WASHINGTON, Feb. 14. President, Taft declared to close advisers to-day that the only thing that could force him to ask Congress to interfere in Mexico, would be if the erces of Madero or Diaz should turn upon Americans, merely because they are Americans or foreigners. Taft et it be known that he would, in that event, rush a special message to Concress in thirty minutes' time. He does not regard the killing of a few Amricans as a cause of battle, but ooks upon such casualties as unvoidable, believing that the proper uthorities should be held liable in damages. The President was disturbed to-day when he heard reportshat communications between Mexico City and the United States might be cut off. At the first usual semiweekly session of the Cabinet, the Mexican situation was discussed. t is understood that its members are n complete accord with the Presilent's attitude


MEXICO CITY, Feb. 14. The rebels opened battle to-day at. .45 a.m., when they started firing in he direction of the Federal concenration point. It had been expected that the Federals would attack first. President Madero, this morning, sent another ultimatum to Diaz, demanding his surrender. The reply came in the shape of a number of cannon alls from the biggest guns of the nsurgents. A stream of refugees, nost of them Mexican citizens, were observed carrying bundles and scurying to the suburbs, from the densey populated district between the Nanal Poloce and the Argonal he firing became more intense. In nany churches special services were tarted for restoration of peace. Thousands of refugees knelt in the old edifices and joined in the prayers, t the same time trusting, not a little o the heavy walls for protection gainst the projectiles. Diaz made reparations to contest every inch of he advance of the Government roops, as he intended he would do in is reply to the President's ultimatum when he told the Government that he and his followers preferred to die at heir posts rather than surrender. they would never ask clemency, nor did they wish it. CHRISTCHURCH, N.Z., Feb. 14. Comment was made here yesterday that Capt. Scott, Dr. Wilson and Lieut. Bowers might have been saved the rescue party had pressed south igorously from its base in March last. Its failure, according to the ritics was due to the inexperience of the acting-Commander, Surgeon Atkinson, who allowed the bulk of the arty to remain at Cape Evans, cut off by open water from the Kut Point dge of the barrier. At the end of February two men went south 155 miles to a depot near which Scott lied, but returned on March 10th. On March 17th, Dr. Atkinson, with one companion, went out 80 miles and then returned, and the southern explorers were left. Their re-appear-ance made it obvious that the need of assistance was intense. Relations between Evans, now leader of the expedition, and Atkinson, are reported to be very strained. Asked for a statement regarding results, Lieut. Evans said .- "There is Dr. Atkinson; he is he man who knows. If he makes a statement, I may have somthing to sav after him." Dr. Atkinson made no reply. In a formal enquiry as to the conduct of the search party, in answer to a cablegram from the editor of the Daily Chronicle, informing him that that paper had donated two thousand pounds to the Scott Memorial Fund, and asking for further news of the expedition, Lieut. Evans begged to be excused from "going into details, which may be painful, in regard to the end of our beloved comrades. The whole history of this expedition.' he adds, "will certainly be given to the public in due course, but please let us complete our work in quiet-







Murdered By Consent. BOY SAVED FROM Paris, Jan. 30 .- The question of whether murder is permissible in the case of a person suffering from a painful and incurable disease is again being discussed in Paris in consequence of a double tragedy which took place in the Rue de Belleville.

Eugene Carriere and his wife, who lived with their son in a little flat, were found dead by the son this morning. The wife had been strangled, and Carrier hanged himself in the adjoining room. Mme. Carriere was suffering from spinal trouble, and the physicians told her husband that she could not be cured. She suffered greatly, and she and her husband agreed to die together.

When the son came home from work his father told him that his mother had been removed temporarily to his bedroom, and asked him to sleep at the residence of his uncle. When the son returned to the flat this morning he found his mother dead in bed. A note written by his father lay on the table. It explained that, unable to see his wife suffer any longer, he ended her life with






