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## NEW BRUNSWICK AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY.

I. That the Society be called the "AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK," for the purpose of co-operating with "The British and Foreign Bible Society," in promoting the distribution of the Holy Scriptures, both at home and abroad.

II. That, comformably with the principles of the Parent Institution, the Bibles and Testaments to be circulated by the Society shall be without Note or Comment, and those in the language of the United Kingdon, of the authorized version only.

III. That all persons subscribing One Dollar, or upwards, per annum, or Twenty Dollars, or upwards, at any one time, shall be members of this Society.

1V. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, Depositary, and a Committee, consisting of not less than twelve other members of various religious denominations, with power to add to their number; and that five members of the Committee constitute a quorum.

V. That the Ministers of all Evangelical Churches in the City are, ex officio, members of this Society. That every Clergyman, or other Minister, who is a member of this Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at the meetings of the Committee.

VI. That the Committee shall appoint all the officers of the Society, and meet once every Quarter, or as often as the business shall require, on some day to be fixed by themselves.

VII. That the Committee shall divide Saint John into District and appoint two or more of their members for each District, may associate with themselves any subscribers, for the purposoliciting subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants the and that they shall establish proper Agents and Correspond different parts within the limits of the Auxiliary Society.

VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donation

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by the Society shall be applied, after deducting incidental expenses, in the first instance, to the purchase of such a number of Bibles and Testaments from the Parent Institution as are required for local supplies; that the surplus funds shall be given to the Parent Society as a free contribution; and that the Bibles and Testaments in the Society's Depository shall be sold at the prime sterling cost as currency.

IX. That for the purpose of giving full effect to the benevolent designs of the British and Foreign Bible Society, in their grant of the Scriptures for distribution among the poor, the Committee shall make it their business to enquire what families or individuals, residing within their several Districts, are in want of Bibles and Testaments, and unable to procure them, and that it shall be the duty of the Committee to furnish them therewith at prime cost, reduced price, or gratis, according to their circumstances.

X. That for the still further promotion of the circulation of the Scriptures, it is expedient to encourage the formation of Branch Societies in such Districts, within the sphere of the Auxiliary Society as may not be sufficiently populous to form Auxiliary Societies of their own; such Branch Scrieties, and the individual members thereof, to be entitled to the same privileges from the Auxiliary Society as it and its individual members enjoy from the Parent Institution.

XI. That such persons as may not find it convenient to become Members of the Auxiliary Society, or any one of its Branches, shall, upon forming themselves into Bible Associations, be entitled to purchase at the Depository of this Society, under the direction of the Committee, copies of the Scriptures at prime cost, for sale, or at reduced prices, for gratuitous distribution among poorer neighbors.

XII. That all Clergymen, and other Ministers, within the sphere of this Society, making collections in their respective congregations in behalf of this Institution, shall be entitled, on remitting such collections to the Treasurer of this Society, to receive Bibles and Testaments to an amount not exceeding one half of the said respective collections, estimated at prime cost, as shall be found to be needed by the poor in the vicinity; such returns of Bibles and Testaments to be claimed within one year from the remittance of the collection. It is recommended in this, and all the other cases, to prefer supplying the poor by sale at low price, rather than by gratis contribution.

The Sixty-ninth Annual Meeting of the New Brunswick Auxiliary Bible Society was held in the Mechanics' Institute on Thursday evening, Jan. 10th, 1889.

The Chair was occupied by the President, T. W.

After the choir had sung the opening hymn-

The President, Mr. T. W. Daniel, said he would occupy but little time, but would call upon the gentlemen who were to move the resolutions. He must, however, refer to the great loss sustained by the Society in the death of their late President, Dr. Botsford. That gentleman was long associated with the Society and for the last twenty years was its President. He was glad to say that the Society's regret was to be set forth in a resolution. By the death of the late Henry Vaughan the Society had lost a Vice-President and a warm friend, and by the demise of Rev. Wm. Armstrong, a great helper and an earnest pro-

moter of the Society. The work of these men was accomplished, he said, and all trusted they had gone to a better home.

Rev. Canon Brigstocke moved, seconded by the Rev. Henry Daniel, the following Special Resolution in re the death of Dr. LeBaron Botsford, President:

Whereas, It has pleased Almighty God to remove by death, during the past year, the much esteemed and highly valued President of the New Brunswick Branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society, Dr. Lebaron Botsford, who, for twenty years filled that position with much ability and power; therefore

Resolved, That we place on record our deep sense of the loss which this Auxiliary has thereby sustained, and our high estimate of his christian character and work. The success which has attended this Branch of the Society for the last twenty years must be mainly attributed to the indefatigable labors and zeal of our late President, who has thereby left us an example worthy of imitation, and a memory which it is blessed to record.

A collection was then taken up and the choir sang "Heralds of the Lord of Glory."

Rev. A. J. McFarland moved, and H. J. Thorne, Esq., seconded the following Resolution:

Resolved, That the thanks of this meeting be tendered to the Ladies' Association of Saint John, and to all the Branches and Agencies in connection with this Auxiliary, for their contributions to the general fund.

## SECRETARY'S REPORT.

On the recurrence of another anniversary, your committee have pleasure in presenting the sixty-ninth Annual Report of the New Brunswick Auxiliary Bible Society.

We record with thankfulness a year of prosperity in the work of this Auxiliary, and also in the more extended operations of the parent society.

The London report states the number of Bibles, Testaments and portions issued during the year as over 4,000.000 copies. This is the largest issue the society has ever known.

The total income of over £250,000 shows a considerable increase, which is chiefly owing to legacies. These have been the highest in the Society's history.

Our own printed report, which was issued last summer, shows the income from ordinary sources for the year ended 30th April, 1888, to have been \$3,329,83, which is \$434.94 more than the previous year.

The particulars of income are:

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The Treasurer remitted to the parent society in March a free contribution of £400 sterling, being £75 in excess of the previous year; and £102 4s., the equivalent of \$500, in payment of the Z. Chipman legacy. He also sent £52 1s. 7d. in payment of books.

Remittances were also made to the Parent Society by the three other auxiliaries in this province, viz: Fredericton £40: Miramichi Ladies, £40, and Restigouche, £12, the same amounts as were contributed last year, making this year's total from New Brunswick, including the legacy, £594 4s. sterling.

The Depositaries, Messrs. J. & A. McMillan, report having issued during 1888, 997 Bibles and 2,939 Testaments.

The Agent of the Society, Mr. Thomas M. MacKelvie, has prosecuted the visitation of the Branches during the year, and his labors, aided by the committee's circular, have resulted in increased contributions. Your committee hope that the current year will show continued and augmented interest among all the Branches.

By his will, Dr. Botsford left a legacy of one-sixth of his estate to this Society.

As the lapse of time softens the sadness of separation, the memory of his kindly face, genial words and life of good deeds, come to the members of the committee as a frequent reminder and stimulus to a faithful fulfilment of duty. "He being dead yet speaketh."

This Auxiliary has also recently lost Mr. Henry Vaughan, one of its Vice-Presidents, who died at a ripe old age, after a life of consistent Christian character and honorable business record.

Surely, to all members of this Society, the truth becomes year by year more emphatic, that while life is ours we should gladly do the duty which the Saviour has laid upon us, and send forth to those who, while they live, are dead in trespasses and sins, the Word of Life which was given for the healing of the nations.

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#### AGENT'S REPORT.

To the Committee of the New Brunswick Auxiliary: Gentlemen:

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On April 30th, after a month's labor in Nova Scotia, I began my visitation of the Branches in your Auxiliary, at a time when the roads were just becoming passable in the southern section of the Province.

