The Lancaster Board of Trade held a full strength meeting in the Court House, Fairville, last evening and two important matters, the street railway extension to Manchester's corner and the advisability of incorporating the town of Fairville were given careful and hearty consideration by the members present. Vice-President A. Anderson was in the chair.

James McMurray and William Linton, who are to prepare a statement of facts and figures to be placed before the board of trade at the next meeting in March. The following motion was unanimously adopted with regard to the matter of the railway extension: "The Lancaster Board of Trade in a body petition the highway board to come to terms with the St. John Street Railway Company, and urge the extension of the line to Manchester's corner as soon as possible."

PRESIDENT INSISTS ON SQUARE DEAL

Washington, Feb. 6.—President Wilson announced today that he would endeavor to have repealed at the present session of congress that provision of the Panama Canal Act which exempts American coastwise ships from the payment of tolls. He made his position clear to callers today in unequivocal terms. The president believes that the Hay-Pauncefote treaty with Great Britain guarantees equal treatment to all nations including the United States in the matter of tolls, and that the United States is in honor bound to charge American vessels the same tolls it imposes upon those of foreign nations. The president impressed upon his callers that he would use every legitimate influence at his disposal to have the exemption clause eliminated from the Panama Canal Act.

IMPROVE THE STREETS

In making a plea for well-paved streets, and the adoption of such legislation as will best produce that result, those who make the appeal are not merely looking to the impression made upon the minds of visitors, although that is in itself a matter of some importance.

UNHAPPY MR. BORDEN

One of the neatest bits of irony that has appeared in the press of any party for a long time appears in today's Standard, and is from the pen of its Ottawa correspondent, who writes:

"Mr. Borden, with that high sense of honor which is characteristic of his life and conduct, has set out to give the Dominion of Canada a clean administration. He formed a cabinet of men of the same principle, and the Alert is an example of it."

The Alert, the reader does not need to be informed, is the government newspaper, which, as the Standard's correspondent truthfully but mildly observes, "has been used for political purposes."

When Mr. Borden reads this estimate of himself by the Ottawa correspondent of Mr. Hazen's organ, we can well imagine that he will throw up his hands and exclaim: "Et tu, Brute?"

If an election were held in St. John tomorrow, how many votes would Mr. Hazen get?

With Premier Borden and Hon. Mr. White both absent from the house through illness, the government forces are somewhat handicapped at Ottawa.

Mr. Guelielm is in St. John tomorrow. If he fails to do justice to local patrons of the Intercolonial, so much the worse for the government which appointed Mr. Guelielm.

The Borden government has a naval policy. It is to use government vessels to carry politicians and whiskey to constituencies where by-elections are in progress.

Are the Tories honoring the flag when they hoist it over a vessel containing whiskey with which to corrupt the electorate of Canada? What do the flag-fappers think about it?

An interesting development of the inquiry at Quebec is the issue of a summons at the instance of Mr. MacNab to bring his old chief, Sir Hugh Graham of the Star, before the investigating committee.

The Norton Griffiths Company are to rush the work at Courtenay Bay. Who is going to rush the work on the St. John Valley Railway, enable the Grand Trunk Pacific to gain access to the wharves at Courtenay Bay? If the work of the Norton Griffiths Company can be rushed, why not the other?

While it is important to provide immediate shelter, as well as food, for the unfortunates who formerly found quarters in the Salvation Army Metropole, the fact must not be overlooked that some of these gratry would be quite willing to enjoy free food and shelter until spring. The greatest charity that could be devised in their case would be the provision by the city, or through the Salvation Army with the city's aid, of work of some kind that would make it compulsory upon every man to earn his bed and meals.

The totes have been caught red-handed in the matter of the use of government steamers Alert for political purposes in Cape Breton. The matter was pressed home so vigorously that the minister of customs was compelled to suspend a customs officer and order the steamer Alert out of commission.

