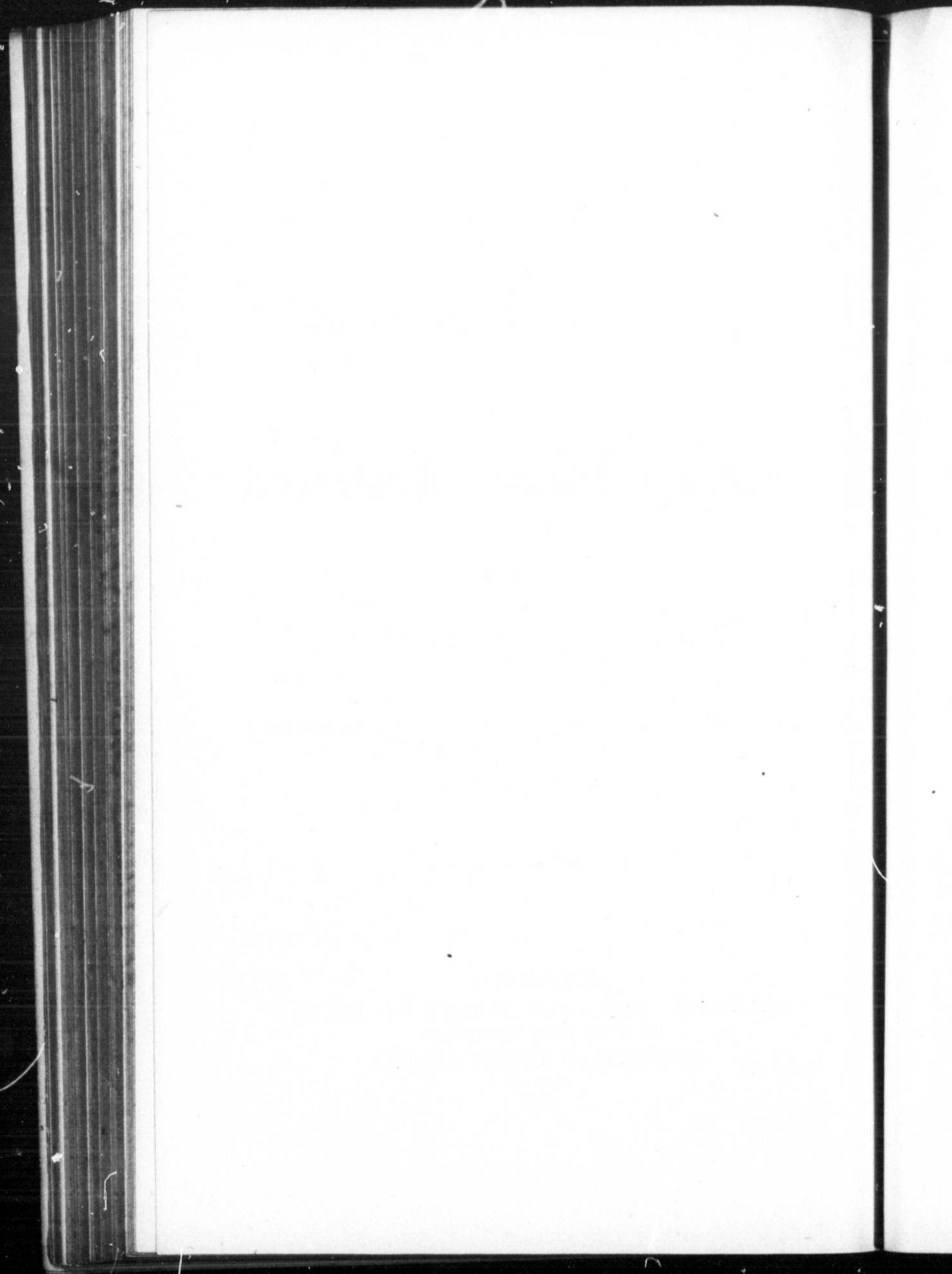

*Held in Wellington Street Church, in the City of Brantford,
June 1st to June 8th, 1881.*

The Eighth Session of the London Annual Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada was opened in the Wellington Street Church, in the City of Brantford, on Wednesday, June 1st, 1881, at 9 o'clock a.m.

