NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LADY MANAGERS.

At the close of the year 1875, we have much pleasure in presenting the public with a short report of the work for the year.

How glad we should be, if, instead of committing to paper the dry outline of what has been done for the suffering children of our city during the last twelve months, we could bring before the public the sight we saw in one of the rooms of the Home, a few days since. Over a hundred healthy, happy-looking little creatures, heartily engaged in play, with no thought or care for the future, and judging by appearances, just as bright and merry as children reared in the homes of luxury. Contrasting their present surroundings with what they had been before they were gathered in from the various abodes of vice and poverty, we could not help rejoicing in that Christianity which prompts to practical effort, when food and shelter, and kindness are needed.

Although more have been supported than during any previous year, there have been fewer emigrants' families. Poverty has been caused principally by the loss of father or mother, in some cases both, while not a few have been of that unfortunate class, brought to the last extremity of want, through intemperance. One instance occurs to us now, that of seven children, who were one morning brought to the Home. Their father had deserted them, and their *mother?* was in jail. Their unwashed faces, and tattered garments confirmed the tale of their elder sister, who, finding them suffering from hunger and neglect, had gladly remembered this place, where she might bring them. It is needless to add that the managers heartily welcomed the little outcasts, providing warm bed and clothing for them, although not one cent could be given towards their maintenance.

The number in the Home at present is 104; 87 were in at the beginning of the year, and 87 have since been admitted, being a total of 174 who have been in the institution during the year. Of these

45 have been taken out by parents, 9 have been adopted, 1 has gone to service, 1 has died, and 4 ran away, being a total of 50 who have been removed from the Institution during 1875.

More have been given out for adoption this year than last, and we might here mention that the views of the Managers have undergone a gradual change in this particular. At first it was thought best to send this class of children almost exclusively to the country, but it was found, in some instances, the assistance required of them, as members of the family, was too great, to render their lot a desirable one. Now, the end aimed at is, that they should be chosen by those who will be able to give the advantages of education, and provide a *happy home* whether in city or country.

The three following extracts from letters are about girls who occupy the position of only children in their respective homes. The first reads :—

“ August 22, 1875.

“ DEAR MADAM,—Your letter came to hand in due time, but I am almost at a loss how to reply to you about the child, for it does seem strange for me to have to write about the good and bad qualities of my own child, for all I can say is, she is as dear to us as any child could be, and she is as fond a child as any one could wish for, thank God. She grows fast, gets or very well with her learning, and is a good child to go to schools, and she is a favourite with her teachers, both at day and Sunday-school ; she reads a chapter in the Bible every night, and says her prayers night and morning, and grace before and after every meal. She is now reading as I am writing, and as far as my humble means will allow, I have made what provision I can for her, after I am gone, and had it properly executed. I think I cannot say anything more, and remain yours truly, R. D.”

The second concerns a little girl, one of two children whose mother died coming from England. Their family most respectably connected have sent remittances for a number of years, but hearing of the desirable openings available here, gave their permission for her adoption :—

“ August 22, 1875.

“ DEAR MADAM,—Your kind letter, telling me the good news about Daisy, reached me two days since. I wish that I could adequately express the gratitude I feel to you, and all the ladies with whom you are associated in this good work, for all the kind care you have bestowed upon these little ones, and the trouble you have taken, to secure for Daisy a good and permanent home. Most thankful too, I am, to our Heavenly Father, that he has crowned your efforts with so great success. I thank you so much for sending one of Mrs. T.'s letters ; I like the tone of it, and cannot doubt but that in a short time she and her husband will *love* dear little Daisy too well, not to

take all possible care of her. I should like to know what kind of business or profession Mr. T. is engaged in, and whether the place is far from Toronto? Dear little Frank is still under your care, poor little fellow! I am afraid he will pine for his sister, and she for him, but we will hope that ere long a good home may be found for him, not far from Daisy. * * * With very kind regards, yours very gratefully and sincerely,

The third is as follows:—

"September 28, 1875.

