Vladivestock Fleet Bobs Up Again-Japa Building Railroad South From Ping Yang.

Tokio, March 23 .- A special dispatch from Wojl says the Japanese fleet made another attack on Port Arthur March 18, bombarded the city and its defenses, and fought a furious engagement with the Russian fleet outside the harbor, destroying one Russian battleship. Seven Japanese casualties are reported. There is no information concerning the Japanese fleet's condition.

The navy department has not been advised of this engagement, but evidently expects news.

A SPY IN THE HOUSE. A Member of the Japanese Diet To Be Placed on Trial.

Akiyama is the publisher of the Nirokushitbun, a Tokio paper which has been bitterly assailing the Government, particularly upon its financial policy. It has also charged the Government with having forced capitalists to subscribe to the war bonds recently issued, and has predicted that a second loan will prove a failure.

PORT ARTHUR EXPECTS A SIEGE.

St. Petersburg, March 23.-The feeling here is that the Japanese tactics are preliminary to a landing on the peninsula in an attempt to cut off Port Arthur, simultancously with a general bombardment and commencement of a siege. For this the Russians declare they are fully prepared. During the last ten days a general shutting down upon newspaper telegrams from the Far East have been noticeable. This is owing to increased precautions to prevent the enemy from obtaining news of the movements of Russian

St. Petersburg, March 22 .- The Emperor has received the following tele-"Lieut.-Governor Stoessel reports

Another telegram from Viceroy Alexieff to the Emperor gives Vice-Admiral Makaroff's report as follows: "At midnight of March 21 two of the enemy's torpedo boats approached the outer roadstead, but were covered by the searchlights of the batteries, and fired upon by the forts and by the gunboats Bober and Otvajny. They were obliged to retire.

"A second attack was made at 4 o'clock in the morning by three torpedo boats, which also were repulsed. "At daylight three detachments of the enemy's fleet, consisting of six battleships, six armored cruisers, six points to the imminence of active opersecond and third-class cruisers and eight torpedo boats approached from all sides. 




