

Sir Robt. Bond

An Able, Honest and Independent Parliamentarian

Yesterday we had under consideration the advantages to the Opposition Party of having as its leader a statesman who is universally recognized as able, honest and independent.

The Liberal Party can present to the country a man of proved ability, proved honesty, and proved independence as the leader of the House of Assembly and as Premier of the Colony. His ability was markedly shown when he led the House of Assembly to a sense of its own dignity and an appreciation of a proper settlement of the French Shore question by leading it

to reject the settlement arrived at in London in 1891. His ability was clearly evidenced on the way he put through the Legislature the curtailing of expenditures in all departments in order to cope with the situation which arose out of the financial straits of 1894. His ability was exhibited in the great fight he put up on the Reid Deal, and the way he coped with the amendment of the Act in 1901. Then there was the legislation he put through which crowned the settlement of the French Shore difficulties in 1904, which earned the praise of His Excellency the Governor Sir Cavendish Boyle. Can anyone forget the fight he put up against

THE PRETENSIONS OF AMERICA

and the compulsion attempted to be exercised by the Colonial Office. In all these his foresight and actions have been abundantly justified by the calm judgment of later years. We might also instance the wisdom he displayed in a gradual and judicious reduction of duties which bore heavily on the fishermen and workmen and his constant effort to reduce taxation. But we have said more than enough to demonstrate the proposition that in Sir Robert Bond, the people have a parliamentarian

OF PROVED ABILITY.

We also stated that Sir Robert Bond is a parliamentarian of proved honesty. This honesty of purpose he showed in the period of the Thorburn administration by refusing to take a leading position on the Government side of the House, as Colonial Secretary, and remaining as a private member in opposition rather than sacrificing the principles which guided him and smirch his parliamentary honour. His honesty of purpose was shown in his opposition to schemes which would benefit the great capitalist at the expense of the people. His

HONESTY OF PURPOSE

was shown in the fights he put upon the question of international import when he faced the frowns of those who could reward complacency and give cold shoulder to those who opposed their wishes.

In the third case we have stated that Sir Robert Bond is a parliamentarian of proved independence. He showed this in his preference for opposition rather than the dependence on the Thorburn Government for which he had no liking. He proved this in the independent stand he took in the French Shore debate when he withstood his leader and the Home Government at the same time. He showed this when he

in 1898. He showed this in his fight against American pretensions. He has thus abundantly proved that in parliament he is a man of ability, of honesty and of independence. That is the

Why Should Anyone Follow Higgins

INTO THE REID-MORRIS CAMP.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—I don't wish to do an injustice to Mr. Higgins, but I should like to know what special qualification he possesses to ask the Liberais of St. John's East to change their politics and follow him into the Reid-Morris Camp. I admit "Billy" is a good fellow, popular among the sports, eager to aid in football, hockey and other matches, but is his popularity a sufficient justification to me to change my politics. I have never voted other than Liberal, I am a father before me, since the days of '54, I have always supported the Liberal cause. I voted for Mr. Kent in the last two elections. Now, I am asked by Mr. Higgins, for reasons good enough to himself if not to me, to follow him and if I can't vote for his colleagues, Howley and Bartlett, to split my vote for Higgins. Why should I? Higgins was talking Liberal politics until two or three months ago and was generally credited with a desire to oust Mr. John Dwyer from the Liberal team, so that he might find a place on it. When Mr. Higgins "converted" to the Tory cause was announced, the best explanation his friends could offer was the shameful one that he had been inflected in the Liberal ticket, Bond and Kent refused to turn down Dwyer for him and when the chance to get on the Tory team offered he accepted. Apparently Mr. Higgins nor the friends who offered this apology for him saw what a confession of political immorality this explanation implied. If it was sincere in his Liberal convictions and wished to fight for them and uphold them in the District of St. John's East six months ago, and this is the only reason he can offer to account for the change he must now inwardly condemn the Government and the policy he advocates. In other words he is a hypocrite. Now can he show me any good reason why I should do likewise. It does not profit me to vote for Morris or Bond. I am not getting anything out of politics. I am an ordinary Liberal voter.

