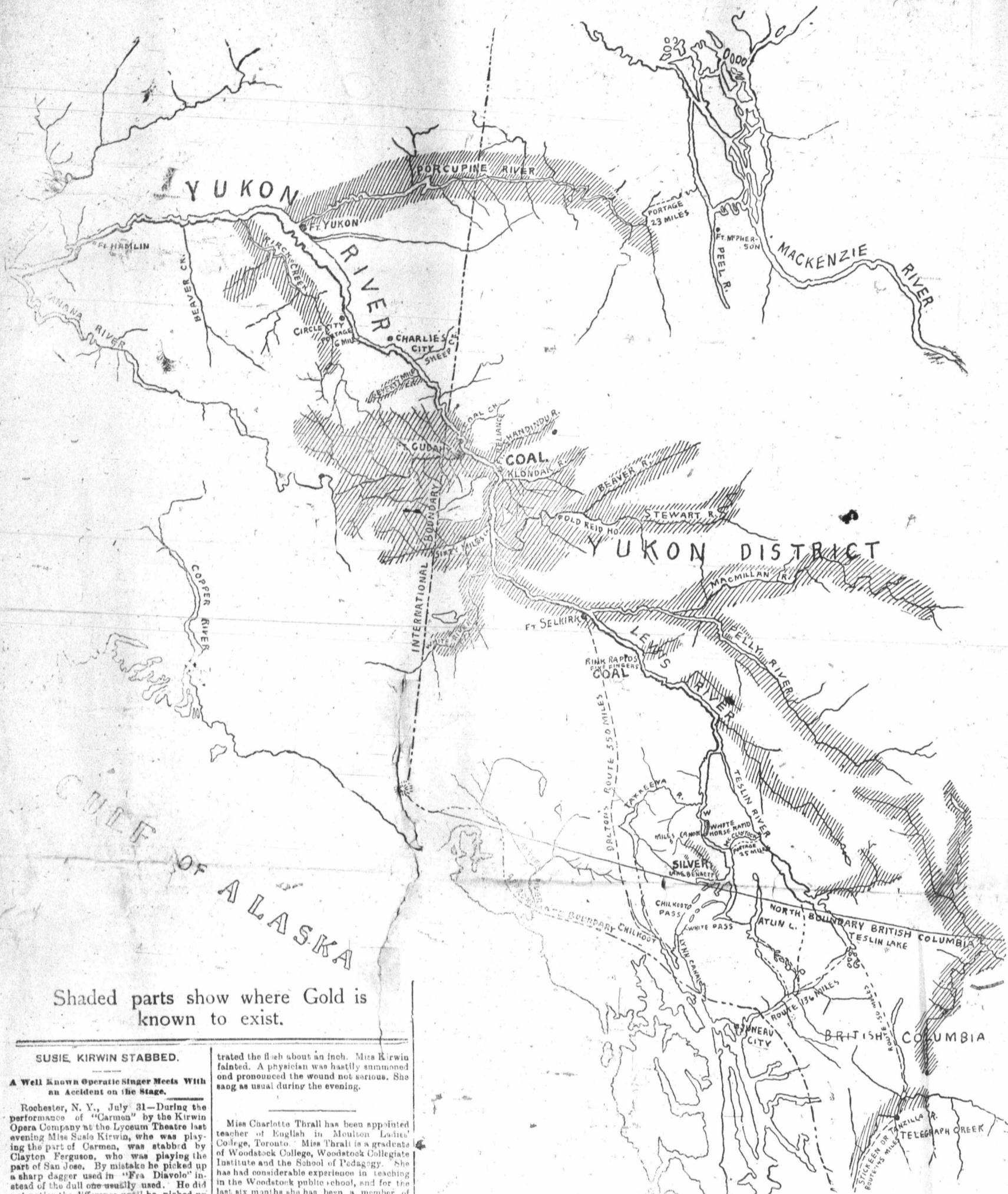

Y., July 31.—During the performance of "Carmen" by the Kirwin Opera Company at the Lyceum Theatre last evening Miss Susie Kirwin, who was playing the part of Carmen, was stabbed by Clayton Ferguson, who was playing the part of San Jose. By mistake he picked up a sharp dagger used in "Les Diabolos" instead of the dull one usually used. He did not notice the difference until he picked up Miss Kirwin with the blood spurting from the wound. The point of the dagger penetrated the flesh about an inch. Miss Kirwin fainted. A physician was hastily summoned and pronounced the wound not serious. She sang as usual during the evening.
