More Details of the Calamity Learned From Those Who Have Arrived at Boston From Halifax

FIRST DUTY OF A SAILOR

Is to Protect His Ship and the Passengers, No Matter What the Peril Encountered.

New York, July 8.—The expressions of horror heard on every hand regarding the Bourgogne disaster are coupled with equally strong sentiments of indignation over the stories of the cowardice and brutality of certain members of the crew in fighting and perhaps killing the passengers in order to save their own lives.

The first duty of a sailor," said Mr. Henry W. Unger, assistant district attorney, "is to the passengers. The law, as laid down by the highest courts in this and foreign countries, is that the sailor is bound to undergo whatever hazard is necessary in order to preserve the ship on which he sails and the passengers it carries.

But above them in authority was and is the company that owns the ships of the French line and controls those that are set to sail them. The company owes the public some explanations.

Why was the ship speeding eastward in the lane set apart exclusively for west-bound steamers? Have not ship captains and the newspapers repeatedly warned the French line steamers of the danger and folly of that practice?

Why were there only one woman saved out of 178? Why were none of the children saved? Why were members of the crew permitted to brain women and children and other passengers with boot-horns in order that they might save themselves?

Why was there not an officer at each boat, with a ready pistol, to shoot down these mutineers and compel that order which looks to the rescue of the women and children in the first object in every slipper?

Why were nearly nine-tenths of the passengers lost—including every one of the 83 in the first cabin—while nearly one-half of the crew were saved?

Read the terrible story of chaos, riot, cowardice and brutal murder, and then, gentlemen of the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique, answer why, if all your ships are equally without discipline and if all your passengers are to be left in case of disaster at the mercy of your crews, without the protection of resolute officers and an orderly life-saving system.

LA BOURGOGNE'S DEAD.

There were 714 souls on board, of whom 550 were saved. One was a St. Catharines man.

Some Further Details. The correspondent of the Associated Press took passage on the Halifax for the purpose of learning from the survivors of the details of the disaster that had been possible in the short time between their arrival at Halifax and the departure for New York.

And if the first narratives of the saved passengers shall be borne out by later accounts, some of those surviving sailors of La Bourgogne should swing for the murders done on board the sinking ship and in the sea when human beings were clubbed to death with oars and bars.

Some of these persons, worried and excited as they were, said hard things about the line and its managers. Mrs. Steele of Philadelphia, mother of Francis P. Steele and Miss Gertrude Steele, who were first cabin passengers on La Bourgogne, called at the company's offices in a carriage yesterday, having just arrived from Philadelphia to make additional inquiries about her loved ones.

They received but cold comfort from the officials of the line. Mrs. Steele and her daughter burst into tears and Mr. Jones relieved his feelings by airing his uncompromising opinions concerning the line and its agents.

Among those on board the Halifax who could be found who were on deck at the time of the accident. The only man saved from La Bourgogne who was on deck when the ship struck was Mr. Lacasse, who left the ship at once and returned to the wharf.

Remarkable escapes. Among the remarkable escapes were those of the stokers of the Bourgogne, who, although they were warned by the other members of the crew not to talk about the accident, told of their experiences. Louis Le Julien, Jean Alvan and Francois Emilio are the stokers. They were in the stoke room when the accident occurred.

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TRUST YOUR EYES.

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CONTINUATION OF PEACE TALK

All Quiet at Santiago—Non-Combatants Rushing to Get Away Before the Bombardment—Nothing Startling.

Despatches from European capitals still talk of intervention in the Hispano-American war. France wants to interfere, but Germany and other powers decline.

The demands of Spanish volunteers in Santiago for the surrender of the city are so loud that many of the soldiers have been imprisoned.

The food supply of Manila is growing shorter. Indignation in Madrid is increasing against Admiral Cervera and the commanders of the crews of the squadron.

Shafter and Sampson have agreed upon a plan of campaign. At noon to-day they will begin a bombardment from the outer harbor.

Officials of the Spanish Embassy at London say they have no knowledge of any peace negotiations being on foot at present.

Russian officials and general public are strongly in favor of a speedy peace. Floods in the country districts around Manila are hindering the advance of the American troops.

Gen. Shafter has forwarded to the War Department a statement of the total casualties in each division of the army under his command.