"Some men," the editor of the News stated a few days ago, "change their opinion from conviction, others for consideration." I at least shall not be among the class that changes for a consideration. Whether Mr. Higgins has changed from conviction or for some reason sufficient to himself I wish to inform him that the great majority of his sporting friends are not so fickle minded as he is. He may get a few split votes but when the ballots are counted he will find the number very small. He will find, moreover, that the 1,800 votes obtained by Gibbs will far exceed anything he may poll. Gibbs was a straight Tory, appealed for votes as a Tory, had never been anything else and under the circumstances polled a wonderful vote, so much so that he could not believe he was defeated until nearly the last ballot was counted. Let me ask "Billy" Higgins what strength he has among the sporting voters of the town compared with the strong labor vote Gibbs brought to the Poll? I cannot see it, I cannot see the change. Why all this talk among the heifers of Higgins going to head the poll? Bluff! Just that and nothing more. The very fact that these same men ignore Howley and Bartlett in their canvassing is proof that their best hopes are to squeeze Higgins in as the third man. Howley who scouted out of Placentia knowing the District had gone dead against the Government is aware he is leading a forlorn hope. As for Bartlett, another "rat." Will some one rise and explain what magnetism oozes from Harry Bartlett that all the "longshiners" who work on Harvey's steamers should be expected to follow him like sheep and vote Morris or Reid as he tells them, and this is the team composed of two renegades—Liberal and Tory—who was afraid to face Placentia who are going, ac-

ording to these venacious writers P. T. and J. A. R. to sweep the East End. Not this time. COM. MAN.

BOND CAN'T LOSE.**

LONDON, To-day.
Rt. Hon. Sir Walter Francis John Hutchinson, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Cape Colony, from 1901 to 1910, died yesterday.

BUCHAREST, To-day.
The betrothals of Prince Charles of Roumania to Grand Duchess Olga of Russia and Crown Prince George of Greece to Princess Elizabeth of Roumania will be announced at an early date.

MADRID, To-day.
Avanah Premier announced that Spain would participate in the Panama Pacific Exposition at San Francisco. The desire to participate is understood to be due greatly to the influence of King Alfonso, who particularly desires to see Spain officially represented.

SANTA DOMINGO, To-day.
The revolution has been limited to Puerto Plata, Moca and Samana Bay in the Northern part of the Republic. All other parts of the country are reported quiet. Foreign residents are in no danger of conducting various business, travelling without fear of being molested. The blockade however continues at Puerto Plata Santa.

LONDON, To-day.
The announcement by the Admiralty that a fleet comprising eight battleships and three battle cruisers will be sent to the Mediterranean early in November, coupled with the dispatch of four large armoured ships which will have their base at Bermuda indicates a radical change in British naval policy which on account of friction with Germany has kept practically all fighting units near home for several years past. The Mediterranean fleet after the manoeuvres will cruise as far as Alexandria. With the vessels already in those waters, the visiting fleet under Vice-Admiral Sir Stanley Colville will make the most imposing naval demonstration ever attempted by Britain in the Mediterranean. The fourth cruiser squadron is leaving England on September 29th and will proceed direct to Bermuda. It is due there on October 10th, after which the ships scatter and visit various ports in the Caribbean.

Our Trembling Cities.

The heavy motor-bus traffic near St. Paul's, London, has shaken and cracked the columns of the cathedral so seriously that the Government is considering how the vibrations can be lessened. All large cities, however, are in a constant state of vibration, in places like London, Manchester, and Birmingham there is not a square inch of soil that is perfectly still. In some large towns it has been found necessary to insist on iron drainage pipes being used instead of earthenware ones. Though embedded in concrete, the average earthenware drain-

age pipe lasts only a few weeks uncracked. Last autumn Professor Ingleton experimented in different parts of London with a seismometer—the instrument used for measuring earthquakes. He found that though the trembling of the earth was naturally less in the suburbs than in the City, and between 1 a.m. and 6 a.m. than at other parts of the day, the constant vibration was such as to make a seismometer in London useless for its real purpose of registering far-distant earthquake shocks. Of recent years there has been some talk of finding a fresh site for Greenwich Observatory, owing to the vibrations set up by the London traffic.

