**Archbishop Howley Council K. of C.**

INSTITUTED AT CORNER BROOK.

Another grand link in the chain of the Order was forged in Corner Brook on Sunday last when Archbishop Howley Council, Knights of Columbus, was duly instituted by District Deputy W. H. Kennedy, assisted by Degree Officers from Dalton Council, Harbor Grace, and Notre Dame Council, Grand Falls. This makes the institution of a Council of the Order in this town marks an important step in the progress of the West Coast. Its location is particularly appropriate since this new industrial centre bids fair to be the Golden City of the West. The great need of the Church in the new town emphasizes the necessity of an organization of Catholic laity, and in the great work that is to be done in Corner Brook the new council will have ample opportunity to justify its existence.

The institution of the new council was brought about by The Right Reverend H. T. Renouf, D.D., Bishop of St. John's, whose wish was that the council be named after the late Archbishop Howley who labored so faithfully as a priest on the West Coast, and whose name is revered throughout the length and breadth of Newfoundland. The council has an added distinction in having for its Chaplain His Lordship, the Bishop, who attended the ceremony of institution and gave an inspiring address to the new members. 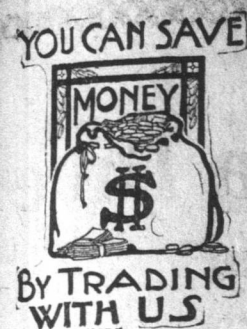

**Municipal Council**

**WEEKLY MEETING.**

The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon at 7 o'clock in the Council Chamber. Mayor Cook presided and the following members were present: Messrs. Martin, Outbridge, Coleman, Ryan and Dowden were present. The Secretary of the Newfoundland Board of Fire Underwriters wrote with regard to the appointment of an Inspector of Electrical Wiring. Following this communication it was decided that a Committee of Council should be appointed to inquire into the recent correspondence on the matter.

Communications were read from the St. John's Nall Manufacturing Company, Ltd., as follows:—

1. Asking that the grading of Hamilton Street fronting their premises be altered, and also that the gutter be removed from the East to the Western entrance. This was referred to the Engineer.

2. Requesting certain information regarding the installation of a sewerage system at their factory. The City Engineer has already given the necessary particulars.

3. Regarding the retaining wall rear of the Company's premises, the Council was unable to take any action as it is private property.

The Manager of the Imperial Oil Company, Ltd., asked that repairs be made to the Southside Road, which in its present state is dangerous to traffic. The City Engineer will see what can be done.

4. Rev. A. B. Stirling, Rector of St. Mary's Parish, and G. F. Pike, Secretary, forwarded a lengthy communication regarding the diversion of the road across the Long Bridge, and particularly the blind corners and the high board fence which they considered dangerous to both pedestrian and vehicular traffic.

They asked if the Council would give consideration to the following suggestions for the protection of the public:—

1. The removal of the "blind corners" caused by the present closed board fence;

2. The stationing of a watchman or traffic constable at this detour;

3. The total prohibition of motor traffic while the detour is being used;

4. The making of arrangements whereby citizens who have to use this new thoroughfare will not be subjected to such inconveniences when it is in a muddy condition.

This petition must appear to all as reasonable one, particularly in view of the constant coming and going of freight trains, etc.

A Committee of Council with the Engineer will visit the place and arrange with the contractors or with the Manager of the Newfoundland Government Railway for some means of improving the present state of affairs.

Messrs. Hynes, Coady, Hogan, Moyle and other residents of New Gower Street petitioned re the inconvenience caused them by persons from suburban districts being permitted to park their vehicles in the open space at the rear of their dwellings on this street; that as a result the place was continually in an insanitary condition, and furthermore that it was formerly the playground of the children in the neighborhood who were now deprived of same. The Engineer was instructed to enquire into the matter and obtain particulars as to the ownership of the property. If it is privately owned he is to see that it is properly fenced.

