His Holiness Died at 4 O'Clock This Afternoon, Surrounded by the Princes of the Church and Relatives—His Career and Achievements—The Procedure Upon a Pontiff's Death— Brilliant Scenes That Accompany the Election of New Pontiff.

Rome, July 20. - 12:35 p.m. - Information comes from the Vatican that it is feared the Pope's last moment is fast approaching. All the cardinals have been summoned to the Vatican. The Pope, after suffering a cardiac attack, has rallied. The Pope, although rallying from the heart attack, still continues in an ex-

tremely grave condition. The Pope lies on his bed, the pillows of which are not whiter than his face. which has a strange aspect, owing to his not having been shaved for so long. His hands are folded over the rosary, which he has used for over 50 years. The famous arm-chair, which, perhaps, his holiness will never again enter stands invitingly near, with his stick beside it. The doctor, from time to time, rises administer nourishment, of this morning the Pontiff had taken some, Indeed, Dr. Lapponi succeeded at a respectful distance by the others in having him swallow several teaspoonsful of coffee, milk and brandy, mixed. The silence of the sick-room is occasionally broken by a hacking cough due to the gathering of phlegm in Pope Leo's throat. These coughing spells have the effect of rousing the Pontiff, causing him to open his eyes and revive slightly. While the doctors were examining their patient this morning, believing him to be in a stupor, his oliness suddenly fixed his eyes, even now brightest, on them, saying: "This

time, doctors, you will not win your brave fight with death." "It is your holiness who is brave," replied Dr. Lapponi, but before the remark was uttered the Pope was again unable to understand what was said. ANOTHER HEART ATTACK.

Dr. Lapponi really thought the end had arrived, and Cardinal Serafino Vannutelli, the grand penitenary, began the prayers for he dying, and gave the Pontiff absolution in articulo mortis. His death was considered so imminent that all the cardinals were present and the members of the diplomatic corps were admitted to the sick-room, as, according to tradition, popes must die surrounded by the Sacred College, the pontifical court and the diplomats accredited to the Vatican.

The Government has decided that when the Pope's death is imminent or has actually occurred, it will hold up all dispatches until the facts are officially verified, when the first official announcement will be made. Although this morning's bulletin may have given the impression that the

Pope's condition is somewhat ameliorated, in reality the doctors do not think so. They consider that the lowering of the pulse and the diminution of the respiration are due to great prostration of the whole organism, which is augmenting, notwithstanding the fact that the patient at times takes a little nour-

The Pope continues, now and then, to mutter phrases, although unconscious. His mind evidently returns to the events which impressed him most before his illness began. If this is the effect of the earliest stages of Chamberlain's policy, we cannot be too deeply grateful to the man, who, a practical man of commerce himself, has seen fit to bring into the arena of practical politics a the interior of every home under British sway. There are countless men and women deeply interested in birds or the animal species, who have not the remotest idea of the economics which govern the lives of their own species, or how they themselves happen to have money with which purchase leisure, which enables them to pursue their favorite line of

There is no subject touching men on the practical side which is so much neglected as political enonomy. It is doubtful whether one man in ten understands the principles of banking, let alone the theory of money. How many of our legislators even nave read a standard work on economics? The difficulty is that most of the text books are too dull and neavy, and yet the subject is one that can be made clear and attractive for persons of ordinary education. Many are familiar with Adam Smith's famous chapter on the division of labor, which was one of the selections understood. The Debt of the Country.

The Dominion Treasury receipts for the fiscal year 1903, ending June 30 last, amounted to \$63,739,271, but a number accounts are outstanding which may bring the total revenue up to \$65,000,as compared with \$58,000,000 last after Confederation. The surplus for the year 1903 will be about \$15,000,000. Capital and special expenditures will absorb eight or nine millions, leaving at least \$5,000,000 for the reduction of the public debt. The operation of the sinking fund will take another two millions and a half from the debt, which stood at \$271,829,089 last year. The Dominion started at confederation with a net debt of \$75,-



Darwin's studies were confined to the gorilla. When Orab is 20 months old Capt. De Lancier will begin to train him. With the experiences he has had with the chimpanzee he will know something of what the gorilla is capable of ac-He will therefore first teach Orab the tricks for which Esau was famous, and this accomplished. proceed much further. If Orab does what Esau did he will eat with a knife and fork instead of with his fingers. He will write his name in handwriting and also upon the typewriter. His musical feats will consist of playing the C chord upon the piano. He will also ride a bicycle, sharpen a lead pencil and pare an apple.




