BAD TRAVEL FROM CANADA

Alleged That Sixty Per Cent. of Diseased U.S. Immigrants Go Thru the Dominion.

STRIKE OUT ALL REFERENCE TO US

Evidence Taken in Washington on the Proposed Immigration Bill.

Washington, Dec. 12.—The hearings on the immigration bill ended today. The educational test was eliminated. Commissioner Sargent stood out for the \$3-a-head tax. Among the most important witnesses of the day was Robert Watchorn, in charge of the United States immigration inspection service in Canada, with headquarters at Montreal.

He advocated the elimination of the provision of the bill, excluding railroad lines entering the United States from contiguous territory, from the penalty for bringing insane, diseased and idiotic aliens in. He also asked that the bill be improved in all the provisions relating to Canada should be stricken out, except section 10, which provides for regulation of border immigration in the hands of the immigration bureau.

He said that there has been almost entire elimination of undesirable immigrants from the United States ports, owing to the requirements of the new steamship companies, but that the average of immigrants coming from the United States to the United States is still high.

The percentages of diseased persons going to Canada were 10, while those of the proportion was only one-tenth of 1 per cent. This, he said, was the result of design and not of accident.

HUNDREDS CAN'T GET COAL

Board of Control Turns Down the Simple Proposal to Supply the Small Consumers

BY SELLING TO LOCAL DEALERS

Very Much Afraid of It—Coal Dealers Cannot Fill Orders for Hard Coal.

"There are hundreds of poor people who want fuel that I can't reach," remarked Street Commissioner Jones last night. "We are delivering all we can, and are now pretty well up with our orders."

The Commissioner was surprised when the Board of Control had in their wisdom turned down the sensible proposal to supply small dealers with fuel from the city yards, to be distributed to the consumers who can only afford to buy small lots.

The controllers who are all well-grounded, well-fed men, with coal in the cellar at home, did this yesterday afternoon, mainly on the ground that a few dealers might cheat, and that a few consumers and thus make money.

The Board did, however, recognize that people living miles away from the fuel yards were entitled to buy in small quantities and at a rate which is not less than the city pays to give it to them.

The whole city, however, would be benefited by having ordered a big load, so that the cart can bring them.

When the report of Street Commissioner Jones, Thomas Rooney (The Mayor's coal agent), and Alexander Stewart and City Treasurer Cady was taken up by the board, the board said he had no objection to selling the coal to small dealers, but not at a ton less than the city pays to give it to them.

The Mayor's suggestion, that the coal be peddled in bags, as is his custom, was rejected by the board, and the board pronounced upon it.




