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**LAWS AND REGULATIONS**

OF THE

**British and Foreign Bible Society.**

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I. The designation of the Society shall be **THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY**, of which the main object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment; the only copies in the language of the United Kingdom to be circulated by the Society, shall be the authorized Version.

II. This Society shall add its endeavours to those employed by other Societies; for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominion; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mohammedan or Pagan.

III. Every subscriber of One Guinea annually shall be a member.

IV. Every subscriber of Ten Guineas at one time shall be a member for life.

V. Each subscriber of Fifty Pounds at one time, or who shall by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to Fifty Pounds, shall be a Governor for life.

VI. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

VII. An Executor, paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, shall be a member for life; or, of One Hundred Pounds, a Governor for life.

VIII. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six laymen, six of whom shall be foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half

members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number, who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all officers except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.

IX. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the directions of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

X. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday of May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the accounts presented and the proceedings of the foregoing year presented.

XI. The President, Vice-President, and Treasurer shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XII. Every clergyman or dissenting minister who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIII. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XIV. At the general meeting, and at meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President, first upon the list then present; and in the absence of the Vice-President the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be voted for the purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

XV. The Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday of every month, or oftener if necessary.

XVI. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential service to the Society, either Members-for life, or Governors for life.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating Honorary Members from among foreigners who have promoted the object of the Society.

XVIII. The whole of the minutes of every general meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

## REGULATIONS.

Adopted at the Annual General Meeting of the Society in 1825 and 1827.

I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the Apocrypha.

II. That in conformity to the foregoing resolution, no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, be made by the Society, the books issued be bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.

IV. That all grants of Scriptures to the Society which circulate the Apocrypha, be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition; and that the proceeds of the sale of any such copies of Scripture be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

## LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

# NOVA SCOTIA BIBLE SOCIETY.

- I. This Society shall be called THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES; the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz., to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment, and to furnish copies of Scriptures gratis to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.
- II. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee.
- III. In order to give effect to the designs of this institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.
- IV. Every person contributing annually ten shillings at one time, or a donation of ten pounds, shall be considered a member of the Society.
- V. A general meeting of the members of this Society shall be held every year, before which will be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year.
- VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting the incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.
- VII. Every member of the Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.
- VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of this Society as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their number as occasion may require.



## SUGGESTIONS

FOR THE COMPLETE

ORGANIZATION AND WORKING

OF A

## BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

ANY BRANCH which, in the past, has not attained eminence as a tributary to the AUXILIARY—whose annual grant has not compared favorably with others in districts of less note as to population, wealth or religious privileges, is earnestly requested to consider the following suggestions of means whereby its latent resources may be made more available in the blessed cause of Bible dissemination.

1. The Bible Society being undenominational, care should be taken to preserve its character, as such, in its Branch organization and operation, and to this end the *committee* and *collectors* should, as far as possible, represent every Christian denomination in its district. The *sheet* in the *Auxiliary's Report* containing the *list of Branches* is divided into four columns: one for the name of the Branch and three for the *chief members* of Committee, viz: *President, Treasurer* and *Secretary*. Where there are more than three denominations in any district, they can be represented by *Vice-Presidents*. When a branch embraces an extensive district, its outlying sections should also be represented by *Vice-Presidents*, who could superintend the work of collecting in their respective localities.

2. At every ANNUAL MEETING (which it is desirable should be held during the *Agent's visit*) the COMMITTEE, if necessary, should be re cast and *collectors appointed, competent to present the Society's claims and earnestly interested in the work*; for to zealous collectors, rather than to Committee or contributors, belong the honor of placing the silver and the gold at the service of the Redeemer.

3. Should a Committee be impaired by the death or removal of any of its *chief members*, notice of such should be furnished the Agent at the earliest opportunity.

4. Each Branch should decide upon always carrying on the work of collecting during that month most favorable for such in its district, (of which, also, the Agent should be informed) and, previous to the collector's canvass, the annual reports of the Auxiliary should be distributed among the *best* subscribers, and placed in the hands of other persons likely to become valuable supporters. And during the canvass *all* ministers of the gospel should be notified of the same, and asked to encourage their congregations in a liberal response to the collector's call.
5. When a Committee receives notice from the Agent of his intended visit, no delay should be made in appointing the place of meeting and making such known from the pulpit and press; for the delay of a day may possibly result in the preclusion of the meeting by another of merely local interest, whose object might as well be attained at any other time, whereas the *loss of one day means the loss of a whole year*, in so far as a due visitation of the Branch by the Agent is concerned. All ministers in the district should receive special invitations to be present on the platform, and should also be requested to call the attention of their congregations to the meeting, and urge upon them their attendance. The editors of local newspapers should also be asked to insert a brief notice of the meeting.
6. As the annual accounts of the Auxiliary are *closed on the last working* day of December, it is desirable that remittances, with lists of subscribers, should be forwarded to the Secretary or Treasurer in Halifax, not later than Christmas.
7. Any Branch can, if necessary, have its DEPOSITORY, but such should be under its own care. During the Agent's visit, a statement of all Bibles in stock should be duly rendered and payment made to him or the Committee. The Depository may be paid a commission of 10% on his sales. *All orders for the supply of Bibles for the Depositor should be sent by the Secretary of the Branch to the Secretary of the Auxiliary in Halifax.*
8. In view of the transcendent aim and ever growing work of the British and Foreign Bible Society, it is hoped that in every locality a few persons may feel moved to espouse its cause as their *special Christian work*, and use their influence in making their Branch an institution deeply established in the popular heart.

## EIGHTIETH ANNIVERSARY

OF THE

## Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society,

HELD IN

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH, THURSDAY, 11th JANUARY, 1894.

THE Eightieth Annual Meeting of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society was held in the First Baptist Church. MR. J. C. MACKINTOSH was in the Chair. There was a large attendance, the meetings in connection with the Week of Prayer being concentrated at this church. The Chairman emphasized the importance of the work done by this great Society, and appealed for a greater interest by the citizen's of Halifax. Several important points were referred to, especially Russia, where all agents of the Society were carried by the railways free of charge—a point which Canadian railways had not yet reached, either in connection with this Society or others engaged in the work of moral reform.

The following letter of regret for inability to be present was read from BISHOP COURTNEY :

I am sorry to find that it is impossible for me to attend the annual meeting of the branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society on Thursday (as I am on that morning to be in Montreal), for I attach very great importance to the work which it is doing in disseminating the Word of God, and acting as a most necessary auxiliary to missionary operation throughout the world ; for without its assistance those opera-

tions would be seriously hampered. I could wish that the Church of England people in this community had taken more interest in and helped the Bible Society more generously than they have done hitherto, but I am in hopes that an improvement is perceptible, and I desire that it may become undoubted, and greatly extend itself. I trust that more personal effort will have been made this year to secure a good attendance at the annual meeting, and that it will result in a revival on behalf of one of the best and greatest of the religious societies of Britain.

The Annual Report of the Society was presented by REV. F. H. ALMON, the Secretary, as follows:—

The Committee of the Nova Scotia Bible Society in presenting a brief sketch of their report for 1893, would first refer to the years' work of the British and Foreign Bible Society as told in their last annual report.

The issues of the Scriptures have been in all 4,049,756 copies, of these, 1,726,788 were from the Bible house in London, and 2,322,968 from the depots abroad. The year's circulation, to take a few representative countries, was in France, 187,300; in Belgium, 17,911; in Germany and Switzerland, 289,783; in Austria-Hungary, 160,768; in Italy, 162,637; in Spain, 61,870; in European and Asiatic Russia, 516,379; in Turkey, 48,580; in Egypt and Syria, 21,644; in India and Ceylon, over 376,000; in Malasia, 38,483; in China, 182,773; in Brazil, 24,340.

This enumeration takes no note of the Colonies, where hundreds of Auxiliaries are at work, nor of many other countries which cannot be named here. Above 600 colporteurs have been employed, and 370 bible women, whose sphere is chiefly the zenanas of India. Grants to the value of over \$21,000 have been made. These include almost \$2,500 to other societies, such as the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and its Ladies' Association, the Church Missionary Society, the Church of England Zenana Missionary Society, the London and Wesleyan Missionary Societies, the Zenana Bible and Medical Mission Society, the Wesleyan Missionary Ladies' Auxiliary, the Baptist Ladies' Association, the Baptist Missionary Society, and others, to enable them to employ more native Christian Bible women to read the Bible to their secluded sisters in the east, and to teach them to read it as well as to buy portions of it for themselves.

Financially the position was more favorable than since 1888. For three years successive deficits amounted to £67,000. Extra contributions during the past year amounted to £25,000

and the movement to wipe out all indebtedness is in full progress. The expenditure of the Society amounts to £600 a day the year through. It is expected £20,000 will be added to the regular income of the Society. A legacy of £20,000 was received last year from an English minister—Rev. James Spurrell, of Brighton. The circulation last year was 4,049,756, an increase of 60,541 on the previous year. Grand total since the formation of the Society, 135,894,552. These figures are eloquent, but there are other figures still more striking. Think of the numbers of countries in which the Society operates, the number of languages in which it speaks. It takes us to Africa—east, south, west, central. It speaks to the Soudanese, the Nubian, the Malagasi, the Bechuana, and many others in the dark continent. In Asia it speaks to the Chinese, the Hindoos, the Siamese, the Burmese, and scores of other nationalities. It speaks in Hebrew and Arabic, in Sanscrit and Persian.

The people of Aneityeum and Erromanga, of Tana and Efate, and scores of Pacific isles, it addresses in their varied tongues; our own Indians, the Micmac, the Maliceet, the Cree the Beaver, the Mohawk, the Eskimo, the Blackfeet, the Iroquois are not beyond its reach. The total number of languages and dialects in which the Society has issued the Word of God is 386. Nine languages were added to the list last year. Some Asiatic, some South American, some African. It cooperates with all evangelical churches in supplying to the people the word of life, and missionaries of all Protestant denominations have experienced the benefits of the Society's aid. When we remember that there are about fifteen hundred millions of people in our world, and that only a comparatively small portion are as yet recipients of the Word of God, very much more ought to be done by all true Christians to enable Bible Societies to overtake the increase in population, the spread of education, and the opening of new regions to the missionary and colporteurs.

The Nova Scotia Auxiliary has for eighty years aided the Bible Society in its noble, charitable work, sowing broadcast the good seed of the Holy Scriptures. It has now about eighty-eight branches.

Its income from subscriptions and collections has ever been far below what a Society, which deserves the support of all true Christians, should have been, only amounting, as stated in the last printed report, to \$2,278.63.

Our travelling secretary, Mr. T. MacKelvie, has been heartily welcomed among the branches, has energetically and faithfully received collections from most of them, and organized two new branches last year, and hopes this year to add two

more. We have to deplore the loss of our faithful Secretary, Mr. James Farquhar, whose valuable services were so zealously given to our Society for more than thirty years, and we hope that God will stir up many more to love His word and to work as hard as he did for its world-wide distribution.