It is rumored that a Spanish privateer is hovering off the British Columbia coast, to prey upon treasure ships coming from the Klondike.

Admiral Cervera has informed the Egyptian government that he has been ordered to return to Spain.

Russian officials and people are said to favor a speedy peace. Spanish securities advanced in London yesterday on peace rumors.

THE SCRAMBLE FOR SAFETY.

Non-Combatants Getting Out of Santiago Presented an Impressive Sight—The Sick in Front.

New York, July 8.—(Special to the Toronto World.)—A special to the Journal from El Caney, July 8, says: The exodus from Santiago to escape the threatened bombardment was an impressive sight.

The authorities had placarded the walls with a notice telling non-combatants to leave between the hours of 5 and 9 Tuesday morning.

The immense crowd of people commenced to file from the city, with about 400 people in litters in the van. Many of the poor women were crucifixes and some entered El Caney telling their beads.

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PERFECTED TARIFF.

Cabinet Meeting to be Held to Consider Customs Regulations.

Two Invoices Required and British Invoices to be Clearly Certified—How a Loan Company Proposed to Bleed a Farmer—Other Ottawa News.

Ottawa, July 8.—At a Cabinet meeting next week, probably on Tuesday, new customs regulations will be considered for the working of the British preferential tariff, which comes into operation Aug. 1, restricted to the United Kingdom and colonies.

On the back of the invoice for the British goods a strong certificate will have to be made by one of the principals of the firm of exporters that the goods are entitled to the preference of being British or colonial origin, that the goods are foreign origin, they have been further manufactured in the country to which the extent of such percentage as may be required by Canadian law. The preference given to British goods is to be secured by the invoice being filled in by the manufacturer of the goods, and a considerable percentage of the total labor of any article is British, although the major portion may be foreign. It is for the Council to determine what percentage of the goods is to be British, and the preference is to be given to British goods from Aug. 1.

Appointment of Choquette Gazette. The official appointment of D. A. Choquette, M.P., as a Judge of the Court of Quebec, and of A. Dorion of the Circuit Court of Montreal, was gazetted today.

To Pay \$2800 for the Use of \$500. A case of oppressive usury has come to light in Ottawa East, which is about as bad as could well be imagined in these days of protective laws and advanced civilization. The man having 1000 loaned society got \$2800 in cash, applied for an loan society and was accommodated. An examination of the agreement showed that the man had a mortgage of \$100 for the money at 10 per cent. The mortgage is to be liquidated by 1902, and the interest to be paid monthly. Should he miss a payment a fine of 50 cents a month is imposed. THE TORONTO WORLD ONE CENT MORNING PAPER.

NORTHWARD, HO! A noticeable feature in regard to the new development in Canada is that the scene of the greater part of it lies along a zone considerably north of the already beaten track across the continent.

Planners are already in the field, and railway and steamboat lines have been mapped out across the continent along the new industrial zone which lies not far from the 64th parallel. The centre of things in Canada is rapidly moving northward. We are having a back road, a back country as well as a front road, and a front road, beginning at the east we notice the first evidences of a new trans-continental movement. Newfoundland. Only the other day a new railway running for a distance of over 500 miles across the island was opened for traffic and steamship connection made with North Sydney. The latter is destined soon to become a new jumping off place from the continent. It is considerably to the north of the present trans-continental terminals at Halifax, St. John and Montreal. Coming westward from Sydney we find a project to connect Lake St. John with James Bay, and thence a line has been projected across the continent to the Skeena River on the Pacific coast. Another northern trans-continental route has its origin among business men in this city. The terminus of this route are Chesterfield Inlet on Hudson Bay and some point in the Yukon country. This route lies considerably to the north of the Quebec project, but they both aim at opening up the wheat fields of the Mackenzie and Peace River basins, together with the development of the mineral resources of northern British Columbia. In the Province of Ontario the movement northward has already assumed the shape in the construction of the Ottawa and Parry Sound Railway and in the contemplated construction of the canal through the Great Lakes to tidewater via the Ottawa River. The western provinces and territories have various schemes on foot for opening up the northern country. Winnipeg has a projected line north easterly to York Factory on Hudson Bay, and other lines running north westerly through the wheat fields of the Saskatchewan. From Edmonton there are one or more routes projected into the Yukon country. On the Pacific coast we find a vigorous movement northward. New steamship lines run from Vancouver, several hundred miles, to the north, giving, in connection with existing and projected railways, access to the English Gold Fields. From the Atlantic to the Pacific, all along the route, there are projects for opening up the resources of northern Canada. The high parallel of latitude is probably the centre of the new development. The prospects for development along this line are fully as promising as were the prospects on the strength of which the Canadian Pacific Railway was undertaken and completed.