The writer of a letter in last evening's Globe need be under no misapprehension with regard to the attitude of the Times in the matter of the open door at city hall. In so far as any city council department from the policy of the open door, it abandons one of the important principles of the commission plan of government. The Times stands for the open door. If, however, the door should be closed at any time, it is well to have some degree of confidence in whoever may be behind it. This also is a fact worthy of consideration. By the way, why does not the Globe's correspondent come out from under the barn? Is there not a suggestion of humor in an anonymous writer demanding the open door?

PERU AND ECUADOR
The announcement of the revolution in Peru is somewhat surprising. A recent issue of the magazine entitled Peru Today gave no indication of the outbreak which has resulted in the capture and imprisonment of President Billinghurst, the murder of the prime minister and the seizure of the reins of power by a former revolutionist. At the last session of the Peruvian parliament the president's address indicated a very progressive policy in regard to agriculture, education and transportation. Glancing over the address one could not but be impressed with the feeling that Peru had entered upon a period of the most promising development. During the few months which have elapsed since that address was delivered, there has evidently been a complete change in the aspect of affairs, and it is impossible to predict what the new regime, if the revolutionary party are successful, may bring to pass.

Cautiously enough there is also trouble in Peru's neighbor, Ecuador. Mail advices say that a revolution is in progress there and is gaining ground, and that Guayaquil, the principal seaport, is to proclaim a new government. The financial situation in Ecuador is said to be bad, and the blame is laid chiefly at the door of President Plaza. Guayaquil is known as the "pest hole of the Pacific," and its citizens have long

The Venerable Archdeacon W. J. Armitage, of Halifax, N. S., one of the most prominent clergymen of the Church of England in Canada, celebrated his fifty-fourth birthday today.

Doctor Armitage has the distinction of being the rector of the oldest Protestant church in the Dominion, St. Paul's, Halifax, the cathedral of the first colonial bishop ever appointed and sent out by the mother church in England.

Doctor Armitage's hobby is Canadian history, particularly that part of it dealing with Nova Scotia. He is president of the Nova Scotia Historical Society and was appointed two years ago to the archives commission of the Dominion. He is also secretary of the committee of the church having in hand the revision of the prayer book.

SHE SUES FOR A HALF MILLION

Wealthy Brazilian In Breach Of Promise Action

FREED ON \$50,000 BAIL

All Went Well and Banns Were Published, Says New York Girl's Complaint, Till His Mother Put Her Foot Down

New York, Feb. 6.—Octavio Guinle, a wealthy young Brazilian and member of a New York exporting firm, was arrested here in an action brought by Miss Monica P. Borden to recover \$500,000 for alleged breach of promise of marriage. He was released in \$50,000.
Miss Borden lives with her mother and sister at 608 Riverside Drive. Guinle has an office at 48 Broadway and other offices in London and Paris. The parent office is in Rio Janeiro.
Mr. Guinle is twenty-seven years old, and is the son of Eduardo Pallasin Guinle, who died about eighteen months ago, leaving a large estate. The complaint says his father left Guinle \$5,000,000, besides \$1,000,000 which was left him by a man named Gaffre, who was at one time his father's business partner. Guinle also has a large interest in the firm.
Miss Borden's complaint fills many foolscap pages. Justice Scudder in Brooklyn signed the arrest order, and Deputy Sheriff McDonald and Zeltner hustled to the Ansonia, where Mr. Guinle has been occupying a suite of rooms that cost him \$600 a month. He was arrested and taken to the sheriff's office.

Wrote Fervent Letters
Mr. Guinle met Miss Borden for the first time in May last, and on July 5 he told her he could not live without her, according to the complaint. Mr. Guinle knew she was to sail for Europe on that day with her sister, Violet. Just before she sailed she got this from him:
My Darling and Sweet Mona—I am crazy. I do not know what to do without you. I have been crying since you left me alone without a soul to console me. You are the only woman I ever loved in all my life. I am willing to do anything for you. Come to me and I am sure I will make you happy. You are my love, my soul, my life. I adore you.
O. Guinle.
Miss Borden remained almost a week, but these were filled with cables and wireless messages. Miss Borden says in the complaint that she returned on the earnest solicitation of the defendant.