In conclusion, as our Treasurer's account is not closed until the first of February, 1894, we express the hope that those churches and friends who have not yet remitted their subscriptions and collections will do so most liberally, that so aided by a generous giving to-night our offerings to God for this great Bible work may be larger than ever before.

#### THE RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED.

REV. A. GANDIER, in proposing the first resolution, referred in praiseworthy terms to the wonderful amount of good done by the Bible Society, who realized the need of giving the Bible to the whole world, and were, at marvelously low prices, doing much to accomplish this. A perusal of the annual report showed an astonishing amount of work done. The Society was indispensable to mission work, and deserved the hearty support of Christendom. The resolution was:—

That the report, a portion of which has been read, be received and printed, and that this meeting thanks our Heavenly Father for the extended circulation of His Word, and the means which have been given the Society to promote its distribution throughout the world, and asks all Christians to pray for the blessing of the Holy Spirit.

In the absence, through illness, of Hon. Dr. Parker, REV. A. C. CHUTE seconded the resolution. He was proud to represent his denomination in connection with such a grand institution, which, in connection with the missionary enterprise of the Church at large, was another justification of the oft-quoted aphorism that God never made a half providence any more than man made a half-pair of shears.

REV. DYSON HAGUE moved the following resolution:—

That this meeting recognizes that the British and Foreign Bible Society, by its numerous translations of the Holy Scriptures, has proved itself to be a most valuable auxiliary to

missionary enterprise, and ought to receive continued and enlarged aid from all interested in the extension of the Kingdom of Christ.

The Bible Society and the missionaries must do more than go hand in hand—they must do each other's work. Missionaries had done good service, for the time being, long before the Bible Society had an existence, but whenever the missionaries ceased their work, the whole matter rested, there being no copies of God's Word to leave with the people. Four millions was a great number of Bibles to circulate in one year; but to give every one a copy, it would require ten millions annually for a century.

REV. DR. LATHERN seconded this resolution, in the absence of Dr. Weldon through sickness; and it was unanimously adopted.

REV. G. J. BOND moved:—

That in order that the Nova Scotia Auxiliary may do its part in aiding the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, the present officers and committee be re-elected, and the meeting expresses the hope that they will, with earnest prayer and persevering energy, discharge their important duties.

Rev. Mr. Bond remarked that the preceding speakers had told of the great success of the British and Foreign Bible Society; of the way God had blessed it, and how He had raised up translators and diffusers of the Word, and of the duty of those to whom the Word is given to send it out over the wide world. The resolution he moved directs attention to our part of the work. That part is to do what we can and ought. Are we doing our part as an auxiliary? The 5,000 church members of this city gave last year to the Society \$379.20—is that our part? measured by the great gifts the Bible has brought to us; measured by the sacrifice of our Lord for us, and the claims of His gospel. No! Our part is to do a great deal more than we have done,—to do for others what has been done for us. The resolution



suggests earnest prayer,—prayer that starts in faith and continues with trust in God. The second suggestion is energy, the accompaniment and results of prayer. Our energy should not be of the fitful kind but steady and persevering.

MR. JOHN BURGOYNE seconded the resolution. In connection with the duty of the Nova Scotia branch of the Bible Society, the text came to his mind: "My word shall not return unto me void." The amount of \$379 contributed last year, it occurred to him, did not compare with the duty which falls to Halifax to perform in this regard. Mr. Burgoyne went on to glance at some of the encouraging features of the work of the press. That agency had, no doubt, too often been a force for evil, but he considered that the good vastly out-weighed the bad. The British and Foreign Bible Society, alone, has printed 130,000,000 copies of the Scriptures. Though, as one of the speakers had said, if 10,000,000 copies were printed each year, it would take a century to reach the whole world, it was a hopeful sign when the output for 1892 was 60,000 more than the year before. Some one had estimated that in the four centuries since the invention of printing the number of separate books issued from the press is 3,700,000. There is an open door in almost every country for the spread of the Scriptures, and it is our duty to lodge the Word of God in the heart of every member of the human family. There is no reason for discouragement at the progress of Bible distribution, even though it is comparatively slow. And in spite of what sometimes seems almost like a losing battle for the spread of the gospel and the propagation of Christianity, a second thought may bring encouragement. In India, for instance, where recent statistics show an increase of population amounting to 13 per cent.,

Christianity has increased  $22\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. Mr. Burgoyne referred in conclusion to the work that might be done by women in Bible distribution, and to the excellent results attending their labors in New Brunswick. The resolution was adopted.

MR. J. C. MACKINTOSH, in putting the resolution, said his idea was that the "persevering energy" should mean getting your hand into your pocket and contributing to the extent of your ability.

REV. JOHN ROBBINS, of Truro, was asked by the Chairman to introduce to the audience Mrs. Mountford, who is a native of Jerusalem, and now the wife of a gentleman in the civil service of India at Delhi. The lady is an eloquent and impassioned speaker, and she held the closest attention of the audience. She spoke of the wondrous beauty of the Scriptures, and of their power over the hearts of men. The reason some intellectual men are doing what they can to destroy the Bible is that they do not understand it. She illustrated her meaning by explaining one use of salt by the bakers of the east, showing the uselessness of salt that has lost its savor. Her idea was to place Christianity and its divine Author before the world—to fear no comparison. Jesus Christ is our pearl which the world is challenged to admire, and He will grow in beauty the more His perfect character is studied. Mrs. Mountford eulogized the work of the Bible Society.

A collection was taken up which amounted to over \$42.

The meeting was dismissed after the benediction by  
REV. DR. LATHERN.

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## REPORT.

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In their report, read to the Annual Meeting on January 11th, 1894, the Committee of Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society referred to the year's work of the Parent Society. The abstract of that work which is printed with this report gives most interesting details of the Bible Society's financial position and its world-wide operations and usefulness. We entreat our subscribers carefully to read and study this abstract. For if they realize the good the Society is doing, and the great need which exists for increasing its efforts, they will be more disposed to make efforts to increase the number of the small band of subscribers, and to give themselves more liberally.

The Treasurer's accounts for 1892 and 1893 are both printed with the report. The friends of the Society will be glad to notice an increase in the amounts received from the country and the city, and from Depository sales.

The attendance also at the annual meeting was much larger than in previous years.

The Treasurer's report for 1893 shows that from Halifax has been received \$582.04, and from other places in Nova Scotia \$2,424.13, making a total of \$3,006.17, while Depository sales amounted to \$709.26, about twice as large as in 1892. The amount remitted to Parent Society—

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While these facts are encouraging yet there is reason and need for a far greater increase in subscriptions and collections and sales in Halifax and the Province.

The field of the Bible Society is the world. It is aiding missionary societies in giving the Word of God to the ends

of the earth, the greater part of whom are still in heathen darkness. It has a claim on the sympathy and help and prayers of every Protestant Christian.

Our income of a little over \$3000 can surely be much increased by the united efforts of all who believe the work of the Bible Society to be philanthropic and Christian.

As we have from time to time to deplore the death of zealous workers in the Bible cause, such as our late Secretary, Mr. Farquhar, and Mr. Alexander Robb, of Amherst, one of our life members, who took a deep and active interest in Bible work, we are reminded that now is the time for exertion to diffuse far and wide those Holy Scriptures which can make those who study them wise to salvation through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

#### ABSTRACT OF REPORT OF PARENT SOCIETY.

For the past four years the Committee have had to present an unsatisfactory financial statement, as painful to themselves as it was disappointing to their friends. It is with exceeding pleasure that they now submit a much more favourable report, which will show, that while the Society has not yet recovered the position it held in 1888, the outlay of the year has been more than met, and the large deficit substantially reduced. For these signal mercies the Committee render devout thanks to Him who has bestowed on the Society's friends both the power and the will to give. Nor would they omit to thank the givers, who will naturally share in their gratitude and joy.

For several years preceeding 1889 the receipts had been (chiefly through legacies) in excess of the expenditure. But in that and the three following years there were deficits, amounting in the aggregate to nearly £67,000.

The Committee felt that this state of things could not be allowed to continue. Their working capital had been seriously diminished, while the annual funds placed at their disposal were altogether inadequate to the Society's own work, and to the demands made upon them for Scriptures, by religious societies and individual workers. One of two courses was inevitable. Either the Society's income must be largely and permanently augmented, or its work largely curtailed.

When the Society's financial position was frankly stated at the last Annual Meeting two gentlemen generously offered £500 each towards removing the deficit, provided £50,000 was raised by the June following. The Committee were grateful to these gentlemen for their spontaneous offers, but they feared the minimum sum

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required was too high for attainment, which event has proved. They have however the great pleasure of announcing that up to the 31st March £25,909 had been contributed to the Special Fund by the Society's friends at home and in the colonies. This sum has afforded the Committee great relief in replenishing their much reduced working capital. How necessary a large reserve is, will be understood from the fact, that the average *daily* expenditure throughout the year is £600.

The Committee will now present a statement of the ordinary receipts, which they are thankful to say is also of a cheering character. The free contributions, for the year, apart from the Special Fund, amount to £137,645 0s. 11d., being £23,032 6s. 7d. more than in the year preceding. The sale of Scriptures has yielded £99,833 7s. 10d., being an increase of £2,961 12s. 2d. The entire increase in receipts from Free Contributions and Sales is therefore £25,993 18s. 9d. This part of their report the Committee regard as calling for an equally hearty recognition of the Divine goodness as that relating to the Special Fund. They would ask particular attention to one fact. The Free Contributions received from the Auxiliaries in England and Wales (excluding legacies, subscriptions, donations, and collections paid direct to the Bible House) amount to £57,263 19s. 4d., which is the largest sum obtained from this source for upwards of twenty years.

It is well understood that a man's position depends quite as much upon what he spends as upon what he receives. The Committee can reassure the Society's constituents upon this point also. The expenditure has been £220,956 13s. 8d., which is below that of 1892 by £13,825 10s. 6d. They do not look upon this reduction with complacency, except in one respect. The pecuniary condition of the Society last year, together with the uncertainty attending the future, counselled the greatest possible economy consistent with the efficient prosecution of its work. They have endeavoured faithfully to carry out this policy. The large reduction has been effected chiefly by a considerable lessening of the stock of Scriptures kept at the foreign depots; also by curtailing colportage in some European countries, and by abstaining from new undertakings except where the call is clear and strong. It should, however, be borne in mind that the large decrease in the continental depots was only a temporary expedient to meet an emergency. The shelves will have to be gradually replenished, which will involve future outlay.

At the last anniversary the President expressed his conviction that an addition of £20,000 to the Society's income was indispensable to enable them fully to meet the world's need of the Bible. The Bishop of Exeter thereupon moved "That the Society's supporters be respectfully urged to add half as much again to their subscriptions." The Committee know that in several instances his lordship's proposal has been adopted, but they have not the means of judging to what extent it has been acted upon throughout the country. They would earnestly entreat all who are able, to assist

the Society in this the surest and most satisfactory way of providing a sufficient permanent income.