"DEAR MADAM,—We duly received the documents, also a letter requesting to know how the little girl is doing. It gives us pleasure to inform you, and others interested, that she is doing well. She can now read well in the third reader, can write, knows the multiplication, and is in the rule of subtraction. She has not neglected a day in her study since we have had her. We also send her to Sabbath-school and church. Could you see her you would not know her to be the same; she has lost that sullen expression of countenance, and in its stead has got a pleasant, happy look, and is very much attached to us, as indeed we are to her. We feel under many obligations to you for your kindness in getting her for us. There is one clause we object to, in the adoption papers, that is the form of reporting to the Home yearly through a clergyman. So doing would expose to the world the fact that our daughter once belonged to a charitable institution, and this might cause her feelings to be wounded in the future. We would not be doing our duty as parents in taking upon ourselves to do what we felt might be hurtful to our child. We would be most happy to report ourselves, or let the child do so. If that clause could be got over, we will have the documents signed at once. I am, dear Madam, yours,

The Sunday-school carried on in the Home is still under the Superintendence of Mr. Anderson. To him, and those who teach, and also to the Rev. Mr. Boddy and Rev. Arthur Baldwin, who instruct the children during the week, the lady Managers tender their sincerest thanks.

To the physician, Dr. Ross, who has so kindly rendered his professional services, the Board would express their heart-felt indebtedness.

They are also gratified to know that their efforts have been ably and most faithfully seconded by the Matron, Mrs. Pearson, under whose management the working of the Home is most satisfactory. Proof of this is found in the Report of the Government Inspector, Mr. J. W. Langmuir, Esq., as follows: "On the 9th September I inspected this Institution, which, in its various dormitories and rooms was found in excellent order, with evidence of good management prevailing in all its departments. The rooms used for dormitories are large, and well aired, with comfortable, clean beds. The

other rooms of the House are also well adapted for their purposes. There were 95 inmates in the Home at the time of my visit, of whom 63 were girls, and 32 boys, 18 of the number being children under four years of age. The children were very neatly and comfortably dressed, and they all had a clean and healthy appearance. There was no sickness in the House. A large number of the inmates are instructed by a mistress in the Home."

Annexed is the Treasurer's Report. The Board beg to make special acknowledgment of the beneficence of the late John Worthington, Esq., in bequeathing to the Institution the handsome sum of \$500; and also of the receipt of \$143, the kind bequest of the late Ann Wheeler. Their grateful acknowledgments are also due to Samuel Platt, Esq., for \$100; to John Shields, Esq., Bolton, for \$80; to the W. M. Church, per Rev. J. Hunt, Eglington, for \$31; to the Committee of the Organ Recital, Jarvis street Baptist Church for \$25; to Mr. W. F. Davin, proceeds from his lecture, \$29; to Mr. R. Jones, Eglington, for \$20; to West Presbyterian S. S. for \$18; to Mr. Ruston, Georgetown, for \$10; Yorkville Baptist S. S. \$10; the late Bond street do., \$10; Mr. E. Gunther, \$27; and to Mr. Chapman for \$10, through the Hon. George W. Allan. Also for a quarterly remittance of \$10 from R. Walker, Esq.

And may we all hope that our efforts during the year have met with the blessing of God, and that our Home will receive the protection of that Saviour who bade little children come unto Him. And as we, who are associated together, work harmoniously, and hand in hand, may our united and high aim indeed be

PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

I have the honour to report to the Lady Managers of the "Girls' Home and Public Nursery," that during the year 1875 the inmates of the Home, with few exceptions, have enjoyed remarkably good health; and are now at the beginning of another year in an excellent condition. The number of children during the past year has ranged from eighty-seven to one hundred and four—the latter number being in the Institution at present.

Death visited the Home on the 26th of March, when John Turner departed this life, after a protracted illness, from Chronic Bronchitis.

I visited the Home on Christmas Day, and was much pleased to see the sumptuous dinner prepared for the children. It reflected great credit upon the Matron for the manner in which every comfort was arranged to please the eyes and satisfy the appetites of the little participants, all except one being able to partake.

Hoping that the Lady Managers of this excellent Institution, and the public generally, stimulated by the good results of the past, may be able to continue to extend its usefulness more and more in the future.

CONSTITUTION.

1. This Institution shall be called the "Girls' Home and Public Nursery," and have for its object the rescue from vice of young girls, and the bestowal of careful attention to their religious, moral, and temporal welfare; also, the maintenance and support of children under the age of seven years.

2. The management shall be entrusted to a committee, consisting of twenty-seven Ladies, chosen at the Annual Meeting, out of which shall be elected the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Directresses, Treasurer, and Secretary.

3. No alteration shall be made in this Constitution, except at the Annual Meeting; and notice of any proposed alteration must always be given to the 1st Directress, at least one month previous to such Annual Meeting.

RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

OF THE

GIRLS' HOME AND PUBLIC NURSERY.

