THE GRAND SOUTHERN.

We can assure Mr. Kay's paid organs, that the decision of the Government was by no means intended, or calculated in any way, to give consolation to the St. John and Maine people. The Government therefore ought not to be abused for having failed to accomplish something that it never intended to accomplish. We told our readers long and long ago the Grand Southern was "not dead but only sleeping." We all know how refreshed one feels after a sleep; judge then of the vim and energy with which the Grand Southern will push ahead after its little nap. Never put your trust in Princes, saith the proverb; never put your trust in old females say we. Mr. Kay might as well have taken his employers' money and thrown it over the wharf, as to have gone and bought wines to set Mrs. Jones and all her gabby old mates half crazy, and turn that ill-fated chamber in the Dufferin for the time being into a Fool's Paradise. The money he paid the Globe for writing that article the other day, was also money badly wasted; not even had the deposed Postmaster the courtesy to mark at the end of said editorial "I insertion." The last instalment paid to Mr. Livingston was a grosser waste still, because anxious as John was to thwart the road, one or two gentlemen who own John body and soul would not allow him to get into print until the matter was settled. But his article after "all the fat is in the fire," is scarcely of very weighty importance, because it is quite evident he does not mean the Grand Southern, or Local Government when he asks, "Why did the Government think it necessary to take a security on their rails?" The Government of China or of Japan, or of some other outlandish country whose secrets the Livingston editor no doubt possesses, may have insisted upon some such conditions, but it is quite a piece of news to members of the New Brunswick Government that any such condition has been agreed upon here, as that paper puts it.

That our readers may know the kind of writers Mr. Kay draws to his service we quote the following, not for its grammatical or logical merit, but for its insane rant:

"If the Government had the power which they now claim, why did the Grand Southern application and bill come before the Legislature last Session at all? Why did the Government make the Company's bill their own measure, and demand, and force its passage in the House?"
We still are forced to believe the Kay organ has Japan on the brain, because *this Country* has yet to learn that "the Government made the Company's bill their own measure," that they brought down the bill, or demanded or forced "its passage" "in" the House, or through the House as the Sun would have said if only knew grammar enough.
If the Grand Southern Railway Company decided on bringing in a

bill to extend their charter, that was no affair of the Governments; they might have wished no doubt that such a bill made a triumphant passage through both branches of the legislature because that would show at least, if it showed nothing else, that the Legislature which gave life to the charter was prepared to stand by an act of its own. Further it would have saved to the Government the responsibility of exercising powers which only at a last resort—where equity and right are involved,—it could care to exercise. The heartier the support the bill received in its passage, the more at ease would the Government have felt; therefore even though they knew the powers rested with themselves, without the last winters bill at all, to continue all the privileges of the charter—with one exception—they made no objection to the bill, but on the contrary approved of it,—little suspecting that it would be murdered in the very cradle where it received its first rocking. The powers of the Government existed then as now; those powers the Government knew they possessed, and this is why, if the opposite organs but remember, it was told them long ago, yea the very day after Mr. Kay had foolishly tossed his cup in the air and spent \$100 telegraphing the result to England, by certain papers not a hundred miles from the Capital, not to shout till they were out of the woods, and added "The Grand Southern is not dead, but merely sleeping."

THE POOR GOVERNMENT.

Mr Kay one of the employees of the St John and Maine Railway Company is in the city, resolved it is said on putting an injunction on the Government of the Province as a punishment to that body for having had the temerity to decide a virtual extension of the Grand Southern's charter. It has not yet transpired in what way Mr Kay will move, but he said in Bangor, we have been told, that he would "fix the Government." This is too vague a statement, and the employe should have mentioned in what particular way he will fix them. It may be he will get the Queen to abolish the Province as a political division, or he may have the clause in the British North America Act establishing this Province suspended. Or, indeed, he may take it into his head to get the United States Government to declare war against England, to take charge of the Province, and thus abrogate all the Government have done. We do not think he would be so cruel as to send the Executive to jail, or attach the revenues of the Province; because in that case how would our public institutions fare? who would make our roads and build our bridges, or sustain our schools or give a little support to the newspapers now and again? Mr. Kay should do nothing rashly—but if he moves in any one of the ways above, we beg of him not to bring on a war between Great Britain and the United States, because, bad as the times are now, that would play the mischief with us altogether.

WHAT COULD IT HAVE BEEN?

A gentleman has just called in to the STAR office and informed the editor that as he was standing in the Square yesterday where Mr. Lawlor's men are at work, he happened to look in through some of the public office windows, and he says he feels quite sure he saw some young man inside one of them. There must be some mistake that there is nothing more probable than that he should see any young man inside these offices. There is not a young clerk about these building now, nor will there be till after the potato digging season is ended. If there was any such person in there, he must have broken in: in that case we call upon the police to visit the premises promptly and investigate what damages have been done. As it will be necessary that some of the young clerks should assist the police in making the investigation, and as it is not at all probable that the police or any one about the buildings, or perhaps in the city, know where the clerks are we beg here to publish the following advertisement.