What Good Would That Do Me?

By RUTH CAMERON.



A friend of mine had some expensive luggage stolen from a suitcase which she had checked on a railway trip this summer. Owing to peculiar circumstances, she did not discover the loss for some weeks, and she was then told that it was too late to get restitution.

Whereupon she dropped the matter without notifying the company or making any complaint. Do you think that was right? I don't.

I told her so, and she said, "But why should I bother to report it? It's too late to do me any good."

"Because if you tell them of your loss, the railroad officials will be on the watch to catch the thief, and thus save other people from losing their luggage."

"But what good will that do me?" she persisted. I gave it up.

Altruism, the belief that it is up to you to make the world a good place to live in for other people as well as yourself, is surely needed in this world.

"What good will it do me?" is a barrier beyond which many people are quite incapable of looking.

In this particular line, for instance, I don't suppose that one person out of ten would bother to make the com-

plaint when it is too late for him personally to be benefited by it.

Nor is this indifference confined to intensely selfish people. I know a distinctly generous and kind-hearted woman who was the victim of an inexcusable carelessness in regard to the transmission of a telegram. Her husband was hurt in a railroad accident and was dying. Three successive telegrams were sent to her telling her of his condition, and urging her to come at once if she wished to see him alive. All three telegrams were delayed twenty-four hours and did not reach her until too late. She never reported the matter at all. "What good would it do me?" she said bitterly. "My husband is dead."

Of course an investigation would not have done her any good, but it might have saved some other woman from a similar terrible experience.

Mind you, I do not mean that one should always be making complaints about foolish little things such as a shop girl's impatient answer, or a telephone operator's mistake. Such fault finding is inexcusable, of course. But when serious wrong is done you that is quite another matter.

"It's no good to lock the barn after the horse is stolen," is "not always a true proverb." You may prevent the thief from coming back after your carriage. Moreover, if anyone else has property in that same barn, you may save him from loss; and the willingness to do this is that rare and beautiful quality which the world needs so sorely—altruism.

Remarkable Address by Sir Oliver Lodge—"Memory Persists"—Science and Existence Beyond the Grave.

"Facts so examined have convinced me that memory and affection are not limited to here and now and that personality persists beyond death."—Sir Oliver Lodge's Address to the British Association last night.

It is one of the curiosities of the address which Sir Oliver Lodge delivered to the British Association at Birmingham last night that the portion of it for which he felt constrained to offer some sort of an apology to the scientific critics in his audience should also be that in which the larger audience of the world outside must take a very much greater interest.

For he dealt with the problem, as old as human understanding and as perennially uprising as human hope, of the survival of human personality after bodily death.

Shall we live again? Is there something in us which does not die when death closes the door on the warm precincts of the cheerful day? And does death effect no more than the merging of the soul into some divine ether which encompasses us about, and from which individual souls are born and to which they return again, even as, in the theories of the physicists, planets and suns are born from the unseen impalpable forces of space, and into them are some day again radiated and dissolved?

Communication Possible.

To these immense, and to our way of thinking these unanswerable questions, Sir Oliver Lodge returns a more positive answer than any scientific man has ever ventured to utter from the chair in which he sat. Yes, says he, I believe, and those who have worked with me believe, that we have found and tested evidence that there is a supernatural world; that we are surrounded

A Notable Song Writer.

