When food is given in excess the age-wing animal, not only is the food wasted, but its digestive apparatus is weakened; since, when an almost exclusive diet of corn is fed, the growing chick must est excessive quantities of it to get enough of the small percentage of muscle-forming material which it contains. Growing young fowls do not readily fatten, but as the pullets become somewhat matured there is a tendency to take on internal fat, which can be only a hindrance to ogg production. Corn should be fed sparingly in the poultry yard, both in summer and winter.
