

says: It is understood that under

the new Lloyd-George plan for con trolling British shipping, the White Star and Cunard Liners will operate between Liverpool and Halifax instead of coming on to New York, and will be armed with 6 inch guns fore and aft. In addition to the protection afforded by the runs there will be fast cruisers at certain positions, which will be known to commanders of the liners who will be provided with special signals to enable them to call for assistance if they are attacked. Cargoes will be taken from New York and Boston in small steamers to Halifax, where freight will be transhipped on board the big steamers waiting to convey it to Liverpool London. Passengers will travel by train. The expense of transhipping freight and conveying it to Halifax will be very heavy, but will have t be done in order to make certain that the Government will get sufficien provisions for the people of Britain and for the army of two million men in France and Flanders,

#### A BRITISH VICTORY.

LONDON, Dec. 25. Following up their victory against the Turks in the capture of El Arish 90 miles east of the Suez Canal, the British forces in Egypt have captured the strong Turkish position of Maghdah, 20 miles southeast of El Arish, taking some 1,100 prisoners, 2 guns and quantities of war material, the var office announces to-day. 



## Churchill

PROVES HIMSELF A HERO.

Saturday last Mr. Azariah Church-Il, fisherman of Portugal Cove, reeived a letter from the officer com nanding the Canadian cruiser Grilse which was reported as lost with all her crew off the Cape Breton coast early last week, but later reached port in a damaged condition. The officer made mention of the fact that Reservist Churchill, the eldest son of Reservist Churchill, the eldest son of the veteran fisherman mention above, had performed a most daring feat at a critical time which resulted in saving the lives of all on board the Grilse when that ship was in danger of foundering It happened that the 'booby hatch" broke loose and as a consequence the mountainous seas that were sweeping over the ship were fast filling the holds and at all costs it was necessary to have it fastened Three sailors, whose business it wa to look after that part of the ship, los their lives in an attempt to secur the hatch. It was seen that a strong experienced man was needed to perform such a daring deed, and glancing around him the lieutenant picked out the man most suitable in the person of Reservist Churchill of Portugal Cove, saying, "Churchill, it is your furn next." The answer was quick and sailor-like, "Aye, aye, sir!" With a brief prayer, commending his soul his wife and little one to the care of God, he dashed towards the broker hatch and in very quick time had i lashed down with a strong rope. 





WAR REVIEW.

LONDON, To-Day. The third Xmas of the European war passed without much fighting or the British and French fronts, where virtually only the artillery was ac tive. Men were feasted and entertained as far as was compatible with the sterner business of the war. Rouma nia's first Xmas as a participant of the war witnessed heavy fighting on the Roumania front. Ground was yielded by the Roumanians at some points under pressure of the German porth of Buzen in the Runik Road. A. province, to a sector of which the Men's 3/4 inch thick or tuszo-Roumanian retreat had taken them. 'The army of Field Marshal Von Mackensen began an attack on the bridgehead at Watchin, after Isakishe on the eastern bank of the Danube was captured. An official statement from British headquarters last night reads: Successful raids were made during the night of Sunday against the enemy's trenches west of Angres and east of Armentieres. There has been considerable artillery activity at intervals during the day along the front north of the Somme, where the enemy defences and headquarters has been systematically shelled by us. Much damage was done to the enemy defences. Elsewhere the usual artillery continued, being most marked in the neighborhood of Ypres and also south of Armentieres, where we bombarded buildings, occupied by the enemy in the rear of his lines.




