But while, it seems, a thousand dollars cannot be got to repair the streets, millions can be pitched anyhow elsewhere. sums, what hundreds of thousands of dollars have been wasted in buying a site for a court house, now left idle for years, in the hope, apparently, that the citizens will some day consent to erect an edifice in expense and style utterly unneeded, with towers, pinnacle, arches, and, I should not wonder, a most and a portcullis, and machicolated battlements for pouring boiling oil on the stormers. the necessity of any architectural humbug?
A plain four walls and a good roof, good drainage, heating and proper rooms, i all that is needed; the old court house, in fact, could have been easily made to do. Bu think of the city; we must have a fine sculptured place for the credit of the city. For the disgrace of the city, I think, that money should be spent so lavishly as to condemn many of the city population to suffer poverty, for that is the end of it. Let us look at the management in the Don improvementsmoney to be spent almost by the million, and lucky if not by the millions, before we are lone. A great improvement is projected vast force of men set to work, the whole face of the country is changed, and then the aldermen go to buy the land and exclaim in horrified tones, "Bless us; it's rose! 