Mr. A. R. Bulley, on behalf of the Mount Cashel Band, asked permission to hold concerts in Bannerman and Victoria Parks during the summer on the same conditions as previous years. It was decided that the City Clerk arrange with Messrs. Bulley and Dutoit, Secretary of the Methodist Guards Band, whose application was received some weeks ago, so that the season's series of concerts may begin at the earliest possible date.

With regard to the painting of electric light poles throughout the city, as requested of the Nid. Light & Power Co. some time ago, the Superintendent stated that while most anxious to fall in line with the wishes of the Council in this respect, the Company was unable at the present time to undertake the work, particularly in view of the heavy expenditure soon to be incurred in the reconstruction of the Street Railway system. He informed the Council that the poles along the principle streets were being treated with creosote, which greatly improves their appearance, and at the same time to a large extent acts as a preservative; that it was the Company's intention to follow up this practice, so that within the course of a few years all the poles within the city would be similarly treated.

The Medical Officer of Health wrote regarding the flushing of drains, hoppers, etc. The Sanitary Supervisor stated all arrangements in this connection had already been made.

Re J. W. Dowling's application to build annex to stable, Plymouth Rd., the Medical Officer of Health had no objection to permit being issued. Same is therefore to be given Mr. Dowling.

Mr. C. R. Moore requested the extension of water and sewerage to that portion of Cornwall Avenue where for so many years past the residents have had to do without these facilities enjoyed by other residents only a few hundred yards distant. The Council having arranged for extension

**The Priest's Convention**

The Convention opened yesterday with Holy Communion at 7.30. Masses having been recited at 7 o'clock. At 10 o'clock the clergy of the diocese of Newfoundland met in the Cathedral to sing together the Holy Eucharist. It was a most impressive service in which the staidness of the buildings lent itself with splendid effect. The procession left the altar preceded by the Crucifer (the Rev. H. W. Facey) and after compassing the Church returned for the celebration itself. The celebrant was the Rev. T. Greaves, Rector of Rose Blanche, who was assisted by the Rev. Canon Jeeves, (Rector of the Cathedral) and Rev. J. B. Elliott, (Rector of St. Thomas's). The Lord Bishop of the Diocese occupied the Throne, and was attended by the Rev. J. Britton, as Chaplain. The music was that of Merbecke, and was under the direction of the Rev. F. P. Law, who also acted as organist. The sermon was preached by the Rev. R. F. Palmer, of the Society of St. John the Evangelist. After this service the Clergy dispersed to meet again at half past five for Evensong.

At 7.30 p.m. the Convention assembled in the Synod Building, the Bishop of the Diocese being the Chairman. After the opening devotions, some matters of routine were decided, the Secretary read a telegram received from Rev. W. Higgit, and the Chairman reported that he had called Dr. A. H. Browne (a former Rector of the Cathedral) who had that morning been consecrated as Bishop of Bermuda.

On the proposal of Canon Smart, it was agreed to send letters of sympathy to Canon Field who has been very ill, to Canon Bolt on the illness of his wife, and to Rev. A. B. Stirling, who was absent through the sudden illness of his father, and to Rev. A. Pittman who is also absent through illness of his daughter.

Papers were then read by Rev. J. Britton and Rev. E. J. R. Nichols, on "Personal Consecration." Many people are confusing the Convention with the Synod. The Synod is a business gathering, while the Convention is an assembly of the Priests for consultation and spiritual help. These papers sought to strike the note, urging those present to expect and so to receive, a "spiritual uplift."

Compline was recited in the Cathedral at 9.30, after which Rev. Father Palmer gave the opening address of the "Quiet Day."

Today (Tuesday) will be observed as a Quiet Day, and the Clergy will spend it in the Cathedral where prayers and intercessions, with addresses, will be taken by the Rev. R. F. Palmer. The Quiet Day will close with Evensong at half-past five.

On Saturday morning at 10.30 the second session of the Convention will be held, and the papers on the "Incarnation" will be given by the Reverend H. Facey and H. Gosse.

