

MAY REORGANIZE NAVY

Roosevelt May Appoint a Commission to Investigate Conditions.

Washington, Nov. 30. - President Roosevelt, it is understood, soon may appoint a commission to investigate the entire system of the navy department, looking toward a reorganization of that department and the establishment of a general staff to act in an advisory capacity to a civilian secretary of the navy.

It is authoritatively learned that Secretary Root has been asked to accept the chairmanship of such a commission, because Mr. Root, while secretary of war, worked out successfully the reorganization of that department and established the general staff system in the army.

While the President is desirous, it is said, of having such an investigation started before his retirement March 4 next, the appointment of a commission will largely depend on securing the right man to head it. Should Secretary Root accept the President's invitation to serve in such a capacity, it is believed that official announcement of the proposed inquiry will be made at once.