FAST SHIPS AND WATER-TIGHT BULKHEADS.

The frightful accident to the Bourgeois shows that modern shipbuilding has not yet overcome all the terrors of ocean travel, though it has been very well pointed out that about the last of the terrors to be overcome is the liability of collision at sea during fog. This liability of collision increases of course with the number of vessels that are travelling on the ocean highways, but even the liability to collide has been reduced by the increased speed of the boats; for it stands to reason that the shorter the time a boat is at sea the less are the chances of collision. Increased speed, instead of being a danger, is a real safeguard, and the chances are that the invention of Mr. Parsons of a turbine steam marine engine will greatly increase the speed of the boats when they are used in the English and America will not exceed three days. Indeed it is likely that before many years a boat will be built to cross from Wales or Ireland to Newfoundland in 60 hours, thence by rail across Newfoundland, and thence across the Gulf of St. Lawrence to Cape Breton, where our system of railways will be reached. The danger of collision at sea can only be minimized by increasing the speed, making the ocean journey between the two nearest ports, in east-bound and west-bound lanes, and by utilizing railways for the rest. It is also satisfactory to know that the science of shipbuilding is advancing steadily on the line of proofing boats with such water-tight compartments that no matter how great a shock the vessel may receive it will be able to float; indeed the very best boats that are now being built can be cut in two, three and even four sections and still float. The vessel which was lost was very deficient in this respect and accounts in a measure for its speedy disappearance after the shock. And as with the passenger is concerned, in the meantime, the best policy, judging by this last accident, would be for him to carry his own life preserver, and to sit up all night if the ship is being lashed fog. Hardly a soul need be going through in the late collision if everyone had been able to get hold of a life preserver.

THE EAST END BOOM.

The eastern suburbs and Munro Park seem to be the vogue at present. About forty new cottages have been added to the summer colony this season, while the travel to the Park is unprecedentedly large. On several occasions lately the crowds to and from this district have been so great that the Railway Company has been unable, or at least unprepared, to handle them. This

was notably the case on Thursday evening when the initial band concert was held in Munro Park. Thousands of people who had made up their minds to visit the park were unable to get a seat in the cars. It is quite evident that the Island has a new and formidable rival to contend with. The beaches and parks are not only very attractive resorts in themselves, but they are much more accessible than the Island. Visitors can reach the park by wheel or by trolley car. The trip to the Island involves a ten-cent boat fare in addition to street car tickets. Herein is one reason for the popularity of the eastern suburbs with cottagers and casual visitors. The increasing popularity of the district enjoins upon the City Council the duty of providing improved facilities for reaching it. The street car service will, no doubt, be adequate in the future, but improvement in the roadways is necessary for wheelmen. The road between Lee-avenue, and the park is almost impassable for bicycles. A cinder path between these points is an urgent necessity. The repaving of the track allowances recently decided on includes the expansion of the bricks between the tracks from Pape-avenue to Greenwood-avenue. The extension should have gone as far east as the Woodbine gate. If this is not undertaken, the council should brick the devil strip, at least, to the end of the city limits. Another improvement that could be made at small expense, and which would be highly appreciated by thousands of wheelmen from all parts of the city, is the construction of a cinder path along Eastern-avenue. This thoroughfare parallels Queen-street from the Don to the Woodbine, a distance of nearly 2 miles. There is very little vehicle traffic along it, and the road is almost a dead level from end to end. It skirts along Ashbridge's Bay, and it is already fairly well provided with shade trees. The route is a popular one with wheelmen, but the going is frequently bad, especially after rains. The construction of a ten foot cinder path would make Eastern-avenue one of the most popular bicycle routes in or about Toronto. It would relieve the traffic on Queen-street and afford ladies and children a safe route to and from one of our most popular resorts. The very small sum of \$100,000 would be a very small sum. There is little or no grading to be done. We do not know of any improvements to the roadways of Toronto that would be more highly appreciated by wheelmen generally than those we here refer to.