My first meeting was held in the school-house at Welsford and seemed to be propitious to the revival of that branch. As you will notice from the list of officers, the Committee was enlarged with the design of embracing a wider constituency. Here the passing of the hat realized \$2.41.

On May the 3rd we met in the F. C. Baptist Church, Patterson Settlement, where I addressed a very attentive audience. This branch, which always did well, made quite an advance last year, and I trust by continuing in the good work, the sister branches on both sides will emulate her commendable energy. Here I got the collection of \$2.62.

The following night, at Blissville, the meeting was discouragingly small and the collection 95 cents. This branch has long been barren of fruit, but the few kind friends who met together, promised me returns in due season. They expressed surprise at the exploits of Patterson. I endeavored to show them that there are generally, at least, two ways of looking at things, and that doubtless the Patterson people were surprised and sorry at the shortcomings of their Blissfield neighbors; for Blissville seemingly is rich, compared with some places that liberally support our cause. Its name sounds well, let its sweetness henceforth be felt in our financial lists. We appeal for a share of its charities.

On Sabbath, I addressed two meetings at Harvey and Acton,

where the collections were \$7.66. As these places belong to the Fredericton Auxiliary. I left the collection with the Rev. J. A. McLean for a Bible Depository, which was there much needed.

We had a good meeting in the Methodist Church at St. Stephen, and as usual stirring speeches were delivered by the President and others; and the following night at Milltown, another part of this Branch; the meeting was very cheering to your Agent, while all present seemed to be deeply interested in the Society's work, and anxious for its prosperity. The collections were respectively \$4.88 and \$6.23.

Again owing to a failure in notices the meeting at St. Andrews was very small, and we took up no pew collection. I notice that the returns are less than those of last year. I did not expect that the boom in St. Andrews real estate would have had such a depressing action on the interests of the higher kingdom; "What shall it profit a man though he should gain," etc.

We had a meeting for the first time at Bayside in the Hall. I hope yet for the privilege of addressing that whole community in a building convenient for the assembly, where I can thank our very kind friends for their increased liberality, tell of the Society's operations, and organize a Branch to be enrolled in our world-wide book, as a fitting memorial to him whose last public work for Christ was the presenting of this Society's claims upon his community. The memory of the Rev. Wm. Millen will ever be sweet in Charlotte County. Let the Branch at Bayside annually extend its fragrance through the medium of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Our meeting at Bocabec was very small, and its immediate results 44 cents; but I hope for good returns from the collectors.

The Rev. John Hawley kindly opened his pulpits to me at St. George and Pennfield, where the plate collection realized \$6.00, and I trust that the way was opened for the organization of a branch. It is a fairly prosperous community and could very well afford our Society generous assistance.

The unusually heavy flood of the St. John river prevented any further travels for a few days. But I returned to the work at Oak Point on the 22nd, where we held a small meeting whose col-

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lection was \$1.29. This Greenwich branch is very faint and, I fear, not persevering, still, "while there is life, there is hope."

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Next day was very hot and my walk covered twenty miles, as my duties drew me in different directions, but I hope that my journey to Petersville may not be in vain. I there addressed a good assembly, and I saw that the country for many miles around was rich in soil and thickly settled with people well to do in temporalities. This Branch was re-organized; it remains to be seen whether it is revived. The collection was 72 cents.

The meeting at New Jerusalem was held in the Methodist Church, and the collection 47 cents. The people there also, have rich lands and poor memories. I hope they will not forget us this year.

On the 25th I addressed a small meeting at Hampstead, and was given the collection of \$1.04. This Branch was credited last year with \$21.15, but I do not see any list of contributors. Perhaps it did not accompany the gift. I notice in some old report that Hampstead showed large returns. This is a rich district, the people are generous and of a warm religious type, and a good canvas could not fail to meet with success. I look for continuous improvement in this good Branch.

I visited Cambridge on the 26th and 27th, and addressed two meetings; that on Saturday night was poorly attended, but on Sabbath afternoon I had a good audience. This is a very extensive branch, embracing, I think, the whole parish, and were three meetings held annually (or two good ones) such might materially assist the collectors in their arduous duties. I will gladly fill as many appointments as the committee of this Branch may consider necessary for such a large and thrifty community. There I received \$2.25.

We had a pleasant meeting in the F. C. Baptist Church at Wickham, where a new committee was formed and resolutions made for a wide and thorough canvas of the district. I hope for good results of that meeting. That Branch ought to rival Hampstead in its liberality.

We had a good meeting in the Methodist Church at Gagetown, where stirring speeches were made, and, as usual, that fine choir

rendered good service. Last year's contributions were more than double that of the previous year, and we look for a continuous and liberal support from the pretty shire town of Queens.

The meeting at Douglas Harbor was again fair and interesting. There the Society has a few friends who most eloquently plead its cause at the annual meeting. I think, however, that they forgot us last year in the way of support. If so, I am sure that they will make up for last year's loss to the best of their ability.

Again the river's flood interfered with my visit to Sheffield and Chipman, and I passed on to Carleton Co. I addressed two meetings at McKenzie's Corner on Sabbath. The following night at Scotch Corner the meeting was a failure, but I had a fair audience on Tuesday at Watson Settlement.

The Richmond Branch embraces a wide and wealthy district, and ought to increase in liberality. I hope that its good President is making progress in the canvas.

From Webster Settlement to Bloomfield was a long walk for such a hot day as the 6th of June. There I addressed a meeting, and received from a few friends \$4.25, and left full of hope that a Branch of the Society would soon be organized in that beautiful agricultural district.

Again, I could not get a hearing in Centreville, although the Rev. Mr. Howard endeavored to arouse the people in our interests.

The meeting at Florenceville was fair, and some of the ministers gave us their hearty countenance and encouraged the residents of that town to increased liberality. We had a good evidence of a new departure in its last year's gift, and we also hope the Society's friends there, in the ministry, will succeed in their efforts to draw Centreville into line of duty.

I addressed the congregation at Glassville on Sabbath morning, and another, some six miles distant, in the afternoon. There I received \$6.81, and hope for a further contribution as the result of a ladies' canvas.

At Grand Falls the meeting was small, but the few present were very kind friends of the Society who never fail to render it all possible assistance. Andove interests. hearing. yet I do n

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Andover is a beautiful village, but, I fear, utterly dead to our interests. For three successive seasons I failed in getting even a hearing. The Branch exists, like some others, only in name, and yet I do not like to hear the order, "Cut it down."

On the 13th a Branch was organized at Kent Station, which, I think, will yield annual returns.

The meeting in the F. C. Baptist Church at Hartland was well attended, and I was encouraged to hope for a good canvas of this new and flourishing Branch.

We had a small but interesting meeting in the F. C. Baptist Church, Victoria Corner, on the 15th. Will the rich and intelligent people there give us a share of their Christian charities? they can well afford a handsome contribution.

On Saturday, the 17th, I addressed a congregation at Waterville, and also pressed the Society's claims upon a few people in Jacksonville. Both of these meetings were unbecomingly small on such a fine day and in such populous districts. In the evening it was my privilege to unite with the worshippers in the latter place, when the large and beautiful church was completely filled. But even that goodly gathering in the house of God was the occasion of some sad reflections upon human nature. There the people crowded to obtain God's blessing on themselves, while in the afternoon only about fifteen people gathered with the view of granting a blessing to others. Neither could the question be driven from my mind as to the proportion of those in many places who publicly plead at the mercy seat with strong crying and tears, and yet are denied heaven's best blessings. How many of us forget the Word of God, "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy."

