If therefore the United States should admit a set of states to commit that lying on each side to a separate line of boundaries, it would create such a diversity of interests as would excite jealousies among the councils, and impede and obstruct all their operations.

If then the separation above suggested, will create the necessary evils, it will follow, that the preservation of the states in the Union will prevent it ; and this in the opinion of the committee of correspondence, concerning which many of the old states now have in their constitutions, the extent of territory within their respective jurisdictions dependent in common with those which shall be erected beyond the same, that similarity in their circumstances, necessary to bind the federal government together by the same tie of one common interest, therefore consider it as a fortunate circumstance that the old states and the new should in no event suffer them to be contracted or separated.

In addition to this it is to be observed, that in proportion to the number of inhabitants that such cessions take from the old states, will their proportions be diminished ; and that the new states, until they attain a certain degree of strength, instead of being able to contribute to its support, will require the assistance of the federal government.
