The Germans in Poland again are making a fierce attack toward the capital, and the Russians are making a stand against them on the east bank of the Bzura river, thirty miles west of Warsaw. Grand Duke Nicholas' army here holds a natural strategic line fifty miles long, running, roughly north and south along the east banks of the Bzura and

The Petrograd report claims that the German force in North Poland has retreated across the boundary into East Prussia in a northwesterly direction. It asserts also that the Austrian advance through the Carpathian Passes to the north has been checked, and the attempts of the Phzemysl garrison to break through the lines repulsed. According to this report the Austrians have been driven into the fortifications with heavy slaughter.

The Austrian communication, on the other hand, claims successes in the Carpathians, but admits that the Russians south coupy Galicia and South Poland in force. Apparently, therefore, the Cracow and Przemysi investments are proceeding and have not been broken.

Serious fighting between the Russians and Turks around Erzerum, Turkish Armenia, has been stopped by snow six feet deep and the intense cold, from which the Arabs are suffering bitterly.

ALLIES AIRMEN SET FIRE TO ZEPPELIN SHEDS AT BRUSSELS

GERMANS FACING ALLIES IN WEST LA CONFIDENCE OF EARLY STAGES OF THE WAR

Methods Adopted by Enemy in Recent Fighting in France and Belgium Shows Kaiser's Men Less Daring in Their Attacks and British and French Have Struck Fear Into
Their Hearts—Eye Witness Describes the Battle from

Paris, Dec. 21.—The French war of an eye-witness of events along the battle line from December 7 to December 15. Its ays:

"During the period from the 7th to the 15th of December the ascendancy gained by our infantry has placed us in a position to make in various parts to the front, progress which seems to have disturbed the enemy.

"The German infantry is more cautious, and continuous sniping by them denotes a certain amount of nervousness. The fact that they are using searchlights and lighting rockets more and more reveals also their fear of attacks.

"After the expensive and useless experiments of last month our adversaries seem almost everywhere to be reduced to defensive measures, and its we, who, on the whole of the front have assumed the offensive.

"Also, in the artillery duels our batteries are showing more and more their superiority.

"Between the sea and the Lys river the enemy, who from the seventh to the ninth instant, had contented themselves with bombarding our lines, and particularly the city of Ypres, on the 10th inst., directed to the south of that city three infantry attacks against our trenches.

"The first two of these attacks were repulsed. The third reached our brist line of trenches, but on the following night we regained this position. On the twelfth, the enemy made nother attack, which also was repulsed.

"On the fourteenth our infantry took the offensive, in spite of the exceedingly muddy condition of the field and succeeded in capturing a German artench several hundred metres in length.

OFFICIAL WAR REPORTS

FRANCE

Paris, Dec. 21—The following official communication was issued by the War Office tonight:

"The British troops have attacked and this morning regained most of the trenches previously lost. Before Lihons the enemy delivered four successive attacks for the purpose of recapturing the trenches which we had previously won in that region, but all of them were repulsed.

"In an attack to the northwest of Puisalenne, south of Noyon, we have gained a foothold in the enemy's trenches of the first line, and have made progress in the wood of Saint Mard.

"There has been no other report of any note on the operations of the day."

RUSSIA

Petrograd, Dec. 21.—The following official communication was issued tonight from the headquarters of the army-of Caucasus:

"In the direction of Van on December 20, engagements occurred which resulted in the defeat of the Turks, among whom there were a great number of wounded. During the pursuit of the enemy we captured a piece of mountain artillery, with five hundred other pieces of equipment.

"In the deriction of Sary-Kamysh, (Trans-Caspian dietrict) there have been several engagements of no importance."