**Laid to Rest**

The funeral of the late Andrew Luby took place yesterday afternoon and was largely attended. At the R.C. Cathedral the prayers for the dead were read by Rev. Fr. Kennedy, following which interment took place at Mt. Carmel Cemetery.

### The Bells of Carlisle TO RING AGAIN AFTER 180 YEARS' SILENCE.

After 180 years of silence the historic bells of Carlisle Cathedral are again to be rung, and for that purpose they have been entrusted to the Whitechapel Bell Foundry to be cleaned, tuned, and completely refitted. Two smaller bells are also to be added to complete the octave. The bells have been removed from the cathedral tower and are now at the foundry in Whitechapel-road, E. In the history of Carlisle the cathedral bells have played no inconspicuous part. It is believed that the last occasion on which they were rung was when Prince Edward Charles Stuart crossed the border with his Highlanders, and, preceded by 100 pipers, entered Carlisle on November 18, 1745.

The bells were forthwith sentenced to silence for 100 years, and although this period has long been expired, ringing has not been possible owing to their state of disrepair and also to some fear of injury to the tower.

The oldest bell in the peal is the 5th, the second largest of the present peal. It was cast about the year 1410 with three others at the charge of William Strickland, Bishop of Carlisle from 1400 to 1419.

**Curse on the Bruce.**  
In "The Bells of Carlisle Cathedral" the Rev. H. Whitehead states that these were not the first bells known to have belonged to the cathedral.

In the presence of Edward the First (who died in 1307), lately arrived from Lanercost, where he had spent what was to prove the last winter of his life, Cardinal Petrus Hispanus, the Pope's legate, having first preached in the Cathedral, "reverted himself and the other Bishops which were present, and then with candles alight and causing the bells to be rung, they accused in terrible wise Robert Bruce, the usurper of the crown of Scotland, with all his partakers, aiders, and maintainers."

Bruce never succeeded in taking Carlisle, but it was taken and burnt in 1345 by Sir W. Douglas; and was again burnt, this time by accident, in 1392, when 1,500 houses and a great part of the Cathedral are said to have been destroyed.

It must have been in reparation of the damage done to the Cathedral in 1392 that Bishop Strickland raised the tower and furnished it with "four great bells," one of which still survives as the fifth bell of the present ring.

### Belvedere and Mt. Carmel Collection

The annual Collection for Belvedere and Mount Carmel Cemeteries will be taken up at all the Catholic churches on Sunday next, June 14th. I am sure it is only necessary to remind our Catholic citizens of this matter to have them contribute generously for the upkeep and beautifying of the cemetery ground where repair their honoured dead. Persons visiting the Cemeteries cannot fail to observe the large amount of work that has been done the last few years, and the untiring efforts of the Committee in seeing that the grounds are kept in good condition, pointing out where necessary improvements may be made, and otherwise attending to the many details in connection therewith. All this work and labour means quite a lot of money, and with the high cost of living now prevailing the Committees find themselves hard put to meet their many obligations. Therefore we have every confidence that our generous Catholic citizens will not allow the last resting place of their deceased relatives and friends to be neglected for want of the necessary funds to keep them in good order and condition. Therefore make Sunday's collection a good one.

### Inquest Reform

Famous Judge Condemns Overlapping—Crippen Case Cited by Lord Chancellor.