The Rev. JOHN WAKEFIELD, President of the Conference, in the chair.

The 478th hymn was sung; after which the Rev. W. R. PARKER, M.A., Secretary of Conference, read the 3rd Chapter of Paul's Second Epistle to the Corinthians; and the Revs. R. FOWLER, M.D., and Dr. WILLIAMS, led the Conference in prayer.

The PRESIDENT called the Conference roll and one hundred and seventy-eight brethren answered to their names.

The ballot for President resulted in the election of the Rev. ALEXANDER LANGFORD.

That feeling the gravity of the responsibility to this fund, and with a deep sense of its obligations to honestly carry out the laws regulating the expenditure of the fund, this Board cannot, in justice to itself and others, commute with any minister who is in vigorous health, and who is physically qualified for the active work of the ministry.

2. That, in the judgment of this Board, the placing of any one on the Superannuation List, who is not physically incapacitated for the active work, is a wrong done to the present legitimate claimants upon the fund, and also a wrong done to the same claimants, in the near or remote future, and is also, further, a perversion of the funds contributed by

ministers, and others, exclusively for the support of the worn-out ministers, and the widows of deceased ministers.

3. That, as the Superannuation Fund is now totally insufficient to meet the present claims of truly worn-out ministers and widows having unquestioned claims thereon, and for whose benefit the fund was instituted and continued, this Board would respectfully, but as earnestly as respectfully, entreat the Conference concerned, not to place as claimants upon its Fund, any of its members who are not physically incompetent for the active work."

Moved by the Rev. John Wakefield and seconded by the Rev. W. W. Carson, and

Resolved,—That this Conference has listened with the deepest attention and interest to the Resolution presented from the Board of the Superannuation Fund and that we thoroughly approve of the views and suggestions which it so justly advocates, earnestly trusting that the claims of this Fund may continue to receive the earnest and generous support of both ministers and people. Carried.

CENTRAL MISSIONARY BOARD.

The Conference proceeded to ballot for a member of the Central Board of the Missionary Society.

The Rev. A. Langford, President of the Conference, was elected.

TRANSFER COMMITTEE.

In the absence of an official report from the Transfer Committee, the Rev. John Wakefield, ex-President, presented a verbal report of its doings at its recent sessions in Montreal, explaining the reasons why no transfers were made in the Western Conferences.

It was moved by the Rev. W. R. Parker, M.A., seconded by the Rev. A. E. Russ, M.A., and *Resolved*, That the Conference has heard with satisfaction and approval the report of the Ex-President of the Conference, as to the action taken by himself and his colleague, Rev. Alexander Langford, as representatives of this Conference on the Transfer Committee.

OBITUARIES.

THE REV. WILLIAM HAWKE.

Our lamented Bro. Hawke was born in the town of Lostwithiel, Cornwall, England, August 21st, 1824. He was religiously educated in a Christian home, and in the Wesleyan sanctuary and Sabbath-school. He was led to Christ and to a consciousness of His salvation in the 14th year of his age, through the preaching of a youthful companion, now the Rev. Richard Whiting, of the Montreal Conference. He was faithful in the use of the means of grace, and early became an earnest worker in the Church, giving marked evidence of personal adaptation to a wider sphere of usefulness, as well as of the call of the Master. It was not, however, till 1854, some time after he came to Canada, that he entered the ministry of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. Being judged worthy, and to meet the urgency of the Connexional work, he was ordained for special purposes after two years probation. The circuits he successively travelled were, Sarnia, Chatham, Florence, Wardsville, Kingsville, Ridgetown, Clinton, Mitchell, Howick, Glanford, Waterdown, and Grimsby. His marked business ability was laid under contribution for the successful prosecution of the financial responsibilities of a Superintendent, and was also utilized in the position of Financial Secretary, which he satisfactorily filled for ten years. In spirit he was devout, cheerful, earnest, and eminently conscientious and faithful. He was emphatically "a brother beloved" of his ministerial

brethren, as well as by the multitudes of people among whom he laboured. As a preacher and pastor he was "a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of truth." He was more than ordinarily successful in evangelistic work, being able to count by the hundred those whom he led to Christ, having seen on one circuit alone three hundred souls added to the Lord. His great love for souls led him to labour arduously for their salvation, and faithfully to deliver the messages of Heaven. And long will his earnest words linger in the memory of those to whom he ministered ; and, doubtless, will yet prove to be "bread cast upon the waters that shall be seen after many days," for, "he being dead yet speaketh."

