Reilly Resigns Position.

OUTSIDERS DO THE DIRTY WORK.

That's the Rule in Election Matters Says
Justice Osler.

Toronto, Dec. 1.—The Court yester-day reserved judgment in the North York election case. During the concluding argument by counsel, Justice Osler remarked to Mr. Aylesworth, that the counsel for Mr. Davis was 'just splitting hairs,' who replied that while the newspapers had said so, he hardly expected the Court to say so. too, and Justice Osler also remarked, on the matter of bringing remarked, on the matter of bringing strangers into the constituency, that his experience in election trials has been that practically all the acts of corruption had been attributable to the outsiders, thus brought into the constituency. FINANCING A RAILWAY

Speyer Bros. Issue Announcement in Wall Street Journal.

Very Full Details of the Grand Trunk Pacific Are Given For the Information of Intending Investors-Bends Nov Being Sold On Western Section of the Read, Which Is Divided Into Prairie and Mountain Divisions.

New York, Nov. 30 .- Details of the New YORK, NOV. 30:—Details of the Grand Trunk Pacific project are an-nounced in connection with the fi-aancing of the road by Speyer Bros. The following announcement was made in The Wall Street Journal to-

made in The Wall Street Journal to-day.

The read is to be built in two divisions, the eastern from Moncton, N.B., te Winnipeg, 1,800 miles, and the western from Winnipeg to the Pacific, 1,500 miles. Rails are to be standard 75 and 80 pounds steel rail. Contract specifications for a line "on a standard not inferior to the main line of the Grand Trunk from, Montreal to Toronto." The western division is to be completed by 1911.

The eastern division will be built

by 1911.

The eastern division will be built by the Canadian Government under Grand Trunk supervision. The western division will be built by the Grand Trunk Pacific under Government of the Covernment of the Cov ment supervision. When completed the entire line will be operated by the

Grand Trunk.

The eastern division will be leased The eastern division will be leased for fifty years on a rental equal to 3 per cent. of the cost, and at the end of that time Government may extend the lease or operate the road itself. At all times the Grand Trunk Pacific concedes a right of way to other systems as the Government dictors.

On the eastern division fifty-year 3 per cent. Government debentures will be issued. The Grand Trunk has nobe issued. The Grand Trunk has nothing to do with the financing. The Grand Trunk Pacific will have nothing to do with the eastern division until it is ready for operation. After this date for several years no rental will be paid, this seven years interest being paid by the Government as

a bonus.

The western division on which bonds are now being sold is divided into two sections, one prairie, the other mountain. On the prairie section the Government will guarantee 3 per cent. bonds up to 75 per cent. of cost not to exceed \$13,000 per mile. For the remainder of the cost the Grand Trunk Railway will guarantee Grand Trunk Pacific second mortgage bonds. In case of a default the first three will get 75 per cent. and the second bonds 25 per cent. of net revenue.

On the mountain division the Gov-On the mountain division the Government will pay the interest on bonds up to 75 per cent. of cost, not stipulated as to amount, for the first seven years. Thereafter for the three years the company will be liable, but no foreclosure will be possible, the years the company will be insected to no foreclosure will be possible, the accumulated debt being capitalized and repaid to the Government on 3 per cent. bonds. After the ten years the bonds will become bonds guarantees the bonds will become bonds guarantees the second to be a second to be

the bonds will become bonds are to be dated on the completion of the property equipped and ready for operation. When this is done the first mortgage when this is done the first mortgage debt will be 3 per cent, guaranteed bonds. The second mortgage, representing additional cost, may bear any interest. Of the stock \$20,000,000 may be preferred and \$20,000. 000 may be preferred and \$25,000,-000 common. The latter goes to the Grand Trunk, which will thus control the new property.

WANTS DUTIES LOWERED.

Canada is flourishing, and the wheat raising country of the Northwest is bound to make a record some day. Everything raised in our latitude is hardier than the products of land further south and is better."

Minister Dryden would have exhibited his prize shorthorn bull, Prince Gloucester, but decided not to pay the tariff duties.

