CONVENTION ARRANGEMENTS. A "Liberal Association President" asks what is the best way to proceed with arrangements for the Provincial Liberal Convention that is to be held in Toronto early in February.

Nothing is simpler. Presidents and secretaries should call their associations together at the earliest convenience, the object and importance of the gathering being stated. Then at least ten delegates should be chosen to attend the convention, it being understood that more will be welcomed if it is convenient for them to attend.

The one great necessity for the present is to have the delegates selected and their names sent to Mr. Preston as early a date as possible.

—All, Boyd declined to let the white-wash be applied to the retiring members of the London City Council. There was novelty in the protest, but Ald. Taylor scarcely appreciated it. He was prepared to "soft sawder" the stay-at-homes to their hearts' content.

—The medical superintendent of the Middletown (N.Y.) Hospital for the Insane, in his report for 1890, strongly commends baseball as an outdoor amusement for patients. During the season, the lunatics were found to be better players than their sane competitors.

—By the death of Mr. Charles Watson, of Providence House, Halifax, England has lost "the Napoleon of tract distributors." For more than 40 years he supplied gratuitously temperance tracts and books. In twelve months he distributed nearly 8,000,000 tracts, weighing 25 tons and containing 25,000,000 pages of reading.

—It is now said that Governor Hill, of New York, will be the next Senator from that State, and that Rowell P. Flower will be the Democratic candidate for Governor. It seems highly probable that Governor Hill will be put up as a Democratic candidate for the Legislature, but it is believed that the Cleveland influence will be too strong for him.

—Prince Bismarck refuses to visit Alsace because he is "unable to obtain any sleep in strange beds." "In such cases," he explains, "the often falls to close his eyelids, and then his thoughts flow back to the past, and torment him." What a melancholy ending to a man's life! Bismarck had his spell of autocratic greatness, but it has after effects truly to be dreaded.

—Two hundred and seventy-five miners were killed while at work in the anthracite coal regions of Pennsylvania last year. The widows number 147, and the orphans 513. Over 1,000 were injured. It is a sad record, especially when it is considered that a little more care on the part of those in authority would have prevented not a few of the casualties that brought sorrow and want to many a home.

—Professor Shaw, of the Agricultural College, Guelph, rightly says the evil resulting from the McKinley Bill and the policy of trade restriction is simply a question of facts and not of politics. The damage done by the increased trade restriction, Professor Shaw says, will be immense. The barley and egg trade will be most affected. Last year the new law was anticipated, and the surplus barley and eggs were shipped before the increased duties were put on. This year, the pinch will come.