As might be expected, after such a life of devotedness to God, faithfulness in the discharge of duty—a life of faith and love and humble piety, Bro. Hawke died well. His last hours were hours of great peace of mind and joy of heart in anticipation of seeing his Saviour and resting at home. His last illness was of short duration, but productive of excruciating pain, which he bore with great patience and Christian fortitude. Not a murmur escaped his lips. Although very anxious to live, that he might labour for God, yet he calmly resigned himself to the will of his Master, saying, several times, "For to me to live is Christ, to die is gain." As the end approached, and the shadows of eternity fell around him, a solemn awe seemed to fill his mind, as he repeatedly exclaimed, "O the infinite solemnity of death!" But in a little while the darkness passed away, and looking upwards he smiled and said, "Yes, Jesus is precious, and I'll praise Him when I get through the pearly gates." Then turning to Rev. G. W. Calvert, who stood by

his bedside, he said, "I am so glad you have come to see me; God bless you, my brother; and tell my brethren at the approaching Conference that you saw one of their number pass into eternity trusting alone in the merits of Christ. My work is done, and I'm going home to rest forever." In the midst of all his suffering, and the near approach of death, he was not forgetful of his family, consisting of a beloved wife and five children (two sons and three daughters). True to the last, his unselfish nature that had manifested itself through life in his dealings with others, now, more than ever, was seen in his tender regard for those who loved him, and whom he loved, and who were dependent upon him. After giving a few directions about some worldly matters, he affectionately embraced his loved ones, and commended them to God. Then, with alternate prayer and praise upon his lips, he rapidly sank into the arms of death, and, without a sigh or groan, he calmly fell asleep in Jesus.

The services connected with the funeral of our valued fellow-labourer were conducted by the President, Rev. John Wakefield, and the Rev. W. S. Griffin, Chairman of the District, the latter of whom preached an appropriate and able sermon. Many of his ministerial brethren mingled with the vast assembly, and fully sympathized with the prevalent feeling that a good man, and an able and successful minister, was summoned from labour to reward all too soon, were it not that we know it is the Master who has said to him, "Come up higher."

He was ordained at Guelph Conference, 1877, and sent to the Delhi Mission, which was his first and only superintendency. The condition of the Mission induced him to put forth too great efforts, which taxed his energies beyond their power, and led to the development of lung disease, which finally ended his work and life.

Brother Guest had a good and well-trained mind, fine social qualities, and a strong spiritual nature. These were, in the fullest and truest sense, consecrated to God. He jealously guarded his spiritual life, and walked always in the light of an unclouded experience. He thirsted for God, for the living God; sought to know His will, and moved in swift and loving obedience to do it.

At the close of the Conference of 1879 he had the first hæmorrhage of the lungs. After two months rest he resumed his work, but was prostrated again in February, 1880. He was superannuated last Conference in hopes that his health might be restored. In September he went to his paternal home at Oxford Mills. It now became evident that his days were numbered. The moment he saw God desired him to depart there was a cordial submission to His will. While he committed his wife and child without fear to Him who had promised to be a husband to the widow and father to the fatherless, he made all arrangements in his power for their comfort, but about his own

future was nobly thoughtless. He had no fears and no fightings. His peace was broken only by rapture. Heaven was a reality to him. His faith was the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. He died on the 12th day of December, 1880.

THE REV. HALL CHRISTOPHERSON

Was born in London, England, March 4th, 1836. He came to Canada with his father's family in 1846, and settled near Toronto. He was converted on the Humber Circuit in March, 1852, under a sermon preached by the Rev. Wm. Richardson. He was at once impressed with the duty of devoting his life to the work of the Christian ministry. After spending some time in preparation at Victoria College, he began his ministerial work under the direction of the Chairman on the Bayfield Circuit, in 1857, and was received into full connection and ordained at the Conference of 1861.

