He fears, however, that he has the major ity against him, for he has been denound ing "the new toryism," which he explains to be the increasing popular craze for hav-ing government do more for the people instead of less. The absorption of the entire telegraph and telephone system by the government, the vigor with which the radical Mr. Chamberlain is pushing his new scheme for extending the powers of the government railway commission - these and many other developments of the time show that public opinion is not going Mr. Spencer's way, but in the very opposit direction. The latest movement of the new toryism is made by the liberal postmaster general, Mr. Fawcett, who is the author of a scheme of government annuities and life assurance, which recently became law.