The following night our meeting was held in the F. C. Baptist Church, Woodstock, where I was ably assisted by the Rev. Mr. Philips, a warm friend of the Bible Society. But here the gathering was very small for such a cause in such a prosperous town.

The meeting at Northampton was fairly attended. There we have some faithful friends of the Bible Society whose contributions are proportionate to their means, and my visit there has always been pleasant.

In taking a review of our Branches in Carleton County, I cannot suppress the opinion that, considering its agricultural wealth and general worldly prosperty, its contributions to the Bible Society forms a too small proportion of its Christian charities. Indeed its rich Shiretown alone might easily contribute as much to our cause as we receive from all the Branches in the County, while that part of the County, which is the very garden of the Province, yields us no returns whatever; yet the Bible is in every home, and every hamlet has its Church and complement of pastors. We thank Woodstock for its last year's gift, and are hopeful of continuous improvement, and we appeal to the Christians in Carleton County, and especially to the ministers of the Gospel, to assist us in arousing due consideration of this cause, which is God's, and the success of which is essential to every Christian Mission at home and abroad.

We had a fair meeting at Sheffield, and I had the pleasure there of extending my acquaintance with some of the warmest friends of the Bible Society in the Province. Sheffield's contribution last year was praiseworthy and munificent, notwithstanding the heavy loss which it sustained by the flood, unprecedented in the history of the Province.

I addressed two meetings in Chipman Branch on Sabbath the 24th of June. The record of this Branch has been continuously good, and your agent often cordially entertained by the members of its committee. Henceforth he will miss, on his visits there, a kind friend, while the Society has lost a President who had its interest deeply at heart, and through whose assiduous care much of its prosperity was due. May the Chipman Branch long remember its late President, and may the mantle of the Rev. Samuel Johnson ever rest on the men who will have the honor of presiding over its blessed Mission.

I resumed my labors in New Brunswick on August 9th, and addressed a meeting at Belledune on the 10th, in its pretty little church by the sea. During the day I collected \$5.19 from the few families there, and I also had the pleasure of forming a Ladies' Bible Association. This will do them good, while it will

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save your agent some toil, and also improve your treasury. I enjoyed very much my visit to Charlo, New Mills and Jacquet, and at the same time gathered some good contributions On Sabbath, the Rev. Isaac Baird very kindly opened to me his pulpits at these three places and I received respectively \$10.03, \$12.12 and \$11.89—\$34.04, and on Monday I collected at Jacquet \$7.25, in all \$41.29.

At Campbellton I collected \$33.83. Our meeting there was well attended and ably addressed by some of the local ministers and one of St. John's most distinguished speakers. Campbellton's happiness and honor will, however, be promoted by the organization of an active Branch Bible Society. A few lady collectors could more than double the amount gathered by your agent, while his time could be devoted to working in new fields, towards the Society's support.

Our meeting at Bathurst was very small. I trust that the friends there will not forget the Society this year.

On Sabbath, the 19th, the Rev. J. D. Murray, of Red Bank, kindly introduced me to his congregation, and I was privileged to address two meetings in the Society's interest and conduct an evening service also. The plate collections, amounting to \$6.75, were given to me, and I was encouraged to hope for the formation of a Branch in that nice rural district. Mr. Murray has always been a warm friend of the Bible Society, and I am sure that his assistance will be heartily given to the accomplishment of that

At Weldford, Kent Co., we had a small meeting and I collected from a few friends there \$4.25.

The meeting at Bass River was, as usual, a good one, and I was ably assisted by the Rev. Mr. Cameron. The collection was \$4.82, and I notice that the Treasurer has sent you \$36.90-\$41.92, for which gift, that nice Branch has our deep thanks.

The very severe storm on the 22nd prevented our meeting at Kingston, but there the Society has some supporters whose friend. ship no storm can destroy. Their contributions will as usual be timely and liberal.

The following night at Richibucto the meeting was fairly at-

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tended and I was ably assisted by the Revs. Messrs. Hamilton and James. The collection, \$3.36, was given to me.

I addressed three meetings at Buctouche and Mill Creek on Sabbath, the 26th, and received \$6.64. The Buctouche Branch was reorganized; this time under the management of ladies, who I trust will improve upon the Society's past record.

It was a very stormy night on which the meeting was held at Scotch Settlement, Westmoreland Co. The collection, however, netted \$2.76. This Society was also re-organized as a Ladies Branch, and doubtless will render good accounts of this very

At Salisbury the meeting was fair, collection \$1.26, and the promises profuse of future assistance. I hope such are already fulfilled to the ability of its residents.

The meeting at Hillsboro was also good and the collection \$2.00. Hillsboro did well last year, and I hope that pretty little village will always be sweet on our lips.

Owing to the absence of some ministers from Riverside, when I wrote for appointments of meetings, no preparations were made and thus my time and funds were wasted. I hope that our friends will think of the only plan to prevent a recurrence of such, viz.: the formation of a Branch, and let it be managed by the ladies.

Our meeting at Havelock on the 3rd of September was a failure. Like some other parts in New Brunswick where the land is of the richest character, the hearts of its owners are most indifferent to an appeal for charity. Surely there are some there whose charity if exercised in our cause, might leaven the whole community. Will such make the effort and report progress?

At Cornhill, things are entirely different. There the people annually respond to our call. Its last meeting was very pleasant, and the speeches of the Rev. Messrs. Thompson and Comber most

We had a small meeting at Newtown.

I notice that the Studholm Branch has forwarded some funds, and I hope for more to follow. That used to be a very good Branch. Let the old friends there encourage the rising youth to sustain the cause in the spirit of its founders.

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There was a small meeting at Upper Millstream in the Reformed Presbyterian Church, and a Society formed as the Carsonville Branch. I trust that this new Branch will flourish, and its reports grace our financial lists. I received a collection of \$2.00.

On Sabbath, the 7th, I addressed a good meeting in Codey's Hall and received \$1.42. There in the past we have had only a few friends, but I hope for an increase in members and support in the near future.

The meeting at English Settlement was fairly attended and realized \$1.97, and on the way there Mr. Duncan McLean gave me \$1.00.

There was a pleasant gathering at Scotch Settlement, Kings Co., on the 11th inst., and I am glad to report upon that Society's prosperity.

I could get no meeting at Belleisle and regret to report my failure to draw that community into our lines. There the Rev. Mr. Hayward gave me a contribution.

On Sabbath, the 16th, I addressed good meetings at Black River, Ten Mile Creek, and St. Martins, and received respectively \$2.94, \$2.35 and \$1.55. I want to see a Branch established at Black River and Ten Mile Creek. I know there are some warm friends of the Bible Soclety in that district. Will the friends there prepare for this, previous to my next visit?

A Branch was formed at Campbell Settlement on the 18th. It is a small district, but large enough to be charitable and we hope to share its gifts.

The following night when I arrived at the Presbyterian Church, Salina, the house was packed to the door. This kind of reception was indeed new to your humble agent and most cheering. No wonder that the Upham Branch stands at the head of your rural associations. The people are never weary in hearing of the Bible Society's blessed work, and thus their Christian charity is quickened.

We had a small meeting at Waterford on the 20th, and I received \$1.90.

The following night I was greatly cheered by the good meeting at Mechanics' Settlement, and was assisted by Mr. John Meehan,

the temperance lecturer. This Branch is worthy of all honor for its steadily increasing liberality, and its venerable President has our warmest thanks for his labor of love.

