Six weeks later a second operation was performed. The operations proved sucssful only in so far as they afforded temporary relief. He remained in the hospital from November, 1890, till January 1892, and with all the modern remedies and appliances known to the staff of that well equipped nstitution no permanent relief could be obtained. He was then advised to go home partly in hope that the change might be beneficial, but instead he continually grew wors and in March, 1892, was again forced to take to his bed, and those who knew of his condi tion did not believe he had long to live. At