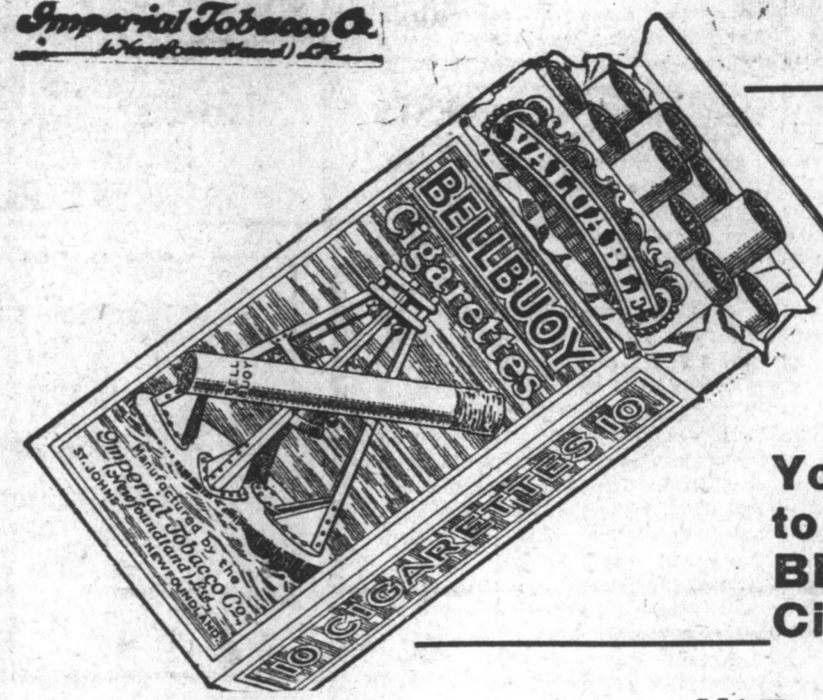
Reform of coroners' courts was foreshadowed in the House of Lords, when Lord Darling, the distinguished former judge of the High Court, condemned the clashing of inquests with trials investigating the deaths of the same persons. Lord Darling pointed out that it was time that some steps should be taken to make it illegal for the coroner to go on holding an extensive inquiry at the same time that an enquiry was being made by a court with much fuller powers of investigating the truth. In recent cases, it had happened that the coroner had gone on with his inquiry long after it had become manifest how the death in question was caused, and long after a person had been arrested and sentenced. The time had come when the coroner should hold his hand while the magisterial hearing was going on. Apart from the inconvenience and expense of two inquiries, an important point was that evidence was allowable at inquests which would not be allowed at the trial, and this was unfair to the accused.

Lord Cave, the Lord Chancellor, observed that he did not doubt that mischief did ensue in those cases. As the practice now stood, a witness to a tragedy might have to give his evidence no fewer than four times before the coroner, the magistrates, the grand jury, and at the trial of a prisoner on indictment. This was not only a burden and a hardship to the witnesses, but in some cases of an unsavoury character it was harmful to the public. Further, there was the expense involved of the persons interested, especially in those cases where the evidence of experts must be called. There was also a waste of public time. If after a particular person had been charged with a capital offence that inquest continued, there was a real risk of prejudice to the person charged. The laws of evidence, so merciful to accused in the courts of justice, did not obtain at the coroner's inquest. In the case of Crippen some 15 years ago, this fact gave rise to something like a public scandal, and there had been other cases since that date. The Government proposed to introduce a Bill dealing with the whole question of coroners and a number of matters which had arisen in connection with coroners' inquests, and it included a clause very much to the effect suggested by Lord Darling. The Bill was ready. It was only awaiting approval by some local authorities in connection with financial matters.

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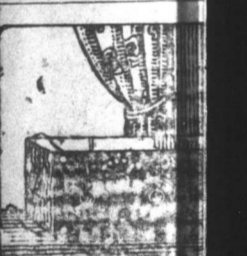


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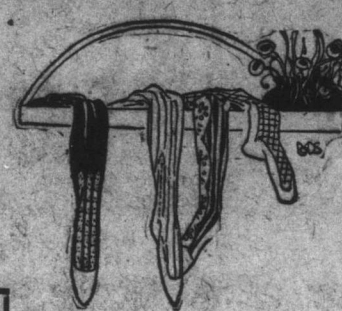