Owing to the enfeebled state of his health, the Conference of 1880 gave him a superannuated relation for one year. He hoped that medical treatment and rest from labour would soon restore him to active work, but in this he was disappointed. Soon after the close of Conference there was a culmination of his disease, and after a period of great suffering he died at the residence of J. H. Flagg, Esq., Mitchell, on the night of Tuesday, August 2nd, 1880.

Bro. Christopherson was a man of considerable culture, high tastes, and diversified gifts. Under favourable circumstances he would have excelled in the fine arts. He had a special aptitude for music and painting, in which he made no mean proficiency. He was clear in his perceptions of

religious truths, principles of right character.

There were many who were minister worthily. He was endeared to his people by his pathetic nature. He gave ample evidence of his preaching. He constantly felt the need of giving a mark of his industry and he often expressed the sinner's faith in the ministry.

But when he was no shrinking to whom he gave the Saviour from heaven to sustain in the

religious truth, and strong in his convictions of the principles of right. This gave stability to his Christian character.

There were many traits in his character as a Christian minister worthy of high commendation. As a pastor he was endeared to his people by his genial spirit and sympathetic nature. The various circuits on which he laboured give ample testimony to his abilities and success as a preacher. He possessed a mind rich in resources, which, constantly fed by reading, observation, and careful study, gave a marked freshness to his pulpit ministrations. He has left a large amount of manuscript which indicates his industry and activity of brain and pen. During his illness he often expressed a desire longer to live and preach Christ, the sinner's friend, realizing the privilege and honour of this ministry.

But when the final hour came there was no trepidation, no shrinking from the cup held to his lips, assuring those to whom he spoke of his unwavering faith in Christ as his Saviour from sin, and of the sufficiency of Divine grace to sustain in the hour of dissolution.

A short time before his death he said to a brother minister, "What a grand thing it is that the glorious gospel we preach to others is all-sufficient for ourselves!" His last words, audibly spoken, were, "I'll soon be at rest."

Thus lived and laboured, and thus died, Rev. Hall Christopherson, in the 45th year of his age, and the 24th of his ministry.

Morley Punshon, LL.D., from his earthly sphere of Christian work—a man whose genial spirit, urbanity of manners, and extensive labours, had endeared him most to those best acquainted with his private and public life.

We desire to record on our Journal, and in our published Minutes, to place before the thousands of our Israel, our high estimate of the invaluable services rendered to the Methodist Church of Canada by our now departed brother, by the incessant devotion of his great and varied talents to the promotion of all its connexional interests during the five years of his Presidency, in which his sagacity, prudence, administrative ability, and untiring effort to elevate, stimulate, and encourage all, and especially the younger members of our ministry, were ever conspicuous.

We gratefully recognize and glorify the grace of God, strikingly displayed by our beloved brother in the fulness, fervour, and blessed results of his presentation of Divine truth in our pulpits, affording a model of chaste and impressive eloquence rarely equalled, and of ardour and directness of aim commanding high admiration, and exciting to praiseworthy and holy emulation.

Nor can we fully state the amount of benefit conferred upon the various institutions and enterprises of the Church,

Our missionary and educational departments are laid under weighty and lasting obligations to the wisdom evinced by our lamented friend in devising, and his zeal and generosity in carrying into effective action, methods tending to the extension and success of those great undertakings.

Nor can we withhold from notice his deep comfort of the veterans retired from active conflict in our ministerial ranks, and of the widows and children of such as have passed to their reward, manifested by his generous benefaction of upwards of four thousand dollars, to be applied for their benefit.

Contemplating the combination of such a wealth of divinely-conferred talent, the wise and studious culture of it, and the faithfulness and humility with which all was laid at the feet of his heavenly Master, many of us are persuaded that we shall "not look upon his like again ;" and were it not for our belief in the inexhaustible resources of the Lord Christ, and in the reliableness of his great and precious promises, we should conclude that by the death of William Morley Punshon, the Church has sustained not only a great, but an irreparable loss.

The Candidates shall present a written sermon each year on some subject embraced in the course of study.

STANDING REGULATIONS RESPECTING CANDIDATES.

The Conference requires Candidates for our Ministry to preach a Trial Sermon before the District Meeting by which they are recommended, or before a Committee appointed by the District Meeting, who shall report their opinion on the sermon, and embody it in the recommendation of such Candidate to the Conference.

