THE STREET RAILWAY.
The new street railway agreement here provides for an increase of ten cents an hour in wages, making the new base rate of fifty and fifty-five cents an hour instead of forty and forty-five. Ten cents an hour will be paid for all snow fighting work; ten cents while they are teaching a new man and ten cents an hour for Sunday work and time and a half for all overtime which includes all legal holidays.

A further agreement was made, signed by the same parties, whereby it is agreed by both the company and the employees that one or two cars of the one-man type now under construction or ready for the rails, shall be given a demonstration run, and in the event that they prove satisfactory to the mayor, the city commissioners and to the general public, the employees will further negotiate with the company as to the safety and reasonableness of operation, and the wages and conditions of operation, of these new cars. In the event of no satisfactory settlement being made by the two parties on this matter, they both agree to submit the whole matter to a conciliation board, or to arbitration, under the Lemieux act.



MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

The Grand Trunk Railway Arbitration Board is now complete with Sir Walter Cassels, chief justice of the exchequer court as chairman. Sir Thomas White represents the government and Hon. W. H. Taft, former president of the United States, represents the Grand Trunk Railway. The board is formed for the purpose of fixing the correct value of first, second and third preferred stock and the common stock.

Following his being sworn in as a member of the Meighen cabinet yesterday, Hon. C. C. Ballantyne left for St. Andrews for a holiday.

An increase of ten per cent or \$250,000 annually is the award to the employees of the Winnipeg Electric Railway by arbitration. Conductors and motormen will now receive sixty cents an hour.

An order in council at Ottawa extends the time in which a soldier may apply for his gratuity from July 1, 1920 to March 31, 1921. A second provision for the payment of the dependents' portion of the war service gratuity to widows of soldiers.

Great Britain and Japan have notified the League of Nations that they have prolonged their treaty alliance for a year.

In Digby county, N. S., Captain Glendon Campbell of Westmouth, and Louis J. Comeau of Saultneville, who

were named for conservative nomination withdrew from the race and Mr. Campbell was unanimously nominated by the farmers, with Amersie Hobbischock as running mate. W. J. Foley of Salmon River, will run as an independent Conservative.

HEARTS OF WORLD AT THE LYRIC

Delightful Love Story Effectively Contrasted with Realistic War Scenes.


An audience that filled the Lyric Theatre was alternately thrilled with patriotic impulses and moved to laughter and almost to tears by the screen presentation of "Hearts of the World" at its opening production last evening. The picture was heralded as Dr. Griffith's supreme masterpiece, and it well justified the title. Mr. Griffith's great spectacular screen productions have been seen here—such as "The Birth of a Nation," and "Intolerance," but none of them have played on the emotions as did the "Hearts of the World."

The story is a clever combination of old fashioned love and romance woven into the most terrific scenes of the great war of all times. There are charming pastoral interludes and delightful love scenes, which are sharply contrasted with scenes of blood and tragedy, illustrating in terrible fashion the graphic descriptive writing that has moved the hearts of everybody for the past four years.

Accompanying these are a series of scenes showing the grouping of the French and British forces for the beginning of the great conflict, the gathering of the Dominions, and the gradual concentration of the forces of civilization to down the brutalities of Berlin, the whole story bearing a distant relation to the delightful story "A Hilltop on the Marne," while worked out with much more dramatic effect.

It would be idle to attempt to describe the enormous wealth of incident and battle significance shown in the screen drama. Suffice it to say that the drama held the audience from start to finish, while even the many hardened movie devotees present, found themselves tense with excited interest, or breaking into involuntary applause, continually throughout the whole play. As an American production it was notable that the familiar American familiarity of the Stars and Stripes was favorably commended for its absence, only cropping up naturally and incidentally at the climax where the Americans came in, and was then introduced so effectively that the audience cheered it to the echo. 



THE WAR IN THE TERMS OF MONEY

London, June 26.—(A. P. Correspondent.) The war in Europe has been in excess of £20,000,000,000, represented by property destroyed, losses in investments abroad, depreciation of property, and by pensions, Edgar Crammond, English minister, told the Bankers Institute at a recent meeting here.

LARGE REWARDS IN THE SMALL CASE

Still Comes No Word of Missing Millionaire

Not Seen Since December 2 and His Secretary Missing Since Three Weeks Later.

(Canadian Press.) Toronto, Ont., July 13.—Whether it is essentially established as a case of kidnaping or violent death, or merely a convenient dropping out of sight for the time being—the double disappearance of Ambrose J. Small, millionaire theatrical man of this city, and his secretary, John Doughty, both well known citizens of Toronto, will go down into police history here probably as the most mysterious and baffling to date.

