League of Nations May Die of Non-Support.

One Million Pounds Wanted to Keep It Alive -- Germans Claim French Have Violated Peace Treaty -- London Times Approves French Entry Into Ruhr District--Greeks Preparing to Resist Possible Turkish Attack -- Military Conspiracy Discovered in Munich.

A PLEA FOR FINANCIAL SUPPORT OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS.

LONDON, April 6. Grey, Premier Lloyd George, Admiral Beatty, former Premier Asquith, Lord Robert Cecil and John R. Clines, publish an appeal this morning in the London Times for one million pounds sterling "to keep fresh in the minds of the people of this country the spirit and ideals which underlie the covenant of the League of Nations." The appeal points out what the League of Nations Union already has done in its educational campaign. It says that a million pounds sounds like a large sum, but that if the British people don't support the League of Nations with all their might and resources "the League itself will assuredly wither and die, and if the League should die off, God help our children, for no human agency can save them from calamities to which those of the late war will appear as the merest trifles."

GERMANS INDIGNANT!

BERLIN, April 7. The occupation of German cities in the neutral zone east of the Rhine by French troops was denounced in an official statement dealing with the incident here to-day. It is declared the Government did everything to prevent what is described as this "unheard of action, which is neither in accordance with the sense of the Peace Treaty nor its scope, and is out of proportion with the insignificance of our measures in the Ruhr region."

THE ONLY COURSE.

LONDON, April 7. The French have taken the only right course after such warnings as they had given the Germans, says the London Times to-day, discussing the French advance into Germany. The hope is expressed by the newspaper that it will not be necessary for others of the Allies to advance into the Ruhr district, "but should the conduct of the German Government or its inability

to control general matters make it necessary, public opinion in England, we are convinced, will insist that our French friends shall receive the fullest and heartiest of support from their British comrades in arms." The Times says it notices with extreme wonder the statements from Washington and Rome that British, American and Italian Governments are standing aside, and that they had no objection to the German advance, provided the troops were to be withdrawn when order was restored. "We do not know what the Italian Government may or may not have decided," the Times says, "and we know that unhappily America is reverting more and more to her old attitude of isolation until at any rate the elections are over, but in the enforcement of the Treaty there can be no standing aside for England from her French ally."

PREPARING FOR ATTACK.

Athens, April 7. Greek troops have been authorized by the Supreme Military Council of the Allies to advance to Asia Minor in anticipation of an eventual attack by Mustafa Kemal. They have occupied a strategic position east of the section they have held around Simlerian according to a despatch to the newspaper Ethnos.

ANOTHER CONSPIRACY.

BERLIN, April 7. A great military conspiracy, which was to have been a Bavarian parallel to the recent Berlin revolution, has been discovered in Munich, it was announced to-day.

ANOTHER NOTE.

PARIS, April 7. Herr Geoppert, president of the German peace delegation, this morning handed Premier Millerand a note relative to the operations in the Ruhr Valley and the French occupation of Frankfurt and Darmstadt. The note

was addressed to M. Millerand as President of the Peace Conference.

CONTINUING ON.

METZ, April 7. French troops on the right bank of the Rhine continue their advance, and occupied Homburg, nine miles north of Frankfurt, at 6 o'clock this morning.

ITALIANS WANT RAW MATERIALS

ATHENS, April 7. It is announced here that an Italian commercial commission has arrived in Athens on the way to Russia to negotiate with the Soviet Government for the purchase of raw materials for food, is provided with several million rubles in cash.

GERMAN ELECTIONS SOON.

COBLENZ, April 7. Announcement that elections for the new German Reichstag will be held on Sunday, June sixth, has been made by the minister of Interior, according to press despatches from Berlin.

DANISH PARLIAMENT OPENS.

COPENHAGEN, April 7. The Folkething re-opened yesterday with a large attendance. Premier Friis was loudly applauded and in his speech laid stress upon the fact that the cabinet would hold office until the general elections. He said that all the parties had agreed upon the speediest possible passing of the electoral bill to enable the holding of elections on April 22nd or as soon after that as possible.

JAPS WILL WITHDRAW.

HONOLULU, April 7. The general commanding the Japanese troops at Vladivostok informed the social revolutionists, a cable from Vladivostok states, that the troops would be withdrawn if the Russians would restrict the movement of the Koreans to Siberia and guard the railroads. No time for withdrawal of the Japanese was announced.

CANADA'S SHARE IN LEAGUE'S EXPENSES.

OTTAWA, April 7. Canada so far has paid \$64,043 as her share of the expenses of the League of Nations. This is for the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1920.

CHINESE FLIER.

SASKATOON, April 7. Lim On, Chinese airplane pilot, accompanied by Harry Rowe, left yesterday on a flight to Calgary. They plan to make the trip in three jumps. The pilot is the first graduate of the local Chinese Aviation School, and is making the flight in the interests of Chinese National League, which is to open a convention in Calgary to-day.

ON THE POLISH FRONT.

WASHINGTON, April 7. Bolshevik forces on the Polish front are being regrouped by fresh forces brought up, the Polish war office yesterday advised Major General Brynk, military attaché of the Polish Legation here. "In the sector of Polesia the Bolsheviks are on the defensive," the despatch said. "On the Volhynian front they continue to attack us near Slawebchno."