I again visited Riverside, and on Sabbath, the 23rd September, addressed the Presbyterian and Methodist congregations and received the plate collections,—\$2.18 and \$1.27. This place has several good buildings for the worship of God, one of them the handsomest country church in the Province. Its grass marshes are extensive and almost world-wide in reputation, but surely such should all the more forcibly emphasize to the rich landlords of Riverside the sacred text: "The grass withereth and the flower thereof falleth away, but the Word of the Lord endureth forever." A financial investment in Bible Society stock ensures good divi-

On the 11th of October I had very great pleasure in attending the annual meeting at Sackville, and seeing so many of my old friends gathered in the interest of the Society. Notwithstanding the arduous and honorable professional duties of the venerable President, this Branch has his careful attention, as evidenced by its prosperity. I was deeply moved at the reception accorded me, and at the chairman's kind reference to my social and business relations with that community in my younger days. I hope to he often present at that Society's anniversary, not only for old acquaintance sake, but that I may catch some of the sacred afflatus which prevails around its classic and religious precincts. Our thanks are due to Sackville for its last munificent gift, which is ten per cent. in advance of the previous years.

I spent from the 11th to the 17th December visiting the Bay Verte and Port Elgin and Botsford Branches. Some of the meetings were poorly attended, others all that could be desired. The Botsford Branch covers a wide field, and I will gladly hold as many meetings there as the Committee may appoint for me. Death has bereft this Society of a Secretary who for many years gave his valuable assistance to a cause dear to his Christian heart, and many other warm friends besides William Duncan are keenly missed in Botsford and deeply mourned by your agent.

On Sabbath, 6th January, I addressed the F. C. Baptist con-

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gregation at Midland. I think that the friends there will not forget our cause this year.

I was glad to meet with the Society's friends at Fairville on the following Monday. Although the night was very stormy, the gathering was good, and the interest in the Society warmly manifested in the pews, while the platform was well manned by vigorous speakers.

The meeting, however, at Carleton was the best that I have ever attended, not only in point of numbers, but in its conception. It was estimated by one newspaper reporter that a thousand people were present; but the new feature in Bible Society anniversaries was its concert character, and that large assembly was treated to the finest sacred music ever rendered in Carleton. The question in my mind was whether these seventy-five singers, assisted by Harrison's splendid orchestra, were there in honor of our institution, or in manifestation of the citizens' joy that the Society's venerable President was again able to be present at its anniversary. From whatever motive, the conception was that of genius, highly commendable, and worthy of imitation by all who have ability or occasion to do so. It was indeed a grand meeting. After the President's address, the admirable Secretary gave a very cheering report of the Society's financial success and vigorous efforts to make it always the banner bearing Branch in the Province. Stirring speeches were delivered by the Rev. Messrs. Bruce and Rice, and your agent shared the inexpressible joy of addressing such a sea of faces whose eyes flashed sympathy with our cause.

I had also the pleasure of again being present at the annual meeting in Barnesville. The Upham and St. Martins Society's meetings have always been good and the last was no less interesting than any one previous. The President was disappointed in not seeing some St. John ministers who promised to be present. I may be permitted, however, to say that the audience too was disappointed—most agreeably so, for the venerable President rose to the occasion and delivered a speech worthy of the Rev. J. R. Lawson in the days of yore. All were surprised,—all were delighted, and thus encouraged to sustain a cause which could arouse such energy in a frame so infirm as that of the beloved

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dd us ur is President. Knowing that Mr. Lawson would be disappointed in his expected help from St. John, the Rev. Willard Macdonald, of Hampton, generously accompanied me, whose characteristic speech gave a charm to the meeting; the meeting was also ably addressed by the Rev. Mr. Patton and Mr. J. W. Smith. In looking over last year's returns of that Society, I am delighted to see its steady advance, and that the gift of \$127 was its measure of devotion to the cause.

The meeting at Point de Bute, on the 13th February, was fairly attended and the cause warmly advocated by the President and Howard Trueman, Esq. Regrets were freely expressed at the smallness of the annual contributions from such a fine country towards our world wide cause. If the committee can effect a more extensive canvas, I feel sure that the record of this branch would improve, as there are many wealthy families between Jolicure and Westmorland Point, who would gladly join in disseminating the Bible if asked to do so. Will some Christian ladies there volunteer their service to this Branch of the Redeemer's cause.

It was my privilege to take part in the Hampton anniversary and to learn something as to the cause of that Society's great success. The meeting was conducted on the same lines as have been already described in my report of Carleton, and every seat of the large hall was filled. Prompt on the appointed hour, the President, Judge Wedderburn, took the chair, and immediately the choir of fifty voices, efficiently sustained by an orchestra, opened the exercises with a grand anthem; this was followed with a hymn, in which all the assembly heartily joined, then reading of holy scripture and prayer, led by the Rev. S. Sprague. The President so ably and eloquently described the parent Society's work that all seemed to feel pleasure in sustaining it with their means, and I felt that I had little more to say than to congratulate the Branch on its steady success. The stirring and spicy speeches of the Rev. Messrs. Evans and Macdonald were followed by really excellent music, and Hampton's great annual meeting was closed, as for nigh half a century in the past, with the Apostolic benediction from the lips of the venerable Rev. 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The following night I addressed a meeting in the Presbyterian Church at Shediac, and was assisted by others in pressing the Society's cause upon that town. A new set of officers were elected who cannot fail to make that Branch prosperous, if they appoint collectors during summer to call upon all the Protestant families in the parish, as was done many years ago.

This finished my year's work, and I may say the same of New Brunswick as I did in closing my report for Nova Scotia, that I have great cause for gratitude, that although my work was sometimes trying on physical and moral constitutions more robust than mine, I did not lose an hour through sickness and very seldom my temper, and even then it was for reasons the very opposite to those which moved Jonah to fret by the wall of Ninevah. I am thankful too for what measure of success has followed my awkward Some Branches that were ready to die have revived; some grafts on the parent stock have already borne good fruit, and others give fair promise for the future. I thus rejoice that my labor has not been in vain, and I hope yet more to gather into line other places which hitherto have not come to the help of the Lord against the mighty, and especially do I hope for the day when, in every place where a Society exists expressly to raise funds for the spread of God's Word, no believer of that Word, lay or clerical, will refuse either his coin or countenance to the sacred cause. It has been argued by some, in disparagement of this Society's aim and work, that the Book depends on the voice of the preacher to be effectual unto salvation, and the miraculous interview between Philip and the eunuch cited proof of the assertion. Such citation, however, proves too much for their position, for even there the Book was in advance of the evangelist. Had there been no reader there would have been no occasion for the interpreter. That too was an Old Testament manuscript—a prophecy concerning the sacrifice of Christ, which had just been accomplished and of which event the reader was evidently ignorant. The Bible Society does not flood either Jewry or Heathendom with Old Testament prophecies, but with New Testament facts,—the inspired interpretation

of the old, and the delaration of saving truth. "These are written that ye may believe that Jesus is the Christ and that believing ye may have life through His name." The printing press enables us to make that Word accessible to millions of our race every year. Let us continue to give the world the Book; that is our duty and privilege; it is the prerogative of God to give the interpreter, and blessed be His gracious name that millions of our brothers have been enlightened by our publications while passing through the desert homeward bound, as was the Ethiopian near Gaza. "The words that I speak unto you, they are spirit and they are life."

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### ABSTRACT OF THE EIGHTY-THIRD REPORT

OF THE

### BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY

FOR 1888.