Toronto police detectives have had numerous trips to New York and other points of sundry clues on both or either of the men, but for nothing substantial has been ascertained regarding their movements since the dates mentioned. Many acres of earth have been dug up, and many bodies examined on suspicion of being buried out to be cases of mistaken identity.

Mr. Small had just put through a deal for the sale of his interests in a number of theatres in Canada at \$1,200,000 to a syndicate known as Trans-Canada Theatres, Limited, and a few hours before his disappearance on December 2 he had received a cheque for \$100,000 in connection with the sale.

The fact that Mr. Small was missing was not made public until three or four weeks had elapsed. In the first week in January the first circulars asking for information as to Mr. Small's whereabouts were sent out by the local police authorities, and a reward of \$500 was offered.

The mystery of Mr. Small's absence was accentuated by the disappearance of John Doughty, who had been his private secretary at the Grand Opera House for many years.

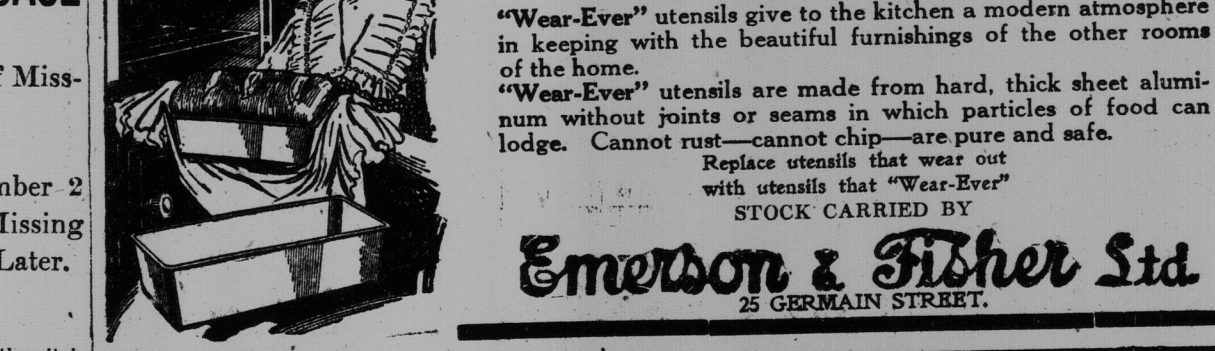

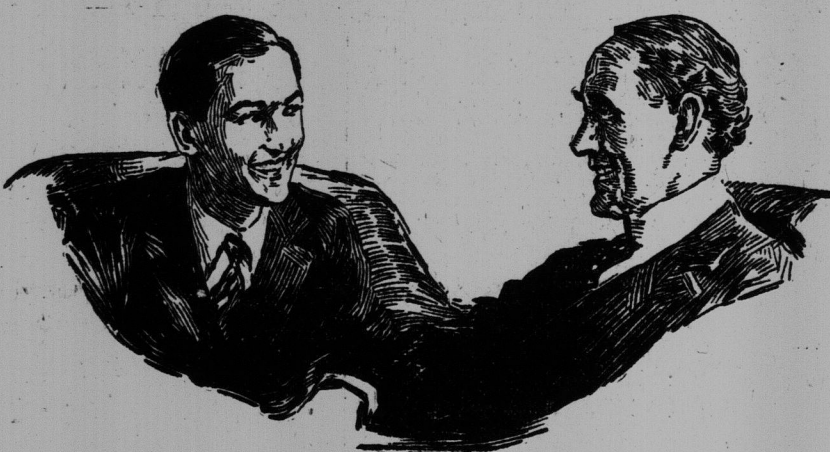

COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD MEETINGS

The annual meeting of the trustees of the East St. John school, was held last evening with the chairman, John Tonge, in the chair. The election of trustees resulted in Mr. Tonge being re-elected and O. R. Black elected in place of David Marshall who had sent in his resignation. The question of the new school building was again brought up and the building committee was authorized to advertise for tenders. The trustees decided to increase the appropriation for this year to \$2,500. Frank Josselyn was elected secretary.

The plan for the building, which were drawn by Garnett Wilson, have been completed and the work will be started soon. The building is to be constructed of brick with a cement foundation and including all foundations will cost about \$20,000. It will be erected at the end of the car line and in the centre of the locality.

The board of trustees of the Beauséjour school held their annual meeting last night, when it was decided to increase the appropriations for school purposes to \$8,500. W. O. Danham was re-elected to the board of trustees and Dr. W. L. Ellis was elected to the vacancy on the board occasioned by the resignation of George M. Bailey, who has left for Ontario. The annual report of the secretary was read and showed that the year had been a very satisfactory one.

