

BIG SLUMP IN LOBSTER PRICE

BOSTON, March 16--Lobsters for enten dishes fairly flooded the local market today. A shipment or 200,000 pounds from Nova Scotia was brought to port by the steamer Prince Arthur and prices came down to forty cents a pound The shipment was the largest of this early date in many years.



"A hen is simply an egg-laying machine, noon for Halifax on a short business trip. Mr. Bishop went on, "and you have to Mrs. K. T. Hibbert, of Halifax, spent look after her efficiently and scientifically as you would any other machine. That is I get my information the only secret. mainly from bulletins of the government department at Ottawa. I follow the methods of feeding at egg-laying contests and any other detailed information I want, I get by writing the department.

The result is apparent in the record quoted above made during the month of Januray. Mr. Bishop has a flock of 20 pure bred Plymouth Rock hens.

"It pays best to keep them all of one breed", he said.

The hens are housed in three large coops, each 12 by 14 feet. and each electrically lighted.

Fourteen hour Day

"The lighting counts considerably, he said, "I give my hens the full fourteen nour day of light all the year 'round, just the same as they would get in the summer. coop the night before, and the hens are up and picking for their breakfast at the same time thy would be around in

"How do you feed them?"

Summer Menu
"Well", said Mr. Bishop, "some people think it is sufficient to keep a hen laying, Sunday at Mrs. Vernon Gould's to go to the door of the coop and throw in a handful of grain. They seem to forget that in the summer-time when hens nor mally lay best, they not only get this grain, but in addition they get out and pick up grass and grit and an occasional worm for themselves. Deprive them of these extras and their winter grain food is simply enough to keep them alive. I try to keep the summer menu going all the year round. There is a pan of dry mash continually in the coops-for hen-

The open side in my coop allows the moisture to escape and keeps the humidity of the air the same as outdoors. I have never had a single case of hens suffering from the cold even on the coldest morning "This idea is directly adapted from the



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PALESTINE'S FUTURE

(From the Westminster Gazette.)

Sir Alfred Mond, who returned to London last night, from Palestine, in an interview with a Central News represent ative, described Palestine as a basket of jewels. "There are immense possibilities there," he said. "The country is in a terstate of neglect-the legacy of the Turkish misrule. I can only describe it as a basket of jewels, or a glorious estate which has been let down by centuries of neglect. The Turks cut timber down and never troubled to afforestate. They slaughtered cattle for meat, and did not trouble to replace the slaughtered animals, and the land has been let to itself. Those areas which have been cultivated under European methods have demonstrated how productive the soil is.

Everywhere during my visit I listened to the grateful thanks of the people to the British Government. I am the bearer of a letter to Mr. Lloyd George from the Jewish Council of Jerusalem thanking him for the San Remo declaration. Capital and labor are needed today in Palestine. They are the pressing needs and will, I am sure, be met. There are huge public utility schemes under consideration, and a Government loan of several millions is to be floated for these. There will be ample security for capital and interest in the railways and the hydroelectricical works to be constructed. Sir Herbert Samuel has done a wonderful work there, and is trusted both by the

Arabs and the Jewish population.
"One thing I would say, and that is to warn British traders. The Germans are making desperate efforts to recapture their old market there. Before the war they had the monoply. British traders must be awakened to the possibilities of a great and growing trade with Palestine The seeds must be sown now before the Germans again get the monoply. When I came away there was a large German ship discharging a cargo of cement for works in Palestine. I want to see British traders, there, and the people want to see British goods."




