Ministers and Investors.

We observe that Sir Edward Morris is giving a number of interviews to certain papers. We have before us interviews published in The Standard of Empire, The Financial News, The Financial World, and Canada. In a report of an interview published in "Canada" there is one paragraph which has a direct bearing on the principle that a Minister of the Crown should not be a party to transactions which are set forth in the two Memorials which were laid before His Excellency the Governor, over two months ago.

The paragraph to which we refer is as follows, and the part to which we especially direct attention is printed in black type. "The pity is that English investors desiring to invest in Canada and Newfoundland do not, before making their investments, first satisfy themselves from reliable sources as to the bona-fides of the representations made to them. If they did there would be less disappointment as to the results of many of the investments which from time to time are made. Speaking for Newfoundland, I can say that if any person requires information in relation to the resources of the country or the opportunities for investment, or indeed, in relation to any matter, this can always be obtained from official sources by applying direct to the Colonial Secretary or to the chief of any other Department at St. John's." It will be observed that Sir Edward advises intending investors in propositions in Newfoundland to apply to any other Department at St. John's, in order to obtain information, as Mr. Ministers holding portfolios

have been publicly recommended by the Prime Minister of Newfoundland for this purpose, it is now, more than ever, absolutely essential that their position shall be absolutely above suspicion of any personal interest in any investment scheme. It is a sine qua non that each Minister shall be able to make a declaration fully and truly that he has no interest, direct or indirect, near or remote, in any investment scheme of the nature referred to by Sir Edward Morris. The Premier on February 22nd last declared in the House of Assembly, as we have quoted on several occasions:—"I have never had an interest, direct or indirect, near or remote, in any timber or mineral wealth. I have never made an application for a piece of timber or a mineral grant."

As a declaration of strict adherence to a rule of conduct which should guide a Minister of the Crown, the sentiment expressed is admirable. Indeed if any other rule was permissible, or if strict adherence to such a rule was not insisted on, the existence of a Ministry would be a menace to the commonwealth and would go far to discredit our system of government and tend to convert party government into a system of graft.

Much more is such a rule of conduct essential now that the Prime Minister of Newfoundland has advertised his Ministers as chiefs of bureau of official, and therefore disinterested, information for intending investors in the resources of Newfoundland.

In order that there may be plain dealing and that Newfoundland be raised above reproach, and recover from the severe blows Newfoundland schemes have received the last three years, it is essential that this plain duty be observed by every Minister of the Crown.

His Excellency the Governor is the guardian of our honour in this respect, and the Prime Minister is his chief adviser in respect of it. How then does it happen that Sir Edward has not insisted on the resignation of the Hon. Donald Morrison, and how comes it about that the latter is acting as Premier, for in the Daily News of yesterday is published a message addressed to "HON. D. MORRISON, ACTING PREMIER?"

It seems opportune now to direct the attention of His Excellency the Governor to this new departure of his Prime Minister, and to ask him to take it into consideration in arriving at a decision on the Memorials submitted to him by the President of the F. I. C. And also, as His Excellency is apparently waiting for the return of his Prime Minister for further discussion before he gives his decision, we direct his attention to a document which was filed in the office of the Registrar of Companies, St. John's, Newfoundland, on March 2nd, 1911, a copy of which certified by the Registrar is now before us as we are writing, it relates to the St. George's Lumber Co., and sets forth that at that time the nominal capital was \$1,200,000, divided into 1,200,000 shares of \$1 each. The total number of shares recorded and issued for cash was 15,000. The total amount agreed to be considered as paid on 1,165,000 shares was \$1,165,000.

These latter shares are recorded as issued for other considerations than cash.

The feature of the document to which we direct special attention is the share list, which sets forth that Sir E. P. Morris, of St. John's, Nfld., held on February 20th, 1911, 40,000 shares in this company.

This latter statement is apparently in direct conflict with Sir Edward's statement in the House of Assembly last February, viz.—

"I have never had an interest, direct or indirect, near or remote in any timber or mineral wealth."