1. Regular meetings of the Board of Managers shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month, at 11, a.m. Special meetings may be called by the Secretary, upon an order from the 1st Directress, or, in her absence, at the request of any three members.

2. All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer (the regular forms being used on these occasions), and be opened as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present (which shall consist of five members, including one of the three Directresses) in the following order:

1st. The Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding meeting, which shall be signed; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read her general Report of the condition of the Institution.

2nd. The Treasurer shall present her account of all moneys received and expended during the past month, to be audited and signed by the 1st Directress, or, in her absence, the 2nd or 3rd.

3rd. The 1st Directress, or, in her absence, the 2nd or 3rd, shall place all resolutions before the meeting, declare the decision to the Secretary, and if an equality of votes occur, give the casting one, in addition to her vote as member of Board.

3. As soon as the meeting is opened (when a quorum is formed) all conversation, not addressed to the presiding Lady, shall be pronounced by her to be out of order, and stopped.

4. Ladies not attending at the usual monthly meeting shall, previously to the same, notify their inability to attend to the Secretary; and, except in cases of illness, or absence from the city, any lady allowing three of these meetings to pass without being present, shall have her name struck off the list of the Managing Committee.

5. The 1st Directress, or, in her absence, the 2nd or 3rd, shall preside at the monthly meetings; audit and sign the accounts presented to her by the Treasurer for that purpose; propose and declare the resolutions, and sign the minutes of each preceding meeting.

6. The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping accounts of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the Managers every month, to be signed by the 1st Directress, or, in her absence, the 2nd or 3rd.

7. The Secretary shall conduct all the correspondence, keep account, as far as practicable, of all the children in the Institution—giving a general report thereof at the monthly meeting, at which she shall regularly attend, but never be called upon to preside, minute the proceedings, and take the names of the ladies present.

8. A Committee of seven shall meet every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock, consisting of the 1st Directress, Treasurer, and Secretary, the two visitors of the previous week, and the two of the current week, when the said visiting ladies shall report their experience of the past. On these occasions three shall form a quorum.

9. The members of the Committee shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, ascertain from the Matron the behaviour of the children, as well as whatever may be requisite for them and for the house, and report the same at the regular weekly meetings. They shall also enter their names in the Visitors' Book. The 1st Directress, Treasurer, and Secretary, shall not be of the number of the daily visitors.

10. Any manager may admit applicants up to the age of fourteen, with the doctor's certificate insuring them to be free of disease.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

FOR THE MATRON AND CHILDREN OF THE GIRL'S HOME AND
PUBLIC NURSERY.

1. The Matron shall be competent to take charge of all the children, as well as to conduct the household affairs generally, and also to instruct the elder ones, from the age of seven to fourteen, in reading, sewing, and writing.
2. She shall be capable of admitting applicants with the doctor's certificate, subject always to the approval of the weekly committee.
3. She shall daily see to the personal cleanliness of each child, and every morning and evening conduct family prayer.
4. The children shall rise at 6 a.m. from 1st May, to 31st October, and at 7 a.m. from 1st November, to 30th April. The time for going to rest to be from 6 to 8 p.m.
5. Meals to be at regular hours. Breakfast at 8 a.m.; dinner at 12; tea at 5 p.m. Grace to be said before and after meals by one of the elder children.
6. All children of age to do so, shall regularly attend Sunday School, and also Divine service once every Sunday, in charge of the Matron; and in the afternoon receive such religious instruction as can be given by the Matron, or any visiting friend to the Institution.
7. The Matron shall devote two hours in the afternoon to teaching the elder children sewing—from half-past one to half-past three. The elder children shall also be taught for two hours in the morning (from ten to twelve) by a person engaged, competent to teach them reading and writing. The younger children to attend for one hour in the morning, and one in the afternoon, or half the time.
8. All hours that are not taken up by instruction or meals shall be occupied by the children, under the supervision of the Matron, in bodily exercise, house cleaning, nursing, or in play.
9. Children shall be admitted into this Institution up to the age of fourteen, except in the summer months of June, July, and August, when infants under twelve months cannot be taken in.
10. No Child shall be admitted who is ill of a contagious disease.
11. The charge for each child of such parents or friends who are able to pay, shall be \$4 per month, unless an exceptional case should occur. If more than one child of the same parent or friend gain admittance, a reduction shall be made as approved by the ladies of the weekly committee. The charge for each child, admitted by the day, shall be—infants, 5d.; children of two years of age, 3d.
12. Parents or friends of the children shall be admitted to visit them any afternoon, between the hours of 3 and 5 only.
