Before Giving Him Up. London, Jan. 14.-Edward B. Taylor, alias Arthur W. Platt, who was arrested at Oxford recently upon a warrant obtained through the United States Embassy, charging him with the murder of Jessie Tyree in Kentucky in 1895 and has several times since been arraigned in the B.w-street Police Court upon proceedings looking to his extradition to America, was again arraigned in that court this morning.