A fortnight or more ago there died in Buxton, England, one whose songs have been sung the world over for years, but whose name and personality were known to very few. He was the author of that splendid song, "The Holy City," which breathes the very soul of Christianity and the Resurrection. His nom de plume was "Stephen Adams," but his real name was Mr. Michael Maybrick, he being a brother-in-law of the famous Mrs. Florence Maybrick, who was condemned to death for poisoning her husband and whose case was taken up with such zest by prominent Americans at the time. The result of that agitation was the commutation of the death sentence to life imprisonment, and the Maybrick children were taken by their uncle and brought up in ignorance of their parentage. Mr. Michael Maybrick was born in 1844, at the age of eight he learned to play the piano well, and at fifteen became the organist of St. Peter's Cathedral Church, in Liverpool. At the same time he began composing anthems, and having a fine voice, he soon afterwards became prominent on the concert platform and the operatic stage, making the grand tour in 1871. During this tour, while confined to bed by a severe cold, he wrote "A Warrior Bold" which immediately became popular. A few days afterwards he composed that beautiful song reminiscent of the sea, "Nancy Lee," in some ways the best sailor song ever written. For the former song he received five shillings from a publisher who quickly made a fortune out of it. Mr. Maybrick took the song "Nancy Lee" to a publisher of the significant name of Boosey, who refused the requested twenty guineas for it. The author therefore took his manuscript away with him and sang the song at a concert in St. James' Hall, London, and Mr. Boosey offered one hundred guineas for it. Mr. Maybrick refused, however, and published it on the royalty plan, making thousands of pounds by the tremendous sale of the piece. Among other notable songs produced by him may be named "Thora," "Long Live the King," "Valley by the Sea," "Children of the City," "Midshipmite," "The Blue Alsatian Mountains," "Little Hero," "The Maid of the Mill" and "The Holy City."

Of course, these are but a few of a great number of pieces composed by him. For many years he had lived at Ryde, Isle of Wight, and had been mayor of the city five times. He was chairman of the Isle of Wight County Hospital, and was active in municipal politics, cricket, cycling and yachting. Through all his work he maintained the high level of lyricism and his noble pieces helped to save the English speaking world from being entirely given over to the unspeakable reign of "rag-time." Not only were his airs of stately melody and pleasing harmony, but his verses were genuinely poetical, not mere rhythmical balderdash wherein the tune is everything and the words mere "filling," like cobblestones set in a golden setting. The verse as well as the music of "The Holy City" is stately and moving, expressive of sublime emotions:

Last night I lay a-sleeping,
There came a dream so fair;
I stood in old Jerusalem,
Beside the Temple there,
I heard the children singing,
And ever as they sang,
I thought the voice of Angels
From Heaven in answer rang.

And then I thought my dream was changed,
The streets no longer rang,
Hushed were the glad hosannas,
The little children sang,
The sun grew dark with mystery,
The moon was cold and still,
As the shadow of a Cross arose
Upon a lonely hill.

And once again my dream was changed:
New Earth there seemed to be;
I saw the Holy City
Beside the endless sea,
The light of God was on the streets,
The gates were opened wide,
And all who would might enter,
And no one was denied,
No need of moon or stars by night,
Nor sun to shine by day;
It was the New Jerusalem
That would not pass away.

Morris Must Go!

A Bitter Traitor!

President Coaker Expels Capt. Yates From the F. P. U.

This morning's News published a letter, signed A. Yates, in which the President of the F. P. U. was vilified and slandered because Captain Yates was not taken as a Candidate in the coming election. His statements are untrue and show that it is well he was not accepted as a Candidate, as his true value is exhibited in his letter; and such weak-kneed men would be a nuisance to the Union if returned to the Assembly.

He was always a Tory and always disliked Sir Robert Bond. When he was selected at Little Bay Island two years ago he stated that he was willing to retire at any time if it would be required. He was present at Bonavista and voted for the resolutions empowering the President to enter into an arrangement with any party, and did not raise his voice against it as the resolution passed unanimously, and reads as follows:—

Whereas this Council has held a secret session to consider the political situation;

And Whereas the President has explained the situation; Be it Therefore Resolved that this Council hereby empower President Coaker to enter into negotiations in view of securing the co-operation of the party most sympathetic to the F. P. U.'s proposals, and leave the decision to his discretion; failing to arrange with existing parties the President is empowered to organize a new political party to contest every district; and in the event of such to release our selected candidates from their oath.