### Current Radio

#### An All-Wave Broadcast Receiver.

EDITED BY JOHN M. CLAYTON, PART I

The receiver about to be described is of the audio frequency amplifier type incorporated in the set. The picture above shows the front of the receiver, together with four of the coils. The left hand dial is on the tuning condenser and the right hand one on the regeneration control condenser. The small knob in the center is the rheostat control. As UV 201-A tubes will be used a single rheostat will suffice for both tubes. All binding posts are brought out to a terminal strip in the rear of the set. A geared vernier dial is very necessary when tuning to the short wave lengths, and is quite handy on the 200 to 595 meter band. A dial having a ratio of at least 20 to 1 should be used. Do not substitute a vernier condenser in parallel to the main condenser as the minimum capacity of both condensers will be in parallel and the tuning range of the receiver materially shortened. This receiver is very easy to tune and the regeneration control is smooth and gradual and will not be "fussy." The range will be better than can be secured from almost any other type of set using the same number of tubes, and the plug in coils make it possible to listen to a large group of wave lengths and to easily change from one group to another.

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### To Improve Canning Industry

At a meeting of the Fisheries Board held yesterday various matters in relation to the canning of salmon herring and caplin was discussed and it was decided that Mr. Chambers would proceed north to begin the work of demonstrating the canning method in vogue in British Columbia, particularly in reference to salmon. Mr. Chambers has been engaged as an expert by the Fisheries Board in an effort to introduce more scientific methods in our canning industry. He is understood an uncle of Mr. W. McKay Chambers and comes highly recommended by Captain Gosse who lectured to the Board of Trade last year, and other competent persons in Canada. Since his arrival Mr. Chambers has been investigating the methods in vogue here and has seen where they differ from those of Canada, and he has already made to the Board many valuable suggestions. One being the creation of a floating factory. This has been suggested because salmon strike in at different times of the year in the various parts of the Island. In Vancouver last year one of these floating factories put up over 20,000 cases. It is not possible to visit every place in the country where salmon is canned, but the principal centres will be called at and instructions given and it is possible that next Spring a model factory will be fitted up in St. John's, where demonstrations in the correct methods will be given to all interested. Mr. Chambers will go out on Sunday's express to Lewisporte, thence taking the steamer to Concha, afterwards coming back to Coachman's Cove, Brent's Cove, Twillingate, Herring Neck, and Seldom-Come-By, after which he will return here and make a report before proceeding to other places on the West Coast.

In August it is proposed that Mr. Chambers will visit various places and give demonstration on the canning of herring.



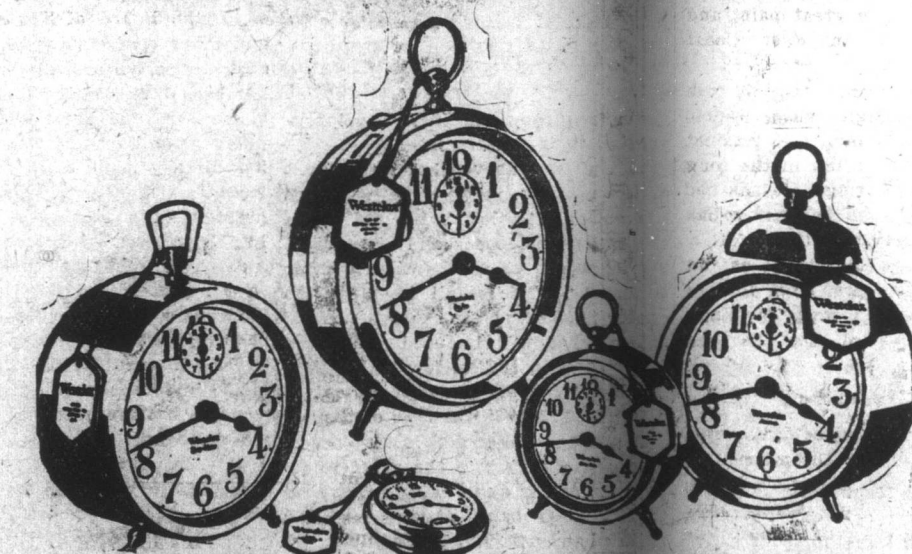