STEAMER KEARNEY IN DIFFICULTIES.

NEW YORK, April 7. The coal laden Shipping Board steamer Kearney, from Newport News for Rotterdam, was disabled yesterday about 950 miles east of Norfolk according to a wireless message received at the naval communications office here. She had burned out the bearings of two turbines. The steam-

REDS DISPERSING.

BERLIN, April 7. The advance troops of Reichswehr and shock troops entered the suburbs of Essen yesterday afternoon, and another detachment occupied the Essen town hall last evening. Long columns of the Red Army in motor lorries and on foot passed through Elberfeld on Tuesday. Most of them surrendered their arms at Elberfeld. Others marched into occupied territory, chiefly to Solingen, where they were disarmed by the British. Other insurgent bands, still armed, are wandering about the mountains. Five hundred insurgents were transferred by the British to a camp near Cologne. Railway traffic in the Essen region probably will be resumed to-day.

EXCHANGING PRISONERS.

PARIS, April 7. Negotiations between Bulgaria and Greece for exchange of prisoners of war have been completed, according to advices from Sofia. Premier Stambouliwsky, of Bulgaria, has announced that Bulgarian prisoners held in Greece will be repatriated immediately in exchange for a certain number of Greek subjects now interned in Bulgaria. Serbia has also consented to repatriate Bulgarian prisoners.

AMERICA NOT A PARTY TO IT.

COBLENZ, April 7. It was learned yesterday at the office of Mr. Noyes, American Rhine-land commissioner, and representative of the State Department in the American occupied area, that several days ago Mr. Noyes formally disassociated himself from any action the high commissioner might take involving it directly or indirectly in a possible French advance into unoccupied territory. It was also stated at the office that Mr. Noyes had notified Washington of his action.

Rum or Moonshine.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—Before Mr. Beresford, of 82 Pennywell Road, takes Dr. Blackall to task in the Advocate for expressing his conscientious ideas on the defects of Prohibition, he should remember that Newfoundlanders in Outports know a thing or two as well as he. Dr. Blackall is too popular, has done too much for education in Newfoundland to be called a twaddler for giving the failure of the Prohibition Act. When one considers the (1) Dope question, (2) the Moonshine and Scraps, one can readily see that the Act needs amendment. I lived in the Outports for twenty-eight years before Prohibition, and never saw one drunk, but what have I seen since Prohibition? Mr. Beresford speaks about other countries. Chorus-Girl to Producer

An example of how women are now successfully filling positions hitherto occupied by men is provided by the case of Miss Jessie Bonstelle, the stage producer of "Little Women," the play which had a great success in New York for a year and a half, and is now attracting big audiences in London.

"Little Women" is the work of Louise May Alcott, and is really an autobiography. It differs from most plays by dealing with real people who lived and had their being in the life of the authoress, and the principal character in the story is none other than the authoress herself.

"It took me just eight years to persuade the family to allow me to have the book dramatized for stage purposes, because of its reality," said Miss Bonstelle, "and I do not regret a moment of the time I spent. Others often tried to turn me from my path by telling me that the result would not repay me for my trouble. But events have proved otherwise."

Miss Bonstelle, who is an American woman, is described by her friends as "one of the finest stage directors in our country." In America women stage producers are plentiful, but it was Miss Bonstelle who started them in this career. She has succeeded herself just because she loves the work. "When I was but a girl in the chorus," she explained, "I kept my

eyes open. I used to watch every movement of the famous producer, Augustin Daly. In fact, I watched everybody doing his or her work. Often these people would ask me why I was always 'kicking around.' I just told them I was interested in what they were doing.

"When at length I got my chance, some of the stage hands were inclined to be amused at the idea of a woman telling them what to do, but by the use of a little diplomacy everything soon began to work smoothly."

"No," replied Miss Bonstelle to a question. "I am not one of those who believe that women can do things better than men. But I do think there are some positions that women can fill better, just as there are positions which men are more fitted to occupy. But in every walk of life the man with a touch of femininity is likely to succeed where others are not: quite so successful."

Pleasures (?) of Travelling.

Most amusing stories are told of the vicissitudes of travellers returning from the Riviera. Many have occupied corridors for fourteen hours without getting bite or sup. Two clever people went by an earlier train to a frontier town, Ventigmalla, I suppose. They had their own luggage duly cleared, and when the big train came in, and everybody with every package was turned out for the Customs, which are made very unpleasant, they quietly occupied two comfortable corner seats. One Customs man "somewhere in France," with his grimy fingers, held up and admired a delicate slimy and most costly bit of underwear. The frater owner told him his duty was to search for contraband, not to mess her things. Thereupon he threw the garment on the dirty floor, upset her whole trunk, and refused to pass the contents until too late to regain the train. That is how travelling is made alluring on the Continent. By far the most comfortable and the cheapest country in Europe is England, in spite of the appalling cost of living.

UGLY RUMORS.

Wherever men congregate today, are heard sinister rumours of untoward doings on the part of people in high political places. In the clubs, stores, auction rooms, market places and offices the question is being asked—but not openly answered—What do you think of it all? Every man has his own opinion, and that opinion is invariably coincident with that of his neighbor, and each one wonders where those high motives of purity which characterised certain aspiring legislators prior to, and during, the election of last fall have disappeared. For disappeared they certainly have. Was it all a bluff put upon the electors for the sole purpose of securing their support, or were the people who had Purity inscribed in large letters upon their political banners the most insincere of hypocrites, believing only in the doctrine of fooling the masses?

