

May I refer to the agency and the newest arguments for leading people to submit to such dictation and coer-

The latest agency calls itself the "Montreal Presbyterian Publicity Committee." It has been sending out a series of letters to the press all over Can-

"Of its four members the only two names known to me are Mr. W. M. Birks, Chairman, and Dr. Bruce Taylor, Secretary. The former does not belong to our church, but to the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. The latter has only been a short time in Can-ada. Of the efforts of outsiders and newcomers to break up the Presbyterian church, and their good taste in assuming the task, your readers can judge.

Passing from this latest agency, note the latest arguments. The old arguments failed. Their only result in the four years between the two votes of the people was to increase the opposition by about fifty per

The new arguments are of two kinds, names and pictures. Our people will appreciate this tribute to their intelligence.

First came the names. The first letter of this "Montreal Presbyterian Publicity Commit-tee" recently published, consists of the names, occupations, etc. of forty-eight "Presbyterian laymen" from Halifax to Van-These names are not given as members of a committee, but as reasons why the Presbyterian Church in Canada should be blotted out because

they think so.
Presbyterians usually do their own thinking. They do not sup-pose that a little prominence in finance, politics or law specially qualifies for deciding questions

faith and conscience for Thirteen of the forty-eight names, more than one-fourth of them, are given as from Mont-One of them, to whom they call special attention as heading the list, removed from Canada thirty years ago. Five others of the thirteen belong to the American church of the

Presbytery of New York, Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. It is a congregation of worthy people, and has done much of its mission work through the Boards of our Church. for more than forty year's it has lived beside the Presbyterian Church in Canada and has not United with it. There was no special reason why it should do so if it preferred otherwise. It would not have done better

work. It shows that organic union is not necessary to unity. This "Publicity Committee" has thus published to the world, as belonging to and representing the Presbyterian Church in Canada, nearly half their list of Montreal names from another Church. This is so plain an un-truth that there need be no surprise at a second untruth, in that same letter, which declares that "the Basis of Union permits and expects existing congregations to continue in every

particular exactly as before.'

On the contrary, it is self

evident, and it is expressly declared in the Basis of Union. that every congregation will be "subject in general affairs, to the legislation, principles and discipline of the United Church";—a Church which has deliberately dropped from the ordination vows of ministers all declaration of acceptance of any system of Scripture Truth, drop-ping even the vow of acceptance of its own Basis;—leaving an open door for error, especially that error, all too prevalent, which takes from Christ His Crown of Deity and makes Him merely a man—a Church which for its so-called eldership, has no ordination vows of any kind whatsoever;—a Church which hands over all control of the Calling and Settlement of min-isters to an arbitrary and irres-onsible Settlement Committee,

One of their picture letters tells of what it calls "The first Union Church in Canada" at St. Anne de Bellevue, near Mon-treal, the seat of McDonald Agricultural College. The letter implies that over-lapping and waste has been there replaced a self-supporting Union

This is a third untruth. What are the facts . We have a few good people at St. Anne who, for many years, maintained re-ligious services, entirely self-supporting. 



Unusual difficulties beset even an official movie man at the front, Capt. Donald C. Thompson found out when he was filming "War as it Really Is," the great seven reeler made under direct authority of General Joffre and the French War Office. When seeing it at the Rex Theatre, where it is to play on Monday and Tuesday next, under the auspices of The Courier, the audience will realize the many perils through which Thompson went to record the 500 scenes of modern fighting methods shown on the screen.

In an interview given just before his departure for the Rou

manian front, where he is now with the Russian armies, Capt.

Thompson said:

"Taking pictures under fire is hard work—the hardest kind to be imagined. Of course, when you really get set, and have to keep turning the camera crank when bullets are whistling near and shells bursting all around it becomes real errors." shells bursting all around, it becomes real sport. The big difficulty is in finding a place to set your camera so it will catch real action in a way spectacular enough to make it interesting to an audience viewing the pictures.



INSECTS AS TRAVELLERS

Moths, Butterflies, and Beetles Often Make Long Distance Journeys

William Evans, a Scottish naturalist, who has made a lifelong study of the fauna of Scotland, obtained from a dozen Scottish lighthouses 241 species of insects, which include two butterflies, 159 moths, 188 caddis flies and lacewings, 40 diptera, 10 beetles and a dozen other species Most of the specimens were males. To reach the Isle of May, in the Firth of Forth, where Mr. Evans collected most of his insects, many of the specimens must have flown across several miles of sea.

In his records Mr. Evans calls at ention to several other extraordin ary flights of insects. Thus, the "painted lady," or this butterfly (Pyrameis cardui), has

been known to cross the Alps; the red admiral butterfly (Vanessa ata-lanta) has landed in numbers on the deck of a vessel 1,500 miles from the coast of England: the common white butterflies cross the English chan-nel in clouds; the famous milkweed butterfly (Danais archippus), abundant everywhere in the United States, is said to make a 200-mile journey from California to the Hawailian islands and has gradually progressed by way of the south sea islands as far as Australia.

a steamer 200 miles off the Cape Verde islands. Clouds of ladybirds miles in extent, so that they resemb-led smoke from a steamer have been seen at sea. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre

Dutles—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead tent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his home-stead right may take a purchased home-stead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per Duties-Must reside six months in Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect house worth \$300.