To prevent a too favourable estimate of the Society's financial position a few words of explanation are necessary. The great increase in the ordinary income is chiefly owing to a legacy of £20,000 bequeathed by a warm friend of the Society, the late Rev. James Spurrell, of Brighton. Such large gifts are rare, and cannot be reckoned upon. With respect to the sum so kindly contributed towards the deficit, it should be remembered that it amounts to only a portion of the total deficit, still leaving the Society poorer by £40,920 11s. 11d., than it was five years ago. Even if the surplus arising from the excess of receipts over expenditure during the past year be applied to the reduction of the deficit, the capital of the Society is yet below that it was in 1888 by £24,498 16s. 10d. For this reason the Committee have decided to keep the Special Fund open for another year; and they earnestly request those of the Society's supporters who may not have already contributed to this object to favour them with donations.

The encouraging character of the Society's finances extends to the issues. The steady and uninterrupted increase reported in the circulation for the last four years has been continued in 1893. It has reached a total of 4,049,756 copies, being 60,541 more than in 1892. There is a gratifying advance of 6,531 in the sale of Bibles. Testaments have diminished to the extent of 46,222. The reduction is mainly in Penny Testaments, which are no longer in such heavy demand. There is an advance of 100,232 in Portions. Considering the smaller expenditure of the year this growth in circulation is eminently satisfactory, and calls for gratitude and praise. The total issues by the Society since its formation are now 135,894,552. The obituary of the year affords a pleasant contrast to that presented in 1892, during which year no less than eleven of the Vice-Presidents died. On this occasion happily the list is unbroken.

The following gentlemen have accepted the office of Vice-President:—The Rev. Canon Edmunds, B. D.; The Hon. G. W. Allan, of Toronto, President of the Upper Canada Bible Society; Edward Rawlings, Esq.; Joseph Storrs Fry, Esq., of Bristol; The Most Rev. the Bishop of Calcutta, Metropolitan of India and Ceylon; The Rev. Dr. Newman Hall, LL. B.; The Rev. J. Guinness Rogers.

Among the Honorary Governors for Life two have been removed by death—Mr. John MacGregor and the Rev. F. J. Falding, D. D. The former gentleman was for many years a prominent and valuable member of the Committee, whose name is held in affectionate remembrance by his surviving colleagues. Dr. Falding was one of the Society's most devoted workers in Yorkshire. Notices of both these deceased friends were given in the *Monthly Reporter*.

The following additions have been made to the list of Honorary Governors for Life:—E. Neston Habershon, Esq.; W. Lashmar, Esq.; The Rev. F. Fitch, M. A.; J. Fenn Clark, Esq.; The Rev.

H. H. Lawry of Auckland, N. Z. ; The Rev. E. E. Reinke of Manchester, Jamaica ; The Rev. Dr. Cornish of Montreal ; The Ven. Archdeacon Maunsell of Auckland, translator of the Bible into Maori.

In the last Report occurred for the first time the names of ladies who had been elected to the same honour 'for essential services rendered the Society.' Already death has made an inroad in their ranks. Miss Cahill, of Richmond, an old and active friend of the Society, has been called to rest from her labours.

The under-mentioned ladies have been since appointed by the Committee Honorary Governors for Life :—The Lady Alicia Blackwood of Boxmoor ; Mrs F. Brown of Douglass, Islé of Man ; Mrs. Cheesman of Buckingham ; Mrs. Richard Davies of Treboth, near Bangor ; Mrs. R. Garnett, of Penketh, near Warrington ; Miss Carell of Coltishall, Norfolk ; Mrs. Lloyd of Torquay ; Miss Metcalfe of Leamington ; Mrs. Robinson of Northampton ; Miss Sharman of Streatham ; Miss Snewin of Barnsbury ; Mrs. Thorpe of Surbiton ; Mrs. Wightman of Shrewsbury.

It is with deep sorrow the Committee report the death of one of their own number—Mr. W. M. Seaman, of Tower House, Putney. He joined the Committee in 1888, and by his Christian character, genial disposition, and painstaking devotion to his duties, gained the warm regard of all his brethren.

In such details as these—the details of finance, the statistical results of organised action—the Bible Society has much in common with all other Christian agencies. But when we turn to its work, as we see it in life and movement in the narrative of the year, we are struck with the way in which it differs from them all. It possesses, indeed, the same deep interest which the missionary enterprise has : it possesses all its spirituality : it possesses also and in a great degree, that romantic charm which is felt as one passes away from home into the heart of strange races and lands. But it is less confined, it is more comprehensive than any : the limitations of creed fall from it : it founds no church : it commissions no preacher : remembering how often popular theology is a paraphrase of the original—how often the paraphrase of a paraphrase, it withdraws to the untroubled wells of sacred truth—to the inspired text itself—and that without comment, without note. And in doing this, while it leaves to others the crowded ways of Christian instruction, it enters the sphere of pure learning and becomes a great philological Institute. Never indeed has there been such an Institute before—with its thousand scholars at work in a hundred languages, and that not in academic seclusion where the voices one hears are from books, but in the midst of crowds and with the sound of their vernacular ever growing more familiar.—nor bent on the production of some treatise of mere learning, but eager to give to men the Words of Eternal Life and intent on the deliverance and redemption of the soul. In such a spirit and with such aims the Society cannot but accept a policy which may be

called imperial—it cannot pause, it cannot retreat, it cannot delimit its frontiers; the greatness of its plan and of its duty will not allow it to rest. It already possesses the great national tongues, but there are hundreds of others. It must annex new languages as the great Powers annex countries; for through the language of the people lies the way to its heart. Within the last three years about twenty new languages have thus been added.\* Some of these were obscure dialects: they have been rescued from degradation and enriched with the beautiful treasures of sacred literature, as waste land is rescued from the sea and transformed into meadows and the orchardland of home. But when the speech has thus been won and the Gospel made vernacular, the Bible woman must be found who complete,—the colporteur and the Bible woman must be found who —themselves ‘living letters’—may follow the people into the haunts of their common life; and put it to their hands the Word of God. It is in the life and work of these devoted servants of the Society that we see best its peculiar character: and the reports of the year which are largely compiled from their narratives—lead us, as in a journey, into every corner of the world.

Let us begin with FRANCE—as with France the Society's Report opens—and with the group of countries of Latin race and faith, among which France holds a premier place. In one sense the accounts of the year may appear disappointing. There is nothing new: there is nothing striking: and, fearing that he has been too sanguine in the past, M. Monod is reticent on the hopes and prospects of the future. But in one felicitous phrase he indicates the true point of view. ‘The noble and wealthy,’ he writes, ‘may seem beyond our reach: but it is otherwise with the poor: we do not indeed see multitudes converted, but we see the faithful efforts of the one blessed to one soul here, another there—always one by one.’ It is this ‘one by one’—this recognition of the individual—which is the great fact and reality in the light of which everything is changed. Watching for some national movement—some characteristic revolution—one too easily forgets that a single soul is itself a world. But what a record of the year it is, here as everywhere else, when the greatness of the individual is remembered! During 1892 fifty-two men have pursued their quiet work in France; we meet them everywhere,—in the crowds that throng the great seaports and the inland cities in the beautiful Loire country, with its white spaces of sand and grey-slatted cottages: in the vast pastoral plains of *La Beauce*, where the great rolling fields of corn put one in mind of the sea: among the mountains of the Cevennes, so far from the ordinary tracks that the shepherds are astonished to see a stranger:—everywhere these patient men are found and always they are in frank and familiar converse with the people,—remonstrating in one case, explaining in another, consoling

in a third, it is 'one by one always' and never surely in vain. How reassuring—when the individuality of their work is remembered—is it to observe the exhilarant tone which marks the journals of the year, and to notice that, in spite of endless discouragements there are no signs of despondency. 'After all, the light spreads,' writes one of the men, and the simple generalisation is unquestionably true. There is indeed one cloud on the pages of the year—it is the sorrow felt by the men when they learned from M. Monod that, owing to the financial difficulties of the Society, the limits of their work and expenses must be as far as possible narrowed; and it is in such expressions that one learns the meaning of a diminished income. Happily it also gives opportunity to learn the loyal spirit of such men as are at work in France. 'I am quite willing,' writes one of the colporteurs, 'to bear one half of my expenses, though,' he sorrowfully adds, 'this will be but a drop in the ocean.' Yes, as regards the amount of the gift, but not as regards its spirit. This spirit it is which in every difficulty has been the treasure and strength of the Society and of all Christian service.\*

Looking for a moment across the north east frontier into BELGIUM, where the mining population, perplexed and excited by the promises of a mistaken socialism, exist in a state of chronic unrest, we mark the colporteur busied among the people as he is in France: here also it is 'one by one always,' and with the same results. 'It is a constant struggle,' writes Mr. Kirkpatrick, 'as our men go from house to house, attending fairs and markets, accosting people in the street, on the roads, in railway carriages, —taking every opportunity of calling attention to the Book of Truth. It is among the manufacturing and mining populations,' he continues, 'that infidelity is growing more combative and virulent: but it is among them also that the Scriptures have been most readily received: it is there also that the distribution of the Scriptures has led to the formation of churches composed almost exclusively of the working classes. In the neighbourhood of Liège, Charlevoi, and Mons, the religion of Christ may be seen influencing the conduct of men who are actively influencing others. They have earned the respect of those among whom they dwell: they are peaceable members of society: they take no part in strikes and riots: some are reformed drunkards: others have learned to read in order that they may read the Bible, and all bear witness that Godliness is profitable both for this life and for the life to come. Sixty years ago there were but few churches, and those composed mostly of foreign residents: now there are fifty and there are urgent demands for more.' Such are some of the results of individual influence in one of the strongholds of ignorance and unbelief.†

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The same narrative continues itself adding chapter to chapter similar to those already written for the north—though in circumstances and surroundings naturally different—when we cross the Pyrenees into Spain, or the Apennines into Italy. But in both these countries there is something of a larger and more national interest, as indeed is sure ever to follow—soon or late—from that patient individual work which receives so full illustration in France and Belgium.

In the summary of last year SPAIN contributed one of the most significant sections, and later accounts fully sustain the interest. In Spain indeed, at least in Bible work, we seem to be standing at the parting of the ways. For more than twenty years the labour of the colporteurs has been prosecuted—silent, inconspicuous, giving slight account of itself: now, and perhaps in consequence of it, a new movement has become necessary. No one can so fairly describe the situation as Mr. Jameson himself. 'The work of the colporteurs,' he writes, 'has been largely to prepare for yet higher work, and for a higher class of workers. But this class has now been furnished and we already begin to see the results,—meetings attended by hundreds of people, educated men being brought into contact with educated Evangelical thought, and made to realize that people called Protestants or Evangelicals are people who cannot be despised for their ignorance or passed over for their insignificance. And to crown all, in the very centre of the religious and political and literary life of the country there has been opened a new Bible House which men of education and importance are not afraid to visit, to admire the linguistic achievements of the Society and to praise its generosity. In a word, in addition to the devoted, patient labours of the colporteurs the Society is beginning to be recognized as a great Institution, and there is a disposition continually evidenced to accept a simple Biblical Christianity, when presented untrammelled with historical associations, which makes one very hopeful of the future of Spain. The circumstances of the time,' Mr. Jameson continues, 'favour greatly this new departure. There is a most manifest movement towards something better and higher: several popular writers have been emphasizing the need of a purer morality and a more spiritual religion: they appear unconsciously to be stretching out their hands towards the Society and asking to be led further on. A rising politician has given strong expression to the view that the most unmistakable reaction is manifesting itself in a religious sense. Twenty-five years ago the leaders of thought declared that the people could do without religion, but experience has shown that is an impossibility. The most advanced thinkers and eager politicians are pointing to the countries where the Divine Book has proved itself the power of God unto salvation, and, while rejecting foreign creeds and confessional forms of belief, they are open to study the Book itself, and to respect the Society which circulates it alone. These are words of great significance. They have been inspired by the facts and experience of the past, and one waits—rather with

hope than with assurance—for the commentary which is to be written upon them by the future.

