



"Balmacedo." Bonnevie explained, "refused to marry Mile. Waddington because she had another lover. She should have told Balmacedo this in her passionate letters, but she did not. Then the proofs being destroyed she urged her parents to demand that Balmacedo should marry her, confessing to them her relations to him."