MEETING OF CITY SCHOOL TRUSTEES

At a meeting of the St. John School Board last evening, a communication from Margaret H. Graham, thanking the board for salary received during illness, was read. An application was received from Miss Dorothy F. Smith for another year's leave of absence to continue college work. It was referred to the

teachers' committee. Application from Miss Beitha V. Stewart and Miss Mary A. Howard for positions on the teaching staff was referred to the teachers' committee.

Dr. Mabel Hannington submitted a report on the medical condition of the schools. It was not made public. It was resolved to engage Miss Ella McLeod permanently in the office of the school board.

Dr. Bridges reported that "My Own Canadian Home" had been adopted as the favorite national song in the schools. The secretary announced that Hon. J. B. M. Baxter had given a decision that the board had not the authority to issue redemption debentures without getting an act put through the legislature. Bonds were to be used to build a vocational school, and Dr. Emery said that the board would have to hire rooms for the vocational classes as before. It would put the board back a little, he thought, but the matter would work itself out all right in the end.

Informally it was brought out that the Colwell Fuel Co. had tendered for 200 tons of soft coal for the Albert school at \$12.50 and J. S. Gibbon & Co., Ltd. at \$18.75 for anthracite and \$12.75 for 500 tons of Nova Scotia national coal. The firm would supply but the amount named at that price. The acceptance of these tenders had been recommended, but they still leave the board 300 tons

short.

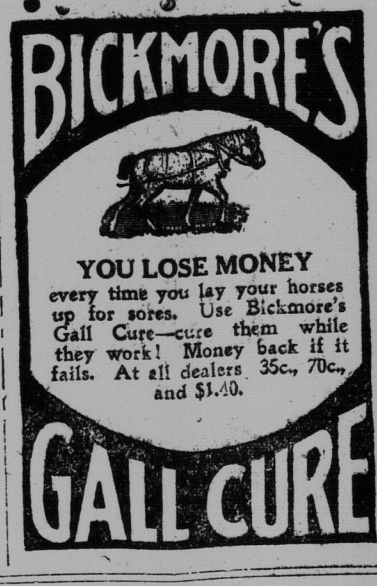

gas field of the Bow River district near Calgary. In Calgary it is estimated that 12,000,000 cubic feet of helium is being lost yearly.

Canada is the only part of the British Empire having helium resources.

The investigation now under way will involve also the liquefaction of the gas. It is understood that a large grant from the research appropriation of the University of Toronto is to be available for extension of this work.

In Canada the gas is found chiefly in the Bow River gas fields, and the right to extract helium from the natural gas is held by the crown. The gas at Bow River contains 3 per cent of helium, and the council is urging upon the government the necessity of conserving the supply, as the flow of both gas and helium in the western Canada fields are said to be diminishing rapidly.

INDIAN BURYING GROUND DISCOVERED NEAR SARNIA.

Sarnia, July 13.—It is said here that the Grand Trunk workmen engaged at the Lakeshore are believed to have unearthed an old Indian burying ground. Every day brings its quota of human bones to view. While the bones in many instances have been scattered by the workmen's tools one or two have been unearthed in a fairly complete state, years gone by this region was the stamping ground of the Huron Indians, a famous in Canadian history.

CONVENTION CALL OF TRADES AND LABOR CONGRESS

The thirty-sixth annual session of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada will convene in the Argylls Ballroom, Windsor, Ont., at ten o'clock on Monday morning, September 18. There is great expectation that the record attendance of 984 delegates established at Hamilton last year will be exceeded. The call convenes in these terms: "The participation of Canada in the League of Nations has brought Canada into closer touch with the world's labor movement and the international aspect of many labor problems with year greater new problems, and as the decisions reached affect not only the lives of the workers attached to the union but the general well-being of the social fabric of the community, local unions and affiliated bodies are called upon to select men and women as delegates who have the broadest vision and coolest judgment."

"The aggressive action of those workers who would destroy the international trades union movement still continues; the rapid growth of mergers and huge trusts controlling the industries of the country cannot safely be ignored; profit-eering is still rampant and the benefit of wage increases are generally discounted before they have been received; inequalities in social life become daily more apparent; inordinate wealth flagrantly displays itself ostentatiously before the eyes of the great mass of workers yet struggling for a reasonable standard of living; unemployment still continues; freedom of speech and press is yet far from being an accomplished fact; immigration and similar problems loom up with ever greater significance, and without attempting to define more fully all the matters that the delegates will be called upon to consider, sufficient is above outlined to emphasize the importance of these important problems. "Women workers are growing more numerous year by year, and the problems which affect their employment are of paramount importance. Unions, which include women workers, are requested to bear this fact in mind when electing their delegates."