To pass into ITALY seems to continue the narrative which has been begun in Spain: here also it is a time of crisis and of change, and the voices which describe them best are those of the leading writers of the day. It is in the words of Sig. Bonghi, an eminent writer of Italy, himself a Roman Catholic, and of Prof. Teza, of Padua, that Sig. Meille finds the best expression of the spiritual position. In the leading Italian review, the *Nuova Antologia*, Sig. Bonghi addresses himself directly to Leo XIII. Much of what he says belongs to politics but he remembers that everywhere politics rest ultimately on religion—that there is a power behind alike Pope and Statesman which both must recognize, and he speaks with unusual frankness on the nation's spiritual needs. 'The conscience of the Italians seems to me,' he writes, 'to be awakening, though as yet slowly and imperfectly. I hope and believe that our people are thirsting after the fountain of living water. In the Catholic Church of to day—such as it has become—that fountain appears to many to be dry. It had ceased giving living water for the generality of the people towards the end of the fifteenth century, and the Reformation began. Whatever may have been the faults and errors of that great movement, it undoubtedly sprang and derived strength from a quickening of the thought of God and Christ in the Christian conscience. I do not,' adds Sig. Bonghi, in very significant words, and in view of circumstances which he evidently believes extremely likely,—'I do not consider it an impossibility that such an event may reproduce itself in Italy.' Prof. Teza, Rector of Pauda University, is perhaps better acquainted than Sig. Bonghi with some important facts, and he speaks with correspondingly greater emphasis. A careful reader of the Society's recent Reports, he has contributed to the *Transactions of the Royal Institute of Sciences, Letters and Arts* an enthusiastic review of the latest volume. What especially engages his admiration is the unceasing and successful toil of the translators. But everything is interesting—the influence of the Agents, the labour of the co'porteur, the Bible-women in the Zenana. Even the perplexities of an inadequate exchequer give him occasion for praise. 'How beautiful,' he says, 'in this age of corrupt financing, to see a great Society exceed its income in order that there should be no corner in the world unreached by the hand that helps, the voice that teaches, the Book that remains for ever.' And this is, more than a testimony to the Bible Society—it is a plea for Italy—an aspiration for that more liberal, happier age which comes in with a popular Gospel. It is a pleasant commentary on Prof. Teza's words that Sig. Meille can report a circulation which, though slightly less than that of 1892, is still far above the average,\* a sale by the co'porteurs of complete editions greater than ever

before, and a public interest in the Scriptures of which every section of his narrative contains evidence and illustration.

Between the Latin countries of western and southern Europe and those in the north and centre where the Reformation made its home, there is a difference which—as regards Bible circulation—every year is rendering more emphatic. It is that while the one group receive their Bible supplies from abroad, the other, to a large and increasing extent, provide them at home. This is eminently the case with Germany, where there are eight Societies, and Switzerland, where there are ten: it is the case in a different degree with Holland and Denmark, with Norway and Sweden. From Sweden and from Holland the Society has been able to withdraw so far as a separate Agency is concerned, and its withdrawal from the others is coming steadily nearer. Nothing can be more satisfactory than the reasons of this readjustment; it means that the organisation for Scriptural supply has, in these countries, been completed, and its administration left in the safe and competent charge of home Christianity. In HOLLAND the present year is the first of so pleasant and healthy independence. SWITZERLAND is in the transitory stage which precedes it, and the accounts which have been received from its Cantonal Societies, with their Bible Union for Colportage, shows that while much is to be desired much is also being done. In DENMARK and in NORWAY the people are familiar with the Bible, and as he passes along the dykes and level meadows of the one, or climbs the steep mountain paths of the other, the colporteur meets with few to whom he is not a welcome visitor. From GERMANY the story of the past year is one which must be read with pleasure: there is indeed a decline from the high figures of 1892, but by extending the comparison to the figures of a decade ago the rapid advance is at once evident. In 1881 the total circulation in the Empire was 461,000; last year it was 621,000. At the earlier date the share of the German Societies in this number was 172,000: last year it was 326,000,—a return nearly double of the first and the highest ever yet attained.\*

Nothing can better emphasise the growth and development of Bible work in the Fatherland than these figures, and there can be no better pledge for the future. The circulation of the British and Foreign Bible Society, limited largely to the Roman Catholic population, has also advanced and at a constantly diminished cost: in 1881 it was 198,000, in 1892 213,000, and at no distant date it must be hoped this share also in the work will pass entirely into other hands. Meantime the colporteurs have urged their work in the face of every difficulty; and though from the Poles and Lithuanians of the eastern frontier to the Alsations of the west, and from the Bavarians whose homeland skirts Switzerland to the

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Mecklenburgers on the Baltic, there is much more to be done than has yet been accomplished, there is ample assurance that it will be undertaken in the spirit which preludes success. A special and very interesting part of the circulation is under the control of Col. Klefeker the Emperor's Commissioner, who gives his undivided attention to the Army and Navy, and who reports for the past year a circulation of almost 37,000. The disastrous depression which follows epidemics like those of cholera and influenza—and 1892 will be known in Germany, says Mr. Watt, as 'the cholera year'—accounts to a large extent for any reduction which may be noticed in the returns, but with restored national confidence, and with the gradual diffusion of the Revised Edition of the Luther Bible, the accounts from the Fatherland for 1893 may be expected to show an advance worthy of the work they register.

Of all the annual letters of the year none is conceived in a more tender spirit or with more frequent reference to the Person and the Kingdom of his great Master than that sent from the AUSTRO-HUNGARIAN Agency by Mr. Millard. It is very copious; the diversified character of the Empire renders it correspondingly varied in contents; and it necessarily leads the reader into many scenes which are sufficiently depressing. But there is a light upon every page and a touch of kindness in every narrative, and though from time to time he is compelled to speak of 'growing opposition' and 'increasing Atheism,' nothing can perceptibly sadden, even for a moment, the temper of the genial writer. Mr. Millard is an Apostle of Hope, and wherever he looks—to Bohemia, to Silesia, to Hungary, to Roumania—he finds reasons for rejoicing. Not that he at all shirks the facts, but that he delights to emphasise those pointing more distinctly to the day which he sees everywhere spread—however faintly—on the mountains which encircle his home. With great pleasure Mr. Millard notices the growth of Christian life and activity in Hungarian and Bohemian society; the courtesy of the authorities in giving facilities to the Society's work; the cordial support of such men as Bishop von Everth\* and Bishop von Tardy, and of such Assemblies as that of the Lutheran Church; the increasing attention shown in the religious press to the work of the Bible Society; the enlarging circulation in some important districts, and especially the numberless instances, occupying as they do almost every page of the journals, of the hearts of men and women touched with the powers of the world to come. Seldom indeed is the individuality of the colporteur's work better seen than here: seldom is one more content—forgetting the excitement of national awakenings—to notice that here is 'one by one always.' The general impression on reading these narratives is that the Karoli celebration of a few years past must have had excellent results; that the work of the Bible Society is becoming largely familiarised to the more educated and Christian classes, and that it is impossible to over-estimate the influence for good, within the territory of the

great Dual-Empire, of the ceaseless though unpretentious work which the colporteurs carry on.\*

It is at this point we enter the domain of Muhammadanism. The shadow of that old faith lies like a cloud over the group of countries where three continents—Europe, Africa, and Asia—meet. To the west its dusky crescent covers Asia Minor and the provinces around Constantinople: southward it lies across the valley of the Nile and the sandy wastes of Arabia; eastward it folds Persia in its eclipse; then northward again it creeps up the Euphrates valley and touches the slopes of Ararat and the coast towns on the Black Sea. In the centre of this area lies the Holy Land; and the outskirts of the cloud are loosely conterminous with three of the Society's Agencies, the Turkish, the Egyptian, and the Persian.

On the European edge of this great area, and writing from CONSTANTINOPLE, Dr. Thomson gives an account of Bible-work which everywhere shows progress. The circulation, favoured by a quiet year, has increased from 40,000 to 48,000, and there are several interesting evidences of increasing liberality of thought and a deepening sense of religious truth.† These may be perhaps best indicated by some of the comments on the table of thirty-nine languages used in the Agency. 'The issues of *Albanian*,' writes Dr. Thomson, 'now considerably exceed 1,000 copies, no small attainment among a people who had no written language till the Bible Society gave them one, and who are still the least civilised of the races of European Turkey. *Bulgarian* reaching a total of 5,243, exhibits the large increase of 1,438 copies, largely in consequence of the pocket Bible published by the American Society, partly also in consequence of the promotion of education by the Government. The *Greek* group has this year attained the highest figure hitherto—that of 30,506, exhibiting an increase of 5,580 copies. A circulation so large and so steadily progressive for these thirty years may safely be held to indicate that the people love and study the Scriptures. It is cheering to report that in the regions of Asia Minor consecrated by the labours of the Apostle Paul, the people are urgently calling for the same Gospel he preached to them though in a different language. Nor is the circulation in Ancient Greek to be overlooked, as it represents largely the place of the Scriptures in the higher department of national education. The very large increase of 1,591 copies in a total of 3,947 in *Turkish* is to be regarded with deepest interest as indicating that in a land where the Gospel is only with difficulty heard in Turkish it is becoming increasingly read. These are but a

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few instances, and generally it may be said that, as in England the systematic promotion of education has given a vast impulse to production by the press, so in Turkey also where, notwithstanding some vexatious impediments, education is advancing among all classes, it is impossible to over-estimate the importance of giving to the rising generation the Word of God in their own tongue.' Thus far Dr. Thomson, and he adds a significant sentence which, summing up the more encouraging facts about GREECE, must be given here:—'I cannot,' he says, 'but direct attention to the progress made among the Greek nation. Thirty or forty years ago utter indifference or open hostility was the general attitude of the Greek clergy and people, though with some noble exceptions, to the circulation of the Scriptures. Now open hostility is seldom met with, while not a few frankly defend and applaud the circulation of the Bible as a work of divine philanthropy.'