The District Meeting shall require the Superintendent of the Circuit from which any young man is recommended to be received on trial, to give a written statement of his religious character, talents, and usefulness, educational advantages and acquirements, employments and means of support, and such other particulars as the meeting may deem necessary; which statement shall be signed by him and recorded in the District Book.

Candidates for our ministry and Probationers shall be examined by means of papers prepared by the respective Examiners.

There shall also be an oral examination if required.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of Candidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each Candidate as to his Studies and General Reading for the year, with a view to giving advice as to his course and method of study. No Candidate shall

be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are completed.

The classes shall be graded as follows:—Third-class, thirty to fifty marks; second-class, fifty to seventy-five marks; first-class, seventy-five to one hundred marks; ninety and upwards marks, first-class with honours.

That no paper under thirty marks shall be received; but the Probationer failing in that study shall have the opportunity of pursuing the subject the next year; and that the number be registered, but not counted in the aggregate of marks.

The standard of qualification for young men recommended to be received into our Conference as Probationers, shall not be lower than *fifty per cent.* of the marks on the Preliminary Course of Study.

Any Candidate who may present a Public School Teacher's Certificate of the second-class, or a Certificate of having passed a Matriculation Examination at any of our Universities, shall not be required to stand an Examination on the English branches of the Preliminary Course; but he shall be required to pass an Examination in the subjects of Biblical History and in Theology—two and three, Preliminary Course—before the Examining Board of his Conference, or of the College where he may be pursuing his studies.

Resolved,—Should any Minister or Preacher, having claims on the Connexional Funds, fail to pay up his account with the office as above directed, it shall be the duty of the Book-Steward annually to draw upon the Treasurer of any of those Funds an amount not exceeding one-fourth of the claim of the brother on such fund towards the payment of his debt; and the Treasurer of such fund is hereby directed to honour such drafts when presented.

Probationers.

Resolved,—That any Probationer, assisted by the Educational Fund, who within the period of ten years after Ordination, may wish to withdraw, from the Conference, shall be required to refund the amount of aid given him before receiving a certificate of standing; provided always that this requirement shall not apply to those who retire from ill-health.

Visiting the Public Schools, &c.

Resolved,—That the Conference earnestly recommends the Ministers of this body to avail themselves of the facilities afforded by the Council of Public Instruction, to visit the Public Schools as frequently as possible at the time pre-

scribed, for the purpose of communicating religious instruction.

The Bible and Public Schools.

Resolved,—Inasmuch as the Bible may be used by public authority in our public schools, and as it is desirable that it should be used in all our schools, we recommend our membership and adherents to use their influence to secure its use in all schools from which it is now excluded.

Removal of Ministers during the Year.

That in the event of a brother removing from any Circuit, District, or Conference to another Circuit, or District, or Conference during the year, he shall be required to obtain a certificate of removal from the Superintendent, Chairman, or President, according as the removal may be to the Circuit, District, or Conference; but in every case the examination of character, belief in our doctrines and the like, shall be held in connection with the name as it stands in the printed Minutes of Conference, due certificates being forwarded the Chairman covering the period of time between removal and District Meeting.

Conference Year.

Resolved,—That all Ministers and Preachers of the London Conference be held responsible for the work on the Circuits they are about to leave during the month of June, and on the Circuits to which they go on the first Sabbath in July.

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

LONDON CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST
CHURCH OF CANADA,

TO THE

CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,—

“Grace be unto you, and peace from Him which was, and is, and which is to come, and from the Seven Spirits which are before His Throne, and from Jesus Christ, who is the faithful witness and the first begotten of the dead, and the prince of the kings of the earth. Unto Him that loved us and washed us from our sins in His own blood, and hath made us kings and priests unto God and His Father, to Him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen.”

Assembled in our Annual Conference, we invite you to join with us in giving praise and adoration to the Father of mercies, and God of all comfort, for the numberless unmerited and boundless blessings of another year, and to make a re-consecration of all our ransomed powers to the service and glory of Him who hath redeemed us to God with His blood.

We need not remind you that we live in eventful times, in which it becomes us to “earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered to the saints:” for those primitive doctrines, and spiritual experience,

and works of holy love so faithfully taught and brightly illustrated by our forefathers, whereby they aroused the slumbering Churches of their day, and recovered to spiritual life the masses of a perishing world.