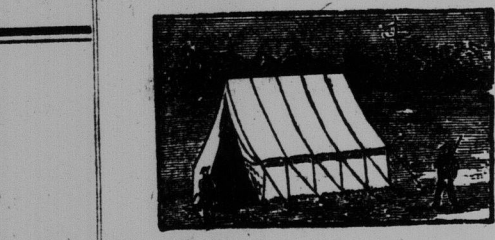

LOCAL NEWS

CAR BROUGHT HERE

The Oldsmobile touring car belonging to O. J. Killam which was struck at the Westfield railway crossing last night was brought to the city this afternoon. The chauffeur says it was not knocked eighteen feet and that possibly can be repaired. H. W. Berry, whose car overturned while he was going to Mr. Killam's assistance, had his leg strained and will be confined to his bed for a few days. No bones were broken.

ACTION OVER GRAVEL

In the circuit court this morning hearing was commenced in the case of Turnbull vs. Saunders. This is a matter arising from the alleged action of employees of the provincial department of public works taking gravel from the shore of W. R. Turnbull at Rothesay. He brought action against W. H. Saunders as an employee of the government, the latter accepting responsibility for the defendant. Letters written by the plaintiff, E. S. Carter and the department were read. The case is being heard with a jury.

AGAINST CARDS IN SCHOOL BUILDING

General Use for Community Purposes Approved
Annual Meeting of Rothesay Consolidated School District—Expenditures for Coming Year About \$16,000.

The ratepayers of the Consolidated school district at Rothesay met in annual session last evening with Chairman P. F. Blanchett presiding and A. W. McMackin as secretary. The amount voted was \$14,500 for the next school year which will be increased by the usual 10 per cent and shows that nearly \$16,000 will be expended for educational purposes in this district during 1920-21. The report shows 172 pupils registered and there was very general satisfaction expressed with the work of the school and the attention paid to school gardens and other courses which are, at the present day, features of progressive schools.

The increase in assessment over last year is between 60 and 50 per cent and it is interesting to note that with a valuation of about \$1,000,000 in the three districts included in the Consolidated school district there will be a school tax rate of between \$1.30 and \$1.40 on the \$100. The school tax rate in Hampton is said to be \$2.50 on the \$100 and in Sussex about the same as in Rothesay. The amount voted in Sussex for their very large town school is \$16,000 but the salaries paid to teachers in the Rothesay school is considerably in excess of those paid either in Sussex or Hampton.

E. S. Carter, one of the trustees, was appointed a delegate to the trustees' convention when held. The question of using the school building as a community centre was brought up and there was found to be no opposition to its general use for such purposes but a large portion of the meeting was opposed to permitting card playing in the school building. The school law says that there must be unanimous consent on the part of the trustees before the school building can be used for any purpose outside of the giving of instruction as provided by the school law. A motion was carried by a small majority to request the trustees to rescind the resolution passed by them forbidding card playing and dancing in the assembly hall but it was pointed out that there were many ratepayers not represented at the meeting and that the trustees would have to be guided by the school law in spite of any resolution of the ratepayers.

CHANCERY COURT.

The chancery court opened this morning. His Honor Judge White presiding. Application was made by J. H. McFadden of Sussex in the matter of Ambrose McDermott and other infants for the sale of a property at Havlock, Kings. The judge granted an order on condition that the infants, who are more than fourteen years of age, join therein. The property is a farm owned by the mother. Deceased. Ambrose McDermott, sr., was appointed guardian.

In chambers before Chief Justice Hazen an application was made by Mr. McFadden for the sale of a property at Sussex and the appointment of a guardian in the matter of Gertrude and Charles Vall, infants. An order allowing the application was granted. The property was that of the late Daniel Vall. Melbourne Scott was appointed guardian.

HAVE ARCHBISHOP AS THEIR GUEST

Syrians Entertain Vice-Patriarch of the East Nicely at Loch Lomond.

A delightful outing in honor of Archbishop Khouri, Vice-Patriarch of the East, was given last evening by prominent members of the Syrian citizenship here, when His Grace was the guest at dinner at Johnston's Hotel, Loch Lomond. Accompanying him were His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc, whose guest he has been at the Palace, and several priests and a few friends of the hosts also were present.