He also voted for an amendment in the very section of the Constitution that he falsely quoted in his letter, and the amended section that he voted for and which was unanimously adopted read as follows:

63.—Candidates of the Union Party must be members of the Union in good standing. They shall be nominated by the respective District Councils subject to the approval of the President of the Union. When selected, each candidate must sign the necessary pledge of the Supreme Council and subscribe to the oath prescribed by the Supreme Council, to ensure resignation of the Assembly seats when their conduct in the Assembly is not compatible with Union principle and the interest of the fishermen. No member of the Union Party shall accept any position from the Government or any payment in any way except the sessional grant and any indemnity that the Supreme Council may grant him. The expenses of Union candidates must be provided by the Union, and every Union member must

support, vote for and assist in every lawful way the Union candidates. The President shall be the custodian of the papers relating to candidates, pledges, etc.

Captain Yates knowing this to be a fact willfully states that section 63 read otherwise. We quote his words:—

"Now, Mr. Editor, what does the Constitution of the F. P. U. say on this point? I quote it for Mr. Coaker's benefit and for the information of the public. Section 63 says: 'The Party shall not hold more than sufficient seats to secure the balance of power between the Government and Opposition parties, and no Union member of the Assembly shall be permitted to hold his seat if he sit on the side of the Government or Opposition.'"

It appears that he is not particular as to what he states if in doing so he can attack the Union and President Coaker. There were but two candidates in the field, as Capt. Phillips resigned last December, when the District Council last met. In view of these facts it is apparent that the F. P. U. is well rid of such a Candidate. Captain Yates will probably be a Graball Candidate, as he was invited to be one in 1908, but owing to not having been asked in time he could not accept. He, however, will have lots of time to consider the Graball's invitation this time. President Coaker informs us that he has notified all Councils that Captain Yates has been expelled from the Union.

Let him stand against the Liberal team for Twillingate and he will be a wiser if poorer man when the votes are counted. Union men will know how to deal with such TRAITORS, who for selfish ends would, if they could, destroy the Union in order to appease personal animosity. Had Yates been a consistent Union man he would have stood by the resolution of the Supreme Council and loyally endeavoured to aid President Coaker in his efforts to uplift the Fishermen. As for giving up his schooner and losing his summer that is childish talk, for he knows that he could not gain anything financially if he was returned as a Candidate, and the Union would much sooner be continued to run his schooner than give up fishing. Perhaps he had his eyes on some job in event of his being returned. It would surprise few if such were the case, in view of his actions and letter now under review. We are of the opinion that the Union will be delighted to have discovered just what sort of a man this Yates was, and will thank their stars that he is not a Candidate, and that he no longer belongs to the ranks of the Union.

Peter Lobengula at Death's Door.

London, Sept. 19.—Peter Lobengula, eldest son of King Lobengula of Matabeleland, who twenty years ago was fighting against the British forces in Africa and was the most notable figure after Cecil Rhodes at the great peace indaba at the foot of the Matopos Hills, has just received the right to vote in England. He expects to die very soon beneath the Union Jack, for the doctors have given only twelve months to live to this strange man, who was once on African prince, later an actor in the Hippodrome exhibition and, then a coal miner in the Midlands. Now he is slowly dying from tuberculosis.

A constable called his name at the Pendleton Town Hall, Salford, last Thursday, and he came forward to defend his right to have his name kept on the voting list. Lobengula had been challenged on the ground that he was not naturalized in England, but the objection was thrown out because the revising barrister held that naturalization was unnecessary, as Lobengula became a British subject on the conquest of his country.

When he was seventeen years old, a year or two before the indaba of 1894 he was one of the chief participants in the annihilation of Major Wilson and thirty troopers who were on the track of old King Lobengula. Lobengula told the Tribune correspondent that he remembered well hearing Wilson and the troopers sing the British national anthem as their death hymn shortly before they were shot down like dogs.

Lobengula came to this country as an exile with the "Savage South Africa" expedition, and then worked to pantomime, but drifted from that to the mines. The gruelling work and the English climate broke down his rugged physique, and now the man who might have been King from Zimbebe to the Transvaal frontier is wasting away in a little cottage, supporting himself and his family on two small pensions, one of £2.50 weekly, from the Insurance Act, and the other a little sum given to him by the Government on condition that he does not go further into Africa than Cape Town.