Japs Advanced At 10 a.m. Wednesday-Fought Till After 7.

Russians Were Then Driven Back-No Part of Port Arthur Marbor Or of the City Is Concealed From the View of Japanese Gunners-No Refuge Now For Steessel-Fortress Due to Fall On

Tokio, Dec. 1.—The Japanese have captured and now hold 203-Metre captured and now hold 203-Metre Hill. The force operating against 203-Metre Hill advanced at ten o'clock yesterday from trenches already captured near the summit of the hill and struggled for the southeastern portion of the fort on the summit till after 7 o'clock at night, when the Russians were driven back.

Jap Gunners Beminate City. Jap Gunners Dominate City.

With this last range of hills in possession of General Nogi no part of the harbor nor of the city of Port Arthur will be concaled from the view of the Japanese gunners. The prompt destruction of the warships and burning of the city will follow unless surrender is offered without delay.

There is no refuge for Gen. Stoes There is no refuge for then, stocssel's army except on the line of hills southwest of Port Arthur, known as the Liaotie Mountain. There is no water there for the army's supply, and there would be no way of obtaining food except that carried in the fight which must follow the final the fight which must follow the fina assault of the Japanese.
Fall Expected Friday.

Fall Expected Friday.

This is accepted in Tokio as practically the end of the struggle at Port Arthur. The final charge against the splendidly equipped line of final earthworks, in which breaches have been made, undoubtedly will cost the Japanese soldiers many lives, but their success will give them command of the entire city and harbor, and mark the capture of the great fortress. Its fall is expected not later than Friday.

St. Petensburg, Dec. 1.—Official and private despatches received here wight indicate that the Japanlast night indicate that the Japan-ese are falling back below Sintsintin, where for several days they had apwhere for several days they had apparently been attempting a turning movement. After four days of severe but unsuccessful fighting, they are now retiring, with the Russians in pursuit. It is impossible as yet to tell whether either movement has real strateric significance.

The Russian Consul at Che Foo telegraphs that the Japanese captured two forts in the storming operations against Port Arthur on Nov. 29, but the news is not confirmed from any other quarter. The Consul says the Japanese losses were enormous, and that 5,000 men were sacrificed in two hours.

He rode through the crowded streets, in a State coach, escorted by a troop of lancers, and accompanied by the Crown Prince, his staff and some members of the Imperial house-hold, to the House of Parliament, where both Houses were assembled in the Chamber of Representatives.

Washington, Dec. 1.—The President announced yesterday that Rear-Ad-miral Charles H. Davis has accepted the appointment on the Dogger Bank court of enquiry.

An Inquiry Made.

London, Dec. 1.—According to The Standard the Government has instituted a searching inquiry regarding British vessels coaling the Russian fleet, with a view to prevent any future breach of neutrality.

Torento Branch Suspends.

London, Dec. 1.—It is reported a large banking and brokerage firm in London is in serious difficulties. The liabilities of the firm are said to amount to \$1,000,000 sterling. The fivening Star, says it is the London and Paris, Exchange, and adds that it, closed its doors yesterday afternagon.

Toronto, Dec. 1,—The London and Paris Exchange has a branch in To-roulo at 34 Victoria street. C. G. T. Bailey, the Canadian manager, when seen yesterday said that he had received no cable confirming the rumor, but that he had suspended business until he received instructions from headquarters.

Surveys For Two Years.

Montreal, Dec. 1.—Arthur St. Laurent, engineer in charge of the Georgian Bay Ship Canal surveys, who was here yesterday, says the 425 miles have been divided into the Nipissing, the Ottawa and Montreal districts, and each district sub-divided into three sections, in all, with 145 men, and the surveys will take two years, but Mr. St. Laurent says that no insurmountable engineering difficulties will be encountered.

Revenue Increases.

Ottawa, Dec. 1.—The customs revenue for November amounted to \$3,358,267. The receipts for November, 1903, were \$162,952 lower. For the three months ending Nov. 30, the customs receipts were \$17,844,033, an increase of \$311,083 over the same period last year.