Those who promoted the very pleasant affair were: N. J. LeHood, John P. Shalala, Arthur Wakim, Raymond Tobias, Peter Farris and Thomas Stephen. Leaving Waterloo street about 6 o'clock in three automobiles, Loch Lomond was reached after a pleasant run and at 7.30 the party sat down to tables tastefully laid out with roses and other flowers in the Bishop's colors while over head hung bunches of wild flowers. A very fine menu was provided and Mrs. George McCafferty was heartily complimented on it and on the general excellence of the arrangements.

The tables were arranged in T form with His Grace, His Lordship, Father Wakim, secretary to the Archbishop, Rev. A. P. Allen, Rev. Raymond McCarthy and Hon. R. J. Ritchie. Besides the hosts others at table were Urban J. Sweney, P. J. Fitzpatrick and Frank McCafferty.

Arthur Wakim made the first address of the evening, a speech in the Syrian tongue welcoming the distinguished visitor from the East. There were no formal toasts but speeches were made by Hon. R. J. Ritchie, His Grace the Archbishop, His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc and Father Wakim. The master of ceremonies, besides welcoming Archbishop Khouri, spoke highly of the fine record made by the Syrian people who have made their homes in St. John, a sentiment in which Bishop LeBlanc heartily concurred and he said words of appreciation for their devotion to their church. He spoke of the people of this race being strong in their faith from the earliest ages.

His Grace spoke in French. He expressed his admiration at the many things which had been done for him to make his stay in St. John pleasant and thanked Bishop LeBlanc and the priests of the Cathedral and the people of his own race. He broadened his expressions of gratitude to include the whole Canadian people for what they had done in the great war and said that Canadian soldiers, as well as English soldiers, were among the first to land in his country to save his people from the ravaging Turks.

The following formal welcome was read by Arthur Wakim—

"It is with a sense of the deepest gratitude and pleasure that we receive you as our guests this evening. The presence of our distinguished Archbishop in St. John fills us with the greatest happiness and the privilege which this opportunity affords us to entertain Your Grace together with our own beloved Bishop is more than we could ask. We beg to assure you of our heartfelt appreciation of the honor done us."

"It is due to the great wisdom and kindness of the Holy Father that such a union as this, the coming together of the East and the West, has been made possible and the Syrian people of this city are deeply grateful to His Holiness that he is mindful of them in their exile."

"We take occasion on this time to express our gratitude to His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc for his generous hospitality. It is but another expression of his paternal interest in our welfare."

"We sincerely hope that Your Grace may enjoy the stay that your mission necessitates in Canada and we pray that you may return soon again to bless and favor us with the honor of your presence."

The return to the city was made at an early hour, all delighted with the outing. His Grace is remaining in St. John today and will leave with Father Wakim tomorrow for Nova Scotia. He is to tour Canada and the United States including South America in the interests of the Syrian people. During the tour he will succumb to the ravages of those fearful times and the local Syrians took advantage of the presence of His Grace to make up a substantial purse for the aid of the needy ones at home.

In the matter of the estate of Margaret Peacock, personally \$2,697.41, P. W. Peacock was appointed administrator. R. A. Davidson was proctor.

The will of Sarah Sophia Merritt late W. Peacock, Michigan, was probated at \$27,100 realty and \$2,023.34 personally. The estate consisted of property on Strait Shore, a warehouse at South Wharf and stock in the Calais Bank, Calais, Me. The will left all in charge of members of the family, for whom provision was made with instructions to divide the proceeds among certain members of the family named. The executors appointed were Donald McKensie, Emma E. Lawrence and Catherine E. Decker of Towanda, Penn. Dr. J. R. Campbell, K.C. was proctor.

In the matter of the estate of Catherine Horneastle letters testamentary were issued to Alice M. Ruddock and Joseph L. M. Johnston, who were appointed executrices. The probate was \$2,400 realty and \$80,001, personally. The estate was left to members of the family. C. F. Sanford was proctor.

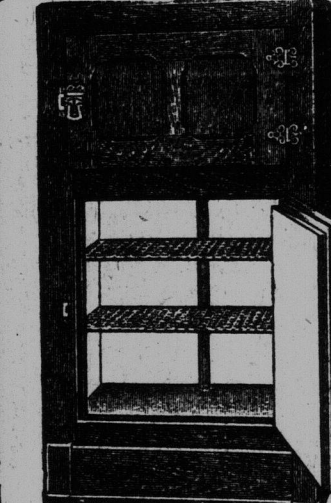

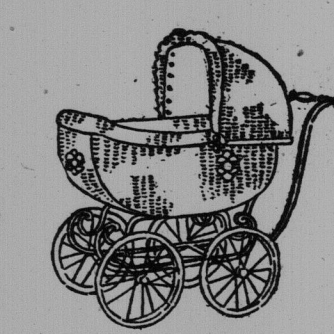
