NEW YORK, May 24—Most important to points lower than those of the particles, is the court report of the special master on Consolidated Gas, which upholds the company in its contention against 80-cent gas. It makes for harmony in the conduct of a great business; shuts out ruinous competition, and enables the great freight business of the related country to be handled to the greatest advantage, at lowest cost, and with much convenience. An instance in point occurred early in the year. Weather conditions were severe during February in the Middl and Western States, as well as in the Northwestern, and compratively good in the Southwest (Southern Pacific territory). The Harriman freight agents were able to divert business from the railroads which were suffering from bad conditions to the Southern Pacific system. In March, the following month, Southern Pacific territory suffered from floods and washouts, and then freight consigned to points far west was carried by the Union Pacific. 





He was apparently in good health and had made no complaint of feeling unwell. After lunch he was actively engaged in connection with his large business interests and at ten minutes to 1 had been in conversation by telephone with Hon. W. H. Owen of Bridgewater. He was talking with Mr. Owen concerning some legal papers and had asked his wife to go to his vault at his office which is next door to his dwelling, to get the papers in question. When she returned he had left the 'phone and upon enquiry Mrs. Kaulbach learned that her husband was in the bath room.
