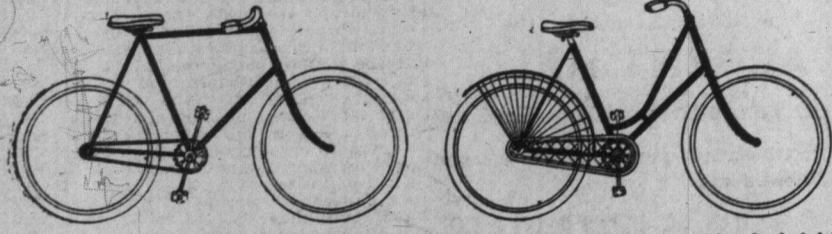

MINES AND STOCKS

Empress to Work Again and the Stock is Being Picked Up on the Local Market.

A BETTER TONE ON EXCHANGE

Weekly Review of Development in the Rosland Mining Camp—General News.

In the local mining stock market to-day Evening Star was a feature, several thousand shares changing hands at slightly improved figures. There was some enquiry for Noble Five from the west. Minnehaha showed strength, selling up around 26c.

Empress to Work Again.

Judging from present indications public interest in the Empress mine is to be revived. The property is a free-milling property, located near Bear Lake on the north shore of Lake Superior, and was opened up some three years ago by Tom Williams and Toronto people. The capitalization was \$1,000,000, and the stock was sold on the local market at 25c. It was driven on the property, opening up a large body of low-grade ore and a tenement mill was installed. In May, 1897, owing to lack of funds the mine closed down, and since then the stock has not been in demand. Of late, however, some parties have been quietly feeling around for Empress certificates, and yesterday a man bid for the issue on the local market. The reason for the revival of interest in the mine is now forthcoming. The management has succeeded in disposing of a large block of treasury stock to Toronto, Montreal and other parties, and it is expected to be at once re-commenced upon the property. Messrs. George A. Graham of Port Williams and Walter Ross of Portage are here in connection with the deal.

Development in Rosland Camp.

The following is taken from the Rosland Miner's weekly review of March 5: Sunset No. 2: A strike was made during the week in the crosscut on the 250-foot level, where 22 inches of ore has been exposed and the full width of the ledge has not yet been determined. Assays over made yesterday of the ore from this body, and it gave a return of \$30.80. Of this \$24.00 was in gold, \$3.20 in silver, and three per cent in copper. There has been a large sum expended in the development of this property and the management has worked hard to make the Sunset a mine, and it is therefore hoped that the strike may be a large and permanent one.

Mascoe: Work on the Mascoe, which is being operated by the Rosland Mining Company, is moving well, 25 men being employed. The chamber over the mine in tunnel No. 2 is about finished, and the Leckgerod hoist will be installed this week. The winze is down about 60 feet and the work of deepening it is being carried on as usual. The shaft is being sunk at a point 80 feet along the crosscut from the present workings. The present workings are in ore all the way. When the contract is completed a depth of 520 feet will have been attained. Crosscuts will be made at the 100-foot level as well as at the lower workings. Having in mind the successful operations of the Columbia-Kootenay property, which immediately adjoins the Iron Cliff on the east, the management is sanguine of similar factory results in the new workings.

Getzler: The machinery for the new 60-horse power electric hoist has not yet arrived, but is expected early in the week. Arrangements for hoisting the plant are about completed. The shaft has reached a depth of 150 feet on Jan. 24 last, when the window of water forced the management to knock off work. When a depth of 200 feet has been reached, the water will be cut out and an electric pump installed. When work stopped the ledge had just come in again and the bottom of the shaft was all in ore. It is expected that the new plant will be in working order in about a fortnight.

Dear Park: This property has been thoroughly overhauled and put in order for the inspection of the Ontario (London) Mining Commission. Mr. Hastings, the general manager of War Eagle and Centre Star, is in charge of the property. The Ontario Boundary, which was being resumed at the inspection will be taken up. When the report is made it will be forwarded to the directors in Toronto. A great deal of interest is being taken in the result. In the meantime work is being carried on as usual on the property under the direction of William Trepanier, Loren Hastings, in charge of the property, pending further arrangements.

Silver Bell: The record for rapid work made by the Silver Bell is being sustained. With two shifts the crosscut is progressing at the rate of three feet a day. The character of the rock is changing, and more quartz and mineral is coming in. From which it appears the ledge is not far from the present face of the crosscut. Water in considerable quantities has been coming into the workings during the past week, but has not hindered the development. Thirteen men are working.

