SWEEPING BRITISH VICTORY: ARMED NEUTRALITY FOR U.S.

BRITISH CONTINUE VICTORIOUS SWEEP

Advance Along the Ancre River Has Attained Depth of Two Miles and Extends Along Front of Eleven Miles from East of Guedecourt to South of Gommecourt.

London, Feb. 26.—The British advance along the Ancre river has attained a depth of 2 miles, and extends along a front of about eleven miles, according to the official report from British headquarters in France tonight.

The text reads:

'The movement referred to in the communications Saturday and Sunday was maintained during the day on both banks of the Ancre. Our advance extends over a front of about 11 miles, from east of Gueudecourt to south of Gommecourt, and has attained a depth of two miles.

"In addition to the village of Serre, reported yesterday, we now occupy the strong point known as Butte De Warlencourt and the villages of Warlencourt-Eaucourt, Pys and Miraumont. We have reached the outskirts of Lebarque, Irles and Puisieux-Au-Mont.

"A hostile attack, made early this morning on one of our posts south of the Somme was driven off with loss.

IN SINKING

Act of German Submarine Looked Upon as Creating Serious Situation.

Washington, Feb. 26.—The sinking of the big Cunarder Laconia, apparently without warning, and with 26 Americans the lower land of the Maricans the most serious disregard of American rights since the ruthless German submarine campaign began. Government officials here made no attempt to conceal their conclusion. Officials pointed out that while final reports may show that no American lives were lost, the fact will remain that the Americans aboard were illegally assaulted on a peaceful mission, and escaped death only by good fortune. The United States is concerned in the sinking of the Laconia also because a large amount of official diplomatic mail had been entrusted to her after the American liner St. Louis had cancelled its sailing.

MOB STORMS THE WALDORF

WILSON FAVORS A STEP TOWARDS WAR

President Appears Before Congress and Asks for Authority to Place United States in a State of "Armed Neutrality" to Resist the German Submarine Menace.

Announcement of Success of Third War Loan Causes Scene of Great Enthusiasm

in Commons.

London, Feb. 26.—There was a scene of great enthusiasm in the House of Commons today when Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, announced the result of Great Britain's third war loan, which is by far the greatest voluntary contribution by the people of any belligerent nation. More than 1,000,000,000 pounds of new money, with more than 5,000,000,000 subscribers, are the stupendous figures which the chancellor of the exchequer confessed he would have thought it impossible to raise only a few days ago.

WILSON WANTS TO AVOID ACTUAL WAR-ASKS TO BE EMPOWERED TO TAKE WHATEVER STEPS ARE NECESSARY, WHICH INCLUDES ARMING OF SHIPS AND CONVOYING OF MER-CHANTMEN BY WAR VESSELS.

Washington, Feb. 26.-President Wilson appeared before Congress at one o'clock this afternoon and asked for authority to place the submarine menace. Continued invasion of the plain rights of neutrals on the high seas, further sacrifices of American lives and ships, the intolerable blockade of American commerce-almost as effectual as if the country were at war-have taken the place of a dreaded "overt act," which was expected to shock the world-and have forced the president into the next step toward war.

President Wilson, asking to be empowered to take whatever steps are necessary, which includes the arming of ships, the convoying of merchantmen by war vessels or what other steps are necessary, made lives and rights or by driving the American flag from the seas.

To Use Armed Forces.

Congress is expected not only to authorize the president to use the armed forces of the country, but also to provide money.

Whether armed neutrality will mean war depends on whether Germany realizes that the United States is ready to protect its neutral rights by whatever means are necessary.

With a full realization of the solemnity of the occasion the president took his action today with the calm confidence that congress and the country will stand behind him.

News of the sinking of the Cunard liner Laconla with Americans aboard, was received here as the president was on his way to address congress.

PASSES AWAY Big 18,000 Ton Steamer Sailed From New York, Feb. 18. With 100 Passengers, Ten of Whom Are Americans.

Queenstown. Feb. 26—The Cunard Line announced at 10.36 p. m. that Line steamship Laconia of 18,099 tons gross, which sailed from New York on February 18 for Liverpool, has been sunk. The survivors are said to number 170. They were landed today. 

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

The Ophir mine, about 20 acres, is located in the southwestern portion of the Butte district, in the heart of the City of Butte, a few hundred feet from the Travona mine, where the first lode location in the district was made in 1864. The company retains surface rights to about three acres of ground, on which the mill and the shaft, assay office, etc., are located, in the heart of the business district of Butte. The shaft of the Ophir, down about 1,065 feet, is the only shaft available in that vicinity, indicating that it will become in time an outlet through which the ores of surrounding properties may be hoisted. It is said that the shaft will command in this way a rich mining acreage many times the actual dimensions of its own estate.

The company's mill, which is now operating, is a splendid piece of construction. It has at present a rated capacity of 200 tons daily, but structure and foundation will admit of this capacity being enlarged to 450 or 500 tons, while the site will permit of the enlargement of the mill to 1,000 tons. 