The Spirit of the age is one of intensified scepticism and worldliness and we solemnly remind you that "all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eye, and the pride of life is not of the Father, but is of the world, and the world passeth away and the lust thereof, but he that doeth the will of God abideth for ever."

In order to attain a knowledge of the will of God, we urge you to the diligent reading of the Holy Scriptures, now happily in our day invested with peculiar interest by the issue of the "Revised Translation." An event which will be marked in ages to come as an era of grandest moment. Let the tide of awakened feeling beget in your hearts increased delight in the word of God. Let this gift of our Heavenly Father's love to us be responded to by augmented faithfulness in more earnest understanding in the law of the Lord. Then shall your Christian experience and character become "like a tree planted by the rivers of water that bringeth forth his fruit in His season, whose leaf shall not wither."

Hold fast to the simplicity of, moment by moment, appropriating faith in the atonement of our Lord Jesus Christ, a faith sealed by the attestation of the Holy Spirit pouring the love of God into your hearts, ever returning to God in praise and prayer and going forth in deeds of Christian love on all mankind; but especially to them who are of the household of faith.

We exhort you to continued faithfulness in the use of the means of grace. Let it not be said of you as of the ancient apostles, "ye are gone away from mine ordinances." Backsliding commences and perpetuates in neglect of the closet. Each morning and evening assemble your households around the altar of family devotion. Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy. Bring your families punctually and constantly to the public ministration of the Word of God, and when the hour for week-night service comes set before the world, the Church, and your children an example of fidelity to the voice of duty, calling you to go up to the house of the Lord and make supplication before your God.

Especially do we commend our own distinctive means of grace the Class Meeting, whose origin is co-eval with the rise of the United Societies of the people called Methodists. Remember the remark of an eminent living divine belonging to another communion, "that God has committed to Methodism, to keep in trust for the Christian Church the communion of Saints as embodied in the Class Meeting, and the witness of the power of the Holy Spirit to perfect the believer in love in this present life." Be it yours and ours to maintain inviolate this trust, and hand it down unweakened and unchanged to those who shall succeed us and win from our Lord the blessed and blissful commendation, "Well done thou good and faithful servant, thou hast been faithful over a few things I will set thee over many things, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

We desire your attention to the literature of the day; guard your homes against the entrance of pernicious books, they are a deadly poison. We commend

to your patronage our Book Room, never more efficient in providing cheap and wholesome literature than at the present time. Our Connexional publications, *The Christian Guardian*, the *Magazine* and our Sunday School literature carry with them seeds of good, and benefit the households wherever they go. Our new Hymn Book is now completed, and meets with general acceptance, furnishing our Church with a psalmody of the highest order.

With pleasure we point to our Educational Institutions, the Female College at Hamilton and Whitby, and our University of Victoria College, at Cobourg. No institutions in the country excel them in giving a first-class literary and Christian education. Their sole weakness is lack of financial resources, and we confidently commend them to your support, whether by contribution, recommending them to your friends, or by entrusting your children to their care and culture.

Our Sabbath Schools are dear to your hearts. The British Centennial, which has been celebrated during the past year, tells by its record that the Church's hope lies in the children; the children for Christ, and Christ for the children; but we affectionately ask you, Christian parents, to join with us in feeding the lambs of Christ's flock. The tears and prayers of Christian mothers, the influence of home training are prevalent with God, and leave marks for good on human character ineffaceable in this mortal life.

The facilities afforded by the Scott Act for obtaining increased powers of legislation in the suppression of the traffic in intoxicating drink lays us, as a people, under high responsibility to unite our energies as one man, and put forth all our influence of word, example,

or civil franchise to join with the friends of humanity to arrest, so far as in us lies, the reign of intemperance throughout our land. Be not, we beseech you, neutral or lukewarm, but do your uttermost when the time comes to aid in the introduction of this measure.

It is to us a matter for thankfulness in view of the unprecedented drain during the past year by the removal of members to distant parts that we are able to report an increase in our numbers, but we feel the need of deep humiliation before God of a more abundant outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon our congregations, and we have set apart the first Friday in October, as a day of fasting and special prayer and intercession. Lend us your co-operation, make, as far as possible, secular duties give way for the sake of the Kingdom of our God and the triumph of the Gospel of His Christ.

