The price, too, is good, the agents are paying the farmers one dollar a barrel delivered at the station.

"The hay crop is also a good one; at the first of the season it was reported light, but the abundance of rain during the summer months brought it on so that it turned out exceptionally well."







"Now, I have said that under ether anaesthesia the brain is in great part wide awake, and during any surgical operation there is in reply to every incision, every pull of the retractors, indeed to every physical contact, a change in the pulse, the respiration, and the blood pressure, and no general anaesthetic can shelter the brain from the assault committed on it by the injuries inflicted during an operation on another part of the body. It is now suggested, therefore, that by means of local annesthetics—novocaine for the skin, quinnine and urea for the parietal peritoneum—a barrier can be ecreted round the area to be operated on, so that no nerve impulses can be conveyed from the territory so isolated. The field of operation, that is easy may be temporarily disconnected from the brain not only at the time of operation, but for a period of from one to five days subsequently.

"The effect of this," explained Sir Berkeley, "is that the operation can now be conducted in an area which for the time being does not belong to the patient, which he cannot reach by any impulse directed toward it, and which can be dealt with as the surgeon wishes without the patient having any power of receiving impressions from it."



FAMOUS BREACH OF PROMISE CASES

Proposals of Marriage Are Not Like Pie Crusts

PEERS AS DEFENDANTS

Quarter Million Given Miss Markham Recently is Record, But There Are Others Involving Large Sums-Once Ruler of a Kingdom Was Sued

(London Tit-Bits) men seem to think," said minent lawyer, who has figured as nsel in many breach of promise actions, to the writer a short time ago, that proposals. like pie-crusts, are only made to be broken, and they are quite pained when they find that the breaking is, at times, a costly process."

He was not alluding to the recent sensational case in which Miss Daisy Markham received £50,000 in the action which she brought against the Marquis of Northampton for breach of promise of marriage, but to the scores of cases which are tried every year, in which damages of a few hundreds are awarded; and he ventured the opinion that in the course of twelve months defendants in breach of promise cases have to pay as compensation for breaking women's hearts something like £15,000. For it must be remembered that many recent cases involving well-known people have been settled at the law courts upon terms not revealed, but presumably very substantial. ons, to the writer a short time ago,

Notable Cases

bus breach of promise cases, nowever, 210,000 damages were awarded. The first was in 1884, when Miss Finney, a Savoy actress professionally known as Miss Fortescue, brought an action against Viscount Garmoyle, son and heir of the great Lord Chancellor Cairns, for breach of promise. Miss Fortescue was then twenty-five years of age, and the sum of £10,000 was agreed upon between the parties when the case came before Mr. Justice Manisty.

Six years later Baron Huddleston had before him an action for breach of promise brought by Miss Theresa Gladys Knowles, a young lady of twenty-one, niece of Admiral Knowles, who sued Leslie Duncan, proprietor and editor of the 'Matrimonial News,' who was sixty-four years of age at the time. In the end the jury ordered him to disburse £10,000 to the lady, who, it might be mentioned, had claimed £25,000.

Peers as Defendants

In the same year Sir George Elliot, M. P., a man seventy-five years of age at the time, was the defendant in an action for breach of promise brought by Miss Emily Hairs, who claimed £5,000. After two hours' deliberation, however, the jury disagreed, and there the case ended so far as the courts were concerned, for it was announced soon afterwards that the parties had come to terms.

Another £10,000 case was the famous Liverpool action, when at the assizes in August, 1908, Mrs. Helen Turner received this amount in damages in an action which she brought against a welknown Liverpool wine merchant.

Members of the peerage have figured in several notable breach of promise actions. Next to Miss Markham's case the record compensation paid to a lady by a titled wooer seems to be, according to Macarthur's History of the Parish of New Monkland, Lanarkshire, N. B., the £20,000 which Lord John Campbell paid in two instalments as damages for breach of promise to Miss Logan, a Lanarkshire lady, the second £10,000 being paid when he became Duke of Argy'll in 1889. In this case much heavier damages were therefore paid than in any other previous case, but they appear not to have been awarded by a jury, but voluntarily paid.

One of the most sensational cases on record, however, was that in which the ruler of a kingdom was sued for breach of promise. This occurred in 1889, when an action was brought against the Sultan of Johore by Miss Jennie Mighell.