Now that the books of the history of the year have been opened—the despatches from the seat and fortresses of spiritual war received—what is the message which they bring? A message—whether good or ill—surely to be received with reverent sympathy, for it is of a work consecrated by the sufferings and the prayers of many men, and in far distant fields, to whom, in their higher ideal, life and all its labor has been Christ, and to whom death in His service will be gain.

Of the work only, in the first instance, may we ask, for this is to ask whether it has been victory or defeat. Not to possess, nor to live long, but to work are we sent; and with us it is well when it is well with the work He has given us to do, and the suffering He allows us to share. Afterwards may we ask of the workers,

and of the means by which the work is to be carried on.

Of the work we may, perhaps, first, try to judge by the ISSUES of copies at home and abroad. And during the year just closed these have been the largest the Society has ever known. The total number of Bibles, Testaments, and Portions has been four millions, two hundred and six thousand (4,206,032). This is an increase beyond the issues of last year of more than Two hundred and seventy-three thousand copies (273,354). Of the total issues Two million two hundred and ninety-three thousand copies (2,293,393) were sent from London; over One million nine hundred and twelve thousand (1,912,639) from the Depots abroad.

Another and a not less interesting—perhaps a more valuable—source of evidence, is the judgment of Agents and Auxiliaries—

the statements of men in the press and actuality of the work itself, with its various aspects before their eyes. Not all of these reports have been received, though comparatively few are wanting. But there is among the returns already laid before the Committee a unanimity of belief-a consensus of opinion-all the more valuable because undesigned. And, on the whole, it is the unanimity of reports which all tell of victory. The victory sometimes of hard positions only not lost-sometimes of attacks sustained with narrowed but unyielding front-sometimes of gradual advance while foes or friends have slept-sometimes of successful assault and advance along the whole line-sometimes of designed retreat that another may occupy the place—sometimes of a victory without colors or trumpets or the victory-song-but of victory still. From every quarter of the field-from the populous North, from the East, 'mother of Empires,' from the new worlds of the tropical South and of the West, there is indeed audible a various but harmonious voice: 'The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad, . . . Unto Him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own blood, and hath made us kings, and priests unto God and His Father, to Him be glory.'

The details of FINANCE may be adduced here, less for its own sake than as an allied source of evidence. The gross total is Two hundred and fifty thousand three hundred pounds (250,3821. 10s. 5d.). The expenditure of the year was a little under Two hundred and twenty-five thousand pounds (224,823l. 9s. 9d.). Thus not only is the deficit of Ten thousand pounds (10,0211. 17s. 2d.) announced last year extinguished, but a balance of some Fifteen thousand pounds is in hand towards another year's expenditure. This is, so far, most satisfactory. But it is no reason for relaxing effort. Let the fact never be forgotten or overlooked, that twofifths of the gross receipts just mentioned are not new income, but only a portion of the old returned in the place of volumes of Scripture sent forth to a value of at least double the amount. Of the gross receipts of the year 147,8341. 5s. 5d. represent the total fresh income during the year from all Christendom to supply the world, so far as this Society is enabled to do it, with the living oracles of the one God and Father of all. Moreover, above twothirds of this new income comes from those who have gone. The surplus of the year is simply owing to Legacies, which have been the highest in the Society's history, and much above the average. The gifts are valuable, though the givers are departed; and particularly in their stimulus and example to the living; for it is in the regular contributions from year to year-and specially from our own country-that the Committee anxiously desire to see ad-

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But, whatever may be the financial fluctations of the years, there is one constant personal deficit; and each recurring anniversary recalls painfully some forms and faces which working field and Council Board can see no more forever. The OBITUARY list may this year be considered light, but every tribute paid to death is serious, and if Heaven be enriched Earth is less wealthy than before. Since last May the Society has lost four Vice-Presidents-Bishop Rowley Hill, of Sodor and Man, Bishop Ryan, formerly of Mauritius, Sir William McArthur, K. C. M. G., and the Rev. Dr. Lewis Edwards, Principal of the College at Bala. At a ripe age Mr. James Cadbury, one of the Society's Honorary Life Governors, has died; and, after twenty years of suffering, the Rev. Philip Kent, formerly one of the District Secretaries. Gone they all are to that world to us unseen, but, as they now know it, the world of truth, where Christ lives whom they served, and to which we also, with hearts of hope and undelaying footsteps, are steadfastly approaching.

On the other hand the Society has been strengthened by valuable accessions to the roll of its Vice-Presidents. The following names have been added:—The Earl of Chichester; Lord Edward Cavendish, M. P.; the Rt. Rev. Dr. Bardsley, Bishop of Sodor and Man; W. Schoolcroft Burton Esq., chairman of the Committee and for twenty-three years continuously one of its members; Sir Thomas F. Wade, K. C. B.; Sir Rivers Thompson, K. C. S. I.; the Rt. Rev. Dr. Royston, Bishop of Mauritius; John Cory, Esq.; the Rev. Dr. E. Herber Evans; and the Rev. Thomas Davies. Two Honorary Governors for life have been appointed in recognition of great services rendered by them to the Society—T. W. Pocock, Esq., for nineteen years a member of the Committee, and J. P. Daniel, Esq., for over fifty years one of the officers of the South Petherton Auxiliary, Somersetshire.

and Christian expectation quickens as the record of the year is opened. Her genius, her tragic history, the undoubted dawning of a better day, the incalculable possibilities of the future—all give a unique interest to her name. Perhaps, everything considered, what she most needs, for the development of a higher life, is rest. And, in the Society's work, the year has been one of quietness. But it has been the quietness of advancing growth. The normal work has enlarged. In the sales of colporteurs and depots there has been an increase of eleven thousand copies. One of the most interesting events of the year has been the history of the version of Lasserre. An accomplished French lit-

terateur practically discovered the Four Gospels, and, fascinated by their charm, translated them into the literary language of Hugo and Chateaubriand. The Archbishop of Paris gave his imprimatur to the new book, and the Pope his blessing. Twenty-five editions were needed to satisfy inquisitive and delighted readers. Then suddenly, as if from alarm at a state of things so unexpected, the work was pilloried in the Index, and hurried from circulation. But it is not without significance that in the various sub-depots of the Bible Society twenty thousand New Testaments were sold instead of ten thousand the year before.

To gain a truer idea of the real state of affairs in France, M. Monod asks us to withdraw a little from the picture which contemporary events are slowly painting, and look at it from a distance. At the beginning of the century he reminds us there were in the country some hundred and fifty Evangelical churches; there are now more than six hundred. Eighty years ago these were scattered over forty-three departments; they are now found in seventy-nine, 'And if we can estimate the missionary work that is being done, the stations of our Evangelical Societies, and the churches that are independent of the State, we find that Protestantism is now represented and the Gospel preached in eighty-five departments, and in the three departments of Algeria.'

Results like these have been largely gained by such unostentatious labors as the journals of M. Monod's sixty-two colporteurs illustrate. In every part of France, from the bocages of Normandy to the thoroughfares of Marseilles, and from the eastern frontiers to the sea-shore and harbors of the west, these devoted men urge their efforts. 'No pastor,' M. Monod adds, 'no evangelist could do such work as theirs.' And if-constantly opposed by scepticism and superstition—it is gradual, and if many another difficulty make it trying, these are but reasons for supporting it all the more earnestly. Only let such work advance, and the spiritual life of the nation be developed, and the possibility of the future will become an actuality—of all modern actualities surely one of the most splendid—the brilliant Gallic race shall be restored to the kingdom it has so long forsaken, and become our most ardent ally—as it is already our nearest neighbor in the evangelisation

the prospects of Christian work could hardly be expected to improve. With its large lapsed population and its public-houses, its socialism and its popery, its depressed trade and its materialistic temper, Belgium seems by no means a promising field. In point

The circulation of the Scriptures is higher by three thousand copies than in the preceding year, and though the Belgians read little except newspaper novels, they seem to have a growing interest in the Bible. Altogether the year, though quiet and uneventful, has been one of distinct advance.

