Later details show that a heavy rain and mist compelled a cessation of firing. Lieut Churchill bravely carried the wounded to the tender under fire. While the Boers were destroying the train their scouts pushed in and exchanged shots with the British pickets a few miles from Estcourt. It appears that the Boers were in ambush. As soon as the train had passed by they emerged from cover and dislodged the sleeper bolts.

An official despatch confirms the statement that Capt. J. A. Haldane, of the Gordon Highlanders, attached to the Dublin Fusiliers, and Lieut. T. H. C. Frankland and 37 non-commissioned officers and men of the Dublin Fusiliers are missing. Capt. Haldane distinguished himself by his services in India, for which he received the D. S. O. (Companion of the Distinguished Service order.) He also was wounded at Etandslangte.

The London Standard's correspondent at Ladysmith, in a despatch to his paper, doted Nov. 17th, says that the arrival of the British relief column at Estcourt has completely modified the plans of the Boers. Gen. Joubert has now moved to the southward of Ladysmith, in order, it is presumed to present the investigation. the southward of Ladysmith, in order, it is presumed, to prevent the junction of the relief force with the Ladysmith garrison. In the meantime a desultory cannonading of the town is continued by the Boer artillery, but, on the whole their performance is unexciting, and very little damage is being done by their shells. The Boers continue to receive reinforcements and fresh supples of stores almost every day. The garrison at Ladysmith are chafing against their enforced inactivity, and are eager for action. Their desire is likely to be granted, as a reconnaisance on Tuesday showed that the enemy were holding off to the south in the direction of Colenso in force. A decisive battle is herefore expected when the time comes for the troops now at Estcourt to attempt to make the junction with the Ladysmith garrison. In the meantime there need be no anxiety concerning the ability of troops no anxiety concerning the ability of troops in Ladysmith to hold out until relieved.

The schooner had a full cargo of produce shipped by Wright Bros. of Crapaud, besides some produce and live stock belonging to the captain, all of which was lost. The cargo was insured. The schooner was owned by Capt. Kenny, and was not insured.

The Moncton Times says; The farmers who were promised and believed that they would get better prices for what they have to sell and cheaper manufactured goods as a result of Liberal government, must feel themselves badly fooled. The prices of manufactured goods have advanced from 25 to 100 per cent, in the last two years, while farm produce has seldom been quoted so low. In the Charlottetown market last week oats were selling at 27 cents per bushel, potatoes at 15 cents and pork at an average of 5 cents per lb. But for the abundant crops of the past two years and the establishment of cheese and butter factories in pursuance of the policy inaugurated by the Conservatives, the position of the farmers would be bad enough.