Judging by happenings of most recent date the latter is the correct view, and the pre-election exaltation of certain gentlemen had for its one object the satisfying of self, to the detriment of country and of country's progress. Nothing mattered so long as a certain section won and leaders and followers of that section were prepared to go to any lengths to satisfy their lust for power and place. The result of the change desired by the people is now manifest. That change has obviously been for the worst, for in addition to a disruption of the public services, which under certain circumstances could be borne with for a while, there has been introduced into political life such corruption as never before disgraced the political leaders of any country; leaders, that is, having a due regard for the amenities of decent political conduct, and mapping their careers along unswayed and respectable lines.

All sense of the moral law has been dissipated, and the stigma of guilt which attaches to divers of the Government, will not be washed out until the whole body of the charges against them is brought within the public purview. And even then—if proven innocent—the indelible stain will remain.

It had been thought that the days of political turpitude in Newfoundland belonged to the past, but it has been left to the new political party to demonstrate that certain of its members have delved deeper into the mire than any of their predecessors in office. Bribery during elections on the part of a candidate or his agent is a punishable offence. Bribery and the making of corrupt bargains on the part of a Minister of the Crown become more heinous than the purchasing of a vote by a candidate or his agent, and as such should be dealt with more severely. There are rumours of bribery and of venal agreements being entered into by men elected to the House of Assembly, wherein the bargaining has been entirely satisfactory to the parties concerned. The low moral ebb to which the tide of the political stream has been brought was never better exemplified than in the case which is now the talk of the town. It is incumbent upon some person to purge the stream at its source. That task can best be accomplished by one man—an officer of the Crown in the present Government. His opportunity has arrived. Will he measure up to the standard of courage required to grasp that opportunity?

Governor Has Invited

DUKE AND DUCHESS OF DEVONSHIRE.
Will be Officially Received, But Visit is a Private One.
In reference to the statement that the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire had been invited to Newfoundland, made exclusively by the Telegram, we are able to-day to corroborate it on the authority of His Excellency the Governor.
The Governor has invited the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire, who are at present in England, to spend a visit in Newfoundland. The Duke, who is Governor General of Canada, once expressed to His Excellency his wish to come here. The visit has not been definitely decided, but it is felt that he will come.
"In the event of His Excellency coming," said the Governor, "he will remain as my guest for two or three days, and then leave for the interior for some fishing. He is not coming as Governor General, but in his private capacity. The visit will therefore be a private one. However, he will be given an official reception, and an opportunity will be given to everybody to meet him."

Big Harmsworth Plans.

Installing \$1,000,000 Worth of New Machinery; Reconstructing Old Railway Lines Back of Town.
The Anglo-Newfoundland Development Co., of Grand Falls, has some big plans in view. One of them is the installation of two new paper-making machines, which would cost about \$1,000,000. These machines would increase the daily output of paper by 100 tons. The plant will have to be enlarged to accommodate the machines. It is stated, also, that the Harmsworth people will reconstruct the old railway line at the back of the city, so that they may run cars of paper from the regular Reid line, branching at Donovan's, continuing to the extreme East End of the city, so as to be near the front of shipment.

The Jones Election Petition.

(Before Justice Johnston and Justice Kent.)
In the election trial of Dr. Jones, Mr. Mews for the petitioner, opened the case, Mr. Summers announced to the court that he appeared by the direction of the Attorney General, Mr. Mews called Joseph Tilley, sworn and examined by Mr. Mews. States he is a resident of Kelligrews, voter, and voted at the recent election. The witness is asked to stand down, and Mr. Stirling of the Colonial Secretary's Office was called and examined by Mr. Mews. The Election Proclamation and returns were put in evidence and the returns read. Joseph Tilley recalled, examined states met Woodford and Jones at Kelligrews at Mrs. Mercer's Hotel, had conversation in sitting room. When asked for subject of conversation witness said he did not remember. Remembered getting \$75.00 in three equal amounts. Howley objects that particulars are not in the allegations. The allegation is that \$13,000 were distributed to voters by Woodford. Mr. Howley asks for further particulars. Mr. Mews claims that these particulars had not been previously asked for. Mr. Mews agrees to furnish particulars for postponement till these are furnished. Justice Kent objects to postponement, and examination of witness continues. Asked what was the conversation about, witness replied that he did not remember. Asked how he received the \$25.00, witness stated he received it from Woodford in the Board of Works office before the elections. Asked again about the conversation, witness did not remember. On further examination he remembered Woodford asked what would he do for him. Witness said he just gave him the cheque for \$25.00. Did not remember whether it was a private cheque or a Public Works cheque. Woodford did not tell witness what to do with the money. Asked why he was given the money, the witness did not know. Asked how long it took him to get the money, witness did not remember. Here several questions relating to the disposal of the money were objected to by Mr. Howley. Questioned further, witness stated he did not do any work for the money. He met Woodford at the Hotel, but did not remember the conversation there. Re the second payment of \$25.00, witness stated it was paid at the Board of Works office, but did not remember any conversation. Remembered getting the cheque. Further examined stated that the money was for work on road in his own farm. He remembered receiving a third payment, but thought it was made after the elections. Asked if he had enquired for the third payment, witness said he did not. Asked if he knew that there was a Road Board in Kelligrews, witness said he did not know. Mr. Howley asks court leave to reserve cross examination until particulars are furnished. Charles Mercer was called and examined by Mr. Mews, stated he received \$25.00 from Woodford within a week of the elections. The court then adjourned the hearing till 2.30 p.m.