Across a geographical line from Belgium lies a different land. The level meadows, the sleeping waters of the canals, the trim antique towns, the barrier dykes, these—clothed as they all are with memories of the Reformation thought and learning—rise before the mind with the name of

#### HOLLAND.

The old universities are quiet enough now, and English and Scottish students no longer gather to their class-rooms as in the days of Drusius and Boerhaave; but if othodox scholasticism has passed away, the life it sought to formulate survives and is energetic still. The Netherlands are busied with the modern problems of religion in contact with political life, and laborious in the various ministries of philanthropy. Of all this the policy of the Society in Holland is a recognition, for it aims at a friendly withdrawal in favour of its daughter in the Gospel, the Bible Society of the Netherlands, and the extension of native organization. Mr. Grelinger, with a reluctance expressive of the joy he has had in his work, is advancing the Society's views. But though he has endeavoured to promote the Netherlands association rather than his own, the issues of the British and Foreign Society have again exceeded those of the previous year by a thousand copies. In this increase a notable item is the wider sale of the cheap edition of the New Testament - so many have been desirous to possess 'the tiny beautiful book.' On the other hand, the national Society has this year reached its largest circulation, and surpassed its previous record by some eleven thousand copies.

But to speak of Holland is to think of the greater Empire immediately near. In the vicinity of

#### GERMANY

every other interest grows comparatively unimportant. The native home of philosophy, yet at the same time of the noblest practical Christianity, the classic land of the Reformation, and still the Continental fortress of Protestantism, half-sister also in lineage and temper of our own — in all these respects the Fatherland is the centre of unequalled interest. Nor is any question more present and practical than the bearing of Germany towards the Bible. In the tremendous problems, political and social, of

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the time no intellectualism can replace the simple strength and majesty of the Divine word. And it can hardly be thought strange that in such circumstances it has already for years been the Society's policy to encourage in Germany a Bible organisation great and energetic as its own people. No important work can be permament or fully effective which is extraneous; nor can Germany ever be evangelized from England. But though the wisest, as well as the friendliest and most patriotic course, it has been necessarily gradual. lessening every year, and with an Agent so capable as Mr. Watt Happily any initial difficulties are they are certain to be minimised at every stage. It is satisfactory to know that just as the British and Foreign Society is carrying out its policy of friendly withdrawal the German associations are coming to the front. And whether in the case of our own or of all the societies together, the past year has been a most satisfactory one. The circulation by the British society for 1887 exceeded the average of the decade of 1872-81 by between two and three thousand copies; and the aggregate circulation of all the societies together is quite up to the high level of the last two years, and nearly 25 per cent. over that of 1881. Of equal importance is the direction of colportage work to these quarters where it is most required — the sympathetic and patient presentation of the Gospel to the Roman Catholics and the poor. One of the veterans of the service, Knabe of Stettin, has died full of age and honour, but the colporteur band is practically unbroken, and the men have worked with exemplary steadiness. A more serious loss has been the death of Captain von Dewitz, the Emperor's Commissioner for the supply of Bibles to the Royal Prussian Army: but that Christian soldier has been succeeded by a like-minded companion. Colonel Klefeker, whose high character is well known in Berlin, In other respects, and in the country generally, there seems an advance in deep and serious godliness. The Crown Prince and Princess have earnestly encouraged Christian work, and their devotion is but a continuation of the influence of the Imperial House. When Mr. Watt closed his report, the late Emperor was still alive; and his son was passing through the shadows of San Remo. Surely the darkening and solemn gloom which has since gathered in the Fatherland cannot but be a power for spiritual influence and for the strengthening of the Kingdom of the Son

What is slowly taking place in Germany is already largely accomplished in

## SWITZERLAND,

and while the supplies are mainly from England, the work of the

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circulation of the Scriptures has passed into the hands of the native Bible Societies. The new organisation — a kind of colony from the mother country — is working with encouraging success. The event of the year has been the formation at Basle of a Swiss 'Union for Bible Circulation,' which is full of the promise of good. The year's work is summarised by Mr. Watt in an interesting way: 'The total circulation of the Scriptures in Switzerland is ten thousand copies above the average of the five years which preceded 1882. Estimating the population of Switzerland at 2,900,000, about twenty-four copies of the Scriptures went last year to each thousand of the people. This is just double the figures reached in Germany. In Russia the circulation for each thousand of the population was five copies; in Scotland over sixty.'

### THE AUSTRIAN AGENCY

is now superintended by Mr. Henry Edward Millard. devoted son of a devoted and gifted father, Mr. Millard gives, in the admirable spirit of his first report, the best assurance that the work is safe in his hands. And though his territory is so extensive as almost to touch with one limit the surges of the Baltic, while with the other it skirts the sunny Adriatic; and to stretch, east and west, from the Black Sea to the Lake of Constance, it is not larger than the Christian love and energy which would fain bring into every household in this vast territory the authentic message of the Gospel of peace. The tone of the report is one of uniform thankfulness; for though candid with reference both to discouragements and defeats, it everywhere preserves a healthy spirit of confidence and of hope. The circulation of the year has not reached the unusually high level of 1886, but the decrease can be satisfactorily explained; and Mr. Millard surveys his bala nce-sheet in no spirit of despondency. His colporteurs have been energetic and patient. They are, he says, the very back-bone of the work, and in many districts the only representatives of Christian enterprise. And if, however busy, they seem to have been less successful in circulating the Scriptures than last year, the printers have been proportionately more active, and the Press record shows an increase of some fourteen thousand copies.

And in other respects the survey is pleasant. In Vienna, in spite of socialism and other secular influences, there is a wonderful change for the better. In Croatia the colporteurs' work has been 'singularly blessed.' In Bohemia a light yet lingers on the fields where the martyrs suffered, and the spiritual atmosphere is still perceptibly warm. 'Last year's work,' Mr. Millard is delighted to be able to say, 'has been blessed beyond every expec-

tation. The circulation has been the largest ever effected in Bohemia.' The Kralicka Bible at once a memorial of the Reformation and a masterpiece of Bohemian literature, and with a history interesting as a romance, has been one of the most popular publications of the year. Referring to Hungary, with its mingling populations and polyglot languages, Mr. Millard cannot help expressing his joy at the unmistakable signs that the Lord's work is gaining ground there. In Roumania, though 'indifference to the truth prevails in all classes of society,' there is a steadily increasing circulation and other healthy signs of advance. In Russian-Poland, the fragment of a once imposing and powerful kingdom, there are, Mr. Millard thinks, substantial reasons for believing that the cause of Christ is steadily making way. In the Southern Tyrol a door firmly closed for many years has been thrown open, and a licence granted for Dalmatia, where for a long time no colporteur could gain footing. These successes give a gratulatory tone to the closing paragraphs of Mr. Millard's survey, which is not entirely absent from any part of it. Altogether it is a report of distant pleasure in the past and assurance for the

Across the Alpine ranges as they slope towards the plains of Lombardy stretch the classic fields of

#### PTARY.

Home of the ancient empire of the world, and of one of the most important modern kingdoms, it engages us with an interest from the future as well as from the depths of the past. Mr. Meille's report is vital with a spirit of achievement and of hope. Everything is not favorable, but there are encouragements which rise above all depressions. The circulation in the Roman depot has been the largest known. Religious liberty is gaining a secure. position. Whole Bibles seem increasingly in demand. In one district of Piedmont there are thirty little towns where groups of Bible-readers meet regularly to study the Word of God, although they are very seldom visited by any pastor or evangelist. Such are some of the brighter passages in a message full of cheer.