When the steamer pulled into the dock Mr. Guinle was there to greet her and then, until October, the papers say, he showed her many marked attentions. Then he asked her, the papers say, to marry him. She accepted him and for some time after that, no matter where they went where mutual friends were, they introduced themselves as an engaged couple. A great deal of the time Mr. Guinle was with Miss Borden, and when he wasn't he wrote her fervent letters with sentences like this: "I could not live without your dear face and wonderful personality."
Banns Were Published.
On Jan. 24, the complaint says, Miss Borden went with Mr. Guinle to the parish house of the Church of Our Lady of Lourdes, where they saw Fr. Sheridan about their marriage. The banns were published. Mr. Guinle said his mother might object to the marriage, but that he intended to marry. Miss Borden anyway, because he was a man of honor.
On Jan. 29 Mr. Guinle got a cable from his mother telling him not to marry and threatening him with expulsion from the firm if he persisted. Mr. Guinle seemed to be overcome by this, but was disposed to obey his mother. He wrote her, Miss Borden says, that if she was a great blow and explained how much suffering it would cause him. He also told her that it was impossible for him to marry her, and said that he would always be her friend.
This statement followed close on the heels of a cable from his mother that said: "Make no promises, but leave at once. We will talk it over here."
Once, while they were talking together, Miss Borden says, Mr. Guinle told her of his wealth. He said his firm was a \$85,000,000 concern. He also told her, she says, that when they were married he would allow her \$50,000 a year for her household and traveling expenses and for the purchase of jewelry. Also he said, according to Miss Borden, that his income was \$300,000 a year.
A gang of young men, averaging twenty years of age, attacked a sleighing party last evening in the vicinity of Erin street. The children of Trinity church Sunday school were enjoying their annual sleigh drive when they were struck by snowballs and lumps of ice. One of the boys in the sleigh was struck and his eye was severely injured.

ABOLITION OF DEATH PENALTY

Parliament Withholds Judgment IN FAVOR OF TITLES

Bill to Abolish Cigarettes—To Restrict Use of Firearms—Tory Politicians Again Use Government Cruiser

Ottawa, Feb. 5.—The commons today decided against the bill proposed by J. H. Burnham, of West Peterboro, to abolish the granting of titles to Canada...

A prolonged discussion was evoked by the motion of Mr. Bicknell for the abolition of capital punishment. It received support and censure from both sides of the house...

Those who supported the bill included Hon. Geo. F. Graham, Levi Thompson, Qu'Appelle, and Dr. Edwards, Frontenac. Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, in adjourning the debate, declared himself against the bill.

Mr. Carvell, of Carleton (N. B.), said his opinion was opposed to the principle sought by Mr. Bicknell. As society and conditions were in Canada today, it was not in the best interests to abolish capital punishment.

Mr. Carvell said that in the state of Maine, next to his own province, he was satisfied that there were more cases of capital crime than in the two provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick together.

Mr. Carvell strongly expressed the opinion that while public hangings had been almost infrequent in this country, they were still altogether too much publicity attending executions, and he suggested electrocution in some central prison where revolting scenes would not take place.

Mr. Carvell said that in the case of the great number of immigrants coming into Canada, many of whom had little idea of Canadian justice, it was certainly better to leave the law as it stands today.

Hon. Frank Oliver introduced the subject of the reliability of the Hansard reporter. He stated that a member for P. E. I., Mr. Nicholson, had said in his speech on the address had used "let us dash away and spend the public money."

Speaker Spruille promised that the matter would be taken up by the Hansard committee. Andrew Broder, Conservative member for Dundas, has given formal notice of his resolution in parliament calling for the abolition of the manufacture and sale of cigarettes.

WOULD HAVE HALIFAX AS THE MAIL PORT

Charlottetown Board of Trade Resolution—The Potato Embargo

A special meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade was held last night. After considerable discussion, a resolution was passed requesting the federal government to give an adequate subsidy to a proposed steamship service between Halifax, Charlottetown, Sydney, North Sydney and ports on the east coast of Newfoundland.

A letter was read from the St. John Board of Trade, asking the Charlottetown board to endorse a resolution passed by the board asking the Dominion government to place an embargo on American potatoes into Canada.

