



## THE STREET RAILWAY.

The new street railway agreement here provides for an increase of ten cents an hour in wages, making the new base rate of fifty and fifty-five cents an hour instead of forty and forty-five Ten cents an hour will be paid for all snow fighting work; ten cents while they are teaching a new man and ten cents an hour for Sunday work and time and a half for all overtime which includes all legal holidays.