CHAPPLE OR FAREWELL?

It is now over a year since Judge Burrhan, senior judge of the County of Ontario, died, and was succeeded by Judge Dartnell, who within the past six months has been stricken with apoplexy that has left him very much weakened. Yet no appointment to the junior judgeship has been effected. Nine-tenths of the bar of the County of Ontario are hot-foot after the appointment, and are leaving no stone unturned to win the race.

Guardians of Ontario's Health.

Dr. Bryce has gone to Muskoka for a few days' fishing, but his office is left in complete charge of the chief clerk, Mr. F. W. Prior to viewing the body, Mrs. Ogden and Dwyer made a post-mortem. The remains were then taken to the residence of Mrs. Green, 418 Sumach-street, deceased's late boarding house, where they were viewed by a large number of friends. The wife of the deceased was notified and arrived last night at 10 o'clock. The funeral, which will be private, will take place this afternoon at 4 o'clock at the residence of Mrs. Green. Case of Cartridges Exploded When Being Carried Aboard the Manitoba at Albert Docks.

London, July 8.—While the steamer Manitoba, which was regularly purchased by the United States Government from the Atlantic Transport Line, was loading at Albert Docks this morning, a case of cartridges which was being carried aboard exploded. Five workmen were killed, all of them literally blown to atoms, and 15 others were terribly injured.

Several of the injured had their arms blown off, others had their legs shattered to pieces, and all were so badly hurt as to render their survival very doubtful. The injured were taken to the Seamen's Hospital.

The cartridges which exploded were of the type known as the safety cartridge. They were shipped as merchandise and not as explosives. The case that exploded was dropped accidentally.

The Manitoba was greatly damaged by the explosion, and will have to undergo repairs.

THE LE ROI AND WAR EAGLE

Should Be Listed on London Stock Exchange.

Would Greatly Help Canadian Mining Enterprise in Britain - More Tappers and Gooderhams Needed - Mr. Parker of London Proposes Great Things for British Columbia.

Mr. G. L. Parker of Rossland, B.C. and London, Eng., at present in the city on his way from the British metropolis, where he has spent the last few months, to the Trail Creek Mining Camp, where he will look after proper development of the Old Country.

Seen at the office of Parker & Co., Victoria street, yesterday, Mr. Parker made some interesting assertions concerning the London financial markets and the chances of new enterprises in the West. He said that the market is not so good as it was some time past, he says, but he has not been able to find the bottom of the market, the Hooley failure and lastly the war have unsettled things badly, with the result that the British public is shy of new change brokers and the London Stock Exchange is not so active as it was some time past.

Then, Mr. Parker says, Canadian mining ventures received a sort of setback in the manner in which the British America Corporation has exploited the Le Roi mine in London. Ex-Governor Mackintosh went over to the British capital and got support on the assertion that the corporation had secured the famous property and here—uncertain—towards its ownership is still uncertain.

What would help Canada more than anything on the other side of the Atlantic, he thinks, would be the result of the London Stock Exchange, which would mean that the attention of the public would be attracted to the British promoter and that Canada's mines would soon come to the front there.

And, Mr. Parker adds, Canadians can bring their country to the front there, showing confidence in such sources as the London Stock Exchange, with Tupper and Hon. Mr. Mackintosh, of British Columbia has done much to advertise it, and if the London Stock Exchange, Gooderhams and Blackstocks, the English investor would soon learn to follow the lead, and capital could be freely obtained.

Meantime the British will only pay money for dividends. But other investors are to take over promising prospects and develop them on shares, rewarding the original holders with stock.

Mr. Parker expresses himself as confident that Canada's mineral resources will be made better known in the next six months will work wonders in the progress of our mines in the West. In the meantime, Canadians would do well to get in on the ground floor.

Monte Cristo Stocks.
The strike in the 300-foot level of the Monte Cristo has widened out to 11 feet of clean shipping, and it is expected that the main pay chute of the property. It will average \$25 clear across the 11 feet. The output this week will be somewhere between 50 and 60 tons. The quantity of ore shipped could be materially increased if there were more power for the drills.