W. F. Tidmarsh did not think it would be good policy for this board to take action along the lines suggested by the St. John Board of Trade as tending to antagonize the board asking the Dominion government to place an embargo on American potatoes into Canada.

R. H. Jenkins, late president of the board, expressed the same view. Geo. E. Full thought the embargo would be removed very soon.

N. Retenbury said the resolution of the St. John board did not meet his approval. The importation of potatoes into Canada from the United States for ten years 1901 to 1910 was on the average \$13,000 bushels worth to worth \$20,000 in Canada, \$50,000 or \$60,000. Keeping out this quantity of potatoes would not be worth considering.

The embargo on potatoes into the United States was imposed because foreign countries were not taking precautions in the matter of scab and blight. These potato diseases had engaged the attention of the United States agricultural department for years.

W. F. Full said that the out-turn of merchantable potatoes in Aroostook county is 300 bushels an acre and the average price for ten years has been well up to 40c. a bushel, or equal to \$120 an acre. This gives a clear profit of \$20 an acre, with \$24 for fertilizer and \$11.50 an acre rent of land not considered in the calculation made by Mr. Retenbury.

In view of the great importance of this question to our farmers, the board of trade would not be justified in taking action without due consideration. A list of subjects for which the meeting was called, action was deferred.

TRUNK HIGHWAYS FOR THE PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA

Halifax Automobile Association Decides Upon Forward Step—Good Roads Movement Grows.

Plans for the construction of main trunk highways across Nova Scotia are to be decided by a committee of the Halifax Automobile Association, which was appointed at a general meeting held on Monday night in the Halifax Hotel.

A comprehensive good roads scheme is to be prepared for submission at the annual meeting in April and in some form it will be later brought before the local government, the municipal authorities and automobilists throughout the province for their co-operation in its practical execution.

A statement was read showing that through the efforts of the Halifax association \$5,000 had been spent in improving the roads near the city and also that the government had been induced to devote considerable money to the betterment of the Mount Chalkley road.

The traffic laws in Nova Scotia are not satisfactory to the motorists and a deputation comprising Messrs. Brookfield, Hills and Eagar was requested to interview the city authorities and the Local Legislature that desired amendments might be enacted.

Resolved that a committee of five be appointed to consider and recommend to the annual meeting to be held in April some comprehensive scheme of road improvement which would involve the improvement and repair of the main circuit.

