The Adjutant-General has received instructions to raise, immediately, a force of two hundred men for service in Manitoba, in place of those now at Fort Garry, who are entitled to discharge. The pay and allowances will be the same as are now granted in Manitoba. Each man who joins and completes his period of service will, provided he has not already become entitled to a grant of land for former service in the same force, be entitled to 160 acres of land.

BERLIN, Sept. 6.—Prince Bismark had a long interview with the Emperor Alexander yesterday. Gortschakoff was present. The Czar attended the opera last night with Emperor William and members of the Royal family. This morning he drove along in Thiergarten, and on his return to the Embassy received Generals Moltke and Wrangel, and other distinguished officers of the Prissian army. During the day, the Czar again visited Emperor William, and also called on the Crown Prince and other members of the Royal family. The Emperor Francis Joseph arrived this evening from Dresden, and was received at the railway station by Emperor William with precisely the same ceremonies and attentions which were accorded to the Czar. As the Emperors rode side by side through the streets, the cheering was incessant, and the popular enthusiasm was even greater than that displayed yesterday.

#### A Political Judge.

The reasons why a Judge of the superior Courts should keep himself sedulously alloof from politics are too various to require argument; they apply with even greater force to a County Judge, who is brought into more frequent and direct contact with the people, and "probably knows the political opinions of every man whose rights are adjudicated upon by him; he also finally decides appeals from the Courts of Revision, and all know that a careful manipulation of the votors' lists has turned the scale of victory in more than one close contest. 
