RIOTERS SHOW DOWN IN THE PITTSBURG STRIKE RIOTS

Six Killed and Many Injured in Battle Between Deputies,
Soldiers and the Rioters—More
Deaths Are Expected.

WOMAN WAS SHOT.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Aug. 22—As a smoke-battered mob rose over the dull gray houses and factories of McKees Rocks early today, machine except two piles of brick and a street littered with broken glass indicated to the casual observer that last night one of the bloodiest riots in Pennsylvania since the days of the Homestead strike had occurred, costing six lives, the result of a six weeks' old labor dispute between the Pressed Steel Car Company of Schenectady and its employees.

One woman, wife of a striker, for the sake of her husband's cause, was shot in the back and will not recover. A boy who stood beside her during the fighting between the State troops and the mob sympathizers also is in danger of death, having been shot with a rifle ball.

Last night's rioting came suddenly and without warning. About nine o'clock strikers were seen together at the Schoenerville end of the bridge, a landmark spanning the Pittsburgh and Erie tracks.

Sunday it was rumored that a number of strike breakers were being brought from the city into the place. Rioters were immediately aroused. Every car that came from the city was held up. This procedure had been going on for some time, when a car carrying Deputy Sheriff Ester came along. He was returning from Pittsburgh to the Steel Car plant. A revolver was placed at the motorist's head and the car was stopped. A crowd of strikers immediately appeared and the Deputy Sheriff was ordered to leave the car. Instead it was said he threw back his seat and was hit in the head. This was the signal for a fusillade of shots. Ester opened fire on the crowd and all the cartridges in his revolver were expended before he fell under a shower of stones and bullets.

The return and conflict showed the body was the car took it to the office of a physician. A large bullet struck through his forehead near the direct cause of his death, although his head and body were terribly mangled and lacerated.

MANY SAVED TAX DISCOUNT

Over Seventeen Thousand
Dollars of Assessment
Paid in Ten Days

A BIG DAY

Thursday was a busy day at the Town Treasurer's office, and a large amount of money, more than six thousand dollars, was received today.

Out of a total assessment of \$27,000, seventeen thousand has been paid over to the Treasurer. Besides this amount, a large amount of water and electric light rates was paid.

Campbellton this year has the lowest rate of any town we have heard of. While other towns have increased their rates, Campbellton has been able to show a substantial decrease. The rate last year was \$1.10, this year it has been decreased to \$1.05.

This decrease has been due to rapid advance in the value of real estate, and the increased valuation of taxable property in the town.

Campbellton citizens, some of whom are prone to complain, should compare their taxes and rates with that of other North Shore towns. Chatham for instance, has a rate of \$2.35, and a poll tax of \$60. Newcastle's rate is \$1.60 and a poll tax as high as \$17.00, while Campbellton has a \$1.05 rate and a poll tax of \$12.50.

MANY COPIES WERE SEIZED

Fifteen Hundred Free Speeches
Seized By Police
at Moncton.

CASE AT ST. JOHN.

MONCTON Aug. 21.—On the strength of a telephone message received from the St. John police last evening, about fifteen hundred copies of "Free Speeches" were seized by the police here this morning and taken to the police station. These will be sent to St. John to be used as evidence in the trial of C. Bruce McDougall, who is standing trial for defamatory libel against Mayor Bullock, Ald. Frink, Alex. McRae, and Daniel Mullin. Several pieces of correspondence were also seized and will also be sent to St. John. These are said to be of a spicy nature, and will probably cause a sensation in the St. John courts. The police say they attach the characters of several well known Moncton citizens.

The seizure was made about half past nine by Chief Ridout and Officer Gunn, who went to the Free Speech office on McDougall's lane. They then went to the home of Mr. McDougall, from where the correspondence was taken. These papers are dated August 21st, and although several articles appear from many towns, none can be seen from St. John or Charlottetown.

J. C. SHERREN COUNSEL FOR "FREE SPEECH" EDITOR.

Case Came up at St. John Friday and Postponed Till Today

ST. JOHN, Aug. 21.—The telephone says:—The police court was crowded yesterday morning when C. Bruce McDougall was arraigned before Judge Ritchie in the charge of defamatory libel, concerning Dr. A. W. McRae, Mayor Bullock, Dr. Mullin, K. C. and

Ald. Frink. Policeman Scott was the only witness examined.

He testified that on August 2, he seized a parcel of "Free Speeches" in the store of Michie's and Abbott, whom he arrested for selling obscene literature. Copies of the issues of July 19, 17, 21 and 21, containing alleged libellous statements against the four named in the warrant were placed in evidence by Dr. McRae and J. B. M. Baxter for the prosecution.

The opening of the case had been delayed an hour while negotiations were entered into with the city lawyers. None of them, however, would consent to take McDougall's case. At the conclusion of Officer Scott's evidence, it was announced that J. C. Sherren of Moncton had consented to appear for the defence. Further examination was postponed till this morning at ten o'clock, the counsel for the prosecution entering no objection. It was intimated that ball would be asked for the prisoner and that this will be responded by Dr. McRae and J. B. M. Baxter, K. C. Mr. Sherren arrived in the city yesterday afternoon.

YOUNG WOMAN LOST LIFE IN FIRE IN HOUSEBOAT

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Aug. 23.—Miss Marjorie Morgan died this morning from burns suffered when the houseboat Wagon, owned by her father, Delius H. Morgan, was destroyed by fire yesterday. The houseboat was anchored in the harbor here and Miss Morgan and her father were the only ones on board. Miss Morgan was 19 years of age.

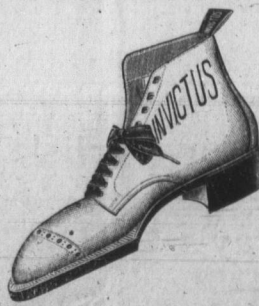