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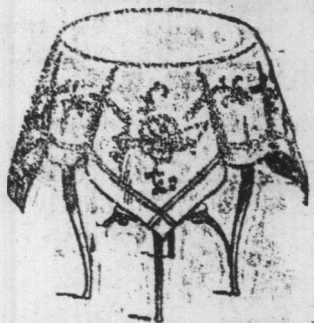

Lectured on China.

At the monthly meeting of the Women's Home Missionary Society in Canon Wood Hall last night, Rev. Dr. Bond gave a lantern lecture on Women's Work in China. Rev. Mr. Moulton presided, and a large gathering attended. The reverend gentleman dealt with his visit to China some years ago, and gave a glowing account of the great work done by the missionaries at various points in improving the people in many ways. The old customs of the inhabitants, forms of worship, their temples, pagodas and idols, congestion in towns and villages, methods of labor and characteristics of different tribes, were all dealt with in most interesting manner. The description of the trip up the river Yangtze was particularly interesting. The views used were unusually fine and added much to the interest of the lecture. Following the address, a solo was sung by Mrs. Cooker, and the passing of a vote of thanks to Rev. Dr. Bond and Mr. Davis, who manipulated the lantern, brought the evening to a close.

Personal Mention.

Mrs. Netten and her little son returned by Kyle from Sydney where they had spent the winter most pleasantly with her aunt. We are all delighted to find her so well and to have our popular little friend amongst us once more.

Messrs. J. Sellars, J. J. Long and Lieut.-Col. Sullivan, M.H.A., who have been in Europe for some time, arrived by the Kyle this morning, having crossed by steamer to St. John, N.B., and by rail to North Sydney, where they joined the Kyle.

Rev. Dr. Greene, of the Cathedral, leaves by the S.S. Schem for Europe on a health and pleasure trip. For some time Rev. Dr. Greene has not enjoyed the best of health, and he has been advised to go abroad by his physician. While on the other side Dr. Greene will probably visit Rome, where he was ordained ten years ago.

Land Settlement for Ex-Service Men.

The Government is prepared to consider the question of affording to ex-soldiers and ex-sailors of suitable character, education and adaptation an opportunity of settling on the land.

The training that would be required of men who would like to take advantage of any scheme the Government may propose would be as follows:

- Work on a farm under some approved farmer for the Summer and Autumn of 1920.
- Every man who during his summer's work had demonstrated his industry and adaptability to agricultural pursuits would be given an agricultural course in some approved agricultural college, experimental farm or similar institution for the winter 1920-1921.
- Every man who had completed the winter's course and during the course had demonstrated his industry and adaptability to agricultural pursuits would be given work on a farm under some approved farmer for the summer of 1921.

(This second summer on a farm might not be required of men who prior to enlistment in Navy or Army had been practical farmers.)

Men who had by their work and conduct during the above courses demonstrated their industry and adaptability to agricultural pursuits and their ability to earn a livelihood for themselves as farmers would be furnished by the Government with a loan of money on easy terms of repayment to enable them to secure small farms with the necessary equipment and stock to start a farming enterprise.

As it is probable that but few men would be able during training to earn sufficient for their own support and the support and maintenance of their dependents, their wages would be supplemented to a reasonable amount, depending upon the circumstances of each case. Dependents would include the wives and children of men married before demobilization.

Until a reliable estimate of the number of men who desire to take up agricultural pursuits under these proposals can be formed, it is impossible to announce details of this agricultural plan.

All ex-soldiers and ex-sailors who desire to undertake agricultural work this summer intending to pursue agriculture for a livelihood, are requested to make application at once to the Vocational Officer, Militia Building, St. John's, for an application form which must be properly filled in and returned to the Vocational Officer not later than the 30th day of April next.

If any ex-service man has any other proposition for settling on the land that he would like to have considered, he is invited to state it in writing to the Vocational Officer at the earliest date possible, but in any event not later than the 30th day of April next.

This announcement does not necessarily imply that a Land Settlement Scheme will be prepared and announced. The action which will be taken in the matter will depend on the number and nature of the applications.

No man who is physically unable to undertake or is afraid to face the hard work entailed by a training to become a successful farmer need apply.

RODMAN ON SIMS.
WASHINGTON, April 7. Admiral Hugh Rodman, commander in chief of the Pacific fleet, told the Senate investigation committee today that Rear Admiral Sims' letter to Secretary Daniels, criticising the Navy's part in the war was "very indiscreet." "Admiral Sims' indiscretions," he said, "lay very particularly in his breach of confidence in making public an intimate and confidential conversation, which should have been held secret."