The narrative turns to

#### SPAIN.

and is continued in Mr. Palmer's report. It is the last, owing to his resignation, the Society is to have from him. His estimate of the year's progress is favorable; but the circulation is considerably lower than before. The failure has not been with the colporteurs,

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but in the supplies of the National Bible Society of Scotland and similar agencies. Mr. Palmer gives a detailed account of two missionary journeys. We follow him in his narrative from Madrid to Ciudad Real, to Cordova, to Cadiz; then by Gibraltar to Malaga, and by Cartagena back again to the capital. His second tour led him by Saragossa and Barcelona to Majorica, returning by Valencia. His surveys were not always encouraging. There is a dead mass of secular thought in Spain nothing but fervid spirituality will move. But the colporteurs, though weakened in numbers, are in most cases standing to their work. Few details are given. But it is very clear that Christian work must, if successful, be urged with apostolic devotion and endurance. Some other agencies are being withdrawn, as if paralyzed by difficulties. But Mr. Palmer hopes, and he may be assured of it, that the Bible Society's motto will be Nunquam retrorsum.

Crossing the frontier into

#### PORTUGAL,

we are conscious of a change of spiritual air. Mr. Stewart's report is brief; it is occupied largely by personal details about the men of his little army of colporteurs, and he also has to announce a lessened circulation. But the tone is at once resolutely calm and hopeful. There is a very great advance of evangelical life, and an increase of membership in the churches. If sales have been less free, Jesuit opposition, recently greatly intensified, accounts largely for it. This concentration of hostile force shows at least that vital resistance is felt. And such is the case. 'The interest in God's Word is deepening and spreading and thus the ground is being prepared for the widespread religious revival to which we are looking forward in Portugal.'

From the Peninsula, the order of the Agencies leads us back to the north. In

#### DENMARK

the policy of the Society is withdrawal in favor of the Danish Bible Association, and Mr. Plenge, necessarily though most reluctantly retiring, is, as he says, retreating with his face to the foe. But it is not a defeat; and, to take the place his forces have so gallantly held, his Danish allies are slowly coming to the front. In the meantime, despite many difficulties, the circulation is as great as ever; the demand is increasing, and vigorous Christian work is advancing year by year. Colportage in Denmark is exceptionally cheap. Mr. Plenge's veterans, though disabled by age and illness,

are full of spiritual fighting power, and have been singularly successful. The Society's work in Denmark is certainly remark-

From this, one of the smallest European States, the survey leads us at a step to one of the largest empires of the world.

#### RUSSIA,

watching from Cronstadt and Helsingfors across the Baltic, sweeps her other frontier round the globe and stands sentinel on her eastern limits over against America. Towards the north her boundaries become lost in the eternal snows and silence of the pole; southward they skirt the sultry valleys of Persia, and march with the marches of Afghanistan. This vast territory is divided for the Society's purposes into two agencies: Northern European Russia with Siberia and part of Central Asia are superintended by Mr. Nicolson; and the southern section, from Odessa across the Caspian, belongs to Mr. Morrison. Territories they are which might satisfy the utmost ambition for empire, and happily with a work to do greater than political imperialism has ever conceived. Nor is the country greater or more important than the race which holds it as its home. With its portentous powers of increase, its potential and but half-developed abilities--its past so full of prophecy, and a present so commanding in possessionthe Slavonic race has a special place among the peoples of the future. And it is one of the best assurances for his yet unwritten history that the Slav is at once teachable and inclined to turn favorably to the highest wisdom of the word of God. 'As soon as the Russian learns to read he is eager to possess the Bible.' Wherever he is found, in Poland or Siberia, the Muscovite soldier is one of the likeliest and the most hopeful customers of the colporteur. During the past year between four and five thousand copies of the Gospels and the Psalms were distributed among the exiles on their way to Siberia; and the authorities were courteously attentive to your Agents in their kindly work, for passes were given to them by steamer and railway, and they were treated as allies and friends. Another pleasant fact is the heartiness of some of the clergy, who in case after case become the colporteurs' most helpful assistants. These things make for encouragement and advance. But he country is sparsely inhabited and the rigid climate of the north increases the distance a hundred fold. The lower classes are very poor. Towards the Asian frontier Islam presents its stolid opposition—'Islam, which, with all respect to its European friends, does not "prove all things and hold fast that which is good." But in spite of all difficulties your Agent reports increased circulation in almost

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every province and a total advance of some twenty-two thousand copies. His elaborate report is a model of statistical completeness and precision; and his colporteurs' journals often read, in their simplicity of narrative and spirituality of tone, like a story of the days of the Aposthes. All things considered, the year has been one of hopeful and healthy achievement.

A similar summary may epitomise the report from the south. Its tone is perhaps somewhat less encouraging than that from the north, but not because there has been any failure in honest and even heroic work. There is a slight decrease in circulation, some five thousand in a total of a hundred and fifty thousand copies, but not in the colportage department. The hostility of some of the priests and people has been vexatious, but Mr. Morrison is confident the Bible Society only needs to be fairly understood in South Russia to be thoroughly supported. His twenty-five colporteurs have travelled some fifty thousand miles in all, and often under circumstances which would try the most adventurous explorer. One reports on his Bible work from Penjdeh, and in a few picturesque sentences photographs Bokhara. He has hardships, but in his quiet devotion he is a type of his heroic race. 'I am glad you have sent me here to work, although the sun is blazing and the water is bad, and not a blade of grass to be seen, only sand, sand everywhere, and a hard dry wind from the east. Still I am glad.' In this southern Agency, as elsewhere, all things considered, there has been a year of true work which will remain.

From Russia it is a natural transition to

### TURKEY.

Here, in the ancient and famous capital of the East, Dr. Thomson directs the movements of his scattered but effective forces, and anticipates the time when Islam shall recognize in Christ a greater Prophet than its own. His report is as candid as it is able, hence its uniform and vigorous hopefulness is all the more reliable. From Albania and Bulgaria, from Macedonia and Bithynia, from Cyprus and Crete, there is a similar account of progress. The total circulation, excluding free grants, is largely in advance of the previous year. 'The steady and, generally speaking, increasing circulation of the Turkish Scriptures since the Crimean war holds out a sure hope of a reform among the governing class of this country.' In a Greek village in Bithynia a company of Biblereaders—recalling the Collegia Biblica of the Evangelical Revival in Germany-now includes most of the inhabitants, and Dr. Thomson thinks 'there is no doubt the Word of God is leavening powerfully all classes of the people, and preparing them to act

decisively in due time.' In Cyprus 'the good work is going forward,' and in Crete 'the light is spreading to every part of the island.' These opinions of a candid and competent observer are as important as they are welcome.

