In a long letter to the Times, Prof. Lankester protests, eloquently and with dignity, against the action which would deprive him of a salary of £1,200, and throw him, at the age of 60, upon a world with which he is unacquainted having spent his life in research and scientific experiment. It is to be hoped that some better recognition of Prof Lankester's work as a scientist will be made than that proposed by the directors.

# STRANGE STORY

Odd Evidence That Ends in Sensational Arrest.

New Face Put on Bedford, Indiana, Murder Which Out Sherlocks Holmes.

Evansville, Ind., Aug. 27. - By the strange linking together of a chain of circumstances that reads like an adventure of Sherlock Holmes, Prosecutor Fletcher, of Bedford, Ind., and the authorities of the city, have run down a man they will charge with the murder of Sarah Schafer, who was killed at Bedford, Ind., on the night of Jan. 21,

The story, it is said, starts back in eight miles from Bedford. Five years ago there lived in adjoining houses the Rainey and the Tanksley families. Won Girl's Heart.

Nellie Rainey, 14 years old, visited the Tanksley home, and, it is claimed, became infatuated with Tanksley when she was but about 15 years old. Two years ago the village folk began to talk about the alleged relations between Tanksley and pretty Nellie Rainey, then a teacher in the Baptist

Sunday school. Tanksley was married and had three children. To escape the whispering tongues of the villagers he left his family in Heltonville, and went to Bedford in the fall of 1903, but kept up a correspondence with Miss Rainey. For some reason, at present unknown, Tanksley returned to Heltonville from Bedford in the spring of 1964, but left again suddenly in October, 1905. At the same time Miss Rainey told her father she was going to Bedford to have some dental work done. That was the last-ever heard her until the detectives arrested Tanksley and Miss Rainey here in a rooming house. They had been traced through the efforts of the girl's father, who never gave up the search

for his missing daughter. After several months of search the father, about three weeks ago, turned over to Prosecuting Attorney Fletcher, of Bedford, a number of letters Tanksley had written to Miss Rainey. A warrant was sworn out charging Tanksley with kidnaping Miss Rainey. and the prosecutor then began looking over the letters.
