BONDS FOR HYDRO AND ROADS SOLD Ten Year 5 1-2 Per Cents Disposed of by Government to United Financial Corpora-

tion of Montreal for \$102,267

Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 16-The New Brunswick Government has ac epted the tender of the United Fir ncial Corporation of Montreal, for its new issue of \$1.890,000 provincia onds for hydro-electric developmen and permanent roads, it was an counced here tonight. This com pany's bid was 102,267 for 10 year 51/2 per cent bonds payable in Canada and New York.

Compared with the bid of recent date obtained by the Province of Ontario for 15 year 514 per cent bonds of 101.457 or 5.37 per cent equivalent New Brunswick has the advantage by a considerable margin.



TUBERCULOSIS TOOK HEAVY DEATH TOLL

Deaths in Eight Provinces in 1920 Numbered 5,228

OTTAWA, Jan. 15-Tuberculosis Canada in 1920, according to a bulle tin issued by the Dominion Bureau of First Birthday! Statistics. In Ontario the number of deaths was 2,300; in Nova Scotia, 775 in Manitoba, 455; in British Columbia 146; in New Brunswick, 389; in Alberta, 381; in Saskatchewan, 357; in Prince Edward Island, 125. Quebec's statistics are not included with those of the other provinces, but it is noted that the number of deaths in that province between June 1919.



A quiet but pretty wedding tool Not long ago the Carnegie Institution said: "Bats devour large numbers of mosquitoes. Flying at dusk and after dark, and capturing all night-flying insects on the wing, they

It was with this object in view that a "battery"—in other words, a bat roost—was built on the experimental farm of the Department of Agriculture six miles south of San Antonio, Texas. Another was established at Mitchell Lake, not far from the same neighborhood, which is an attractive body of fluid formed by sewage from San Antonio, its margins offering excellent breeding places for "skeeters.

These structures are about twenty feet high, uplifted on posts, with slanting walls, a projecting roof slightly elevated to allow the bat to Dass in and out, and an additional entry space running all the way down one side, with boards slanting upward so as to exclude light to some extent while admitting the winged tenants.

The roosts soon acquired occupants—about 9,000 in the case of the battery at Mitchell Lake, which was built to accommodate 250,000—and, so far as that went, they were a success. 

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

In the meantime the Dominion Bridge Company, con-tractors for the steel and its erectractors for the steel and its erection, are shipping the material to Quebec daily, and it is expected that the frame work will be well on the way to completion by the beginning of next, summer, though it will take more than another two years to complete the eastern extension and improvements which, when completed, will put the Chateau in an exceptional position by its architecture and unique situation in comparison with all other hotels on the American Continent.

During the meant season the Canadian Pacific has hauled 2,048 cars of grain, containing 4,285,903 bushels, which have been unloaded to the elevators at West St. John, as compared with 2,063 cars, with 3,473,545 bushels during the corresponding season. The elevators at West St. John contain a million and a half bushels of grain. There has been a general falling off of import freight during the last few days, but the totals are considerably ahead of the same period twelve months ago.

Quebec.—Reports have been re-reived of the discovery of a mine near Onslow Corners, Que., by Mr. J. J. Turner which it is claimed the ore assays gold and silver, and, it is understood he has refused \$100,000 for it.

The new platform in front of the station is seventy-five per cant. completed, and the pouring of concrete for floors has been commenced in the waiting room. Improvements have been made by the erection of a one island platform, and when the building is opened Carleton Place will be able to boast of a station, not only comfortable, but suitable to the requirements of the town.