Knowledge and Southern Belle: These properties are being operated by the Big Three Mining Company and eight men are at work. A winze is being sunk along the hanging wall of the ledge. This winze has now reached a depth of 70 feet and there is a fair showing of ore. The winze is also being driven. This is now in a distance of 200 feet and the showing of ore is encouraging.

Iron Mask: Sinking on the No. 2 winze

has started. It is intended to go down 30 feet further. When that level is reached a depth of 300 feet from the surface will have been attained. Thirty-six tons of ore have been shipped to Trail during the week. Superintendent Hall states that the new electrical machinery runs smoothly and is doing very satisfactory work.

Victory-Triumph: The superintendent of the Victory-Triumph was in the city the middle of the week. The strike in the west crosscut of the 100-foot level, he says, is a promising one, and the work of showing how extensive it is in progress in the shape of a drift along the ledge. The new development in this property will be awaited by the public with considerable interest.

Royal Five: This property is located on Moberly Fork, near Sheldale Landing, in the northern part of the division. A contract has been let to Joseph Williams to sink 50 feet and then crosscut. Work will be commenced immediately in two shifts. The new line of the C.P.R. from Robson into the boundary country crosses the property and the railway working cut the vein to surface on the property.

War Eagle: Shipments of machinery have been arriving all week, but the necessary plant is not all here yet. J. B. Hastings is out of town, but is expected to return in a few days. No shipments of ore were made during the week, but underground work has gone on as usual. Men are busy making the new ore tramway, and a week or 10 days' work will complete it.

Two Horse: The double compartment shaft has now attained a depth of 275 feet. The 200-foot level is now being crosscutting will be commenced just as soon as a station is cut out. It is thought that the ledge will be about 200 feet from the surface, and it is expected to be 25 feet farther and to make the station. Then the crosscutting toward the ledge will be commenced.

Big Four: Work is progressing on the No. 2 tunnel, which is now in 92 feet. The main ledge on the property was struck yesterday and has been pierced for a distance of two feet. The ledge is a high grade and carries shipping values. The intention is to continue the ledge to the surface, and to determine its width.

Letter: A double shaft is to be put to work on the properties of the Letest or Sophie Mountain by Superintendent Allan G. White. The work was closed down on Dec. 23 on account of the heavy snow, which was the depth of the snow, which interfered with the transportation of supplies.

Particulars: The property is being carried out as usual. The railway cutting and the new tramway over Centre Star will be finished within a fortnight ready for track laying.

Novelty: Work is still in progress on the long tunnel which is being driven to tap the ledge. There were no new developments made during the week.

James: Work continues on tunnel No. 2. This is being prosecuted by two shifts. The tunnel has now been driven a distance of 172 feet.

Coxey: Work is being continued as usual. The upper tunnel is now in 300 feet. Crosscutting has been commenced about 150 feet in, driving west.

Commander: The drift on the 34-foot level is now in about 100 feet. The showing of ore continues to be satisfactory. A copy of a shipping grade.

Abel: Work is progressing steadily with good results.

Messrs. Currie & Kitley, in their daily bulletin on mining shares, say: The market to-day is quiet, but stronger on the stocks. In Ontario stocks, Golden Star, ex-dividend, sold at 72 and 73. Minnehaha opened in the morning at 25 1/2 and 26.

SMALL RAFFLES IN WHEAT.

Chicago Futures Up Half a Cent on Crop Damage Talk. Increase in Visible Supply Last Week Was Small—World's Shipments Fairly Large, With Danubian Provinces Out of It—Grain on Passage—Local Market Quotations—Notes and Gossip.

Monday Evening, March 13. Liverpool wheat futures opened weak this morning, at a decline over Saturday, but recovered, and closed at about Saturday's final figures. Paris wheat futures advanced 5 centimes to-day. Reports of damage to the winter crop were circulated in the Chicago pit to-day, and the price of futures recovered materially. The May option rallied above the cent mark again, and the close was near the top of higher prices. The shorts were scarce in corn, and there was quite a buying movement. An encounter with the shorts in the absence of Danubian shipments for the past week. Legitimate conditions favor lower prices.

Liverpool maize futures were to-day unchanged to 3/4 cent lower than Saturday's close. The market was quiet, with a bushel to-day, and held half the gain. These rose another shilling at Liverpool to-day, and is now quoted at 5/1 for both white and colored. Wheat receipts at Minneapolis and Duluth to-day 207 cars, against 413 the corresponding day of 1928. Exports into United Kingdom the past week: Wheat 262,000 quarters; maize 221,000 quarters; flour 248,000 barrels.