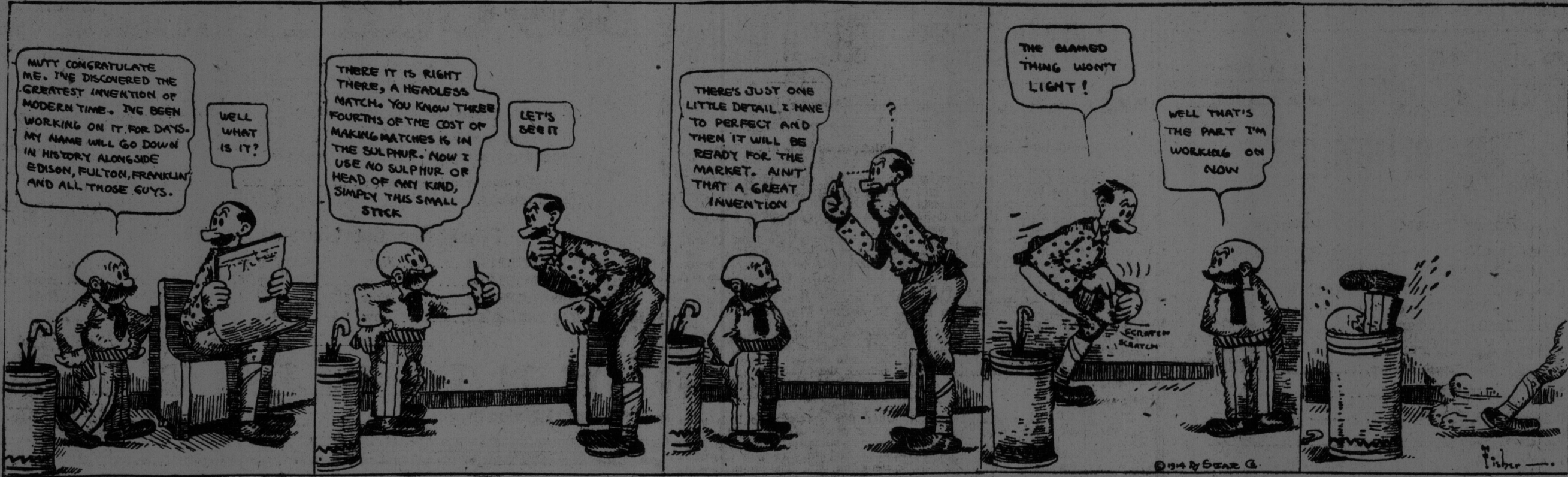

A suggestion which may be of importance in helping to solve the problem of construction of dwellings in St. John at reasonable cost has been made by James Carleton, inspector of buildings. He is strongly in favor of brick construction as being less liable to take fire and because of the greater permanency, but in the past the extra cost has been prohibitive. The use of brick on an extensive scale as might otherwise have been possible. The cost of lumber and labor has now brought the cost of frame construction so near the cost of brick work that the difference in the cost is hardly enough to balance the disadvantages of the former method, and there does not seem to be much prospect of lumber becoming any lower.

Under the circumstances it is probable that greater attention will be paid to the possibilities of brick and concrete buildings and Mr. Carleton's suggestion along this line. The present law requires all brick walls to be twelve inches in thickness, except on the top story dwellings, where only eight inches is required. Mr. Carleton says that for the average two-story dwelling an eight inch wall for the whole height is all that is required for perfect safety. The use of cement instead of lime mortar would be satisfactory here can be secured by the experience of other cities where only eight inch walls are required for two story brick buildings. In Toronto, where practically all construction is of brick, the smaller houses are all built in this way and as a result comfortable single family brick dwellings are sold from \$2,000 to \$3,000.

The discovery of large deposits of excellent clay on the city lands at Lancaster may lead to the establishment of new brick yards, and this might have the effect of reducing the price of bricks, which would have a further effect in the reduction of the cost of building operations.

PROVES TO BE ONE WHO ESCAPED FROM CHAIN GANG HERE

Donovan, Daley and Delaney The Names Used by Him—He and Two Others in Barn

Thomas Donovan or Thomas Daley, arrested in Brussels street last night was identified in the police court this morning as being William Delaney, who took a hurried leave from the chain gang a little before Christmas and departed on a fast freight train for parts unknown.

He was arrested with Fred O'Keefe and William Lavigne. The three were charged with lying and luring a barn off Brussels street. Policeman Kane said that he was making his rounds about three o'clock this morning and heard the men making a row in a barn. He tried the door, but finding it locked, went to find the owner and he and Policeman Gibbs arrested the three men. They were passing the night in the hay loft. Neighbors say that this barn has been occupied quite frequently at nights.

Delaney gave the name of Donovan but when called in court this morning he did not respond to that name and when asked who he was gave the name of Daley. He said that he came to the city from Digby yesterday and that he had not known "the other gentlemen" until he met them last night when he happened to go to the same "lodging house."

He was reminded until someone who knew him could be found to testify as to his character. A young man present in the court identified him as the man whom he had seen sentenced to serve six months in jail some time ago for begging in the streets. The witness said he was working on the new station at the time the man escaped from the chain gang and recognized him at once when he saw him get off the train there. He told the Daley tried to work the same job in the city.

Delaney was also recognized by others in the court this morning. The three prisoners were remanded.

HON. WM. PUGSLEY IS RAPIDLY RECOVERING; HERE LIKELY IN FEW DAYS

Hon. William Pugsley, who has been in New York for the last week, is rapidly recovering his usual health and is expected to return to St. John in a few days. An Ottawa despatch which said that he would spend the winter in the south and would be unable to return to Ottawa during the present session was greatly exaggerated.