A SAFE REFUGE.
CONSTANTINOPLE, April 7. General Denekin, former commander of anti-Bolshevik forces in Southern Russia, arrived here Monday night and is to-day a fugitive on board a British warship. Immediately after he landed, he went to the Russian Embassy with General Romanovsky, his former chief of staff, and it was while he was there that the latter was assassinated. General Denekin is believed to be in danger because of the high feeling that prevails among Russian officers here, and went on board the warship under a guard of British soldiers.

CRIMINAL WASTE.
MONTREAL, April 7. Sixty bags of potatoes, which had rotted in the warehouse during the winter, waiting for higher prices, were dumped on Commissioner's Street last night, too far gone to be used even for hogs. It has been impossible to learn where these potatoes came from, but the health inspector is continuing to make inquiries. During the last two weeks of March, over ten tons of meat and other food were condemned by city health inspectors.

HOLY CITY IN TURMOIL.
CAIRO, April 7. While details of clashes between Moslems and Jews in Jerusalem are lacking, which may indicate that a censorship has been imposed, it is pointed out that the Moslems are now celebrating "Moses" the Jews Passover and the Christians Easter. There is always a risk of collisions during processions incidental to these observances, of which there have been a number during former years. Travellers say that an anti-semitic feeling has developed acutely, recently, among the Arabs, but that there has been no show of hostility between Moslems and Christians. When processions of Moslems and Christians met on April 2, not an unfriendly word was uttered, but bands of Moslems and Jews clashed the same day the Jews crying, "We won the country by the sword." A melee ensued, in which knives and stones were used. British soldiers arrived quickly and calmed the trouble but there were subsequent disturbances, as the processions were passing through the city's narrow streets, the Jews being attacked whenever they met.

LORD FRENCH EXPRESSES OPINION.
LONDON, April 7. "I have always been a Home Ruler and more so since I have been here," said Lord French to an Express correspondent in Dublin. "I totally disagree with Dublin Castle methods, but I have had splendid support from Premier Lloyd George and Bonar Law." "What of Sinn Fein?" the correspondent asked. "Does England want a reign of terror in Ireland?" he countered. "That's what Sinn Fein means. The best brains of the country are behind the movement. They have organized an army of a hundred thousand. It is properly regimented, brigaded, controlled, disciplined and officered. They are formidable. They have three treasures. One is a Catholic Bishop." Lord French thinks there is evidence of a split in the ranks of Sinn Fein. He declared the murder of Lord Mayor MacCurtain, of Cork, was the work of Sinn Feiners, because as a brigadier in the Irish Volunteers, he refused to sign a death warrant for a man, eventually found shot dead outside Limerick, as a "traitor to the cause."

WILL NOT WITHDRAW.
NEW YORK, April 7. Japan will not withdraw her troops from Eastern Siberia at once, because of her peculiar national honor and the dangers which threaten her successes in Manchuria and Korea, says a Tokyo despatch, filed March 31, received here to-day. The despatch, which quotes an official statement relative to the recall of Japanese forces from Russian territory, was delayed in transmission, and tends to express the occupation of Vladivostok by Japanese soldiers on April 5.

BY ORDER OF BERLIN.
MAYENCE, April 7. Disturbances broke out in Frankfurt to-day, but energetic intervention by French troops restored order. From German sources it is learned that six Germans were killed, and thirty-five wounded. It is reported that the manifestations, which gave rise to these incidents, were due to an order originating in Berlin. "The

first day of the occupation of Frankfurt passed without incident, the reception by the population being almost cordial," says General Degoutte, French commander, on his return from a tour of the district. "Suddenly, on orders from Berlin, a certain ferment seized the population. This ferment degenerated into aggression, and our soldiers, in self-defence, were obliged to use their arms. So far as I know we had no losses. The incident shows how we must watch the proceedings in Berlin, and that is why the events in Ruhr demand our whole attention. Aggressions at Frankfurt and events in Ruhr are attributed to some military reaction. Of that we have absolute proof."

AGED PREACHER DEAD.
TORONTO, April 8. Rev. Stephen Bond, one of the pioneers of Canadian Methodism, who was in active ministry for fifty three years and retired ten years ago, died at his home in this city yesterday, in his eighty third year. He was a former member of the Montreal Conference.

N. S. TRAWLER FOUNDERED.
HALIFAX, April 7. The steam trawler M.F.S., sailing out of Liverpool, N.S., sprang a leak and foundered fifty miles off Halifax Tuesday morning. The crew took to three boats, two of which landed on the coast thirty miles east of Halifax to-day. The other boat, with men, is missing, but the survivors have hopes that their shipmates have been rescued.

THE VOLATILE FRENCH.
PARIS, April 7. Considerable reaction was noticeable to-day in French public opinion, which was unanimously favorable yesterday regarding the advisability of the occupation of Rhine cities. A note, prepared by Premier Millerand, was read to Ambassadors to-day, and then delivered to Wilhelm Von Mayer, in which the Premier declared that France had taken great care to inform and consult with the Allies before occupying the Rhine cities. Banking financial and business circles are more outspoken in opinion and freely express that the intervention was untimely, and detrimental to French interests.