FROM ALEXANDRIA a brief statement summarises the year. Seldom indeed has there been a year so crippling to all engaged in the work, so obstructive to all their means of doing it. Almost every one was prostrated by influenza or some other form of illness. —Mr. Weakley himself was long an invalid—the ports of SYRIA and PALESTINE were guarded; the interior of the country was barred by sanitary cordons; the door left so invitingly open last year in Southern Arabia was closed again, for the route to the interior was blocked and the cases of Scripture were untouched:—the narrative is little but a chapter of accidents. Yet in spite of all this the circulation by sale has been larger than ever: never indeed has so high a figure been touched in Arabic Scriptures. No wonder that, as he recalls what he and his colleagues have suffered and then considers the total of over 21,000 copies distributed, Mr. Weakley finds in so unexpected success 'a token not to be doubted that their great Lord and Superintendent has been with His servants.'\*

The same story of progress, and in the face of hardly fewer—though they are different—obstacles comes from PERSIA. In 1891, 2,657 copies were circulated: the returns for 1892 are 4,303. In various ways Mr. Hodgson has been able to improve his organization: and the possibilities of the position are more inspiring than any obstacles could be. 'Arabia,' he writes, 'from this side at least, has hitherto been closed to the Gospel, but at Bagdad, Basra, Bahrein, and Muskat we stand on the threshold and it will be a great day to look forward to when we join hands across the Continent, with the Egyptian Agency.' No doubt that day will come. Meantime the Persian colporteurs have been pursuing their work in other directions as they were able. One reads, with a strange sense of its romance, the narrative which recounts their journeyings. 'We stayed,' writes one of them, 'fifteen days at Hillah [Hillah is the ancient Babylon] sold many copies of the

Scriptures, and had much religious conversation with those who came to us.' 'Going to Shiraz' says another, 'I passed through a beautiful country full of lemon and orange groves and sold seventeen copies on my way.' Among these groves lie the tombs of Hafiz and of Sadi, and Shiraz was a famous city when England was emerging from barbarism. Others of the band are found by the banks of the Euphrates on the way that leads to Ur of the Chaldees—another started for Susiana where travellers are shown the traditional tomb of the Prophet Daniel.\* What strange visitations of thought come at such names from that old buried world to these modern times which tread upon its tomb! But of all such reflections these Persian colporteurs are unconscious: they live in the present: their care is to make an impression on the narrow Muhammadan natures they meet: to put into their hands a Book they have themselves found to contain a treasure: to touch their lives with a new inspiration. The journals of the year show that they have not laboured in vain.

From this ancient world let us turn to the modern—from the Muhammadan to the Slav. At its northern extremity the Persian Agency approaches part of the Russian: on the boundary line stands Mount Ararat: beyond, and almost in its shadow, one hears the shriek of the locomotive as it speeds from Tiflis to its terminus on the shore of the Caspian Sea. The Bible Society's records of 1892 are found, as regards North Russia and Siberia, in Mr. Nicolson's report; the accounts of the Southern and Central Asiatic section are given by Mr. Morrison. Both are interesting, both must be called progressive, but each has a special section in which is largely centred the interest and the advance of the year. In the north it is the journey of Mr. Davidson into Siberia; in the south that of Mr. Morrison into Chinese Tartary.

Mr. Davidson, who is in charge of what is now the Sub-Agency of Western Siberia, left Ekaterineburg in the spring of 1892. His course, after visiting the great fair at Irbit, lay through Omsk and Tomsk to Irkutsk on Lake Baikal. At this point he turned westwards again by Tobolsk and Tyumen to the point whence he started. During this long and often perilous journey the organization of the Agency was developed and strengthened, and not a few fresh proofs were given by the higher Russian officials of their courteous regard for the Society and goodwill to its work. At Irkutsk—the 'Paris of Siberia,'—Mr. Davidson parted from his fellow traveller, Mr. Keay, in whose charge as Sub Agent Eastern Siberia is now placed. When the account was written Mr. Keay was at Vladivostock, the new Russian port on the shores of the Sea of Japan. From this eastern boundary of the Agency to St. Petersburg on the west it is almost 4000 miles.

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The journey of Mr. Morrison was equally long, it was more perilous; it was perhaps even more important. His object was partly to develop Bible circulation, partly to test the value of the new Uzbeg-Turki translation of the Four Gospels. In both respects he was successful. At Kashgar, where Mr. Morrison was courteously received by the Russian Consul and by the agent of the Viceroy of India, he was able to secure the services of a colporteur whom he hopes soon to see travelling across the uplands which stretch from the southern wall of the Thian Shan to the northern frontier of Thibet. The inquiry as to the version, one of those with whom he is to work, was equally satisfactory. 'I am satisfied,' says Mr. Morrison, 'we have now a book which is understood by 4,000,000 of people scattered over the illimitable plains between the Caspian and the Wall of China.' In this journey Mr. Morrison entered what is entirely new ground for the Bible Society. 'It is to the credit of the Swedish Mission Union that they were the first to enter this rather unpromising Mission Field: it is to the credit of the Bible Society that they were only a few days behind them.'

These journals have a special interest of their own, but the reports from Russia are interesting everywhere. They show, as perhaps no others do, how kindly affected the great Slavonic people are to the men who bring them the Word of God, and how courteous and helpful the Government officials are. When the colporteur goes to one of the military garrisons, he has a soldier to introduce him to the men, and the good word of the commanding officer to help his sales. When he visits a prison the authorities seem almost as wishful that his books should be distributed as he is himself. The expenditure both in north and south has been considerably reduced owing to the readiness with which free passes have been given to the men, and freights have been remitted on the cases of books. This latter is not a slight item: within three years there have been transmitted to the East thirty-seven tons of Scriptures. In some districts the circulation has greatly advanced. In Kharkov, for example—and Kharkov is a centre of work almost exclusively among Russians—last year's circulation of 63,442 is by far the largest on record, and almost amounts to the entire circulation of the Agency when this Depôt was established. Results like these have been won only by corresponding sacrifice and effort. 'Some of the colporteurs,' says Mr. Morrison, 'have done astonishing things as travellers: one covered in the course of the year 28,000 miles; another in the Volga, 27,000; a third in the province of Voronej, 18,000. The average of these three is nearly equal to a journey round the world.\*'

From Russia it is natural to turn to CHINA—the one name is increasingly suggestive of the other—and with China in this review may be classed JAPAN. Unlike recent years, 1892 has been in China one of comparative quiet. It has been unvexed by special pestilence or calamities, and the 'Prodigal Child'—the wayward Yellow River—has kept fairly within its bounds. The narrative of the Society's work is also unmarked by special incident. We turn over the pages of such journals as reach us to mark again that characteristic of colportage everywhere—its individuality—its patient, gradual influence, touching person by person, broadening occasionally into groups and little communities,—there are references to bands of thirty or more, who from the influence of the Gospels alone have associated themselves for study and worship; but from one side of the immense field to the other it is a fresh illustration of 'one by one always.' During the year about 176,000 copies have been circulated. This is less apparently than the figures of 1891, but some of the returns have been delayed. The colporteur force numbered 140. Of these six only were Europeans. 'It is a pity,' says Mr. Dyer regretfully, 'that their number is not double and treble what it is.' When we recollect what has been done among the islands of Malaysia by the band of young Englishmen who found Christ's work calling them there, one feels how true the regretful words are. What a voice one may surely hear—if the conscience will but listen for a little—from these great cities, these villages, these populous plains of China, pleading, in its inarticulate way, for that guidance and ground for hope for which weary people turn to the dumb oracles of Confucianism in vain.

In JAPAN the year has been one of political agitation so intense and continuous as to absorb, in the meantime, much of the thought which religious affairs might claim. With too many in eager young Japan Christianity has become 'something we may neglect,' it is not home-born, it is not 'patriotic.' 'Are you a Japanese?' says an indignant native to one of the colporteurs—'a Japanese to deal in these foreign books and doctrines!' It is one result of such feeling that the number of inquirers has been reduced, and that attendances in many places have diminished. The case is all the sadder when it is seen—as it may be seen plainly enough—that the chill which has for the moment fallen on the first love of Japanese piety, has come like a frost wind from the same countries whence the missionaries and the Scriptures themselves first came. The young men read the agnostic and the sensuous literature of the West: they watch the ecclesiastical feuds: they become—with a sigh perhaps—disenchanted, for '*we trusted that it had been He which should have redeemed us,*' and they transmit their unbelief to others. 'The mass of the people,' writes the report, 'has thus been rendered less sensitive to the preaching of the Gospel.' On the other hand it is noticeable that there is increasingly shown among Buddhist writers a distinct despondency as to their own future, and that they admit it is idle to stem the inflowing tide of Chris-

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tianity by questioning its critical or historical claims. In the meantime the work of the united Bible Agencies has been continuously pressed; the circulation though less in volume has perhaps been signalised by what may be called its central event—the publication, in Roman character, of the entire Japanese Bible, assiduously revised from the earlier edition, and fitted to be what it is hoped it will soon become—the book of the people, understood and studied by them—in this strange new Empire of the East.

The annual narrative from MALAYSIA, as if reserving its best for the living voice of its writer at Exeter Hall, is brief and without special interest. The circulation is not higher than that of 1891, but it is hardly less, though illness and absence withdrew some of the busiest workers who contributed to the advance of earlier years. It is in fact like this—the correspondence between the number of hands that give and those that receive—the failing or the broadening of the kindly beam just as there are few or many messengers to bear it on—it is in this that one may read the claim that the populations walking in darkness urge upon those who are walking in light—that the voice may be heard that shapes itself, as we give or refuse it obedience, either into words of encouragement or of condemnation. It is one of the safe generalizations of experience in Malaysia that Europeans of the stamp worthy of such work are incalculably more efficient than natives. Why have we not more of the abler men? Why must returns remain stationary, because there are none to fill vacant places? Now that the Japanese Bible is fast approaching completion, and that the Malay will soon possess the New Testament in an idiom which, it is hoped, may speak more clearly than ever to his heart, why should these issues be limited because colporteurs are few.\*

But whatever interest is awakened by these Islands and Empires of the East it is sensibly deepened as the eye turns to INDIA. For in India everything fascinates; the memorials of its undeparting past, the panoramic scenery of the present, the approach—dimly discerned, but ushering itself by many heart-shaking anticipations—of some near and mighty future. That past meets us indeed everywhere, not only in the great temples and palaces—more impressive because their uses and their inhabitants are gone—but also in the living descendants of once imperial races in whom one may still mark the unexhausted power which built up the dynasties of the Mahrattas and Moguls. To many these are reminiscences only of what has vanished; it is the European cities, the military station, the flag and the drum-beat of England which impresses the scene. And yet the deepest interest is not here, it is absorbed with the problems and the anticipations of what is to come. For India is moving—rapidly moving—through an era of transition: in a very impressive sense the old is passing away—the

old fantastic faith, the old order in morals and manners, and all is becoming new. And what is the new age, so near but so indefinite, to be? Have the powers of Brahmanism and Buddhism gathered their shadowy robes about them and gone, to leave their thrones to Muhammadanism—virile and aggressive still; or to the Agnosticism of the West; or to Christianity? And if to Christianity, is the advent of that better Kingdom near, or must it come—as the earlier political dynasties came—only after convulsions and shattering war? It is such questions as these which haunt the mind, and which give the main interest to the annual messages from the mission agencies, and to the accounts of the Bible Society, for from these, as from despatches from some distant battlefield, one hopes to gather the reply.

