Pope Benedict Delerious And Unconscious; End Near

Hope Revived as Sleep Came This Morning Was Soon Dispelled, and Death is Feared Before the Day Has Ended.

(Canadian Press Cable.)

Rome, Jan. 21—(2 p.m.)—Pope Benedict became appreciably reaker about midday today and hopes which had arisen after a period of slumber in the morning disappeared. His general condition had become worse and he seemed to be slowly expiring.

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

Incidentally, Miss Farncomb discovered that tuberculosis, with influenza and pneumonia, was responsible for a large percentage of the mortality that had left families dependent on the state. Miss Farncomb said that in most cases the mothers found it necessary to augment the funds given under the act—\$40 for two children, \$45 for three, \$50 for four, and \$55 for five.





Sunday following a fire, or met death by drowning. Ten survivors of the crew were landed at Lowestoft by a trawler were landed at Lowestoft by a trawler late this afternoon.

Details of the disaster as related by the captain of the Vesta are to the effect that during heavy weather on Sunday night the deck cargo of the vessel, consisting largely of naphtha, shifted. An explosion occured and a few minutes later the whole vessel was in flames, with the exception of the space near the bridge, where the crew huddled for safety.

A boat was lowered, but it was engulfed in the heavy seas and its three occupants were drowned. The mate, clasping his newly married wife in his arms, jumped overboard. Both perished. Others of the ship's company also plunged into the sea from the now fiercely burning vessel, only to sink beneath the waves. Finally only the captain and nine men were left on board. They were rescued after great difficulty by a trawler, after six hours and when they had almost abandoned hope. Those rescued had been scorched by the flames and partially asphyxiated by the naphtha fumes.





The city of Hamilton has been paying to this same company, \$45 per h. p. for pumping, but the commission's offer was \$17.50. The company, upon learning this, made an offer to supply services to any municipality at ten per cent less than the Hydro Commission, matter what that price might be.

This was such an object lesson to Hamilton of the ills of private ownership, that instead of accepting the offer, they, in 1911, voted for municipal ownership and distribution. An appropriation of \$505,000 was made and, in spite of injunctions and other legal efforts to prevent it, the city hydro system was adopted in 1912. The city commenced operations in 1913 swith only five customers, yet in 1920 it had 15,450 domestic users, 16,664 commercial users and 550 power users. This is a striking example of what was accomplished in spite of legal actions, and against a very power ful company who were buying their power at a cost so low as almost to defy competition. Judging by the results in Hamilton, there need be very little worry by the citizens of \$1, John with regard to the ability of the present distributors to obstruct municipal distribution.