A REGULAR MIX-UP.
BERLIN, April 8. (By the Associated Press.)—A private telephone message reading, Berlin, yesterday, reported a serious clash between colored French troops and crowds of civilians in front of the main post office at Frankfurt. The troops were said to have been annoyed by the crowds who continuously jeered at them, whereupon they opened fire, killing seven persons and wounding many others, including women and children. The message said the feeling or resentment among the civilian population was visibly increased as a result of the incident, and many rumors are current here to the effect that the United States is addressing a note to France demanding the withdrawal of French forces from Frankfurt.

SAVED THE MINES.
THE HAGUE, April 7. Nieuwe Courant, describing the plundering of Essen by the Reds before the occupation of that city by Government troops, says part of the retreating Red troops captured all the arms which they had already delivered, plundered shops and finally left town in automobiles firing at inhabitants. The Red army commander ordered that mines be blown up, but mine guards succeeded in repulsing the Reds, although great damage was done to the mines.

VERY MUCH SO.
BERLIN, April 7. The idea that the despatch of troops to the Ruhr region could in any way involve a menace to France, is so absurd that it does not require to be refuted, says a German Government note in protest against the occupation of Frankfurt and other territory of the right bank of the Rhine by French troops.

CARMANIA BROUGHT GOLD.
NEW YORK, April 7. The Cunard liner Carmania arrived here to-night from Liverpool, by way of Halifax, N.S., with ten millions in gold bullion. Among the cabin passengers was Sir, Wm. Wiseman of the British Foreign Office, who is said to be on a special mission.

MILLERAND EXPLAINS.
PARIS, April 7. Premier Millerand, at a conference of Ambassadors this afternoon, explained the French attitude towards Germany, and the recent events that led up to the occupation of Frankfurt and other German cities. The Premier made no reference to France's future policy, beyond reiterating that the occupied cities would be evacuated as soon as German troops were completely out of the Ruhr district. Ambassadors of Britain, Japan and Italy were present.

EARLY NAVIGATION.
QUEBEC, April 8. Ice conditions in the River St. Lawrence, west of the port of Quebec, indicate that the ship channel between Quebec and the port of Montreal may

Butcher or Baronet?

Arthur Orton's Amazing Claim.
"Guilty!"

The words fell on the hushed and crowded court like the stroke of doom. The huge man in the dock bowed his head under the blow, and his flabby cheeks assumed an ashen hue.

It was the climax and conclusion of the most amazing fraud in the history of crime, a crime which for three years had divided England into two camps of fierce partisans—one declaring that the prisoner was the rightful heir to the Tichborne barony and vast estates; the other, that he was a vile impostor, one Arthur Orton, an Australian butcher.

For nearly 300 days the greatest lawyers in England had wrangled over the problem in the limelight of public excitement without parallel in the history of our Courts. Now at last the curtain was rung down. The man in the dock was branded by the one word "guilty" as a "perjurer, a forger, an imposter, and a villain," and he vanished from the stage on which he had played so astounding a part with the words of doom—"Fourteen years' penal servitude"—ringing in his ears.

The amazing thing was that Arthur Orton's story should have been believed for a moment by the most educated, the most distinguished-looking, the most well-educated, distinguished-looking, smart cavalry officer, Roger Charles Tichborne, who had gone to his death in 1854, on his way to New York, as too grotesque, one would think, to delude the most foolish.

And yet so amazing is human credulity that, before the butcher had been any weeks in England to prosecute

his impudent claim, he had many strong supporters prepared to swear that he was the lost baronet.

A Ruthless Cross-Examination.

The feeble-minded Dowager Lady Tichborne, Roger's mother, though at the first meeting she saw only the back of his head as he lay half-intoxicated and wisely silent in his bed, exclaimed, joyfully, "This is indeed my dear son!" and she never wavered in his identification when, later, she found that he was so illiterate that he could not speak the "King's English."

Mr. Rous, host of the Swan at Alresford; Mr. Hopkins, the Tichborne family solicitor; Mr. Baigent, the historian of the family—all men who had known the real Roger from boyhood—recognized the butcher as the missing heir. Bogle, the real Roger's black servant, swore that the butcher was none other than his old master, and John Moore, another old servant, was just as assured of his identity.

When the first scene in the great legal drama was set in Westminster Hall, one May day in 1871, half England was ready to stake its last shil-

ling that the claimant would emerge with flying colors.

Never was a drama of the law more crowded with sensation, more startling in the development of its plot; and never was imposture so mercilessly exposed. The atmosphere of the court was tense with excitement. For sixteen days Arthur Orton was under Coleridge's dissecting-knife, writing but helpless. One fatal confession after another was wrung from him. He had to admit that he did not know his "brother" Alfred's pet-name; and that he had forgotten every word of French, the native tongue of the real Roger as a boy.

John Moore, the real Sir Roger's body-servant, who had professed to recognize his old master, had to confess that he had declared to friends that the claimant was a "rank imposter," and that "if they had sent over an Egyptian mummy, Lady Tichborne would have acknowledged it as her son."

Mr. Baigent, the family historian, in Mr. Hawkins's ruthless and clever hands, was exposed as a witness who had private reasons for playing the role of enemy towards the Tichborne family, which had shut the door

against him though he had married one of its members.

