Meeting With the King Was Accidental, But Intensely Exciting.

Appointment of Lord Dundonald as Commander of the Canadian Militia Officially Announced.

London, April 10 .- A Brussel's dispatch says the meeting of King Leopold with the Socialists yesterday, on his arrival from Biarritz, was quite accidental, but none the less unpleasant NEW COMMANDER OF CANADIAN for his majesty, whose automobile was surrounded by excited Socialists, who shouted: "Long live the republic," 'Long live universal suffrage," and

waved red flags in the king's face. The Socialists had collected at the railroad station to bid farewell to the members of a delegation of Spanish republican deputies who had attended the Socialist gatherings here, and who had participated in the previous night's demonstration. The police, in the morning, informed the Spaniards that they must leave Brussels forthwith, and the delegates were escorted to the station by a large gathering of Socialists, car-

rying red flags. The king happened to arrive at the same time and had difficulty in getting his automobile out of the crowd, but he finally found an opening and outdistanced his pursuers.

INTENSE EXCITEMENT. The incident aroused intense excitement, and there are fears of further were repulsed with the loss of twenty disturbances and complications. Pretoria, April 10.-The trial of Commandant Kritzinger, by a British court-martial, on the charge of having ommitted four murders, besides trainwrecking and cruelty to prisoners, lasted to connect the prisoner with the shooting of natives, and one scout who had been captured by Kritzinger testified that he was well treated. The charge of trian-wrecking was withdrawn, and he was acquitted (as already announced) without cross-ex-amination by counsel for the defense.

BRITISH "DRIVES." The British authorities are making preparations for a great series of "drives" on the arrival of reinforcements. The general outlook for the Boers is said to be most dishearten-ing. Augusta, Ga., April 10.—The lockout of all mill operatives in the Augusta district, which was threatened by the Manufacturers' Association in retaliation for the strike on Monday of the employes of the King mills, went into effect yesterday. Every mill in Augusta and in the House Creek district is closed. The lockout affects 10 000 men. fects 10,000 men.

LONGSHOREMEN WIN. Halifax, N.S., April 10.—The striking 'longshoremen have gained a victory. Two of the deal shippers agreed to pay the strikers the union scale of wages, and 150 men began work loading the steamers Magda and Chicklade.

TO WIPE OUT UNIONISM. Pittsburg, Pa., April 10.—The Post says: The strike of the miners in the central district fields, and particularly those who were employed by the Rochester and Pittsburg Coal Company, has determined the coal company upon drastic measures for stamping out all unionism in their section. The Rochester and Pittsburg Company operates three mines, and upon them depend fully 10,000 men for employment. The first step taken was to issue the notice to the miners occupying houses owned by the company to remove from them. The first of these ejectment notices were served last Thursand were to miners who had been among the leaders of the strike. All of the others are to have similar notices served upon them during the present week. In addition to this the company's stores have been practically closed down and clerks dismissed. It was announced open the mines again until next fall. When the company was ready to begin again it was said they would hire non-union men only, and would not recognize any scale or agreement of the United Mine Workers.

PROJECTED BERING STRAITS TUNNEL

A French Engineer's Plan to Connect Asia and America by Rail.

The New York Herald says: One of the most daring engineering projects ever contemplated is that of a tunnel under Bering Strait to connect the Trans-Siberian Railway with American lines. Chimerical as the scheme may at first appear, its author, M. Loicq de Lobel, says that within six years the work will be practically realized. The European edition of the Herald publishes an interview with M. Maurice de Lobel, who recently returned to Paris, after spending two years at Bering Strait. To carry out the task his father had had set him in the matter of soundings and measurements in the treacherous strip of water that divides America and Asia, he crossed the strait twice in a small open boat, with a companion, a feat that had never before been accomplished by a white man. The strait here is 14 miles wide and about 350 feet deep.