For recent years the Society's Reports have been singularly articulate in their intelligence and their forecasts, and if they do not furnish a complete answer, they seem as to the main question to be clear. They have given testimony to the advance of Christianity everywhere—an advance so rapid as to alarm native attention, and so sustained as to have suffered no serious retreat. These testimonies are continued in all the latest reports which have been received. One comes from Allahabad, itself a centre of pilgrimage, not far from the temple-crowded city of Benares, and overlooking from its ramparts the spot sacred to native faith where the Jumna and the Ganges and the Saraswati meet. It is also the centre of the Hindi-speaking population and therefore of peculiar importance. In 1891 the circulation was exceptionally high: in 1892 it has, in the important items of Depot and colportage sales, advanced still further; a great impulse has been given to Scriptural distribution by the issue of a portable Hindi Bible, and a still more portable New Testament; and in summing up the partial results of the year the Agent can say, that 'as a whole the Kingdom of Christ is making rapid progress in the North-West Provinces and many are looking for a large in-gathering of those to whom the Gospel has been made known.' From the military and at the same time Auxiliary centre of Bangalore in the South there are similar accounts; the Kanarese Bible is being revised with elaborate care so as to bring it nearer than before to the ordinary comprehension of the masses of people; 'the number of volumes of Scriptures sold is nearly double what it was six years ago, and of purely Kanarese editions it is nearly two and a half times as great as then.' Similarly the Madras Auxiliary reports a purely colportage circulation higher than ever before, a proof, says the secretary, that 'the Word is gradually gaining ground, breaking up prejudices and preparing the way for a great future.' The same is the case in Bombay. There also the colportage circulation has increased, there is a continued demand for Scripture Portions, and the Gujarati Old Testament is being revised. These are suggestive testimonies, and all the more as they represent an ever increasing and sustained advance. If it be objected that all this is slight in comparison with the millions of India, and that the older faiths

increase with the perpetual increase of the population, it should be remembered that the progress of Christianity has never been controlled by natural but by spiritual law; that the arithmetical rather than the geometrical ratio represents the growth by which it first occupied Europe and destroyed the superstitions which then overshadowed everything; and that the 'one Divine Event' to which all history points is to a dominion not of an era or of a race but of the world.

In a review so rapid as this, little can be said of another great continent—differing singularly from India both in its past and present—but, to the Christian estimate, destined equally to share in the great Christian future. In AFRICA everything to ordinary interest is modern; on its wide uplands and rivers seem to meet, and in all their force, the currents of the interests and competitions, the changes and revolutions of to-day. From the Bible-Society point of view the centres of special development are in Egypt, in the region of the Great Lakes, and in the fast developing colonies of the Cape. To Egypt some reference has already been made; if we pass in thought almost directly southward, we enter Abyssinia. It is one of Mr. Weakley's regrets that the transmission of Scriptures into Abyssinia from the coast has been so long delayed; but something has been accomplished, and a cordial autograph letter of thanks from the Emperor to the Committee of the Society creates a hope that every facility will be given to its work. Further south lies Uganda, the scene of the labours of the Church Missionary Society, and still further south the region of the Lakes, in which the Universities Mission is at work. Both of these have specially engaged attention during the year, and both have furnished fresh evidence of the importance of the Society's aid. Since the date of last Report 25,000 copies of Scriptures have been sent to Uganda, a number which will soon be exceeded in the present year; and Mr. Travers, Secretary of the Universities' Mission, regards the completion of the Swahili Bible as the 'crown of the year.' Almost at this point we meet the outposts of the great Auxiliary centred at the Cape, and there is perhaps no report of the year more expressive of activity and advance than theirs. The circulation—close on 36,000—has never reached before so high a figure. 'Who can estimate,' say Mr. Nuttall, 'the moral value and spiritual worth of these thousands of volumes scattered in various parts of South Africa?'

Of the WEST INDIES, where the Society's Agent, Mr. Heath, is patiently urging everywhere the extension of Colportage, the formation of Depots, and the organized supply of the populations with the Scriptures, no detailed account can be given here: nor of the pleasant islands of MELANESIA and POLYNESIA, where the Society has many friends: nor of CENTRAL AMERICA, to which Mr. Castells, with the experience gained in his Malaysian work, has recently been commissioned to the Spanish-speaking islands and inhabitants of the mainland: nor of CHILI and PERU, where the Valparaiso Society, assisted from London, is continuing colportage

work: nor of the ARGENTINE REPUBLIC, where an excellent and most necessary work is being done by the men under Mr. Jetto's superintendence, and about whom he characteristically says—'If they have not done more it is because more cannot be done!' Nor can anything beyond a reference be made to the group of Auxiliaries and the innumerable friends who in CANADA and AUSTRALIA and NEW ZEALAND are doing so much to strengthen the Society's hands and to extend its influence. In these great Colonies one happily notes the absence to a large degree of the more purely missionary characteristics of other fields; we are among communities a ready Christian—members of the old home circle, and delighting to find out year by year, in their deepening sympathy and increasing contributions, how much more blessed it is to give than to receive.

It is one of the peculiar honours of the language of England that its *contents* are so inestimably rich,—that it possesses and gives access to a literature which no other language can boast. And just as the language becomes more widely spoken—as the river broadens its bosom and extends its course—so the influences of the literature it bears with it will be correspondingly diffused. In 1760 English was the vernacular of about twelve millions: it is now spoken by more than a hundred and thirty millions. This has been more than a mere linguistic expansion? it has been the development of the reach ~~and~~ the powers of a great treasure or thought: it has been the establishment of an intellectual empire: it has made Shakespeare, and Milton, and Bunyan, and above all the English Bible, familiar wherever their tongue was spoken, and since it has grown well-nigh cosmopolitan *they* have become classics of the world.

And it is the peculiar honour of English Christianity in founding the Bible Society that what has been done without human intent in the case of its own language, it has desired to imitate of purpose in all the languages of the earth. It has desired to avail itself of the connection between the language and its contents, and give to every tongue a literature, sweeter, deeper, more mighty than any other—to launch on the river of every form of speech a vessel which may bear its cargo and spread its riches wherever the river itself may flow. And in all this it has been wonderfully successful. It has made popular the Divine possession of the older tongues of civilisation, and consecrated many rude and barbaric ones by making them custodians of the same treasure. It has taught many dialects their noblest use, and brought into kindlier concord than ever before the long-dissonant accents of Babel. The time foretold in ancient prophecy,\* when all PEOPLES shall become obedient to the Son of Man seems still distant, but the Bible Society has been privileged to bring sensibly nearer the period when all LANGUAGES shall serve Him.

## AGENT'S REPORT.

*To the President and Committee of the Nova Scotia  
Auxiliary Bible Society.*

GENTLEMEN :—Although there is not much to report outside of the usual routine of duties among the Branches of the Auxiliary, an outline of my visitation of them is annually expected ; and I hereby submit a brief sketch of my labours, successes and failures, hopes and fears ; not alone for your perusal but for our reading constituents, some of whom may be stirred up to greater liberality by contrasting their meagre contributions with the generosity of others, while our liberal supporters may have the assurance of our deep gratitude for their beneficence.

I regret that our last years report, although through no fault of its compilers, did a seeming injustice to four of the Halifax churches, as few readers would examine the *last page* of the book for information regarding the Halifax contributions. Late returns are, however, very apt to be unduly tabulated. I was delighted at reading the press report of your grand annual meeting, with its good collection and promise of a general support by the Christian citizens of Halifax ; and from your Treasurer's list before me I notice a marked advance over last year's congregational gifts. May the Holy Spirit bless the efforts of the prominent ministers of Christ to provoke the rich in their congregations to their fulfilment of that duty expected of them,—a service which will honour God and their own name, while shedding heaven's light in many a household far and near.

On the 15th of March I held my first meeting of the year at BROOKFIELD, and with the help of the Rev. Chas. McKay organized a Branch there, the financial result of which, however, I have not yet learned.

The following night I addressed a meeting at Middle Stewiacke and received that Branch's contribution of \$13.60, together with \$25.00 as the legacy of MR. JAMES HAMILTON,—in all \$38.60.

On the 17th we had a good meeting at UPPER STEWIAKKE VILLAGE, which was addressed by several of our friends there. The collection \$1, was handed to me, and your treasurer's memo. informs me that he has since received \$21.30 and \$17.75, but I have no list of subscribers. \$40.13 is a praiseworthy contribution from that old and faithful Branch.

On the afternoon of Saturday we had a fair meeting at SPRINGSIDE, and I notice that congregation has remitted your treasurer \$23.50, but as usual without any list of subscriber's name.

On the morning of Sabbath 19th, I held a meeting in the church at DEAN SETTLEMENT, and another in the afternoon at UPPER MUSQUODOBOIT. The collections were respectively \$1.69 and \$3.21 = \$4.90. Your treasurer has since received \$11.53—in all \$16.43. My thanks are due to the kind friends who for several years have conveyed me from Dean Settlement to Upper Musquodoboit—over the worst roads I usually travel.

Our meeting at MIDDLE MUSQUODOROIT was very small and the collection 40cts, and as far as I know at the present writing the contributions have not all arrived.

There was no meeting arranged for at SHUBENACADIE, another of an attractive character being held in the neighbourhood on the night of my visit. There I collected \$12.00.

The attendance was very small at our meeting in the Congregational Church, MAITLAND. Notwithstanding the absence from home of some good supporters I succeeded in collecting \$34.75. I had hoped for not less than \$50.

I had another disappointment at LOWER SELMA through lack of notices, but on Sabbath, the 26th, I obtained meetings at NOEL and MOOSEBROOK. I have not seen any returns as yet from Noel, but as the Society has some warm friends there doubtless your treasuer will yet hear goods reports of it.



At WALTON meeting I received \$1.59. No other money has yet come in.

We had fair meetings at CHEVAREE and SOMMERVILLE, and I received \$22.68 from the very kind friends there.

At BURLINGTON the meeting was very small. I obtained the collection \$1.05, but have yet to hear from the collectors of that branch.

Although we had the proverbial poor weather and bad roads when at BROOKLYN, NEWPORT Branch, the meeting was fair and gave promise of unabated interest in our cause. The returns, \$40.14, tell of the collectors assiduous efforts for which they, with the Branch's excellent secretary, merit our thanks.

I had counted upon obtaining meetings at ELMSDALE or MILFORD on Sabbath, April 2nd, but was disappointed in such, and I went to Halifax where I attended to other duties until the 5th.

I addressed a meeting at WALLACE on Sabbath, 25th June. The two following days I failed in getting meetings at TATAMAGOUCHE and RIVER JOHN. I addressed a small meeting at SCOTSBURN.

At SPRINGVILLE, EAST RIVER, Pictou County, we had a good meeting, when a working Branch was organized, which I was assured meant business from the heartiness of response to my plan of operations, and I am now delighted to see the large contribution of \$31.34 from that new branch.