It was proved, further, that one of the claimant's first visits after his arrival in England was to the East-end of London, to inquire about the relatives of a certain Arthur Orton, son of a Wapping butcher, who had emigrated to Australia, and about his old sweetheart, Miss Mary Loder; and that, although the real Roger had been tattooed on his left arm, no trace of a tattoo-mark was to be found on the claimant.

But the most conclusive evidence of all was that of Mrs. Radcliffe (Kate Doughty), the missing man's cousin and fiancée. She produced the original duplicate of a destroyed letter which he had written to her. The claimant falsely asserted that this letter contained a serious reflection on her morals. This witness also swore to the tattoo drawings, and said that, on first seeing her, the claimant had addressed her companion and not herself as "Kate." So overwhelming was the evidence that the jury declined to hear any more, and on the 102nd day the case was closed, and the plaintiff was arrested and lodged in Newgate jail.

A little more than a year later the whole drama was re-enacted for a period of 188 days, with the claimant this time in the dock. To this trial there could be but one issue. The greatest impostor in the world's history was ruthlessly exposed to the world's derision.

He was branded as Arthur Orton, son of a Wapping butcher, an ignorant bankrupt lout who had been tempted by an advertisement by Lady Tichborne in the Australian papers, asking for information as to her missing son, Roger Charles Tichborne, to masquerade as the resurrected heir to a baronetcy and large estates; and who had played so cleverly on human credulity that for

some years he had waxed fat, in a double sense, on his fraud.

Nemesis had caught him at last; and the curtain is finally rung down on his villainy as his mountainous figure totters feebly down the steps of the dock to his punishment; and with ashen cheeks he turns round for a last glimpse at the sea of faces in which he sees no look of pity, but only contempt and loathing.—Tit-Bits.

Kyle's Passengers.

Brought 12,000 Seals Between Them.

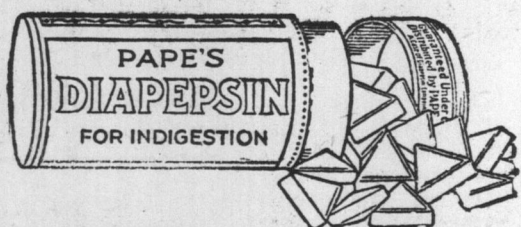

The captains contend that the main patch was well North of them, while members of the crews think that it was miles South East of where the steamers were.

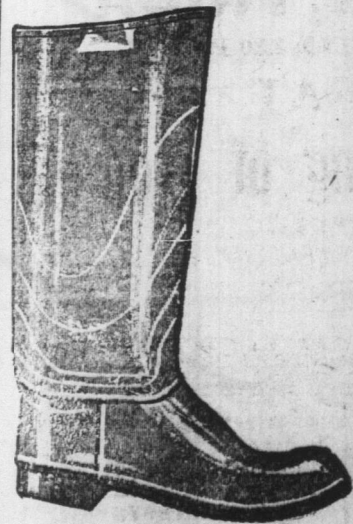

Glasgow Captain's Rescue.

TERRIBLE TALE OF THE SEA.

A terrible story of the sea was told at Liverpool on Wednesday, when Captain G. C. Oxley, master of the Polish Monarch, of Glasgow, was presented with a silver cup awarded by the King of Norway in recognition of his services to the survivors of the Norwegian barque Sadchama, which foundered in the Atlantic on July 5, 1918. Two boats were launched, and remained in company throughout the day, but in the evening the lookout of the captain's boat heard cries for help. Owing to the state of the weather nothing could be done to render assistance. About midnight on July 6 a squall caused the remaining boat to capsize. The men clung to the boat, and climbed on to the keel. They lay on the bottom for half an hour, and then righted her. They found they had lost one man and nearly all of the equipment and provisions.

On the following day the cook became insane and died. Three days later the boat again capsized, and it took half an hour to right her. The men lost more provisions, and their supply of fresh water was spoilt.

A third time the boat capsized, and everything was lost with the exception of a sail. Then the steward drank salt water, became insane and died. The men had been in their open boat for ten days, when they were rescued by the Polish Monarch.

The Polish Monarch, which is a steamer of 4292 tons, is owned by Messrs. Raeburn and Verel, Glasgow. —Glasgow Weekly Herald, March 13.

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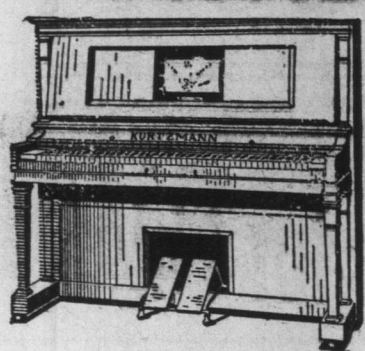

Western Notes.

The present happy-go-lucky mail system instituted since the Liberal Reform Party gained power is pleasing to no person, and has aroused the greatest indignation all over the West Coast. Mail has been laying at Port aux Basques for Humbermouth and intermediate points along the railway for weeks, without any attempt being made to get it along. Weather conditions about Channel section have seriously militated against fishery prospects, but on April 3 there was somewhat of a let-up, when the skiffs and boats got to the grounds, some of them returning with as high as two thousand pound catches, while of the Halibut fishers one was fortunate in securing seven hundred pounds, which sold at a good figure. But one schooner sailed from Channel this spring for the seal fishery, the Goldwin Roy, a small vessel of thirty tons, which left on March 25th. Should she have struck the families as reported by Sagona and Kite, coming out the Gulf, a good trip will likely be made. The wedding of Mr. William Blackmore and Miss Currie was solemnized at St. James's Church on March 29th, by the Rev. H. J. Read, Rector of Channel Parish. Flu is very prevalent about Channel and Port aux Basques; nearly everybody complaining of its effect. The doctor has his hands full.

