The sole head of a tamily, Calay mal over 18 years old, who was at the com enminiat of the present war and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neural country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchawan or Alberta pplicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency

tion of land in each of three yars e in certain districts a nomesteadr may secure an adjoining quarter-security as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre Duties-Reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead coasnt and, cultivat e 50 extra acres Ky obtain pre-emption patent as sool as homestead patent on certain con

ditions.

A settler after obtaining homestea patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead n certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.