His Excellency the Governor will doubtless consider the propriety of requesting his Chief Minister, who is we imagine advising him on the Memorials, to rescind his statement taken from the official debates of the House of Assembly with the statement in the record of the Registry of Companies to which we have referred, and particularly so, now that the Prime Minister has recommended Newfoundland Ministers as advisers to British and other investors.

Norwegian Ship a Total Wreck.
CREW SAFE.

Yesterday the Telegram made an allusion to a Norwegian vessel being ashore but at the time no particulars could be ascertained. To-day we were kindly furnished with details by Mr. J. C. Hepburn, who was apprised by a message from Balne Johnston's agent at Battle Harbour, Mr. Croucher stating that the "Thattalla," a full rigged Norwegian ship, went ashore at Pleasure Harbor, which is about twenty miles from Battle Harbor, on Monday. The Thattalla is a barque of 1,700 tons and was in ballast on her way from Sandfjord, Norway, to Pt. Leamington, for a cargo of lumber when she went ashore." On receipt of the above information Mr. Hepburn communicated with her agent, Mr. Croucher, giving instructions for the 3. S. Southern Cross, which was at Battle Harbor with supplies, to proceed to the wreck and give all assistance possible. The Southern Cross reached the scene of the wreck yesterday at noon and returned to Battle Harbor this morning reporting to headquarters here that the Thattalla was a total wreck. The game was well worth witnessing. The teams are evenly matched, but the Cadets seemed to combine best.

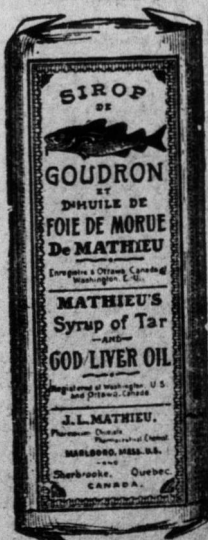

An Imperial Trade Congress.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day.
The eighth Congress of the Chambers of Commerce of the Empire met yesterday, 300 delegates were welcomed by the Lord Mayor. Mr. Asquith, Premier, said such gathering coming from all parts of the Empire, representatives and accredited delegates of commerce and industry was one of the striking proofs and our surest safeguard for loyalty, unity and strength. Whatever differences of opinion there might be, the common object was the furtherance of the material interests, ensuring closer bonds of sympathy which united various communities that were subject to the King. For several years past nearly one quarter of the imports of the kingdom has been received from Overseas Dominions and possessions and over one third of the exports of the United Kingdom had been sent by them. The total import and export trade for 1911 represented between the Dominions themselves, amounting at least to 70 million more. These were stupendous figures and the inference was plain and the deliberation upon which they were to enter and the conclusions at which they would arrive must have greatest weight with those who are called upon to guide various parts of the Empire. Lord Desborough, in his Presidential address to delegates emphasized the fact, becoming more and more apparent, that if the empire was to live it must be consolidated. Commerce as well as defence made it impossible to deny that the enormous progress of other countries threatened the supremacy which Britain once held. He concluded by dwelling upon the importance of such a body as the British Imperial Council of Commerce, assisting statesmen dealing with business requirements of the empire as a whole. The Congress telegraphed an expression of devotion and loyalty to the King.

Organized on Same Lines.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day.
Lord Haldane, speaking at a banquet, after a review of troops by the King said the Dominions were organized for war on the same lines as adopted here. Our forces now had to be so disposed as to protect the Overseas Dominions, but the time would come very soon when the Dominions would have so organized their own naval and military defenses that we should become by far the most powerful military and naval nation combined, the world has ever seen. Haldane especially referred to the visit of Canadian cadets and said in organization the cadet forces in England had something to learn from her daughter States.