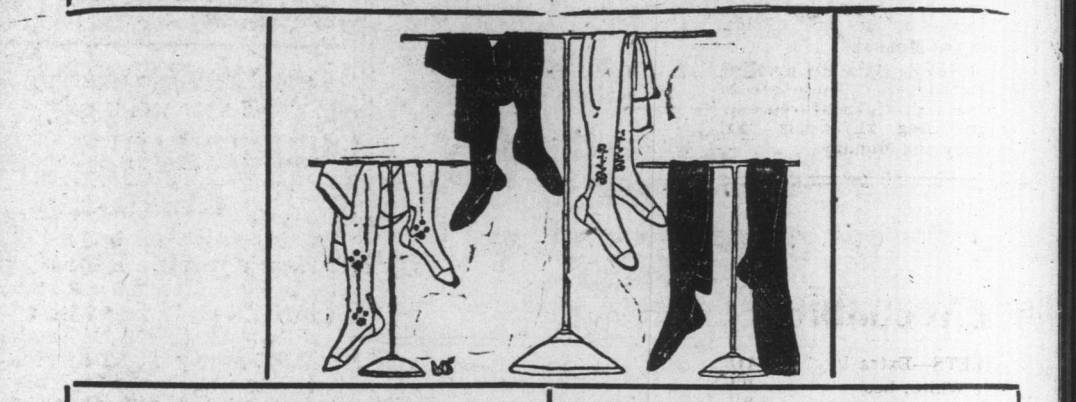

BRITISH WIRELESS SERVICE.

HORSEA, April 8.
From an authoritative French source, Reuter's Agency learns that there is every reason to believe that the Germans will evacuate the neutral zone, and that in a few days both French and German troops will be withdrawn from that area. The incident will thus be closed, "having served its purpose by conclusively proving to the German Govt. that the terms of the treaty which they signed will have to be carried out." Troops of the Reichwehr have entered Essen, and large numbers of Reds continue to lay down their arms. Two thousand Reds walked over into occupied territory and allowed the British to disarm them. In view of the fact that the Reds are disbanding, it is anticipated in London that the German Govt. will shortly withdraw Reichwehrs from the neutral zone, and that Millerand's statement that such an act would be at once followed by evacuation of German towns will be put into effect. The whole incident is likely to terminate speedily.

The British treasury gave notice that on and after April 13th, they will be prepared to offer prices for certain American dollar securities deposited with them. Holders of these securities will be advised individually, and lists of securities to be purchased will be exhibited at various stock exchanges. The announcement showed further improved condition in New York exchange, because the securities obtained under this scheme will be sold in New York, and will still more increase the growing balance in favor of London at that centre, which will assist repayment of Anglo French loan of one hundred million pounds, when it matures next October. New York Exchange further advanced yesterday to 4.02. This is the highest rate since November last, when it was about the same level. The value of the pound sterling in New York has thus risen about three shillings and six pence in two months.

From the British Ministry of Munitions, the Ministry of the Health Research Department has acquired 4.03 grammes of radium, valued at about seventy-two thousand five hundred pounds. During the war there was an enormous quantity of material like points for gun sights, and various other surfaces on instruments, that had to be rendered luminous at night. All this was radio-active, and when the actual element of radium was extracted, it produced sufficient to enable the Research Department to carry out a series of experiments at the London Hospital, principally connected with cancer cure. It is computed that half a million pounds sterling, per ounce, is the market value of radium, and in the actual element, for research, there is not as ounce in the world.

HORSEA, April 8.

Germany had launched German troops against the working class population of the Ruhr District, in doing so it had violated one of the most imperative and most solemn stipulations of the Peace Treaty. The French Government was therefore compelled to take guarantees to bring the German Government to restrict its nature. Occupation did not imply any hostile force towards the hard-working populations of the region, and its sole object was to ensure the execution of the Peace Treaty, and it would come to an end as soon as the Reichwehr troops have completely evacuated the neutral zone. It is stated in Paris that the first demand, to allow supplementary troops to enter the Ruhr Valley, was made by Kapp's Government, after its coup d'etat, when there was no sign of disturbances whatever in that region. It was renewed later by Von Haniel, who had remained in Berlin under the instructional Governments.

With One Exception.

A party of jovial fellows, on board a Cunarder, caused some trouble to the captain and the rest of the crew by their pranks. For the want of something more foolish to do, one of them gave a party at which champagne was partaken of freely by all, especially by Brown, the host. Next morning one of the number rose early. As he was leaving his berth he was approached by the steward. "Bog pardon, sir, Mr. Brown would like to see you in his cabin." "The early riser went and found Brown with a wet towel round his head. "Hallo, old chap, how are you?" he cried. "Oh, I'm all right," said Brown. "I wasn't really drunk, you know. I remember everything that happened—except one thing. I say, old chap, who paid for the taxi?"
