GREAT SUM LUST IN WAGES BI STRIKES IN OLD LAND

London, Eng., Feb. 6—A profit and loss account for the strikes of the last ten years, prepared from the board of trade returns, supplemented by details furnished by trade union leaders in the principal industries, shows that the loss to the organized workers' alone, from stoppages due to disputes of all kinds, has been equal to £17,418,188 in wages, not to mention thousands spent in strike pay.

Against this the net gain in wages resulting from disputes is returned at \$22,714,840, leaving a net loss of £14,698,

848.

In the same period the working classes as a whole have secured advances in wages estimated at more than £15,000,000, but the greater proportion of these advances have been obtained through conciliation, machinery and working agreements

Of every hundred strikes or other dis-outes recorded in the years under re-riew, 50 uer cent. have been won by he employers, 25 per cent. by the corkers, and the remaining 25 per cent.