On the following night we had a fair meeting at SUNNY BRAE, another lovely place at the head of the picturesque valley of East River. There also a new Branch was organized which has already borne good fruit. \$35.37 is a commendable gift; and to our new friends there and of the sister Branch in the Valley I tender my deep thanks.

On Sabbath, July 2nd, I had a meeting at GLENELG, but was unable to go to the other section of St. Mary's Branch. At Glenelg I received \$8.20.

I could not get a meeting at SHERBROOK, but my canvass there realized \$13.25.

On the 4th there was a fair meeting at LOCHABER, but beyond the collection of \$1.06. We have had no returns from that place up to this date.

The meeting on the 5th at ANTIGONISH was good. I obtained during my canvass there \$23.00, and \$4.50 was subsequently collected by a young lady.

It rained heavily while I was at PORT HASTINGS. Our meeting was small but the few friends there gave me \$7.75.

At HAWKESBURY the meeting was fair, and my canvass of the town realized \$14.56. Since then your treasurer has received from the Depository there \$19.75.

On Sabbath the 9th, the rain came down in torrents during my ten miles drive from West Bay to the Church at Points, yet the attendance was almost as good as usual on a fine day, for what does it matter to Highlanders whether the weather be fine or fierce when the Sabbath bell calls them to the kirk. There I received \$8.60, and was afterwards conveyed to the hospitable home of Wm. Urquhart, Esq., and also on the following day kindly conveyed to St. PETERS, where we had a fine meeting on Monday night and a contribution of \$12.02, which was enhanced by the free favors of Mr. Morrison, the generous host of one of the best hotels in Cape Breton.

I held a meeting at SYDNEY MINES, but the time was unpropitious for one at NORTH SYDNEY. Our friends at the Mines gave me \$11.25, and they of North Sydney \$59.50. I also received from Mr. McKeen \$10.00 for Bibles. You will likely have a further contribution from Sydney Mines. The list from NORTH SYDNEY again shews some good contributions—one of the gifts being from the best annual contributor in the Province.

We had a very good meeting at COW BAY, and the very kind friends there gave me \$22.67.

I held three meetings on Sunday 16th, at GLACE BAY and vicinity. The contributions at GLACE BAY and CALEDONIA MINES were \$17.65, and those at BRIDGEPORT \$10.60—in all \$28.25 received by me.

We had a very good meeting at SYDNEY, when a good friend of the Society was elected to the position of Secretary

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vacated by the late Duncan McLennan, Esq., who was a life long supporter of the Society, and one most generous towards every good cause. My canvass at SYDNEY realized \$58.00, which I considered a good amount, as was also that of NORTH SYDNEY, for I was immediately following, and part of the time collecting in the same street along with another for a good and almost similar cause,—that of the British American Book and Tract Society.

We had a small meeting at BADDECK, and during my too short stay there I collected \$10.82, which may yet be supplemented by the lady collectors.

I had only a few hours for my CANVASS of WHYCOCOMAGH, but collected \$8.50 before the stage started for MABOU.

It was almost midnight when I arrived at the manse of HILLSBOROUGH, near MABOU. The following day, Sunday, I addressed the Mabou congregation in the Hillsborough church and was kindly conveyed by Mr. Smith in the afternoon to PORT HOOD and back to Mabou for collecting duty on Monday. I collected in MABOU \$26.40, and the following day \$12.75 in PORT HOOD. My deep thanks are due to Mr. Bayne for his pulpit, to Mr. Smith for his team, and to Mr. Walter McDonald for his assistance in canvassing the very liberal friends in his busy cloth mill; also to the Rev. Jas. Tweedy for his invaluable services of introduction to our new supporters at Port Hood. I regretted the shortness of my time to take in all the lovely views of charming Glendyer and the famous scenery of Mabou, and the time was unpropitious to visit Guysboro and Canso, although I had planned for such visits in laying out my Eastern route.

I was at ACADIA MINES on 26th and 27th. Our meeting there on the 26th was small, and the 27th very wet yet I collected \$14.80.

I did not obtain a meeting at OXFORD, the time being inopportune, but from two friends I got \$3.00

On Sunday, the 30th July, I held a meeting in the Presbyterian Church at PUGWASH, and another in the Methodist Church, PUGWASH RIVER. The contributions were \$7.78 and \$4.75, also \$1.00 from a lady at the River.

My next journey in Nova Scotia extended from 7th October to 12th of December. We had a good meeting at

TRURO, on Sabbath 8th, in the Y. M. C. A. Hall. The meeting was encouragingly addressed by the President, Mr. Blair, and several ministers of the town. I had also the privilege of addressing for half an hour the congregation of the First Baptist Church on the same evening when our cause was also advocated by the pastor, the Rev. H. F. Adams. I am glad to notice an advance in Truro's annual gift; still that prosperous town does itself injustice when it permits the figures \$112.00 to indicate its interest in our efforts to give the Bible to the World, and I am sure that many of our good friends there will rejoice if this hint will evoke not less than \$200.00 next year, and constant increase of the annual grant henceforth, in due ratio with the town's growth.

The annual meeting at WINDSOR was held in the Presbyterian church. The attendance was fair, and the speeches of the President and of the two ministers present very encouraging. I rejoice at seeing quite an advance in WINDSOR'S contribution this winter, and I trust that such progress will encourage that committee to extend the collectors canvass to the outskirts of the town. When the support of the Bible Society becomes general among all the churches, then that beautiful and classic town will have an added glory.

At the meeting at AVONDALE, our friends there showed their appreciation of Miss M. Mosher's services to the Bible Society in the past by electing her to the presidency of that Branch, and I am glad to notice an advance in the annual returns.

On Sabbath 15th, I addressed the Methodist congregation at HORTON and obtained with the collector's cards, \$12.76. On the evening I held service in the Baptist Church at WOLFVILLE, and afterwards addressed the congregation on the Bible Society's work. My thanks are due to Dr. Higgins for his courtesy, and to the few contributors there for \$22.50.

We had a small meeting at Church St. in the Hall, and the contribution of that section of EAST CORNWALLIS, amounting to \$17.61, shews the Society's indebtedness to the two young gentlemen who have for three years volunteered to collect for our cause. I never think of their

noble efforts without invoking blessings from the Prince of Life upon their hearts and Christian homes.

At CANARD we had a fair meeting, where I obtained \$11.65 with collectors' card. There also I was pleased to see the dear youth of the church in the active service of the Bible Society. May they too "grow up as plants in their youth," and may the fragrance of their service be as the incense of the holy temple of God.

Although we had as usual a small meeting in the Methodist church at CANNING, it gave good promise of future help; and for the first time in the history of my agency did CANNING respond becomingly to our appeal. For the gift of \$21.64 my thanks are hereby tendered to the President, ministers, and lady collectors.

We had a good meeting at KENTVILLE. When the secretary remitted the annual contribution he expressed hopes of better success in the coming year.

I had three meetings on Sabbath 22nd, WATERVILLE in the morning, BERWICK in the afternoon, and SOMERSET in the evening. I obtained in WATERVILLE \$2.53, and \$7.00 last spring per Rev. Mr. Coffin. BERWICK's contribution, so far as yet in, is \$8.77, while SOMERSET's \$34.84 shews that there still lives there some of the Bible Society's warmest friends. Oh that the annual record of SOMERSET may provoke the Christians of beautiful Berwick to due love of the Bible Society and to good work in its behalf. A friend in Berwick signs Psalm 119—130 to the contribution. Such would form a good text for a sermon in our cause; when the simple become wise and the dark mind enlightened by the entrance of God's word, then the gladdened soul delights in giving the word to others.

The meeting at AYLESFORD was good and the contribution quite an increase over any in the past. The interest in our cause was deepened at the meeting by the scholarly address and liberal hand of a Rev. gentleman who has lately become a resident of that place.

Our meeting at MIDDLETON was small, but a Branch was organized. I obtained there \$3.00, and hope that the collectors returns will be in time for the report. My thanks are due to Mr. Morrison for the use of his new hall.

We had no meeting at LAWRENCETOWN, but our few friends there will soon be heard from.

At BRIDGETOWN our meeting in the Methodist church was small. I received \$11.00, but our good friend, the president of that Branch, was out of town and the collection lists unfinished.

We had a good meeting in the Baptist church at ROUND HILL, and the contribution of \$19.75 attests the zeal of our young friends, the collectors, and also the kindness of our contributors.

Our meeting at ANNAPOLIS on Sabbath evening in the Methodist church, was the best and most promising ever held there. The chair was ably filled by the president, Mr. Owen, and by excellent addresses from the Rev. Messrs. Howe and Strothard our cause was so promoted that the contribution amounted to \$45.79.

Our meeting at DARTMOUTH, on October 11th, was held in the Methodist church; the pastor of that church and the Rev. Thos. Stewart, in short addresses, promoted our cause. I am deeply grateful for the kind and active interest manifested towards the Bible Society by the good people of Dartmouth, and I am sure that the ladies who manage that prosperous Branch rejoice at the success of their last efforts, and at the great good which may be accomplished by their collection of \$154.36 used for the diffusion of the glorious gospel of the blessed God. May the light of Heaven ever shine upon their own homes and the approving smile of the Redeemer comfort their hearts.

The meeting at DIGBY was as usual small, but our good friend Mr. Theall has secured for us \$16.13.

Through an unfortunate circumstance, over which the committee at WEYMOUTH had no control, we had no meeting during my visit, yet WEYMOUTH'S contribution is \$19.25. My warmest thanks are again due to St. Clair Jones, Esq., for his unfailing courtesy and hospitality, and for his ever timely action on behalf of the Bible Society.

The annual meeting at YARMOUTH was held in the Y. M. C. A. Hall on 2nd December. The Rev. Messrs. McIntosh and Miller briefly addressed the meeting. Deep regret were expressed at the absence of the venerable president, Mr.

Hilton, and that through impaired health he had to vacate the presidency of that Branch. My canvass among the gentlemen of the town realized \$61.00, and that of the ladies association \$152.00. Both of these amounts are less than the contribution of last year, still the gift of \$213.00 is good when we consider the prevailing cry of dull times among the merchants and the other busy classes to whom we chiefly look for support; for our annual appeals evoke meagre responses from the unfortunately rich in Yarmouth as elsewhere. There are some very estimable ladies and gentlemen in Yarmouth who would do themselves honor by becoming *life members* of the Bible Society; and the perusal of its annual reports, teeming with achievement of God's revealed and saving truth in every land, would increase their own joy and enhance the value of life, health and wealth.

On Sabbath, the 5th November, I held three meetings in BARRINGTON, the first in the Methodist church at the HEAD, the second on the ISLAND, and the third in the Presbyterian church at the PASSAGE. The contributions were \$3.81, and the sums \$2.00 and \$1.44 for bibles sold.

Encouraged by the Rev. Dr. C. Jost I went to PORT LA TOUR, and had a good meeting in the Baccaro church, when we organized a new Branch which gives good promise of prosperity, for I notice that your treasurer has already received from there \$14.05 as its first fruit.