Tillett Threatens Shooting.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day.
In the course of an inflammatory speech to strikers, Tillett, the leader, made a violent attack on Lord Devonport, Chairman of the Port of London, an authority whom he declared was responsible for the strike. He continued: "Employers want the Government to turn out soldiers to shoot you if you want to say if there is any shooting, I am going to take a gun and shoot Devonport." Undeterred by the failure of previous attempts the Government resumed negotiations with a view of arranging a peaceful settlement of the dock strike. The prospects of success are slender, as shipowners are convinced that a national strike cannot be successfully engineered, and have taken an unyielding attitude. The number of men outside London who have responded to the call for a national strike does not exceed 25,000, but several ports, including Bristol, Swansea, Southampton and Manchester are partially tied up. The London situation remains unchanged.

A HARD WINTER On the Labrador.

Great Shortage of Fur--Huskies and Indians Have Hard Time --Some Die of Starvation-- They Lose Their Dogs Thro' Lack of Food---Writer is tried of Eating Partridge Twice a Day for 3 Months.

From a letter by a resident on the Labrador we learn that times have been especially hard on the Labrador during the past winter.

The writer states that:

"During my 21 years' experience of this country, I have never seen a winter like the present, and if it was not that the inhabitants did fairly well both with fish and salmon last summer, the demand for relief would be something fierce. As it now stands, quite a number had sufficient provisions to last them until about the end of February, but now, (Feb. 25th) most are out and every day more or less are coming for assistance. Many trappers with from 100 to 150 traps, to date have not caught a single skin, not even an ermine. Last year about this time I had purchased about six thousand dollars' worth of furs, while to date I have not one hundred dollars worth on hand. To make matters worse there is no chance of much improvement, as with the exception of a sign of a few mink and otter inland, all other fur bearing animals seem to have utterly disappeared."

"At the head of Hamilton Inlet, where at least 600 foxes were secured last season, when I visited there two weeks ago, only seven had been caught."

"The problem is what has become of them. The majority of the trappers believe that they contracted distemper last spring and all died."

"The Northern mail reached here last week, and the accounts from that part of the coast, if possible are even worse than here, as not only have the fox hunt failed, but the seal catch as well. This latter has proved a very serious matter at the Moravian Stations, as not only the natives, but the dogs as well partly depend upon it for a living. I am informed that most of the latter have starved to death and the Huskies have had to remove to the woods, so as to be near firewood, having, now they have lost their dogs, no means of hauling it to their homes at the Moravian Stations. My correspondent also makes the remark that not a single fox has been caught by the Esquimaux at any of the Moravian Stations."

"The Indians that hunt inland inside Davis Inlet are also up against it, having either missed the deer last fall or otherwise there was none for them to miss, as a gang came out early in December in a starving condition, bringing the news that six of their number had died of starvation, and that many others were in such a weak state that unless provisions were speedily got to them they would follow suit; however, I believe Gaurreau got provisions to them in time, as on the 24th ult the majority if not all the gang had reached the Post, most being in a shocking state, the poor fellows had done nothing with fur, and Gaurreau hardly knew what to do for them, but by first winter mail I instructed him to allow no one to starve, so if my letter has reached him he will have something to act upon."

"Only one poor solitary deer has been killed in this Bay to date, and if it was not that partridges were fairly plentiful, we should ourselves be pretty short of fresh meat, however, I suppose we ought not to complain, but after having partridges twice a day for the past three months one is apt to get rather tired of them and long for a change."

Yesterday morning at Marlborough House, the residence of Queen Alexandra, a man named William Woodley, an escaped lunatic, eluded the guard of police and soldiers and broke into the Palace. He roamed about through many rooms, and finally went to sleep in a bed in a room on the first floor. The Queen Mother was not in residence, but Princess Victoria was. When the intruder broke in she was sleeping in her apartment. The lunatic was discovered by a housemaid at 8.45 this morning.

Use of Motor Boats in the Norwegian Fishery.

It appears, however, that there are no figures obtainable showing the catch by motor boats alone; but the Director of Fisheries has supplied me with statistics, which are enclosed herewith, showing the number of vessels of different types employed in the cod fisheries in the most important districts during the last three years.
