British Submarine Attack Successful; Summary of The Morning War News

London, Oct. 7, 8.30 p. m .- Submarine E-9, of the British navy, under command of Lieut. Commanfer Max Horton, yesterday made another raid into German waters, off the mouth of the Rievr Ems, and succeeded in sinking a German torpedo boat destroyer. It was this same submarine, under the same commander, which made a similar dash and sank the German cruiser Hela off Heligoland September 13. As on the former occasion, the E-9 has safely returned to her home port. The action took place at 1 o'clock yesterday, and was witnessed by the Dutch coast guards on the Dutch Island Schiermonnikoog, in the North Sea, off the province of Friesland.
