

Should St. Andrew's and the First Walker; Liderton, T. W. Caverhill; Fin-Presbyterian Church unite and be one central Presbyterian Church was one of the many vital matters brought before the largest and most enthusiastic meet-ings that has been held by the London Presbytery for a long time in the First Church this morning. The committee who were investigating into the possibilities of such a union, were in favor themselves of the union and expressed an opinion that it would be a great thing for the Presbyterian cause and a great power in the central part of the city. The question was discussed from city. The question was discussed from different standpoints, and finally the matter was laid on the table for still further considerations without any de-cision of any sort being made. Rev. D. L. The Presbyterians present at the meeting this morning were a muchelated gathering due to the success of the Forward Movement in the London Presbytery, despite the fact that this denomination was more hampered in its canvassing than any other denomination. An excellent report was given by Rev. D. C. MacGregor, chairman of the committee for the district Presbyterian Forward Movement. The objectives and London Delegation.

The recent decision of the supreme council at its session in London not to recognize the Soviet until the horrors of the campaign are ended, but favor-ing the encouragement of commerce between Russia and the remainder of Europe, seemingly has inspired even the Liberal elements, which heretofore have been reluctant to consider peace, to change their attitude. Many of them have expressed the conclusion that the have expressed the conclusion that the opening of negotiations cannot be avoided. Generally the Liberals approve the conditions outlined by the Diet's foreign affairs commission. The Socialist press contends that Poland herself must make peace or that otherwise Great Britain will do so on its own initiative. These newspapers declare that Great Britain's policy toward Russia is dangerous to Poland's interest in more ways than one.

City Council Will Get a Shock When School Estimates Viewed.

Increases for public school teachers alone amount to more than \$50,000. Approximately 28 men teachers were granted \$300 increases or \$8,400, while about 272 women teachers were each about 272 women teachers were each given \$250, totalling about \$42,900. Increases for male teachers at the Collegiate totalled \$10,800, and for women \$2,100, a total of about \$13,000. High school janitors received aggregate increases of \$400 and public school janitors totalled about \$3,000. Increases for school inspectors and other officials of the board bring the total well above \$80,000.

Teachers recognized that the aggregate increase would mean much to the city when they presented their requests. They claimed, however, that this was no argument against it, and believed that the people were willing to pay the additional amount to see fair salaries editional amount to see lair salaries paid.

Estimates from the board of education will likely be quite a shock to the city council when they come before that body. Other big items will be provision

for coal and other supplies and for reairs.

RISING PRICES.

An announcement from Washington by the prominent American financier, Mr. B. M. Baruch, that prices are bound soon to drop, reads curiously alongside a statement of the Montreal sugar refiners that their prices will rise at once and may go even higher before long. There is a grim irony in the coincidence.

Mr. Baruch seems to be talking with the purpose of shielding profiteers, while he pretends to rejoice over their coming discomfiture. He serves out the old stuff about prices being fixed or forced not by combinations but by simply supply and demand. He is very cheery over world production and transportation returning to normal proportions. "Prices will then go back to normal." Mr. Baruch seems to Teel "real bad" at statements made in the House of Representatives by Chairman Graham of the Committee on Expenditures in the War Department, declaring that the prices in the copper industry had been fixed by the copper producers. No, no, it was a "committee of government officials, after a full hearing given to all persons interested, and considering the costs of production, that fixed the prices in all industries, including copper." Some cynics will ask who fixed the officials of the Government, or bamboozled or intimidated them. It is a safe guess that the general public was inadequately represented in the matter.

Mr. Baruch is eager to make it appear that the iron providence of supply and demand has been the cause of everything. But don't anyone worry, supply is fast catching up to its old level, and prices will be themselves again. Does Mr. Baruch think the public has so short a memory and so little insight? Were not pricesrapidly advancing before the war, and their rise the subject of world-wide discussion years before 1914? Look up files of newspapers and magazines or private letters of those days and prove it. Are not prices going up faster now than in war time, with production increasing? People know of the immense profits and dividends being made by manufacturers and middlemen. A small ring of people is eating up the wealth of the land.

This is clearly seen by Mr. A. B. Balcom, Magazine (Montreal) on "The Rise in Prices."

The money of the community as a whole has increased. The loss of some is counterbalanced by an equal gain on the part of others. Who are these fortunate classes? For generations it has been 'ill-paid, ill-housed, ill-nurtured, ill-Under circumstances considerably improved, it has come to realize that man does not live by bread alone. The voice that is heard above the din and confusion of the world today is that of Labor demanding a fuller and a freer life."

Mr. King's comments apply to older countries than Canada. It cannot be said of Canada that for generations labor has been "ill-paid. ill-housed, ill-nurtured, ill-taught." # Women At Home and Abroad

TO AMUSE CHILDREN N DAY NURSERY.

There is opening up a new field of endeavor for young girls with spare time on their hands with the establishment of a Day Nursery in London. And what more fascinating work could be imagined than helping to entertain small children for half a day or a whole day each week! It is just such volunteer helpers that the Day Nursery Board is looking for and hopes to find among the great army of young girls who devoted their leisure time to Red Cross work during the war. There will be a large enough staff to feed and look after the health of the little ones who spend their days at the Creche, but these same little ones will have to be amused and kept out of mischief. And this is the work which will fall to the volunteers. Many a young girl who is in doubt whether the kindergarten is her sphere might gain assurance here.

AND HIGH PRICED?

Why is sugar so high and so scarce? is a question which is bothering every housewife today. And yet the answer is very simple. There is not enough to go around, or, in more technical words, the demand exceeds the supply. Of course the blame is laid on the profiteers, and certainly the big sugar

merchants are by no means failing to take advantage of the situation that has presented itself. But to say that they are responsible for the situation is absurd. Before the war, the production of sugar had reached the high point of seventeen million tons a year, increasing at the rate of about half a million tens a year to meet the demand. In contrast to this, the production in 1919 was about two million tons less than in the year previous to the war, and that in the face of the fact that the sugar-using area of the world has increased greatly. Whereas in China, India and Japan the use of sugar was comparatively small a few years ago, the great masses in these countries are now beginning to know

Great quantities of sugar were produced in Germany, Austria, Russia and France before the war. That supply has, however, been cut off, leaving Cuba and Java practically the only great sugar-producing countries of the world. Java sugar has been pretty well taken by the oriental countries, leaving Cuba to supply Great Britain, America and France. In other words, Cuba practically has had monopoly of the sugar market.

During the war there was severe sugar rationing, and the price was kept down artificially by war governments. Now that the natural laws of supply and iemand are righting themselves, the sugar price soars away up. This seems even the greater to the housewife, since, unfortunately, before the war, when sugar was plentiful, it was the custom of merchants to sell this article at a loss in order to get rid of tea, coffee and other groceries at a profit. They would advertise a big sale of sugar—so many pounds for a dollar—actually losing money on the deal. But they would in this way attract customers to their shop and sell other goods at a profit. It was unfortunate that sugar was the article selected as a bait, for now that it has become so very scarce, the price seems to

have advanced even more than it really has.

Of course, it must be remembered that a great part of the sugar consumed in the world is used indirectly for canning, preserving, candy, ice cream, powdered and malted milks, cakes, pies, pastry, etc., and since prohibition the demand for these articles of food has greatly increased, for they are to some extent taking the place of alcohol. 


