#### SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF

#### THE MANAGERS OF

### THE ORPHANS' HOME AND FEMALE AID SOCIETY.

In presenting their Seventeenth Annual Report to the members of the association, to the subscribers, and the public generally, the managers feel deeply sensible of the great blessings vouchsafed to the Home by a kind and over-ruling Providence during another year.

During that period it has been almost entirely free from any serious sickness, and quite so from any infectious disease. No death has occurred within its walls since the month of January, 1867. Many of the children of the Home are improving fast in those things which will be serviceable to them when they leave the institution. Those girls who are able are employed in taking care of the younger children and assisting the cook and housemaid in their departments. It is to be hoped that greater progress will be made in future in regard to those important matters than can yet be reported, as the managers propose keeping the children in the Home a longer period than has been the case hitherto, in order that they may be well trained in those departments before being apprenticed out. The matron, the nurse, and the governess continue to deserve the confidence and approbation of the managers for the faithful and assiduous discharge of their important duties.

The matron devotes her spare time in the evening to the improvement of the older girls; having them with her, reading to them, assisting them in writing letters to their friends, teaching them plain sewing and fancy work, and instilling into their minds good principles—thus at once rendering their stay in the "Home" a happy season, and fitting them so thoroughly for domestic service, that it may reasonably be hoped, that the very fact of a girl having been brought up in the

Orphans' Home, will secure for her a good situation, when the time arrives for her to leave its sheltering roof.

The boys when not in school, are employed in the yard, in cutting and piling the wood, and in cultivating, under the Matron's direction, that portion of the land on the east side of the property, which has hitherto been devoted to the purposes of a play-ground and bleaching green. Here the work of the boys shews itself in a very creditable kitchen garden, which has been entirely cultivated by them. Finding this piece of ground so useful in giving healthful occupation to the boys and in furnishing vegetables for the "Home" the managers would appeal to the friends of the Institution for means to purchase an adjoining piece of ground, to the west of their property, which can be had on reasonable terms.

The Home has been visited during the past year by several of its former inmates, who all speak in the most gratifying manner of the benefits and blessings which they enjoyed here, and the friends of the institution are constantly receiving letters to the same effect from those who are married and settled in distant parts of the country, and who connot conveniently visit the Home; but who look back with gratitude to the time they spent there. There are at present in the "Home" 62 children, 36 boys and 26 girls; 34 have been admitted during the last year, 12 have been removed by their parents; four have been apprenticed, one ran away, and three have been adopted.

The managers continue to receive most substantial proofs from their kind friends the loyal Orange society, who have long taken a deep interest in the Home.

The managing director of the Northern railway has again liberally granted the managers the privilege of getting down wood for the "Home" at half the usual rate; and J. Hendrie, Esq. has with equal liberality carried the wood to the Home free of charge.

The managers again tender to the butchers and the market gardeners their best thanks for their generous gift to the Home during the past year.

The town council of Clifton have granted \$50 to the Home in consideration of the Managers having received several children sent from that town.

The Managers must not omit to notice an act of generosity on the part of the matron of the Home. The collecting of yearly subscriptions

in former years has always been done by persons to whom a commission on their collections has been paid. This year the matron offered to do it herself, and has done so most satisfactorily. When offered the usual collecting commission, she declined it for herself, but wished to use it improving the Home in little things, which she thought needful.

In conclusion, the Managers of the Home would state for the information of the public, that the Home is open at all hours of the day to visitors of all denominations, who are respectfully requested to inspect it thoroughly, and to note in the visitor's book in the Board Room any remarks they may be pleased to make in regard to it.