The increase in the missionary income in our Conference of nearly \$1,900 furnishes cause for gratitude. Our mission fields are white unto the harvest. Doors are opening wide. Labourers, with their hearts filled with the love of Christ, and lips touched with hallowed fire, are offering themselves for the work, saying, "Here am I, send me!" Our need is not an open door, nor devoted workers, but we wait and long for a larger measure of the spirit of liberality and consecration to descend upon the Church.

Solemn and admonitory elements have blended with our Conference. Three of our brethren, beloved, have died in the Lord. Thanks be to God who giveth us the victory, they died in the triumphs of faith. It is our heart-joy "that our people die well." We mourn the death of the late Rev. William Morley

Punshon, known and honoured over the entire realm of Methodism throughout the world, but especially endeared to us as our once honoured and beloved President, and know that our Canadian Methodist Church was peculiarly dear to, even as it was devotedly served by him; but we sorrow not as those that have no hope.

“ Our friends are gone before
To that celestial shore ;
They have left their mates behind,
They have all the storms outrode,
Found the rest we toil to find,
Landed in the arms of God.”

The recent heart-rending calamity near London on the Queen's Birthday in which beneath a bright unclouded sunshine more than two hundred of our citizens, many of them in life's opening bloom, found in a moment unexpected a watery grave, threw its dark shadow over our sessions. We commend the bereaved and sorrowing ones to your prayers. We hear the voice, “Work, for the night is coming,” “Prepare to meet thy God, O Israel!”

We have enjoyed a happy Conference, never did we feel more of unity and love one to another, and never did we realize more manifest tokens of Divine presence and influence resting upon our assembly. The best of all is, God is with us. And now, dearly beloved, we go forth with yourselves to the duties, toil, and unknown events of another year.

The Church of the first-born to join,
We travel to the mount of God;
Our labour this, our only aim,
To find the new Jerusalem.”

REPORT OF THE SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE,
1881.

The Rev. G. A. Mitchell, B.A., presented the Annual Report of the Sabbath-School Committee to the Conference, as follows, which was unanimously adopted :

A careful examination of the official returns warrants your Committee in presenting to the Conference a most favourable report of our Sabbath-School work for the past year. Our schools now number 550, being an increase of 11. Number of scholars, 45,822, increase 259 ; conversions, 2,200, increase 126 ; meeting in class, 6,321, increase 210.

Having again considered the importance of the Temperance question, your Committee recommend that a Temperance service be held in each school quarterly, and that the best available talent be secured to enlist the sympathies and interest both of scholars and teachers in order that all may be united on the principle of total abstinence. Further that a pledge-book be provided by every school and presented at each Temperance meeting to secure signatures to the pledge, embracing abstinence from all intoxicating liquors and tobacco.

The growing importance of our Sabbath-School literature, induced your Committee to invite a consultation with the Book Steward and Editor of our Sabbath-School papers, in order to suggest to them such changes as may secure greater improvement in our periodicals and a wider circulation of these excellent productions. The result of this interview was a promise to furnish *Pleasant Hours*, greatly improved, at reduced rates.

We deem the large number of conversions during the past year in connection with our Sabbath-School effort a cause for devout thanksgiving to God, and we urge most earnestly all Sabbath-School workers to put forth renewed effort towards securing direct-soul-saving results.

A memorial from the Simcoe District relating to the use of the Catechism, being under consideration your Committee recommends that superintendents of Circuits be strongly urged to secure the study of the Catechism in all our schools, that they impress also upon parents the great importance of systematic study in their families, and further that all pastors faithfully comply with the requirements of the Discipline relative to the catechising of the children.

Your Committee would still recommend the continuance of the Rev. George Brown, as Treasurer of the General Sunday-School Fund, and that the Secretary be elected corresponding member of the Sunday-School Board.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

RIDGETOWN.—That permission be granted for the sale of the church lot at Highgate, proceeds to be applied to the liquidation of the debt on the Ridgetown Church.

Also for the sale of the parsonage property, proceeds to be applied in purchasing a new parsonage property.