At SHELBURNE our meeting was small, but the collectors have done their duty well, and the returns are \$16.59.

At our little meeting at LOCKEPORT I got 94cts., and the hospitalities in the home of Rev. D. McKinnon were again most generous and enjoyable.

The meeting at LIVERPOOL was small, and as yet I have not seen any returns from that town. I hope they will arrive in time for our report.

On my way to MILTON I met my old friend and the society's generous supporter, Mr. Wm. Henry Freeman, who was also looking for me to hand me his annual contribution. Passing through MILL VILLAGE I obtained \$4.00.

On Sabbath 12th, I held a meeting in the Methodist church, PETIT REVIERE, and received \$5.11 with some collector's cards. My thanks are due to the Rev. Mr. Ogden for his kind hospitalities, and also to the Rev. H. Crawford, who came there to convey me to his church in WEST DUBLIN. I was disappointed in my efforts to obtain a third meeting at Getson's Cove on the same Sabbath, but I was assured of better success in that quarter if I am ever again able to devote a day to our cause in West Dublin and vicinity.

As usual we had a grand Bible Society meeting at LA HAVE, in the Methodist Church. The chair was ably filled by the pastor, and short but pithy addresses were delivered by the pastors of the other churches of the district, and also by the Rev. Mr. Batty of Lunenburg. Mr. Batty, whose zeal in a good cause is enhanced by executive ability, sustained your agent's opinion as to the desirableness of taking up a plate collection in such a full house, but we were in the minority of voting power. And I now humbly submit the opinion that had a collection been taken up at the meeting, La Have's last year's noble contribution would have been equalled by the present one, whereas it has fallen short \$7.44. Still I am most grateful for La Have's grand gift of nearly \$73.00, notwithstanding the fact such an offering as a "sealing ordinance" at a meeting in a Methodist church had in this case been neglected; and I hereby most heartily thank the kind young ladies of LA HAVE for their energetic canvass in the interest of Christ's kingdom.

The annual meeting at LUNENBURG was again held in the Methodist church, but the very cold and rough weather prevented a good attendance. The Rev. Mr. Batty was the only minister present, some being on duty in the neighbouring towns and one on the ocean. In my last report I expressed my assurance that Lunenburg's gift for 1893 would be indicated in the hundred dollar column lists. You will now share my joy at its fulfillment, and join me in congratulating our kind friends there on the success of their praiseworthy efforts, for they have rolled up a contribution of \$101.31; and as some of the ministers have promised your agent a hearing in two of the outlying



settlements next year, doubtless there will be a still better showing in the future. May the blessing of God attend every effort of theirs on land and sea, that the treasures of the deep, harvested by such industrious hands, may ever be used for God's glory and the welfare of humanity.

The annual meeting of the BRIDGEWATER Branch was held in the Lutheran church. The pastor of that church led in the devotional exercises and filled the duties of the chair, and the other ministers of the town gave short addresses. At the close of a very encouraging meeting, the ladies of the Branch committee handed your agent the handsome returns of their zealous canvass, \$67.93, which is an advance of the previous year's gift, and for which, while I gave them my deep thanks, I knew that such work to them was a joy, better far than any praise from tongue or pen of mine,—a service throughout sanctified by loyalty to Him whom having not seen they love. Here I may state that on last August 2nd, your secretary in Halifax received \$9.78 from a place near Bridgewater, called Keizar's Branch, which sum was taken up at convention (I think) of Christian Endeavourers. If the Bridgewater committee will arrange for a meeting there and also at Conqueral Bank, or at any other place on either side of the river below and near Bridgewater, I will, on my next annual rounds, gladly address them on the work of the Bible Society. Such places might become valuable tributaries to the Bridgewater Branch, and enable its zealous committee to roll up easily an annual contribution exceeding a hundred dollars.

At a meeting at MILFORD on the 21st I received \$3.52.

The meeting at CLIFTON, on the 22nd was fair and the returns to your treasurer \$12.70.

At PORTAUIQUE there was a fair attendance, but the following night when at BASS RIVER, the weather being very stormy only a few of the Society's most devoted friends came to our meeting. The returns from Bass River and Portaupique Branch sum up \$37.91. There I am always most kindly welcomed and it cheers my heart to witness their zeal and friendship towards the good cause.

On Sabbath morning I held a meeting in the Presbyterian church at FIVE ISLANDS where I received the plate

collection of \$8.15, and the subscription of J. Broderick \$1.50. On the same day I held a meeting at Economy. There I received \$23.20, and since then your treasurer has received \$2.06, making in all \$25.26. The previous year's contribution of \$15.35 arrived in Halifax too late for the report, both years contributions are in the present.

On the 27th we held a small meeting in the Methodist church at PARRSBORO, the contribution there added to my canvass netted \$14.30.

The meeting at SPRINGHILL was fairly attended, and the contributions of that town amounted to \$48.51. When there I received for Bibles sold by Mr. Simon Fraser \$17.00, and from J. S. McDonald \$15.38. My thanks are due to Mr. Carl Cooper for his admirable sheet of subscriptions ready for printer's use, and to the collectors for their exertions in our cause. If all the churches there were equally interested in our work of giving the infallible Word of God to the nations, Springhill could easily contribute over a hundred dollars annually to the Bible Society.

Other meetings at OXFORD again precluded an appointment for one on behalf of the Bible Society, but you will likely hear from that Branch in a few days.

I held meetings at FOLLY and at GREAT VILLAGE on Sabbath, 2nd December, but at the present writing I have not seen any returns from these Branches. I would like to hear from them in time for insertion in our report.

I was at AMHERST on the 7th and 8th, and addressed the Methodist and Presbyterian congregations during their prayer meetings. In my canvass I obtained \$48.00, and the three ladies who kindly supplemented my work remitted to your treasurer \$13.85. Total for Amherst, \$61.85. I regret that our friends in the various churches of Amherst are unable to appoint one evening in the year specially devoted to the interests of the Bible Society, and have a working Branch framed according to the Society's ideal of such organizations; but I still hope to see such consummated, and an annual contribution of about \$200.00; for the \$100.00 which the Sackville branch annually returns to the New Brunswick auxiliary comes almost entirely from the

Methodists of that village. While I am grateful for the response to our canvass from our few supporters there, they will, I am sure, permit me to stir up their pure minds by way of remembrance of Amherst's former glory in devotion to our cause, for even when it was a very small village it furnished one name in the select roll of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary's LIFE MEMBERS, and whose loyal devotion to the Bible Society has influenced many beyond his own family circle to regard themselves honored in the support of its noble work. Will some of Amherst's wealthy citizens follow the example of Alexander Robb, the late LIFE MEMBER, and do themselves the honor of enrollment among the princes of Philanthropy?

On Sabbath, the 10th December, I held meetings at MACCAN and RIVER HEBERT, but I have not yet seen the returns from that young and generous Branch. Doubtless as in some other places La Grippe has retarded the work of collecting, but I hope that the contribution will arrive in time to be reported in our lists.

This ended my visitation of the Nova Scotia Branches, and I immediately crossed the provincial line to continue my work among the Branches of New Brunswick. Grateful to God for continuous good health and strength, for I did not lose a day through sickness, and ever bearing in mind the many kindnesses tendered me by the Society's friends while prosecuting its work,

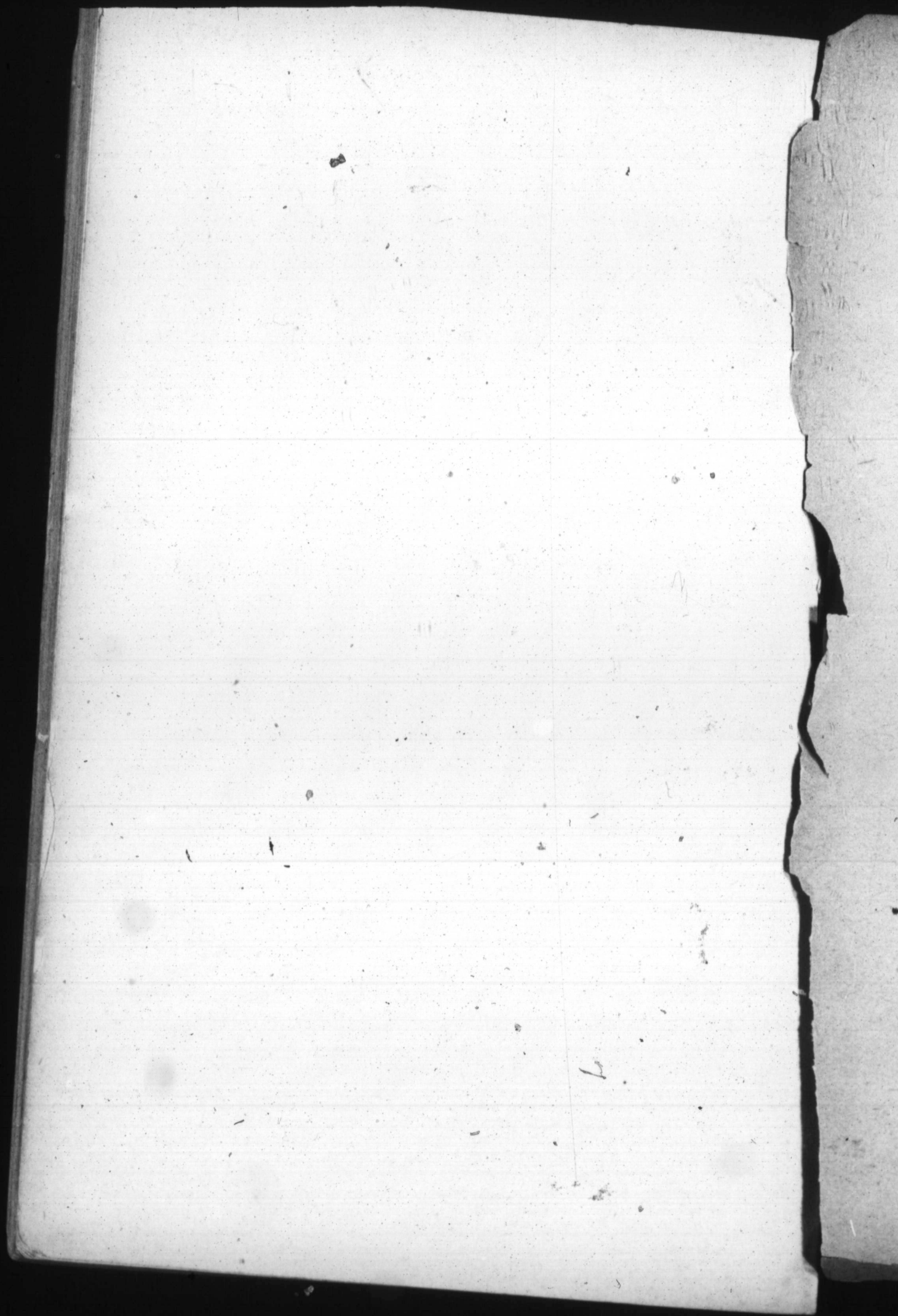