In this rapid survey we have approached

### GREECE.

and no one can approach that famous land without emotion. Herself-like her most illustrious city, and in a still larger sense-'mother of arts and of eloquence,' and the native home of that language long ago classic from its superb treasures of imagination and style, and now for ever consecrated by its use in the Septuagint and the New Testament-it cannot but be a question of unique interest how she will receive that body of sacred literature, which is itself the most classic of the classics, as well as the one ripe flower of perfect culture of truth. And it is delightful to know that the year's report is an answerfull of hope. There had been difficulty in always securing suitable colporteurs, but with a happy intuition Dr. Kalopothakes turned to the Christian students who were available for summer work, and secured their educated gifts for the service. The experiment has so far been most successful. And in other regards the accounts are healthy. The settlements fringing the coasts of Asia Minor and Macedonia are peculiarly open to receive and study the Word. The Isles of Greece-the sporadic kingdom of the Archipelago-have been visited with a thoroughness unequalled within the last ten years. Your Agent made a tour in the historic Peloponnesus, and was received by clergy and people with every respect. Surely there is still heard from the Greeks, not only the echo, but the renewal of that ancient message, 'We would see Jesus."

Close to the home of ancient classical literature stretches another realm, possessor also of the memories of a learning and a supremacy which have passed away. The wide spaces where Arabic is the language and Islam the religion, and including the regions from Alexandretta, close to St. Paul's birthplace, in the north, down to the southern boundaries of

# EGYPT AND ARABIA,

form the next Agency in this rapid review. It is the shadowy Empire of Muhammad, and it holds the shrines and fortresses of his faith. To attack this seat of superstition, and that with substantial success, is no unimportant achievement; and the point of Mr. Weakley's report is that during the past year this has been done. After many a difficulty and delay, direct to colportage work

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wy of obof en rk among Muslims has been begun in 'the home of Islam and of the Arabic language, and the hitherto almost inaccessible stronghold has been entered by the Stronger than Muhammad.' In this brief sentence Mr. Weakley describes an achievement and implies a hope of the highest significance; and it is sufficient to make the year memorable. No reference can be made to a mass of details, but it is stimulating to know that, in spite of Turkish jealousies and opposition, the circulation by sales has more than doubled, and the gross total is three thousand copies in advance of last year.

In a review where populous territories receive but a glance, there can be no adequate reference to the myriad-peopled

### CHINA.

To so many the fear and the problem of the future, the vas Eastern Empire is the Christian's hope. With excusable ardour the Society's Agent in the North says: "I believe in our work, and that the Christianity of China will be a far more robust Christianity because of the Bible work in the land. Our work is truly the foremost pioneering work in the country.' In the South Mr. Kenmure's expressions are equally vigorous; and from Amoy, Mr. Macgowan, reporting a net increase of ten thousand copies, believes the general survey shows 'splendid results.'

No message of the year is brighter than that received from

### JAPAN.

A quiet light, as if from the dawn, lies upon every page. It is the opinion of Mr. George Braithwaite, the devoted Assistant Agent, that 'Christianity is rapidly spreading through the country,' and he has had the advantage, in forming so hopeful an estimate, of two recent and careful tours in northern and southern Japan. The sales of colporteurs have nearly quadrupled, and instead of some six thousand total circulation of the previous year, the return for that just closed is over sixteen thousand.

Up to this point these sketches have been drawn from the accounts of the Society's Agents. But there is another band of workers whose reports—not in manuscript, but printed with all the apparatus of officials and contributions—indicate independent organization. These are the Society's Auxiliaries—a group of Christian colonies—which in their adopted countries are centres of light and energetic benevolence. Passing eastwards from the Arabic populations, and leaving on the north the Central Asian territories of the Russian district, we approach and enter on our

# INDIAN POSSESSIONS.

-that vast peninsula continent, with its two hundred and fifty millions and almost uncounted languages and dialects. No Agent reports on this Eastern world, but a group of Auxiliary Societies in Calcutta, in Madras, in Bombay, in Allahabad, in Lahore, represent the nobler rule which is realizing the Christian conquest of India. If ever interest, stimulated by many a fascinating subject, and combined with a sense of responsibility, be felt, it should be at its height in regard to Hindustan. And though no details can be given here, the mind is invigorated by the accounts of the wide work done and its resistless if gradual advance. The Calcutta Auxiliary reports for the past year the highest sales on record, and notices with surprise and encouragement the number of Zenanas open in the city to Bibls teaching only. Bangalore, with its seventeen colporteurs, has nearly doubled the sale of New Testament Portions, almost entirely among non-Christians. At Madras there has been a larger circulation than in any previous year. 'The Word of God has found its way to the soldiers and the sailors, the sick in hospitals and the children in orphan homes, the dwellers on hill and plain, and the emigrants to foreign lands, the visitors to fairs and festivals, and the pilgrims to sacred shrines. Many laborers have borne a part in this glorious work, and from far and near comes the testimony that their efforts have not been in vain in the Lord.' The Bombay Auxiliary testifies to the vigor and efficiency of its various agencies,' and a substantial increase in circulation; and the workers in Lahore-with difficulties their southern brethren do not experience—have increased their vernacular sales one-third. In these encouraging notices of the past year reference is frequently made to two very interesting agencies—the distribution of the Bible among the young university men on passing their examinations, and the ever-extending work among the women in Zenanas and elsewhere. No more important classes exist, and successful work among them must be

### AUSTRALIA

merits a larger notice than any 'Abstract' can give. So vast in its southern seas this continent-home of our developing race, so partially populated, so various in the circumstances of its scattered colonies, it cannot but send a report as varied in detail as its own condition. But there is no want or potential energy, and little of actual devotion. There has been considerable depression in several districts: others send messages of unusual prosperity.

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The Home Society is very sensible of the unwearying services of its Agents, East and West, and of the Auxiliaries who are building up, in the face of many natural difficulties, a nobler kingdom than politics or commerce can know.

Another of these Auxiliary outposts is in

### SOUTH AFRICA.

There also Anglo-Saxon and Dutch energy is elevated and directed to a sense of Christian duty to the dark races and the neglected populations around. The Cape Town Auxiliary has now nearly a hundred agencies and branches in different places in the colony, and there are sister Auxiliaries in Natal and elsewhere. The sales for the past year have increased 70 per cent., and it is one of the most encouraging aspects of the well-organized work in these southern fields that the ladies take a special interest in its advance.

A third group of Auxiliaries, and in some respects the most interesting, have their fields of work in

### CANADA

and the North American Provinces. These strong young branches of the parent tree are evidently full of potential vitality and rich in fruit. The report of Upper Canada is itself a closely printed volume of some 120 pages, and those of Ottawa and Montreal are scarcely less. They give evidences everywhere of health and progress, and reflect from their western shores a light on the home whence they sprang. But when, passing in mental survey, the dominions of a mighty people yet to be, we stand on its western limit and look across to the Russian agency we have left, we recollect that in following the work of the Bible Society we have encompassed the globe.

Slight and even saddening the survey may indeed seem — for all the largeness of numbers, the limitless field, the various and consecrated ability — when we remember the vast moral gloom of the world. A mere margin to the cloud, we say — a little more colour on the map — a flush on the deadly pale cheek of a sinful race. But when we remember the Great Patient One whom, on a sultry day in Samaria, one soul, uplifted and saved, made glad with fresh strength for His work and His suffering; when we recall the thought that in heaven, where no false conceptions darken the perfect sense, there is joy over one repentant sinner—then our mode will change. There is indeed a world of difficult

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work; but there is also a world of hope, and it is ours to work and to be steadfast, leaving the times and seasons with the Father, and with the Son who has not loved the world in vain.

"We dare not think
The time too long in which it pleases Thee
To wait; and yet forgive us, gracious Lord,
If, bowed in reverence, earnestly we pray,
Patient in our impatience, for the time
When Thou shalt to Thyself take Thy great power
And reign o'er all the Earth in every heart.
Yea, come, Desire of Nations!"