SARNIA DISTRICT.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Though regarding the Temperance movement as one of the most important social, moral, and political questions of the present day, your Committee, nevertheless, finds it exceedingly difficult to suggest any course of action that would at once recognize the true position of Methodism in relation to the Temperance cause, and at the same time organize the entire forces of the Church, as a Church, in securing the objects of this great reform. Hoping, however, to make the action of this Conference as practical and effective as possible, your Committee recommends the following resolutions:—

1. That whereas, the prominent feature of the Temperance work in the country is the restriction and suppression of the liquor traffic by legal enactment, as the most effectual remedy for the evils of intemperance.

And whereas, the Methodist Church has, during the whole of its history, practically endorsed and pronounced in favour of Prohibition in the terms of the Discipline, by *prohibiting*

those who continue in its societies from "Buying or selling spirituous liquors,—unless in case of extreme necessity," as well as from "drinking them." Therefore be it

Resolved,—That we as a Conference do affirm the principle of the legal suppression of the liquor traffic and pledge ourselves, as ministers, to do all in our power to secure the passage of the Canada Temperance Act of 1878, in the Counties within the bounds of this Conference, and at the same time urge upon all our people the duty of assisting us to secure the same.

2. That whereas the Canada Temperance Act of 1878, has, wherever tested, proved the most effective piece of Temperance legislation ever given to the people of this Dominion for the purposes of regulating and controlling the liquor traffic, and lessening the evils of Intemperance. Therefore be it

Resolved,—That, as a Conference we enter our protest against any amendment to the Act, by either the Senate or House of Commons, that would in any way impair the present efficiency, as a total prohibitory enactment, from all kinds of alcoholic liquors, or that would interfere with the long established and well understood principle of a majority vote.

3. That whereas no prohibitory legislation can be either secured or maintained but through a strong public sentiment thoroughly educated upon the different phases of the question. Therefore be it

Resolved,—That we recommend our ministers and people to encourage the circulation of Temperance literature, to hold regular temperance prayer-meetings, to form Church Temperance Societies, and to make the general Temperance movement a regular and recognized part of our Church work. We further recommend the preaching of at least one sermon during the year, on some aspect of the Temperance question, by all our ministers at each of their appointments, in connection with which service the reports of the

Conference on Temperance and the position of our Church on the general question shall be submitted to the people.

4. That whereas the regulation of the traffic in intoxicating liquors and the removal of the evils arising therefrom is one of the great reforms that must be wrought out in the history of this country, in which the Methodist Church must be prepared to perform her part intelligently and effectively. Therefore be it

Resolved,—That there be a Standing Committee on Temperance, whose duty it shall be to watch the developments of this movement, gather information and statistics touching the question, suggest courses of action and submit to this Conference a full report at its next Annual Session.

REPORT OF THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

The Committee on Memorials met in the vestry of the Wellington Street Church, on June 3rd, 1881.

On motion, the Rev. W. W. Ross was elected Chairman, and the Rev. R. W. Williams, Secretary.

Upon the matters being laid before it your Committee would report—

1st. Upon the Memorial from the Brantford District, asking that "the Conference express its judgment on the subject of attendance upon class-meetings in such a way as to arrest the spread of the erroneous opinion that such attendance is not necessary." We recommend that whereas our Discipline is explicit (Part I., Section III., paragraphs 71 and 72), the Conference earnestly urge our ministers and people to keep the Discipline.

2nd. Upon the Memorial from the Sarnia District, relating to the revision of the "General Rules" and the "Covenant Service," we believe that whereas the "Rules of Society" cannot be altered (Part II., Section I., paragraphs 15 and 3), no action can be taken; but in relation to the "Covenant Service" we recommend the Conference to take such action as may lead to a revision thereof.

3rd. Upon Memorial from the Niagara District, asking that some time be set apart for the investigation of matters which may affect the next General Conference legislation, we recommend the Conference to grant the request.

4th. Upon Memorial from the Goderich District, asking for the publication of the Minutes of the Conference as they appear on the Conference Journal, and also the stations of the London, Toronto, and Montreal Conferences, we respectfully urge the Conference to accede to the request.

5th. Upon Memorial from St. Thomas District, asking for the publication of a report of the Educational Society, in harmony with that of the Missionary Society, we recommend that the report of the Educational Society be published in detail in the Minutes of the Annual Conference.
