IS THE EMPIRE DEPENDENT UPON THE UNITED STATES?

The policy of the United States towards this country has all along been based on the theory that Canada was not a self-sufficient community, that it was a matter of time till we were starved into annexation. Prohibitive tariffs against Canadian products was the method adopted by our neighbors for starving us into annexation. The adoption of this starvation policy in need effect than anything else in proving to our neighbors the falsity of the hypothesis upon which they proceeded in their dealings with Canada. As the people of the United States imagined that Canada could not sustain itself by their own efforts, so they also believed that Great Britain and the British Empire is absolutely dependent upon United States good-will and friendship. THE CROP PROSPECTS.

The recent rapid advance in the price of wheat is based on an estimated shortage of 120,000,000 bushels in the United States crop. The condition of the United States crops on June 1 indicated a total of about 200,000,000 bushels, against the 320,000,000 bushels winter and 218,000,000 bushels spring wheat. It is the spring wheat principally that has been damaged by the lack of rain. The winter wheat, already heavily reduced by the early damage in the spring, is still considerably larger in the aggregate than a year ago, when the crop was 300,000,000 bushels. The damage done to the spring wheat is confined principally to Minnesota and North and South Dakota. The shortage in these States is estimated at 40,000,000 bushels. If the estimated loss of 120,000,000 bushels is correct, it means a shortage of twenty per cent. While there is a big drop in the crop as estimated on June 1, the yield this year, figured at 200,000,000, will be but 47,000,000 short of last year's crop, which was only twice before exceeded in the history of the country. Even if the minimum estimates of 200,000,000 bushels total yield are accepted, the crop indicated is fully equal to the

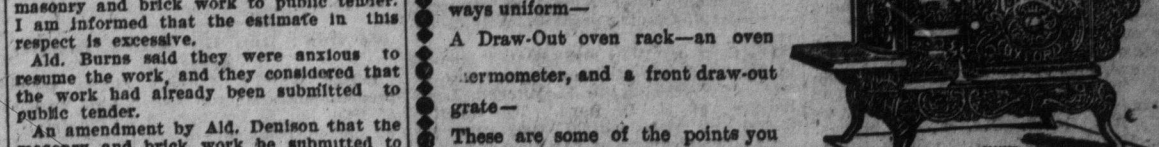
