Be Considerate.

We must beg those who owe THE ACADIAN subscriptions to pay up without further urging. The price of paper and other printers' materials has advanced and will further advance and it is necessary to have cash to pay our bills. Will not those who owe us and continually neglect to pay, have the kindness to forward the amount of their indebtedness without further delay. This is an unpleasant subject to harp on, but the fault is not ours.

Complaint has been made to THE ACADIAN that a citizen of the town was arrested this week on account of unpaid taxes and only escaped being locked up by promptly paying the amount due to the officer. While in no way desiring to escape payment of taxes, the citizen feels himself aggrieved in as much as he was singled out from a large number in arrears. We are inclined to think that he is justified in so looking upon the matter. There should certainly be no discrimination in matters of this kind, and equal treatment should be meted out to all. The law in such matters provides, we believe, that in cases of overdue taxes, an attachment may be made of any personal property, and only in the absence of such an arrest may a case on record in the province where an arrest has been made for unpaid taxes. We would like to know who is responsible for this annual action.

There will be four more by-elections for the House of Commons before Christmas. The existing vacancies are in Nicolet and Labelle, vacated by the resignation of Hon. C. R. Devlin and Mr. Henri Bourassa respectively. The other two will be in Ottawa and Centre York, where Hon. N. A. Belcourt and Mr. Arch. Campbell will be elevated to the Senate. There is every possibility that the senatorial appointments will go through before Saturday and that the dates of the by-elections will then be announced. They will take place about the 12th of December.

Dexter M. Ferry, head of the seed firm which bore his name, and who was prominent in local business enterprises, was found dead in bed at his home in Detroit on Monday of last week. He retired in apparently good health and died from heart disease during the night. Mr. Ferry was born in Rochester, N. Y., in 1833. He went to Detroit when a young man and amassed a large fortune, being one of the wealthiest men in Detroit.

Councillor R. F. Reid is looked upon as one of the strongest men in sight if made a candidate for either Ottawa or Halifax. Shrewd, able and popular, a gentleman of the old school, he unquestionably would be the strongest candidate in Horton township. If Mr. Reid could be persuaded to accept nomination under an independent standard there is very little doubt but that he would be elected by a very large majority.

Radcliffe, the public executioner, who hung Collins at Hopewell Cape, N. B., states that he has executed over two hundred men. He has been a student for the ministry, a sailor, a soldier. He is hardened to the work; but any reference to the Robinson execution at Kentville he evades with a shudder. And no wonder! If he were to blame for what took place on that memorable occasion hanging would be too good for him, but he was not.

With one exception the past season has been the most successful in the records of codfishing along the Labrador coast. The total catch was 289,493 quintals, valued at \$1,013,227. Last year the catch amounted to 250,887 quintals. All fishing operations along the Labrador coast have ended for this year and the vessels have left for their home ports.

College News.

Two basketball games of the inter class league were played on Saturday. The Freshmen won from the Juniors, and the Sophomores handed the Seniors a lesson. On Wednesday the Freshmen defeated the Academy.

The Juniors and Seniors debate in College Hall to-morrow evening. President Hutchinson left for St. John yesterday. On Sunday he will preach in the Main Street Baptist church.

Principal DeWolfe returned from St. John Wednesday. He was Acadia's representative on the intercollegiate committee which unravelled the football fiasco.

A joint political meeting under the auspices of the Acadia Athenaeum Society will be held in College Hall on Saturday evening, December 7th.

The speakers will be: Conservative, W. B. Porter, Geo. F. Kirstead and L. V. Margeson; Liberal, G. V. White, P. C. Atkinson and L. N. Seaman. The past record and present status of each political party will be thoroughly cleared up.

P. R. Hayden, of the Senior class, received a telegram on Tuesday saying that his mother was dead at Jordan Falls, Shelburne county. He left on the afternoon train to attend the funeral.

Drop in Prices.

The prices of almost all country produce are very high, but signs are not lacking which seem to point unmistakably to a drop all along the line. Money is tight. Not only is this true in the United States where some 29 banks have recently suspended payment, but in the larger cities of Canada the tightness is felt. Railroads and large manufacturing concerns are cutting down their staffs and preparing to go slow. Tight money and high prices cannot continue for long. Tight money must necessarily mean a fall in prices, and one of the first evidences of this may be found in the recent slump in pork. Packers have unloaded, in view of the financial depression, and the prices have been pounded down. Western beef has also taken a fall. The crop shortage has made it necessary for hundreds of ranchmen and farmers to cut down their herds, and a fall in prices was naturally to be expected.

Here in the Maritime Provinces the prices of butter, eggs, vegetables, hay, grain etc., have been almost unprecendently high, and while prices on these articles are not likely to drop as low as they did a few years ago, yet farmers cannot reasonably expect the present prices to obtain for long. Those who are holding back, therefore, expecting to profit materially thereby, would do well to study the situation carefully.

Mr. R. L. Borden.

Says the Victoria B. C. Colonist: The Canadian Courier, which professes to be independent in politics, and probably is pretty near it, as near as any paper can very well get, thinks Mr. Borden is lacking in enthusiasm. We do not think the criticism is warranted by the facts. There may be more energetic men than the Conservative leader. He wins rather by his evident sincerity than by his appeals to the feelings of those who listen to him. While many people have left Mr. Borden's meetings not particularly impressed with his faculty of arousing an audience to excitement none can have done so without feeling that they have listened to a sincere, honorable man, in whom they could put every confidence. And it seems to us that such a man is the sort needed in Canadian politics when the time comes—and it cannot long be delayed—when he is called upon to accept the premiership, he will exhibit those qualities which will command the respect, esteem and trust of the people of Canada as few other men have enjoyed them.

Presented to Alexander McKay, Supervisor of Schools, in recognition of his long and faithful service in the schools of Nova Scotia, Nov. 19, 1907.
